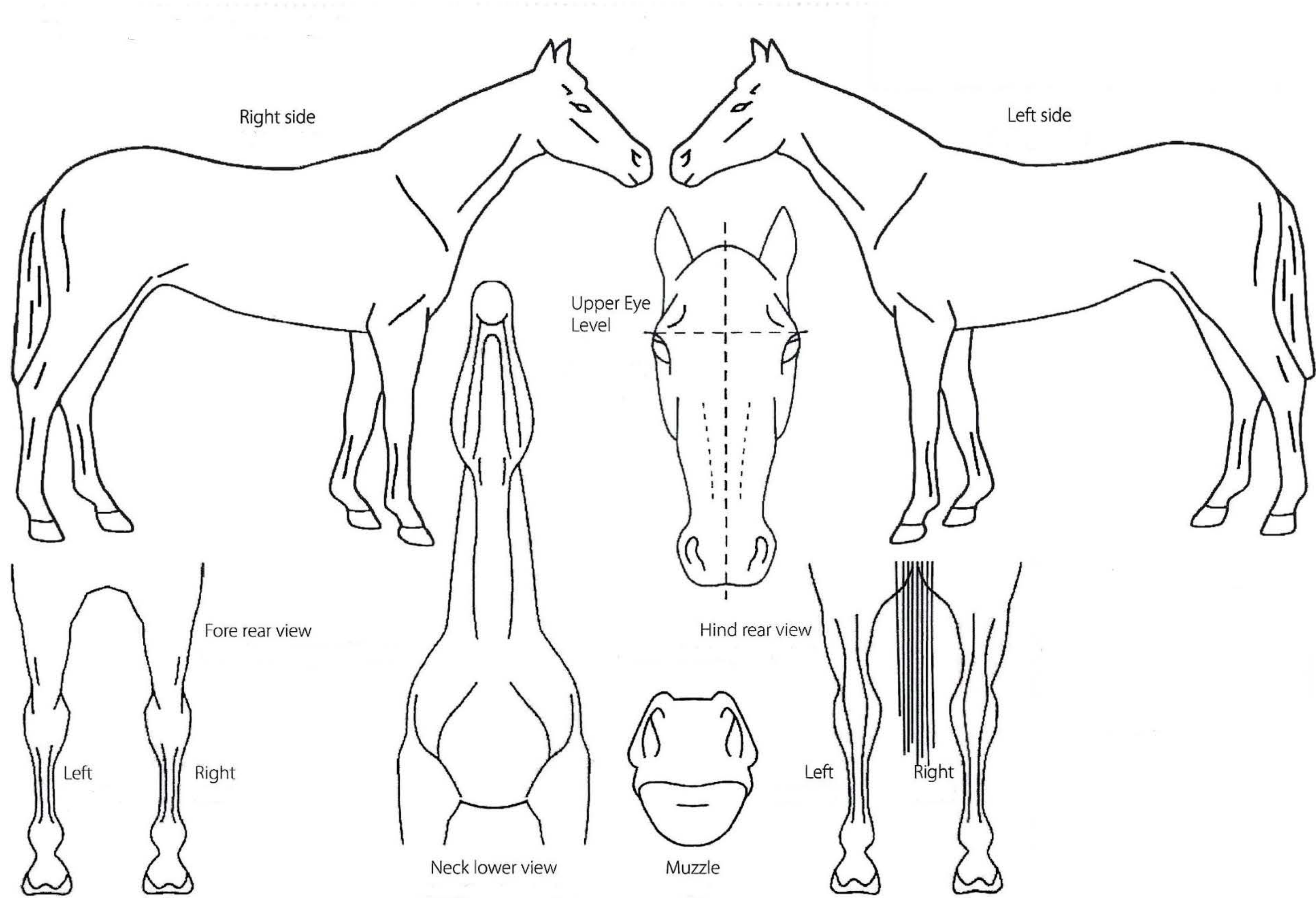

Horse Identification

Horses must be identified by color markings or photograph. Project animals not owned by the exhibitor or his/her family must have an affidavit from the owner certifying that the exhibitor will manage and have access to the horse at least 75 percent of the time during the course of the project year. The term "manage" includes ALL of the following: Feeding, Grooming, Exercising, Training, Stall Management and use of the horse.
