4-H Ambassadors are 4-H teens that applied and were selected to lead and take part in activities that help them become good citizens and leaders through civic engagement education. The mission of the program is to empower teens with the knowledge and skills to be advocates for Nebraska 4-H & Youth Development across the state. This experience will strengthen their leadership abilities so they can serve as a positive role model for younger youth; build partnerships with teens, volunteers, and supporters of the 4-H program; and promote 4-H in Nebraska. Four Dakota County 4-H Ambassadors met with county commissioners during Nebraska 4-H Month and represented 4-H at the Dakota-Thurston County Fair.
