


Kimball & Banner Counties Impact At-A-Glance



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4-H is constantly striving to reach youth in new and exciting ways. This year over 90 Kimball/Banner County youth got to experience the awe of holding a ball python while learning about animal care.

In 2022, we hired Brooke Heine to judge our small animal show. A couple weeks prior to fair, we let her know that we would have two Ball Python Snakes in the show. Her response was swift and concerned, “Nathan, I am deathly scared of snakes. I can’t judge them.” It took 2 weeks of reassuring, but finally as the day of the show arrived her countenance shifted. Brooke realized that in her role as a life coach she challenged others to step outside their comfort zone and now it was time for her to do the same. She did an amazing job growing our youth that day and even grew a little herself.

Programs At-A-Glance

- 77 Panhandle beef producers took part in face-to-face programs focused on improving pregnancy rates in cows. The program had an estimated economic value of \$160,000.
- 152 Kimball-Banner County youth took part in 4-H clubs in 2021-2022. Clubs recorded over 235 service hours just in the month of April.
