## HORTICULTURE

The purpose of Horticulture is to encourage participants to start and maintain vegetable gardens. In addition 4-H'ers can participate in planting, growing, and caring for flowers. There is also a special gardening project in this category that 4-H'ers can participate in.

4-H members may only exhibit in the project in which they are enrolled and one entry per class number.

All exhibits must be labeled. Label each item with the exhibitor name, project division, exhibit class number and years in the project before entering at county fair. Any exhibit not in a clear glass container will be dropped one ribbon placing.

All static exhibits must receive a purple ribbon at the county fair in order to be eligible for State Fair selection.

State Fair Premier 4-H Science Award is available in this area. See General Rules in State Fair Book for more details.

“My hands to larger service” — In an effort to reach out a helping hand to the community, the vegetables and fruit from the 4-H horticulture projects will be donated to a food pantry. These will be collected and distributed the day after entry day. Samples of Purple, Blue, Red and White ribbon winners will be left in each category, where possible. If a 4-H'er does not want to donate a certain exhibit, e.g., a pumpkin, onions or something that does not spoil during fair, then they need to request that it not be donated and mark the entry tag appropriately.

You Be The Teacher in Horticulture or Floriculture — Share with others what you learned in the project. Exhibit may be a three-dimensional display, scrapbook, charts, pictures, photographs, a file of ideas, research study, etc. A display may not exceed a total space of 12 inches deep, 15 inches wide and 10 inches high. Pictures, models, plaster, paper-mâché, etc., may be used in your exhibit. Attach the entry tag to the upper right hand corner of the entry. This exhibit must be educational. Examples: A comparative study on production of certain vegetable varieties, a story and record of products grown to sell at market, an exhibit of steps in making a craft item from plant material.

## FLORICULTURE

\*Denotes State Fair Entry

**Purple, \$1; Blue, \$0.75; Red, \$0.50; White, \$0.35**

Youth must be enrolled in the World of Flowers, Growing Great Houseplants, Annual Flowers, and/or Special Garden projects to enter exhibits. Exhibits are limited to ONE EXHIBIT PER EXHIBIT CLASS NUMBER.

The cultivar or variety name must be included on all entry cards. Failure to identify the cultivar or variety will drop the entry one ribbon placing. Proper identification is the responsibility of the exhibitor, not the Extension staff or office personnel. For Floriculture, punch hole in the top center of entry tag and use a rubber band to securely attach the entry tag to the container.

Exhibits entered under an incorrect class number or containing an incorrect number of stems will be dropped one ribbon placing. In classes G770023, G770045 and G770046, do not duplicate entries with the classes listed by using other cultivars or varieties, or entry will be dropped one ribbon placing. For example: 4-H'ers with two cultivars or varieties of marigolds can only enter the marigold class and cannot enter the other cultivar or variety in any other class. A perennial is defined as a plant of which the crown overwinters. An annual is a plant that grows from seed each season, whether self-seeded or planted by the gardener. A biennial is a plant that germinates, grows and overwinters as a crown, blooms the following year and dies. Foliage will be considered when exhibit is judged.

All 3 or 5 stems of cut flowers should be the same cultivar and color, do not mix cultivars and colors. Exhibit flowers in a “bottom heavy” container. Containers will not be judged; however, they should be a clear glass container and of adequate size to display blooms. Exhibitor is responsible for watering flowers during fair.

Follow the guidelines in 4-H Preparing Cut Flowers for Exhibits 4H227 (revised 2016) (free download-<https://unl.box.com/s/2f3a785c67p7qhqasevp6gu6adf3ugon>) when preparing entries for the fair.

**Educational Exhibits**

**Purple, \$2; Blue, \$1.50; Red, \$1; White, \$0.50**

- \*G770050 Flower notebook — Exhibit a notebook containing pictures of flowers grown in Nebraska. There must be at least 10 different species of annuals and/or biennials and 10 different species of perennials hardy to Nebraska. Bulbs may be included in a separate section. 4-H'ers may show more than one cultivar of the same species but it will only count as one species. The notebook must be the result of the current year's work. Pictures from garden catalogs, hand drawn pictures, or photographs may be used. Each species/cultivar must be labeled with the correct common name(s) and scientific name; the height and spread of the plant; and the growing conditions the

species prefers (for example: needs full sun and dry sandy soil). In addition to this information, bulbs should also be labeled as spring or summer flowering. Give proper credit by listing the sources of the pictures and information used. The 4-H member's name, age, full address, county and years in the project(s) must be on the back of the notebook.

\*G770051 Flower garden promotion poster — Individual poster promoting vegetable and/or flower gardening (14 inches by 22 inches, either vertical or horizontal arrangement). Poster may be in any medium — watercolor, ink, crayon, etc. — as long as they are not three-dimensional. Poster may not use copyrighted materials such as cartoon characters or commercial product names. Entry card must be stapled in upper right hand corner. The 4-H member's name, age, full address, county and years in project(s) must be on the back of the poster.

\*G770052 Educational flower garden poster — Prepare a poster no larger than 14 inches by 22 inches by 2 inches (three-dimensional if needed) illustrating a skill or project done in a 4-H flowers or houseplant project. You might show a special technique you used or equipment you have incorporated in your garden. Refer to 4-H horticulture project manuals, but use your own creativity. Entry card must be stapled to the upper right hand corner. The 4-H member's name, age, full address, county and years in project(s) must be on the back of the poster.

\*G770053 Flower gardening history interview — Neatly handwritten or typed account of a gardening history interview with a person whose flower garden has inspired you. Maximum of four pages of text and two pages of pictures of the garden if the individual is still gardening. Include one photo of the person interviewed. Protect with a clear report cover or small three-ring notebook. The 4-H member's name, age, full address, county and years in the project(s) must be on the back of the report.

**Purple, \$2; Blue, \$1.50; Red, \$1; White, \$0.50**

G770054 You Be The Teacher — This exhibit must be educational. See information in introduction to this division. Only one entry in this class

**NO PREMIUM**

G770055 Community service activity — Show what was done as a community service activity related to the horticulture project. In a notebook, photo story, or poster show the purpose and results of that activity. Example: planting and/or maintaining a flower garden at a public building or nursing home, helping an elderly person with a large gardening task, planting and harvesting vegetables for a donation to a food bank, etc. May be an individual or club activity. **Non-competitive/No premiums/Not a State Fair Exhibit.** Special recognition certificates will be awarded to participants.

**Houseplants**

\*Denotes State Fair Entry

**Purple, \$1; Blue, \$0.75; Red, \$0.50; White, \$0.35**

Youth must be enrolled in the Growing Great Houseplants project to exhibit in classes G770060-G770066. Entries must receive a purple ribbon at the county fair to advance to the State Fair.

Container-Grown Houseplants: The choice of container and soil quality will be considered in judging. Each houseplant must be identified by listing the names on the entry tag or on a card attached to the container. Houseplants should be grown in the display container for a minimum of six weeks. Plants grown as houseplants must be used. NebGuide G2205 "Guide to Growing Houseplants"

(<http://extensionpublications.unl.edu/assets/html/g2205/build/g2205.htm>) and NebGuide G837 "Guide to Selecting Houseplants" (<http://extensionpublications.unl.edu/assets/html/g837/build/g837.htm>) includes a listing of common houseplants. Containers of annual flowers or annual plants (ex. petunias, geranium, impatiens) will be disqualified and will not be judged. Entries in Classes G770060-G770066 must have been designed and planted by the 4-H member. Container grown houseplants must have received a purple ribbon at the county fair to be exhibited at the State Fair. Container grown houseplants shall be in pots no greater than 12 inches in diameter (inside opening measurement). Dish gardens, fairy or miniature gardens, desert gardens and terrariums may be up to 12 inches in diameter (inside opening measurement). Any container-grown plant in Classes G770060-G770066 that is greater than 12 inches in diameter (inside opening measurement) will be dropped one ribbon placing. Classes G770060-G770066 exhibitors must have and provide a saucer to catch drainage water. The 4-H member's name, age, full address, county, and years in the project(s) must be on the bottom or back of the container and saucer.

\*G770060 Flowering potted houseplant(s) blooming during exhibition (non-blooming plants will be disqualified). Container may have one or more houseplants in container. Label name for each plant.

\*G770061 Foliage potted houseplant(s) One variety of tropical or cacti or succulent plant.

\*G770062 Hanging baskets of flowering and/or foliage houseplants. Container may have one or more houseplants in container. Label name of each plant.

\*G770063 Dish garden – an open/shallow container featuring a variety of houseplants excluding cacti and succulents. Label name for each plant.

\*G770064 Fairy or Miniature garden – A miniature “scene” contained in an open container and featuring miniature or small, slow growing houseplants. The garden needs to have an imaginative theme and miniature accessories, i.e. bench, fence made from tiny twigs, small shell for a bath tub, etc. Label name for each plant.

\*G770065 Desert gardens — An open/shallow container featuring a variety of cacti and/or succulents grown as houseplants. Label name of each plant.

\*G770066 Terrariums — Transparent container, partially or completely enclosed; sealed or unsealed. Label name of each plant.

## **HORTICULTURE**

Youth must be enrolled in the Everyone A Gardener project, Gardening Unit 1-Unit 4, and/or Special Garden project. Exhibits are limited to ONE EXHIBIT PER EXHIBIT CLASS NUMBER. Notebooks and posters must receive a purple ribbon at the county fair to advance to the State Fair.

The cultivar or variety name must be included on all entry cards. Failure to identify the cultivar or variety will drop the entry one ribbon placing. Proper identification is the responsibility of the exhibitor, not the Extension staff or Office personnel. Exhibits entered under an incorrect class number or containing an incorrect number of vegetables will be dropped one ribbon placing. In classes G773252, G773255, G773268, G773269, G773285 and G773286, do not duplicate entries with the classes listed by using other cultivars or varieties or entry will be dropped one ribbon placing. For example: 4-H’ers with two cultivars or varieties of red tomatoes can only enter the red tomatoes class and cannot enter the other cultivar or variety in any other vegetable class. Score Sheet SF108.

Garden displays must be made up according to 4-H 226 “Selecting and Preparing Vegetables for Exhibit.” This circular is available at the County Extension Office.

\*G773255 4-H vegetable garden collection of five kinds of vegetables. Display in a box not more than 24 inches in any dimension. Showmanship will be considered in judging, but plastic grass, cotton, figurines, etc., should not be used in exhibit boxes. Each vegetable in the collection should be exhibited with the number specified for individual class G773201-G773252. Do not duplicate entries in classes G773201-G773252 with any in the group collection.

\*G773256 4-H cultivar vegetable collection. Vegetables entered in the collection are five cultivars from a single exhibit — for example, five cultivars of all types of peppers or squash or onions or tomatoes, etc. Display in a box not more than 24 inches in any dimension. Showmanship will be considered in judging, but plastic grass, cotton, figurines, etc. should not be used in exhibit boxes. Each vegetable in the collection should be exhibited with the number specified for individual class G773201 through G774252.

G773257 You Be The Teacher — This exhibit must be educational. See information in introduction to this division. Only one entry in this class

#### **Herbs**

Not more than three entries in this division. Herbs will be judged using the same general criteria used for vegetables. Those grown mainly for their seed such as dill and caraway should be exhibited on a plate. Those grown for their leaves such as basil, parsley, etc., should be exhibited in a container of water. Containers are not returned.

Fruit will be judged using the same general criteria used for vegetables (see 4-H 226). Fruit will be judged for the stage of maturity normal for that season and growing location. Emphasis will be placed on how well fruit approaches market quality.

\*G773290 Garden promotion poster — Individual poster promoting vegetable or herb gardening (14 inches by 22 inches, either vertical or horizontal arrangement). Poster may be in any medium — watercolor, ink, crayon, etc. — as long as they are not three-dimensional. Posters using copyrighted material will not be accepted. Entry card must be stapled in upper right hand corner. The 4-H member's name, age, full address, county and years in project(s) must be on the back of the poster.

\*G773291 Educational vegetable or herb garden poster — Prepare a poster no larger than 14 inches by 24 inches by 2 inches (three-dimensional if needed) illustrating a skill or project the 4-H'er has done or learned about in a 4-H vegetable gardening project. One might show a special technique you used or equipment you have incorporated in your garden (e.g. drip irrigation system, composting, or special techniques learned). Refer to 4-H horticulture project manuals, but use your own creativity. Entry card must be stapled to the upper right hand corner. The 4-H member's name, age, full address, county and years in project(s) must be on the back of the poster.

\*G773292 Vegetable and/or herb gardening history interview — Neatly handwritten or typed account of a gardening history interview of a person whose vegetable or herb garden has inspired you. Maximum of four pages of text and two pages of pictures of the garden if the individual is still gardening (include one picture of the person you interviewed). Protect with a clear report cover. The 4-H member's name, age, full address, county and years in project(s) must be on the back of the report cover.

\*G773293 Vegetable seed display — Each display must include seeds representing the following families: Cucurbit, Brassica (cabbage), Solanaceous (nightshade), and Legume (pea) families plus representatives from five other families. Group the seeds by family and type. Glue seeds or otherwise fasten clear containers of seeds to a board or poster board no larger than 22 inches by 24 inches. Label each group and each individual vegetable type with the common and scientific name. Use only one variety of cultivar of each vegetable, except for beans where several examples of beans may be shown. Attach a card to the back of the display explaining why and how it is important to know which vegetables are related, and site references on where the scientific name information was found. The 4-H member's name, age, full address, county and years in the garden project(s) must be on the back of the display. Information on vegetable family members can be obtained from the Extension Office.

\*G773294 World of vegetables notebook — Choose a favorite foreign cuisine and learn what vegetables and/or herbs are common to it (e.g. Mexican, African, Chinese, Italian, etc.). Include a handwritten or typed report telling about a minimum of five vegetables and/or herbs from each country chosen. Include the scientific and common names; pictures from your garden or seed catalogs; how they are grown; and how the foods are used. Also list a source for buying the seed or plants. Favorite recipes using some or all of the vegetable described may be included. Give proper credit by listing the source of pictures and information used. Protect in a clear report cover or small three-ring notebook. The 4-H member's name, age, years in the garden project, and complete address must be on the back cover of the report.

### **SPECIAL GARDEN PROJECT**

\*Denotes State Fair Entry

**Purple, \$2; Blue, \$1.50; Red, \$1; White, \$0.50**

Youth must be enrolled in the Special Garden Project to exhibit. Fresh cut flowers or harvested vegetables should be entered in the appropriate class listed above.

\*G775001 Special Garden Project - Educational exhibit based on what was learned from the project. Present information on a poster 14" X 22" either vertical or horizontal arrangement or in a clear plastic report cover. The 4-H member's name, age, full address, and county must be on the back of the poster or report cover.

\*G775002 Special Garden Project Fresh Cut Flowers or Harvested Vegetables – The current year's special garden project fresh cut flowers or harvested vegetables should be entered in this class. Refer to classes 001-045 for quantity to exhibit if special garden project is a fresh cut flower. Refer to classes 201-252 for quantity to exhibit if special garden project is a vegetable.
