The Early Childhood team provides affordable, research-based programs and resources to empower adults who care for young children.



Access to professional development is a critical issue for early childhood professionals, particularly those in rural communities. Nebraska Extension's Early Childhood team members partnered with local organizations to host seven uniquely local conferences, providing an opportunity for both professional development and connection with peers. These conferences reached 511 attendees, with 2,870 training hours awarded (twelve hours are needed annually to maintain licensure). Home-based providers often note that local conferences are the only opportunity they have to connect with others in their profession, making these experiences critically important. One participant noted, "I feel like I can connect with my peers, director, and children more because of this conference."

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The Early Childhood team is collaborating with University of Nebraska-Kearney and Communities for Kids on the Knowledge Network for Early Childhood Education Workforce (KNEW) project. The goal of KNEW is to increase recruitment and retention of early childhood educators in Nebraska, particularly in rural communities.

The team was awarded \$2 million in support from the U.S. Department of Education. Fifteen communities—including businesses, nonprofit organizations, early childhood educators, and other stakeholders— are being invited to participate to create a statewide network. The Early Childhood team will play a critical role in program implementation and community outreach.
