Start

412 and 418 Oak Drive (they are side by side) Both have lovely front approaches to their homes with large terraces in the back yards, each decorated a little differently.

(when arriving in Wayne on Hwy 35 from the west, Oak Drive is about a block

east of Bomgaars) You will turn south, west side of road. (these two homes are new on the tour)

217 West 11th

Corner lot with a vast array of blue pots incorporated into the landscape. If you like blue this landscaping really pops. (this home was on previous tour)

(return to hwy 35, drive east to Lincoln Street, turn north to 11th street. house is on the corner

911 Loyd Court

Corner lot house in one of the newest housing areas of Wayne. Many items packed into the corner of the backyard. (when on 11th street, drive east to main street and turn north. Turn east on Lindahl Drive) You will be driving through Wayne State College. Your GPS will take you the rest of the way. If you drive past the large dome, you have gone too far north. This house is new

on the tour.

Know your Master Gardener-----

I was born and raised in Waseca, Minnesota, about 30 miles north of Albert Lea. My dad was a mechanical engineer who worked for EF Johnson Company that manufactured communication radios. When I was in junior high, Mom and Dad bought a house that was on Clear Lake. We had so much fun learning to water ski and sail. I learned to canoe in Girl Scouts and spent hours each week canoeing on the lake. Several times I canoed in Boundary Waters with different groups. I loved the camping, adventure, and water.

I finished college in the Pacific Northwest and stayed there several more years, working for Washington State Unemployment. On the weekends, I hiked in the Cascade Moun-

tains and around Mt. Rainier. Eventually, I moved to the Rocky Mountains west of Denver, settling in Summit County, a resort area in CO. For several years, I worked seasonally, summers with the US Forest Service in the San Juan Mountains and winters at the ski resorts in Summit County. The Tilden Petunia Story

From 2005 to 2015, Ginny Werkmeister spearheaded and championed Tilden's annual community-wide flower displays along its main streets during Prairie Days. She also planted and nurtured the beautiful wave petunias that cascaded from planter boxes suspended above the streets every July and August.

Since Ginny's passing in 2015, a small band of flower enthusiasts (a.k.a. The Petunia Pals) have honored Ginny's memory and continued the petunia tradition. We each take turns watering and fertilizing the plants. This year there are seven Petunia Pals sharing the flower duties, which began May 1st with the potting of 130 wave petunia plants. The Werkmeister family still graciously allows us the use of their greenhouse for nurturing the flowers.

As the plants mature fully, we "pinch them off" to create a more full effect. In mid-July, the plants will emerge from the shelter of the greenhouse onto a flatbed trailer to "harden off", and in late July they'll be brought to town to be enjoyed by all.

It's a fun project every year! We hope everyone enjoys our labor of love — a gift to the community and an ongoing memorial to Ginny, whose life embodied "the strength of the soil and the beauty of the flowers"
