

Box Butte County 4-H Scholarship Application Procedure

Rules and Guidelines

Scholarship Details

The Box Butte County 4-H Council will award **three** \$1,000.00 and **one** \$500 scholarships provided by the Box Butte County 4-H Council, 5-C's Scholarship & Sharon Davis Memorial.

- Scholarships are paid in two parts, half for first semester and half for second semester.
- Scholarships are paid after proof of enrollment has been received for first semester and proof of enrollment and proof of GPA are received for second semester.
- *Recipient must be enrolled as a full-time student (minimum of 12 credit hours) and maintain a minimum GPA of 2.5.*

Basis for Selection

- 1. Candidate must be a high school senior with a GPA average of C or higher
- 2. Candidate must have completed three years as an active 4-H member in Box Butte County, Nebraska and be currently enrolled as an active member (a member who competes in a county 4-H contest and/or participates in a 4-H club by attending at least half of their scheduled meetings) in the Box Butte County 4-H program.

The application will be submitted in a clear binder in the following order:

- 1. 1 billfold size picture
- 2. 4-H Scholarship Application Form
- 3. Cover Letter
- 4. Box Butte County Scholarship Form
- 5. Copy of high school transcript
- 6. Two Letters of Recommendation. One recommendation letter must be from a Box Butte County 4-H leader or volunteer; the other may be from a teacher, guidance counselor, employer, minister, or activity sponsor.

Applications for the scholarships are due Friday, April 12, 2024, at the Box Butte County Extension Office at 415 Black Hills in Alliance. Awards will be announced through the local news media before graduation.

Requirements for Completing this Scholarship Application

1. Photo

Include one color or black and white billfold size or $4 \ge 6$ picture. Mount on white sheet of paper with removable adhesive (tape or glue). Write or type your name under the picture.

2. 4-H Scholarship Application Form

Complete and signed.

3. Cover Letter

This letter should be a concise informative narrative telling how 4-H has significantly impacted your life including favorite projects, awards and/or experiences. Explain why you are applying for the scholarships, your goals for the future, where you plan to attend college, and any additional information that will help the committee know you better.

4. Box Butte County Scholarship Form, including either:

4-H Career Portfolio current to date, Scholarship Form Part B (3 years' worth of information) OR at least 3 years' worth of Achievement Applications. If submitting a 4-H career Portfolio please submit it in its original green folder and make sure it is current to date.

5. High School Transcript and ACT/SAT scores

Contact your High School Office to obtain your transcript.

6. Two letters of recommendation Letters should be submitted as part of the application in sealed/signed envelopes.

7. Please submit in a large sealed envelope.

If any of the required items are missing from this application, the application will not be considered for scholarship reward. Please submit ALL materials in a large, sealed envelope.
