Of Nebraska's 3,000+ childcare centers, Our Place in Hastings is unique—it provides care for special needs teens. Founded by Adeline Johnson for her daughter, Zoe, the center opened in the basement of a local church but soon outgrew its space. Then Johnson turned to Rural Prosperity Nebraska's grant-funded eCommunities team. The team helped Johnson secure a larger stand-alone building for Our Place, and open the Freedom Factory consignment store, which sells crafts made by the teens. The center thrives on donations, but all profits from the store go to the teens.
