4-H ENROLLMENT NOW OPEN!

Each year, you (members and leaders) must re-enroll in the 4-H program. Access the enrollment form at https://v2.4honline.com. If you are a returning member, enter your email address and password. If you have forgotten your password, click "Reset Password" to receive an email with a link to set a new password. Do not create a new profile if you have registered before!

For NEW members! We can't wait for you to join us! Please visit https://v2.4honline.com. If you have never enrolled in 4-H using 4-H Online, select "Don't have an account?" Select your state, "Nebraska 4-H Youth Development", and your county. Each household will have a profile, and individual members will be added under one profile. Choose club or clubs. If taking a shooting sports project, be sure to select the 4-H Shooting Sports Club as one of your clubs, and then select your project areas.

NEW FOR 2023-24: The list of projects has been condensed into project areas. For example, if someone wants to take Breeding Beef and Market Beef, they will simply choose "Beef". Or if you are taking Photography, you will not have the option of choosing different levels. Clover Kids will only choose Clover Kids. Some of the department names have been changed, so if you need help, please call the Extension Office.

Projects should be selected if families would like to receive additional information regarding project-specific reminders, such as upcoming deadlines. If you forget to choose a project, no worries, <u>you can still take</u> <u>exhibits from any project area to the fair.</u>

If enrolling in Horse and Shooting Sports, those areas have not changed. You are required to select these projects due to the consent forms that are required. The goal is to enroll in 4-H now. Then when you turn in your fair entries in June, you can add all the exhibits you want.

If your 4-Her plans to attend 4-H camp or participate in any state or national events, you must complete the health section. All other 4-Hers may skip over the health information. Then complete the consent section.

SHOOTING SPORTS

SHOOTING SPORTS SAFETY

- 1. Treat every firearm and bow with respect.
- 2. Watch the muzzle or arrow point. Always be in control of the direction the bow or firearm is pointed, even if you stumble.
- 3. Be sure the barrel and action are clear of obstructions, and that you have only the proper ammunition or arrows for the gun or bow that you are shooting.
- 4. Be sure of your target before you pull the trigger or release arrow; know your backstop or DON'T SHOOT!
- 5. Unload guns and take arrows off the string when not in use. Carry guns and bows in cases, UNLOADED and secure.
- 6. Never point a bow or firearm at anything you do not want to shoot; AVOID ALL HORSEPLAY!
- 7. Never climb a fence or tree or jump a ditch with a loaded firearm. Never pull a gun toward you.
- 8. Never shoot at a target on a flat, hard surface or water. Be sure of your target before you squeeze the trigger or release the string.
- 9. Store guns and ammunition or bows and arrows separately beyond the reach of children or careless adults.
- 10. Avoid alcoholic beverages or any type of drug before shooting. If such actions are observed in others, do not join that group. Enjoy your sport safely.

Local 4-H Shooting Sports clubs are open to all youth ages 8 to 18. Each year, 4-H teaches a shooting sport to about 500,000 boys and girls each year. Shooting sports can be gratifying for youngsters, especially those who aren't athletes. The program provides a supportive environment in which young people can experience hands-on, fun learning experiences.

Volunteers are needed to coordinate county programs and to work at the local level. Individuals who are interested in shooting sports and are willing to learn about them can become involved in an existing program or club. If none exists, they can work with 4-H youth staff to help establish a program.

All instructors are trained by state instructors certified to teach courses. Adult volunteers receive training in shooting sports at state and regional workshops to become qualified instructors.

4-H teen leaders may wish to assist with instruction. Shooting sports leaders act as role models and must impart the 4-H philosophy and youth development objectives to 4-H members.

4-H VOLUNTEERS

INTERESTED IN BECOMING A 4-H VOLUNTEER?

Volunteers are the heart of 4-H. Whether you choose to start your own club or be a project leader on a special project, or serve as an activity worker at the county fair or other 4-H activities, your time and effort are valued as necessary assets to the program.

Club organizational leaders and project leaders will enroll as an active volunteer in 4-H online.

- All volunteers must sign the Activity Worker Guidelines and Volunteer Code of Conduct every year, as a part of the enrollment process.
- ALL NEW club volunteers must be screened prior to service, and complete a screening as a direct volunteer every 5 years.
- Club volunteers should complete at least two hours of training annually.

Volunteers not enrolling in 4-H online will need to complete the volunteer screening for indirect volunteers every year. This can be done by completing the Activity Application for the Indirect Volunteer at

HOW TO ENROLL AS A VOLUNTEER

If you are a returning 4-H volunteer, you will need to enroll in 4-H Online at https://v2.4honline.com. Every 5 years, we need to go through a screening process with DHHS. Fortunately, Boone and Nance Counties are not on the list this year. Only the new volunteers will need to do the screening process.

If you are a volunteer that is affiliated with a Club, you will choose Club Volunteer, then either Organizational Leader or Project Leader. Parent helpers do not need to enroll as volunteers.

If you are a new club volunteer, please also select Program Volunteer, then Selected for Required Screening.

If you are a county volunteer (not associated with a club) you will choose Program Volunteer, and County Volunteer. This would be for 4-H Council members and other volunteers that may assist with the fair, but are not attending 4-H meetings.

CLOVER KID CORNER

4-H Clover Kids is the officially recognized 4-H program in Nebraska for children under the age of 8. The program is designed to provide 5 to 7 year-olds a variety of educational and recreational experiences in a non-competitive environment. 4-H Clover Kids provides an excellent opportunity for youth to achieve their highest potential because early life experiences affect future development.

The primary goal is to promote the child's stages of development - intellectually, physically, socially, and emotionally.

- Develop Self-Esteem
- Decision-Making Skills (making positive choices)
- Comprehensive Skills (learning how to learn; positive attitudes toward learning)
- Mastering Physical Skills (enjoying constructive and creative play)
- Social-Interaction Skills (getting along with others)
- Diversity Skills (acceptance of others; exploring family and community relationships)

Children possessing these life skills are less likely to have problems with drug use, school failure, delinquency, and depression as they move into their teenage years and then into adulthood.

LIVESTOCK ACHIEVEMENT PROGRAM 2024

We are excited to announce the fourth year of the Nebraska 4-H Livestock Achievement Program. This additional opportunity for enrolled livestock project youth is designed to promote all educational aspects of 4-H livestock projects including selection, production, leadership, and exhibition by recognizing youth striving to improve in their livestock project knowledge and leadership.

The program recognizes Members of Excellence across all 4-H livestock project areas, including: beef, sheep, meat goat, swine, dairy cattle, dairy goat, rabbit, and poultry.

Youth completing the achievement program and receiving member of excellence recognition in the various species will be recognized during the Parade of Champions, 4-H weekend at the Nebraska State Fair.

ANIMAL PROJECTS

If you are new to 4-H and are interested in showing animals, there are several options. If you are a Clover Kid, you can bring a small pet or two. Or you can bring a bucket calf.

Older 4-H members can also bring market beef, breeding beef, feeder calf, sheep, swine, dairy, goats, cats, dogs, poultry, rabbits, or small pets.

An animal must be owned by the exhibitor who enters it, and identified to the Extension Office by May 15 to be eligible for the County Fair.

For information on how to get started in an animal project, contact your 4-H Club Leader.

HORSE PROJECT

The Horsemanship Advancement Levels program is designed to serve as a guide for instruction and evaluation of each member's progress. The correct handling of horses is emphasized from the beginning to the most advanced level. Each level has certain requirements a member must meet before they are allowed to proceed to the next level, such as demonstrating basic horse handling and riding, making a feed chart, written exam, and skills test.

The 4-H members being tested must be enrolled in the 4-H horse project. During testing of each level, youth must use a horse that has been properly identified on the 4-H Horse Identification Certificate (available at the Extension Office).

4-H'ers must own, lease, or manage the horse being used. Youth must have access to the horse and provide care and management. 4-H members may use any of their project horses. However, a single horse must be used for the entire skills test of each level.

County exhibitors must complete Level 1 testing after 2 years (two fairs) in the horse project by June 1, 2024.

For State 4-H Horse Expo participation, Level III and/or IV must be successfully completed before entering the coordinating level classes.

SCHOLARSHIP OPPORTUNITIES

NEBRASKA 4-H FOUNDATION SCHOLARSHIP

The Nebraska 4-H Foundation offers 4-H members the opportunity to apply for scholarships. The Nebraska 4-H Foundation awards up to \$22,000 worth of scholarships each year to 4-H'ers from across the state.

To apply for scholarships, 4-H'ers must submit the Nebraska 4-H Achievement Application for state-level review by <u>January 5th</u>. Youth must follow the application instructions available on the Nebraska 4-H Achievement Application webpage at https://4h.unl.edu/achievement-application. If applying for multiple scholarships, only one Achievement Application should be submitted.

ENGLER SCHOLARSHIP

This scholarship is available due to the generosity of The Paul and Virginia Engler Foundation. Paul is a native Nebraskan who through vision, hard work, sweat equity and tenacity built an exceptional career as an entrepreneur, industry leader, and dedicated advocate for building bridges for the next generation to cross.

For academic year 2024-2025, the application will open on 10/1/23 and close on 1/15/24 at midnight. The only requirements to apply for an Engler scholarship – declare a CASNR major and have participated in 4-H or FFA. Awards range from \$1000 to \$4000 per school year. Students also can reapply each year during their undergrad time at UNL.

SPECIAL GARDEN PROJECT

As you begin making plans for 2024, be sure to check out the Special Garden Project. This project is open to all 4-H youth and it will give them the opportunity to learn about growing, harvesting, and exhibiting this unique flower.

The Special Gardening Project lets 4-H members try their hand at growing unusual vegetables, flowers, and herbs. The project allows experienced 4-H gardeners to grow something fun, new, and different while letting younger members new to gardening get their feet wet in this project area.

The focus of the 2024 project is the Princess of India Nasturtium. This Victorian-era heirloom flower can be grown in a variety of ways including in containers. It provides a splash of color from its scarlet flowers, and much of the plant can be eaten.

Seeds will be distributed in March or April, along with planting and growing instructions. Gardeners will be able to exhibit this unique flower at County and State Fair. Exhibits can be the flowers, or a poster, story or essay, poem, or a photo exhibit. Youth participating in the Farrowed and Owned Cohort will exhibit their Farrowed and Owned project animals at the 2024 Nebraska State Fair with the opportunity for special recognition as a result of participating in the cohort.
