GENERAL INFORMATION FOR ALL 4-H & FFA MEMBERS

ELIGIBILITY

4-H members must turn 9 years of age during the current calendar year. A 4-H'er becomes ineligible if he/she turns 20 years of age during the current calendar year. Voc. Ag & FFA exhibitors must be currently enrolled in a Butler County High School FFA program. All exhibits must be the work performed as part of the current year's 4-H or FFA program, with the exception of Department G – Fall Harvested Crops. Exhibitors must be enrolled in the 4-H program by the June 15 deadline.

WHAT ENTRIES MAY BE MADE?

Only articles mentioned in the premium list will be given a placing. An exhibitor who is found to have tampered with or entered any exhibit that is not HIS or HER own work will forfeit any premium, ribbon and cash won. All exhibits are entered at exhibitor's own risk. The Ag Society or University of Nebraska-Lincoln Extension in Butler County will **NOT** be responsible for lost or damaged items.

HOW TO MAKE ENTRIES

All clothing, sewing, style revue, livestock and exhibit hall entries and narration sheets (style revue) must be pre-entered to the Extension Office prior to June 15 via on-line entry @ <u>https://butler.fairmanager.com</u>. However, an exhibitor may enter up to an additional 5 exhibits (static exhibits only – NO animals) on entry day. Exhibitors must be enrolled in the project area corresponding to the additional exhibits.

PROCEDURE ON MAKING ENTRIES

All entries – livestock and static – must be entered on-line @ <u>https://butler.fairmanager.com</u>. Entry cards for static exhibits will be printed by the Extension Office staff and will be available for pick-up by the 4-H'er on Monday of fair week. Only one entry per person per class number may be made except in beef, sheep, goat, swine, dairy, rabbit and poultry classes.

NUMBER OF ENTRIES IN LIVESTOCK/SMALL ANIMALS

A 4-H/FFA exhibitor is limited to exhibiting three (3) market beef; two (2) feeder calves; two (2) breeding heifers; one (1) bucket calf; one (1) cow/calf pair; four (4) market hogs; two (2) breeding ewes; four (4) market lambs; two (2) breeding goats; and four (4) meat goats; eight (8) poultry; and five (5) rabbits. The numbers represented here are a <u>combined</u> total if the exhibitor is showing both 4-H and FFA livestock.

NOTICE TO 4-H/FFA EXHIBITORS AND LEADERS

All State 4-H Rules will be followed unless otherwise stated. However, final decisions will be made by department superintendents and Extension/FFA personnel.

All 4-H/FFA premium money will be given during the fair. Livestock monies will be awarded at the livestock shows; exhibit hall premiums will be available at a specified time during the fair in the Event Center. Exhibitors who exhibit in open class must also pick up their premium money at the same location.

Additional monetary awards, other than premiums, will only be awarded if donations are received for that specific category.

Early removal of static or livestock exhibits is not allowed. ALL EXHIBITS must be removed, or arrangements made for removal between 7:00 pm and 8:30 pm on Sunday or may be picked up on the Monday immediately following the fair at the Butler County Extension Office. STALLS AND PENS must be left clean after livestock leaves the fair.

STATE FAIR 4-H RULES will be followed if this book does not cover the situation.

STATE FAIR ELIGIBILITY

A static entry must receive a purple ribbon to be considered for a State Fair exhibit and/or awards at the Butler County Fair. An entry with an asterisk (*) preceding the entry number is a county only entry, it is not eligible for State Fair competition.

SUBSTANCE ABUSE POLICY

The use or possession of alcoholic beverages or drugs (except for medical purposes) by an exhibitor who is participating in 4-H/FFA at the Butler County Fair will result in the immediate disqualification of that exhibitor's entries.

DISCLAIMER – CARE OF EXHIBITS

APPEALS/PROTESTS

Any person, who feels that a violation of the rules or regulations of the Butler County Fair 4-H/FFA competitions has occurred, must go through a protest/appeals process. This appeals process covers all 4-H contests, static exhibits, and livestock exhibits/shows.

The respective superintendent has the authority to make appropriate decisions based on the 4-H/FFA Premium Book. When needed, the protest committee (consisting of respective superintendent, Ag Society representatives, 4-H Council representatives, FFA instructor and Extension Educator) will meet to act upon concerns. The FFA instructor will be asked to be present only when the situation involves FFA livestock or static entries. *Protests for pre-fair contests/competitions must be submitted no later than 7 days after the contest/competition. Protests for fair exhibits/shows will not be accepted after the exhibit release time.*

All protests must be submitted in writing and signed by the filing party in the time specified. The written protest must be submitted to the 4-H Youth Development Extension Educator and must include:

- 1. Name of person(s) involved.
- 2. Nature of concern
- 3. Situation and documentation
- 4. Recommendations for corrections
- 5. Specific action, rule, etc. in question
- 6. Additional person(s) committee may contact for further clarification
- 7. Procedures and/or steps carried out by person involved prior to submission of protest to the 4-H Youth Development Extension Educator and/or FFA Advisor.

The committee will review the written protest. They may discuss the situation with the affected persons and show/contest/exhibit officials/superintendents, including the Extension Educator-Unit Leader. Recommendations will be developed, followed and communicated both verbally and in writing to the group or the individual(s) affected.

In cases of protest, the exhibitor(s) may be allowed to exhibit/show/compete, but results of exhibiting/showing/competing will be subject to change based on the outcome of the protest process. This allows for the smooth operation of the shows/competitions and facilitates appropriate processing.

The management reserves the right to withhold premiums and/or awards. The exhibitor(s) may also be excluded from the show/exhibit hall/contest if action warrants. **Protests related to the judges' integrity, decisions, placings or other evaluations will NOT be accepted**.

4-H Youth/Parent/Guardian Code of Conduct

The primary goal of the 4-H Program is to help youth develop competency in their projects, confidence in themselves and others, connections to their community and sound character. Actions by persons (Parents, and 4-Her's) involved with the 4-H Program will be consistent with the six core ethical values comprising good character: trustworthiness, respect, responsibility, caring, fairness and citizenship. As a 4-H Participant/Parent/Guardian I will:

Treat all people and property with respect, courtesy, consideration and compassion. Avoid and prevent put-downs, insults, name calling, swearing and other language or nonverbal conduct likely to offend, hurt or set a bad example.

- Keep informed about 4-H program policies and projects and read materials pertaining to the county 4-H program.
- Teach and model kindness and compassion for others. Recognize that all people have skills and talents which can be used to help others and improve the community. Teach and foster teamwork and discourage selfishness.
- Practice fair-mindedness by being open to ideas, suggestions and opinions of others. I will make all reasonable efforts to assure equal access to participation for all youth and adults regardless of race, creed, color, sex, national origin or disability. Decisions will be made fairly and treat all individuals and families with impartiality.
- Obey laws and rules as an obligation of being a good citizen. I accept responsibility for the proper treatment and care for other youth and adults, the program facilities and/or equipment.
- Demonstrate the responsible treatment of animals and stewardship of the environment.
- Not use alcohol or illegal substances (or be under the influence) while working with or participating in any part of the 4-H Program.
- Provide a safe environment for all parties involved in 4-H. I will protect those involved from sexual harassment, physical force, verbal or mental abuse, neglect, or other harmful behaviors.

4-H Parents, Guardian and/or Youth who do not abide by the above code of conduct, may receive the following consequences:

- Be asked to explain actions to the 4-H Council.
- Be dismissed from an event at own expense.
- Further disciplinary action determined by the 4-H Council, which may include:
 - o restriction from contacting 4-H families, volunteers, donors, and/or sponsors pertaining to any 4-H matter
 - o becoming ineligible to attend any further 4-H activities
 - o family may become ineligible to participate in the County 4-H Program
- Reimburse the proper entity for any property damage or for liability resulting from inappropriate actions. In the case of vandalism, guilty party may be required to reimburse 4-H and/or the facility.

An exhibit of items, pictures, maps, charts, slides/tapes, drawing, illustrations, writings or displays that depict the heritage of the member's family or community or 4-H history. **Please note:** Exhibits are entered at 4-H'ers own risk. Nebraska Extension in Butler County along with the Butler County Ag Society will not be responsible for loss or damage to family heirloom items or any items in this division. Displays should not be larger than 22" x 28" wide. If the size needs to be a different size because the historical item is larger than 22'x 28 please contact the superintendent's office for approval. Display collections securely in an attractive container no larger than 22" x 28". If the size needs to be a different size because the superintendents for approval. Exhibits must include NAME – COUNTY- PAST EXPERIENCE –years in Explore Your Heritage, on back of exhibit. All entries must have documentation included. SF71.

Division 101, Level I: Beginning (1-4 years in project)

- A-101-001 Heritage poster or flat exhibit Entries may be pictures, posters, items that depict family heritage. Exhibits must be supported by a written explanation.
- A-101-002 **Family Genealogy/History Notebook** Include pedigree charts/family group sheets, with documentation for two-three generations of one family line, expanding each year. If multiple books included in exhibit, only bring book with most current year's work.
- A-101-003 Local History Scrapbook/Notebook Scrapbook or notebook that depicts history of local community or Nebraska that helps youth appreciate their heritage.
- A-101-004 **Framed Family Groupings** (or individual) of pictures showing family history. Pictures must be supported by a written explanation.
- A-101-005 **Other exhibits depicting the heritage of the member's family or community** Exhibit must be supported by a written explanation. May include biographical album of themselves or another family member, family cookbooks, etc.
- A-101-006 **4-H History Scrapbook** A scrapbook relating to 4-H history of local club or county. Must be work of individual 4-H'er no club project. If multiple books included in exhibit, only bring book with most current year's work.
- A-101-007 **4-H History Poster** Poster relating 4-H history of local club or county or individual.
- A-101-008 **Story or illustration** about a historical event.
- A-101-009 Book review about local, Nebraska or regional history.
- A-101-010 **Other historical exhibits** Attach an explanation of historical importance.
- A-101-011 Family Traditions Book Exhibitor scrapbook depicting family traditions of the past.
- A-101-012 Family Traditions Exhibit Story or illustration of a family tradition or event. Exhibits must be supported by a written explanation.
- A-101-013 **4-H Club/County Scrapbook** Scrapbook relating 4-H history of local club or county compiled by club historian. If multiple books included in exhibit, only bring book with most current year's work.
- A-101-014 **4-H Member Scrapbook** Scrapbook relating to individual 4-H members' 4-H history. If multiple books included in exhibit, only bring book with most current year's work.
- A-101-015 Special Events Scrapbook A scrapbook relating to a 4-H special event, such as Congress or CWF or a personal of family special event, such as a trip, family reunion, etc.

Division 102, Level II: Advanced (over 4 years in project)

- A-102-001 Heritage poster or flat exhibit Entries may be pictures, posters, items that depict family heritage. Exhibits must be supported by a written explanation. If multiple books included in exhibit, only bring book with most current year's work.
- A-102-002 **Family Genealogy/History Notebook** Include pedigree charts/family group sheets, with documentation for two-three generations of one family line, expanding each year. If multiple books included in exhibit, only bring book with most current year's work.
- A-102-003 Local History Scrapbook/Notebook Scrapbook or notebook that depicts history of local community or Nebraska that helps youth appreciate their heritage.
- A-102-004 **Framed Family Photos** (or individual) of pictures showing family history. Pictures must be supported by a written explanation.
- A-102-005 **Other exhibits depicting the heritage of the member's family or community** Exhibit must be supported by a written explanation. May include biographical album of themselves or another family member, family cookbooks, etc.
- A-102-006 **4-H History Scrapbook** A scrapbook relating to 4-H history of local club or county. Must be work of individual 4-H'er no club project. If multiple books included in exhibit, only bring book with most current year's work.
- A-102-007 **4-H History Poster** Poster relating 4-H history of local club or county or individual.
- A-102-008 **Story or illustration** about a historical event.
- A-102-009 Book review about local, Nebraska or regional history.
- A-102-010 **Other historical exhibits** Attach an explanation of historical importance.
- A-102-011 Exhibit depicting the importance of a community or Nebraska historic landmark.
- A-102-012 **Community Report** documenting something of historical significance from past to present.
- A-102-013 Historic Collection (displayed securely and attractively in a container no larger than 22" x 28").
- A-102-014 Video Documentary of a family or a community event. Must be produced and edited by 4-H member.
- A-102-015 **4-H Club/County Scrapbook** Scrapbook relating 4-H history of local club or county compiled by club historian. If multiple books included in exhibit, only bring book with most current year's work.
- A-102-016 **4-H Member Scrapbook** Scrapbook relating to individual 4-H member's 4-H history. If multiple books included in exhibit, only bring book with most current year's work.
- A-102-017 **Special Events Scrapbook** A scrapbook relating to a 4-H special event, such as Congress or CWF or a personal or family special event, such as a trip, family reunion, etc.

DEPARTMENT A – Citizenship

Division 120, Citizenship

Purpose: The purpose of these citizenship exhibits is to foster civic responsibility and action within the diverse areas of citizenship including community service, service learning, government and policy making.

Display: Not larger than 22" x 28". Display collections securely in an attractive container no larger than 22" x 28".

- Supporting Material: All entries must have a statement explaining:
- The purpose of the exhibit
- Exhibitors are encouraged to show evidence of their personal experiences, study or observations that relate to their exhibit.
- References: All exhibitors should reference material sources or supporting information used in exhibits (i.e., if questions from a game were taken from an outside source, they must be referenced).
- Identification: All entries should be labeled with the exhibitor's name, club and county.

Project Manuals: The official references for the citizenship projects is Citizen Guide's Handbook. Other helpful references include Citizenship Washington Focus guides, Character Counts! And Service Learning Information.

Scoring: Scoresheets, forms, contest study materials and additional resources at https://go.unl.edu/ne4hcitizenship.

Entries: Each exhibitor is limited to one item per class number. All static exhibits must have received a purple ribbon at county fair to advance to State Fair.

- A-120-001 **Care Package Display** This exhibit is a display about the PROCESS of creating and giving a care package, not the actual care package. You may use a poster, PowerPoint or another multi-media program to tell about the PROCESS of developing and giving a care package to a service organization. PowerPoint should be saved to a USB/thumb drive. You need to answer the following questions in your exhibit.
 - 1. How did you select the organization?
 - 2. What items did you include in your care package?
 - 3. Why did you select those items?
 - 4. How did it feel to present your care package to the organization?
 - 5. What did you learn from this experience?
 - 6. Other information that you feel is important about the care package or organization.

Some examples of care packages: backpack for school supplies, litter pan for animal shelter items, suitcase for abuse shelter/homeless shelter, etc.

- A-120-002 **Citizenship Game** which could include but is not limited to symbol flash cards, question and answer board or stimulation with props. Clear instructions on how to play the game and what the game hopes to accomplish must be included.
- A-120-003 **Patriotic or Cultural Fine Arts** can be made of any art media but should tie in the relevance of the artwork to citizenship.
- A-120-004 **Public Adventure Scrapbook** should describe your Public Adventure or Service Learning Activity. Scrapbooks must measure no more than 16" x 16".
- A-120-005 **Public Adventure Poster** should describe your Public Adventure or Service Learning Activity. Display posters must be stiff enough to stand when supported from behind and below. Length and width must be no more than 24" x 28".
- A-120-006 Written or Recorded Stakeholder Interview should follow the outline found in the Public Adventures curriculum. It may be written or recorded.
- A-120-007 Written Citizenship Essay is designed to promote good citizenship and patriotism. This essay is open to all age groups. All essays should be 300-400 typewritten words.
- A-120-008 For 9-12 Graders Only: Oral Citizenship Essay addressing the theme "Freedom's Obligations" should be 3-5 minutes. No background music, singing or other enhancement allowed. All essays should be saved as a .wav or mp3 file: a USB/thumb drive will be accepted. Voice tone should be normal and conversational. A copy of the written essay should be attached.
- A-120-009 Service Items can include but aren't limited to lap quilt and homemade toys. Only non-perishable items will be accepted. Attached to the exhibit should be an explanation of who the recipient was and how the service project was made and used. The service item could be part of a larger community service effort.
- A-120-010 **4-H Club Exhibit** should depict what a 4-H club has done in the area of community service. This item could include, but is not limited to, a service item, poster, scrapbook, and cultural or creative arts item or care package.

Division 130 – Seeing i2i

- A-130-001 **Cultural Fine Arts** can be made of any art media but should symbolize what makes the media unique.
- A-130-002 **How are We Different?** Interview should follow the interview guide in the participant manual on page 3 and should reflect on the differences and similarities between you and the person you are interviewing.
- A-130-003 **Name Art** should be a creative art exhibit that symbolizes or explains where your name came from and what it means. Can use any media.
- A-130-004 **Family History** depicting your family cultural history or the ethnic make-up of your community noting who were the first settlers, where did they come from, is there evidence of the background today (local celebrations, family celebrations, museum or educational displays, historical markers, etc.)
- A-130-005 **Exhibit depicting a cultural food** that is special to your family. Can be a story or essay.
- A-130-006 **"This is Who I Am"** poem. A poem written by the 4-Her that reflects who they are.
- A-130-007 **Poster** that depicts what you have learned through the i2i Project.
- A-130-008 **Biography** about an historical figure that has made a positive impact on our society or who have made a difference in the lives of others.
- A-130-009 Play Script written about a different culture.

DEPARTMENT B – COMMUNICATIONS & EXPRESSIVE ARTS

Department B - Special Exhibits

Division 150 – Banners & Special Exhibits Guidelines:

- Each banner should illustrate a phase of 4-H work or promote 4-H generally. Copyrighted materials cannot be used. •
- When using the official 4-H Emblem (clover with the H's on each leaf), it must follow approved guidelines, which can be viewed at. https://4h.unl.edu/name-emblem-guidelines.
- Banners are a two dimensional display, depicting one idea. See Posters for exhibit guidelines.
- Banners must be hung on at least a X" dowel or a rod strong enough to support the banner. The dowel should be at least 2 inches longer than the banner.
- Banners should be made of materials that permit the banner to be folded or rolled without damaging the display. Three dimensional objects should not be attached to the front of the banner.
- Attach a club label and the current entry tag to the front lower left-hand (as your face it) corner of the banner.

Division 150 – Club Exhibit

This is an exhibit that will be displayed on the fairgrounds. Exhibits must have a 4-H or "fair theme". Examples of this exhibit are decorated hay bales, decorated and planted flower barrels, decorated trash barrels, club poster etc. All supplies will be furnished by the exhibitors. Each club is allowed one exhibit. Fair Theme, Special: Melding History and Art; or club's choice theme.

Division 150 – Special Theme Exhibits

*B-150-003 Bone Creek Museum Theme Exhibit-Items are designed and constructed at the summer Bone Creek workshop event. The exhibits are part of a special Bone Creek Museum of Agrarian Art display at Butler County Fair, no ribbon is assigned. A participation premium is awarded to all contributors.

*B-150-004 Special Fair Theme Exhibit-all age levels. Entries may be pictures, posters, stories, poems, or similar items. The 4-H member will determine the exhibit which will relate to the current Fair's theme. Exhibits will be judged and premiums will be awarded.

Department B – Photography

General Photography Rules

1. 4-H members are allowed to exhibit in only one photography level.

- 2. 4-H members may enter one exhibit per class.
- 3. An image may only be used on one exhibit with the exception of Portfolios, which may include images entered in other classes.
- 4. Cameras: Photos may be taken with any type of film or digital camera, including phones, tablets, and drones

5. Photos must be shot by 4-H member during the current project year with the exception of Portfolios, which may include images captured and/or exhibited in previous years.

6. Securely attach photos, mats, backing, and data tags. Exhibits that are poorly attached may be disqualified. Do not use photo corners, borders, or place coverings over the exhibits.

7. Portfolios: All portfolios must include the following information: 1) 1-page max bio, 2) table of contents, 3) year each photo was taken, 4) title for each image, 5) device make and model used to capture each image, and 6) reflections for each photo. When writing reflections, youth should focus on what new photography techniques or skills they were practicing when they took the photo, what makes the image successful, and what could have been done to improve the image. Portfolios may be presented in either print or digital formats:

- A. Printed portfolios should be presented in a 8.5"x11" three-ring binder or similar book format. Recommended photo size is 8"x10". Matting is not necessary.
- Digital portfolios may be presented online and must be exhibited along with a single 8.5x11 flyer. Flyers must include a link, URL, or QR Β. code that takes users (judges and fairgoers) to their online portfolio.

8. Display Exhibits: Display exhibits are only accepted in Level II. Displays consist of three 4"x6" photos mounted on a single horizontal 11"x14" black or white poster or mat board. Incorrect sizes will not be accepted. No foam board backing should be used. Each photo in the display must be numbered using a pencil. Numbers should be readable but not distract from the overall display. No titles, captions, or stick-on numbers will be allowed. Photos may be mounted vertically or horizontally. Appropriate Data Tags are required (see rule regarding Data Tags).

9. Print Exhibits: Print exhibits must be 8"x10" printed mounted in 11"x14" (outside size) cut matting with a sandwich mat board backing. Incorrect sizes will not be accepted. No foam board should be used for matting or backing. Mat openings may be rectangular or oval. Photos may be horizontal or vertical. No frames are allowed. Appropriate data tags are required (see rule regarding Data Tags).

10. Entry Tags: Entry tags should be securely attached to the upper right-hand corner of the exhibit.

11. Data Tags: Data Tags are required on all print and display exhibits. Data tags are not required for portfolios. Each exhibit must have the appropriate number and level of data tags Data tags are available at: https://unl.app.box.com/s/1ttnemphrd4szykl5t9xm1ofiezi86js

 - Every photo on picture display must be **pencil** numbered (no. 2 lead pencil) below (for judge's reference only). Numbers should be readable but not detract from display.
 - No titles, captions, or stick-on numbers will be allowed.
 - Photos must be mounted vertically or horizontally.
 - Data Tags (part A is required (see General Rule G).
- B. Level 1 Photo Journal:
 - Choose project area 1, 2, 3 or 4 in the Level 1 project manual titled "Focus on Photography".
 - Complete the pages associated with the project area of your choice (project 1, 2, 3 or 4) or recreate and print the pages (still using actual photos).
 - Place pages in an 8 ½ x 11 black or white 3 ring binder.
 - Data tag (See General Rule G). For your journal, complete Part A and include this as page one of your journal.
- *B-180-001 **Picture Display** Entry will consist of **3 pictures from 3 different categories.** Categories to be selected from include: 1) animal; 2) building; 3) people; 4) landscape; 5) special effects; 6) still life; 7) sports.
- *B-180-002 **Photogram** An entry will consist of **one photogram** developed on 8" x 10" black and white photographic paper, mounted in 11" x 14" cut matting with sandwich backing. Entry will be judged on creativity, use of shape, texture, black to white color variance, correct exposure and comparison.
- *B-180-003 **Panorama Exhibit** Entry will consist of an arrangement of **3-5 pictures connected** to show a wide angle of a subject. Panorama displays must be mounted on a horizontal 14" x 22" poster board. Pictures may have some overlap. Unwanted excess can be cropped (cut).
- *B180-004 Lighting Display Entry will consist of **3 pictures of 3 different photography techniques.** Categories to be selected from include: 1) back lighting; 2) diffuse lighting; 3) front lighting; 4) side lighting; 5) flash (artificial light).
- *B180-005 **Building/Landscape Picture Display** An entry will consist **3 pictures of 3 different subjects** which will include buildings and landscape.
- *B-180-006 People/Animals Picture Display An entry will consist of 3 pictures of 3 different subjects which will include people and animals.
- *B-180-007 **Photo Journal** Entry will consist of a single completed and bound section of project 1, 2, 3 or 4 in the level 1 project manual titled "Focus on Photography".
- *B-180-008 Photo Story Display Entry will consist of a display of **3 pictures** that tell the beginning, middle and end of a story.
- *B-180-009 **Fun With Shadows Display** Entry will consist of **3 pictures of 3 different subjects** that capture the image of the shadow.
- *B-180-010 Magic and Tricks Display Entry will consist of a display of **3 pictures of 3 different subjects** that us a "special effect" to create interesting photos.
- *B-180-011 Still Life, or Sports Picture Display An entry will consist of 3 pictures of 3 different subjects showing still life and /or sports in any combination.
- *B-180-012 **My Favorite Other Picture** Any other favorite photo. Exhibit may range in size from 3" x 5" to 8" x 10" mounted in appropriate size cut matting (no frames) with a sandwich backing.
- *B-180-013 Digital Photography Display Entry will consist of 3 different pictures taken with a digital camera.

Division 181 - Level 2 Next Level

- B-181-010 Level 2 Portfolio: Level 2 portfolios should represent the photographer's best work and must include 5-7 different images from the 4-H member's photography career. At least 2 images must have been taken during the current year. The remaining images may have been taken at any time during the member's 4-H experience and may have been previously exhibited. Portfolios may include photos which are exhibited in other Level 2 classes during the same year. Portfolios must include: 1) 1-page max bio, 2) table of contents, 3) year each photo was taken, 4) title for each image, 5) device make and model used to capture each image, and 6) reflections for each image. When writing reflections, youth should focus on what new photography techniques they were practicing when they took the photo, what makes the image successful, and what could have been done to improve the image. B-181-060 **Expression through Color Display or Print**: Photos should capture a creative use of color or a color scheme, such as complimentary, contrasting, monochromatic, warm, cool, primary, secondary, or tertiary. (Activity 13). SF87

Division 182 - Level 3 Mastering Photography

- B-182-020 Advanced Techniques & Lighting Print: Photos should show an experimentation or exploration of advanced lighting, such as low-light or silhouette photography or another advanced photography technique, such as astrophotography, underwater photography, or infrared photography. (Activity 3, 4, 5, or 12). SF89
- B-182-030 Advanced Composition Print: Photos should show advanced compositions, such as using diagonal, horizontal, or vertical lines or repeating shapes to frame a subject or lead the viewers eye through a scene; breaking the rule of thirds to compose a discordant image; or another advanced composition technique covered in Book 3 Mastering Photography (Activity 6, 7). SF89
- B-182-040 **Portrait Print**: A great portrait captures not only a person's physical image, but also something of the person's character or personality. Photos may be either formal or informal, but bust be of one or more human subjects. (Activity 9). SF89
- B-182-050 Still Life Print: Photos should capture non-moving objects that have been arranged in an interesting way. Photos should demonstrate advanced control over lighting and composition. (Activity 8). SF89
- B-182-060 **Freeze/Blur the Moment Print**: Photos should capture a subject in motion. Photographers should adjust shutter speed to either freeze or blue the movement. (Activity 11). SF89

1. Exhibitors in the Human Development project area will be asked to focus on designing toys/games/activities that meet the different needs of children.

A list of items in the kit is suggested to be included. Display in box or bag suitable for what it contains. Approximate size not larger than 12"x15"x10". All items in kit must be safe for child to handle. Information sheet for Class C200008 should include: 1) State which ONE age group (infant, toddler, preschooler, middle childhood) the kit was prepared for. 2) What are children this age like? Give 2 examples to show how the kit would be appropriate for children this age. 3) What will the child learn or what skills will they gain by using the kit? 4) What item(s) were made by the 4-H'er. Most importantly the kit should serve a defined purpose, not just be a catch all for several items. SF85

4-H'ers taking any projects in Department C-200 may enter:

C-200-009 **Family Involvement Entry.** Scrapbook, poster or story describing an activity the family did together. It might include making something such as a doll house or feedbunk. Items may be exhibited if desired. Photographs are encouraged. Visuals should show family participation. Participation by all family members is important. Department C – Clothing/Sewing

All clothing exhibits will be judged on Wednesday, July 18 at the Butler County Fairgrounds. Items must be preregistered at the extension office by June 15. Interview judging and modeling times will be first come, first served.

- A. Number of Entries Per Individual Each individual is limited to one exhibit per class number.
- B. Entry Tags Every clothing exhibit must be described on the appropriate entry tag accompanying it (for example: dark blue wool skirt and jacket, red and white figured blouse). Entry tag placement: as you look at the garment place the entry tag on the right side of the garment and the hook of the hanger to the left.
- C. Identification Labels Each item entered as a clothing, knitting or crochet exhibit must have a label attached stating: County, Exhibitor's name and age, project name and class in which garment is entered, and the number of years enrolled in the project exhibited. Wool entries must have the fiber content listed on the identification label. Attach a label on every component of the outfit using safety pins or by basting. Not responsible for unlabeled items.
- D. **Preparation of Exhibits** Please bring all wearable exhibits on wire hangers or hangers with a swivel hook ONLY. All exhibits not suitable for hanging should be entered in a self-sealing plastic bag. Wool garments and garments with narrow straps hang better on other hangers, i.e., wooden or notched plastic hangers. As you look at the garment place the hooks of the hanger to the left. Use safety pins to fasten skirts, shorts, and pants to hangers. Each piece should be entered on its own hanger. If more than one hanger is used for an entry, fasten hangers belonging to one exhibit together with twist ties or rubber bands. All items need to be in clear garment bags.
- E. **General** Garments as listed may be made for self (4-H member) or another person. 4-H'ers enrolled in clothing projects should continue their skill development. Once you have exhibited in a higher level, you are not eligible to exhibit in a lower level. Ex. Once you exhibit in STEAM Clothing 3, you are not eligible to exhibit in STEAM Clothing 2.
- F. **Criteria for Judging** Refer to the Nebraska 4-H website <u>http://www.4h.unl.edu</u> for current state fair scoresheets. In addition, all entries must conform to rules and regulations as set forth in this Premium List.

Completed textile cards should be placed in an 8 ½ x 11, 3 ring binder. Include an appropriate cover. See project manual for fabric suggestions.
- *C-900-004 What's The Difference 4-H members enrolled in STEAM Clothing 1 may enter an exhibit (not to exceed 22" X 30") a notebook, poster, small display sharing a project comparison and price point. <u>Beginning Sewing Exhibits</u>: Exhibits must be made from medium weight woven fabrics that will sew and press smoothly, flannel/fleece is acceptable. Solid color fabrics or those having an overall print are acceptable. NO PLAIDS, STRIPES, NAPPED OR JERSEY KNIT. Patterns should be simple without darts, set-in sleeves, and collars. Raglan and kimono sleeves are acceptable.

- C-221-006 **Textile Arts Garment or Accessory** A garment or accessory constructed using new unconventional materials. Examples: rubber bands, plastic, duct tape. Extra garments cannot be modeled. Only complete outfits can be modeled, except in Beginning Sewing/Clothing Level 1.

Garments being modeled must be entered for construction judging. An outfit in middle or advanced units is a complete, wearable outfit.

The judges will choose two Grand Champions, one from the beginning unit, and one from the middle and advanced units. The judges will select state fair representatives and their alternates, who must be 10 years of age before January 1 of the current year. All judge's decisions are FINAL.

The Public Style Show will be held during the Butler County Fair. <u>You must model at the Public Style Show to receive your premium for</u> <u>fashion show classes</u>. Scoresheet SF117 for all classes.

Division 410 - Beyond the Needle - Fashion Show Classes

4-H members must show their own original creativity.  - 2. Accessories should be of high quality (as compared to quick, simple crafts), suitable for use in the home several months throughout the year. Holiday specific items are discouraged.
 - 3. Items should show creativity and originality, along with the application of design principles and elements. (Ask yourself: How have I shown creativity and applied the design principles and elements in this accessory? Youth are required to include the design elements and principles they used along with simple directions for how they designed their project with their exhibit. Information on the elements and principles of design may be found in the Design Decisions manual, as well as Portfolio Pathways and Sketchbook Crossroads.
 - 4. Entered in correct class: What medium was changed or manipulated? What medium is the majority of your exhibit made from?
 - 5. Items should be ready for display in the home (pictures framed, wall hangings and pictures ready to hang, etc.). No single mat board or artist canvas panels allowed. Wrapped canvas (if staples not visible on edge) is accepted without framing. Make sure hangers are strong enough to support the item.
 - 6. All static exhibits must have a received a purple ribbon at the county fair to advance to state fair.
 - 7. Items should not be ones made for beginning level or other projects (ex: simple (10 minute) table runners or woodworking). Exhibits from the beginning level, Design My Place, are county only and not state fair eligible.
- B) Items should *not* be ones made for beginning level or other projects (ex: simple (10 minute) table runners or woodworking).
- C) ENTRY TAGS An entry tag which includes a clear description of the entry must be securely attached to each Home Environment exhibit. Use color names or pattern/picture descriptions to aid in identification.
- D) IDENTIFICATION-In addition to the entry tag, a label with the exhibitor's name and county should be attached to each separate piece of the exhibit.
- E) SUPPORTING INFORMATION Supporting information is required for all home environment exhibits. Information must also include the elements and principles of design used and steps taken to complete project. Exhibits without supporting information will be dropped a ribbon placing.

Department C – Visual Arts

Pay Category #4

The purpose of the Visual Arts projects is to learn design principles and develop design techniques. In addition, youth should work to communicate a personal voice, with intention, through their work. Be sure to take note of the rules section to develop a successful project. By completing supporting documentation, youth will examine their choices and demonstrate an understanding of the elements of art and principles of design.

- Original Work Items must be the original work of the 4-H member and should show creativity and originality. No copyrighted images or master studies.
- Display Items should be ready for display, framed, ready to hang, etc. No single mat board or artist canvas panels allowed. Wrapped canvas (if staples not visible on edge) is accepted without framing. Make sure hangers are strong enough to support the item. Command Strips are not adequate hangers. Items not ready for display will be dropped one ribbon placing.
- Entries per Exhibitor: 4-H members may enter up to three exhibits but no more than one exhibit per class.
- Entry Descriptions: Entry tags should include a clear, visual description of the exhibit, such as colors, size, or subject to aid in identification.
- Supporting Information: Supporting information is required for all Visual Arts exhibits. Information must include responses to at least two reflection questions and steps taken to complete the project. Supporting Information tag templates can be found at https://go.unl.edu/ne4hvisualarts. Exhibits without supporting information will be dropped a ribbon placing

Department C - Quilt Quest

Division 229 - Quilt Quest

Pay Category #3

In Quilt Quest, 4-H'ers learn skills as they progress through the project. The least experienced 4-H exhibitor will select fabric, cut, and sew together only squares or rectangles in making the quilt top. They may have additional guidance in piecing the quilt block and layering together the quilt top, inner batting and the quilt bottom. Another person can do the quilting for them.

In the Premier class, the 4-H'er has developed skills to be able to do all of the work by himself/herself. This includes pattern and fabric

selection, cutting and sewing individual pieces, layering the quilt top/batting/backing together, and quilting. Quilting may be done by hand, by sewing machine or by a commercial-grade quilting machine. After quilting, the 4-H'er must finish the quilt by "squaring it up," put binding on the edge, and placing a label on the quilt which provides details about the quilt making process for historical purposes.

Supporting information is required for this exhibit. Information must also include elements or principles of design used and steps taken to complete project.

All entry cards and support information must be attached using a safety pin. No straight pins.

When judging Quilt Quest exhibits, the judges consider SF209 "Standards for Judging Quilts and Quilted Items."

For all classes, 4-H'ers can choose fabrics for the quilt by selecting fabric from fabric bolts. 4-H'ers may also use "fabric collections" offered by manufacturers in a particular designer or fabric line. Examples of fabric collections include:

- Jelly Rolls are made of (up to) 40 different strips of 2 ½" wide fabric laying on top of one another and rolled up to look like a jelly roll. The fabric is created by one designer or fabric line and compliments each other. In many cases, less skilled 4-H'ers find it difficult to cut narrow strips with a rotary cutter and ruler, so this fabric selection may make it easier as they learn.
- Honey Buns are made like the Jelly Rolls with 1 1/2" strips of fabrics.
- Layer Cakes are 10" squares of fabric from a manufactured designer or fabric line with different pieces of fabric "layered" on top of one another to look like a piece of cake.
- Charm Packs are made of 5" squares of coordinating fabric and may be tied up with a string or scrap of fabric.
- **Turnover** is a collection of coordinating fabrics that are cut into 6" triangles.
- Fat Quarters are ½ yard cuts of fabric which are cut in half to make a rectangle that is approximately 18" x 21". (One half yard of fabric yields 2 fat quarters). The "fat quarter" can be more economical to purchase for a smaller quilt because the purchaser does not have to buy the entire yardage width.
- **Fabric Kit** is a collection of fabrics cut in large pieces to accommodate the requirements of a particular quilt pattern. The 4-H'ermust cut out all of the smaller squares, rectangles, etc. to make the quilt top according to the pattern directions.

After fabric selection, youth can use a variety of tools for cutting the fabric and completing the quilt. Cutting into pattern pieces may include hand roller die cutting machines that cut particular shapes which can be appliqued to fabric. This is allowed in the construction of the quilt.

A quilted exhibit is made up of at least 3 layers. Quilts or quilted items must be quilted or tied through all layers. Fleece blankets are not eligible in this division. Quilts must have a permanent label on the back in the bottom-right corner with quilter's name and date of completion.

- C-229-010 **Exploring Quilts** Illustrate some aspect of quilts or quilt making. Examples include, but are not limited to, language arts, quilts of different cultures, chemistry, design, preservation, history, construction, math-conversion of quilt patterns, textiles/fabrics, computerization, and entrepreneurship. History may include history of an old quilt or history/research of a particular style of quilt such as Baltimore album quilts or Amish quilts. Exhibit may be a 14 x 22 inch poster, notebook, CD, PowerPoint, Prezi, DVD, YouTube, or other technique. All items in an exhibit must be attached together and labeled. NO quilted items should be entered in this class. SF208C Scoresheet for Education Exhibits and Computer Exploration. SF208C
- C-229-020 Quilt Designs Other Than Fabric Two or three dimensional item with quilt design made using medium other than fabric, such as stained glass, paper, etc. Supporting information is required. Must include elements of design used and steps taken to complete project. (Tag template is the Home Environment information sheet.) Exhibits with supporting information will be dropped one ribbon placing. SF208B
- C-229-021 **Barn Quilt** created that is less than 4'x4'. Supporting information is required. Must include elements of design used and steps taken to complete project. (Tag template is the Home Environment information sheet.) Exhibits with supporting information will be dropped one ribbon placing.
- C-229-022 **Barn Quilt** created that is 4'x4' or larger. Supporting information is required. Must include elements of design used and steps taken to complete project. (Tag template is the Home Environment information sheet.) Exhibits with supporting information will be dropped one ribbon placing.
- C-229-030 **Computer Exploration** Poster or notebook with a minimum of six computer generated quilt designs or color variations on a quilt design. Include information of type of program used, process used to generate designs, or how you used color to create different quilt designs. Size of poster or notebook to be suitable for the exhibit. SF208C
- C-229-040 Wearable Art Quilted clothing or accessory which must have a recognizable amount of quilting and may include fabric manipulation. Quilting must be done by 4-H member. On a half sheet of 8 ½ x 11 inch paper, tell how you selected the design and fabrics including whether or not you used a kit, jelly roll, charm squares, etc.
- C-229-041 Inter-Generational Quilt A quilt made by a 4-H member and family members or friends of different generations. On a half-sheet of 8 ½ x 11 inch paper, include an answering the following questions: A) How was the quilt planned and who did what in the construction of the quilt? B) How did you select the design and fabrics including whether or not you used a kit, jelly roll, charm squares, etc.? SF208E
- C-229-042 Service Project Quilt A quilt constructed by a 4-H member or group to be donated to a worthy cause. On a half sheet of 8 ½ x 11 inch paper, include an explanation answering the following questions: A) Why was the quilt constructed and who will receive the donated quilt? B) How did you select the design and fabrics used including whether or not you used a kit, jelly roll, charm squares, etc.? C) What did you do and what was done by others? SF208D

Guidelines for entries in classes 50-83 Quilted Exhibits

- Please note the description of classes. They denote degree of difficulty in construction and <u>not</u> the number of years in the project.
- A quilted exhibit consists of 3 or more layers.
- All quilted exhibits must be quilted (machine or hand) or tied.
- All quilt piecing and finishing must be the sole work of the 4-H member. Quilting, whether machine or hand quilted, may be done by another individual except for the Premier Quilt class.
- No pre-quilted fabric may be used.

- Wall quilts must have a hanging sleeve on the back of the quilt or some method for hanging. All quilted exhibits must be clean and finished for intended purpose.
- On a half sheet of 8 ½ x 11 inch paper, include an explanation answering the following questions: A) How did you select the design and fabrics including whether or not you used a kit, jelly roll, charm squares, etc.? B) What did you do and what was done by others? C) What did you learn you can use on your next project? SF208A

Sizes of Quilted Exhibits:

- A) Small –length + width = less than 60". This size includes miniature quilts, wall hangings, table runners, placemats (4), and pillows. All items must be quilted. Pillows must have a quilted top, not just pieced patchwork.
- B) Medium length + width = from 61" to 120"
- C) Large length + width = over 120"

Level I quilted exhibits - Pieced quilts made up of squares and/or rectangles. DEPARTMENT D - ENVIRONMENTAL EDUCATION/EARTH SCIENCES

Department D – Conservation & Wildlife

General Information

- A. SHOW WHAT YOU DID & LEARNED All exhibitors will show evidence of their personal field experiences, study or observations that relate to their exhibit. This helps judges understand what the 4-H'er did and learned in the process that led to the exhibit.
- B. PROPER CREDIT Show proper credit by listing the sources of plans or other supporting information used in exhibits.
- C. WHO'S EXHIBIT? The exhibitor's name, county, age and address must be on the back or bottom of all displays.
- D. WILDLIFE & WILDLIFE LAWS "Animal" or "wildlife" in the following classes includes wild fish, amphibians, reptiles, birds, or mammals. Please make sure you follow all wildlife laws.
- E. PROJECT MATERIALS Related project booklets include Exploring Your Environment Series, 4-H Shooting Sports, Amphibians, Bird Behavior (EC 59381), Fishing for Adventure Project Manuals, Wildlife Conservation (4-H 125), Geology, and Outdoor Adventure. Other resources include: Outdoor Skills: Learning Science in the Outdoors series (Science Signature Outcome Program) <u>outdoornebraska.gov/afterschool/ and www.whep.org.</u>
- F. BOARD AND POSTER EXHIBITS Mount all board exhibits on ¼" plywood, Masonite, or similar panel no larger than 24" high by 24" wide. Poster exhibits should be on regular poster sheets, no larger than standard size (22 by 28 inches) but half size, 22 by 14 inches, is recommended.

Division 340 - Wildlife and How They Live (Classes 1-4)

- D-340-001 **Mammal Display:** Board or poster exhibits. Display may show any aspect of wildlife, wildlife habitat, or related conservation. Examples: life history or other facts about one type of wildlife; how to manage wildlife on a farm or in town; managing habitat for one kind of wildlife; life requirements for one kind of wildlife during one season or through the year; wildlife behavior and habitats. For more ideas, refer to project booklets. SF154
- D-340-002 **Bird Display:** Board or poster exhibits. Display may show any aspect of wildlife, wildlife habitat, or related conservation. Examples: life history or other facts about one type of wildlife; how to manage wildlife on a farm or in town; managing habitat for one kind of wildlife; life requirements for one kind of wildlife during one season or through the year; wildlife behavior and habitats. For more ideas, refer to project booklets. SF154
- D-340-003 **Fish Display:** Board or poster exhibits. Display may show any aspect of wildlife, wildlife habitat, or related conservation. Examples: life history or other facts about one type of wildlife; how to manage wildlife on a farm or in town; managing habitat for one kind of wildlife; life requirements for one kind of wildlife during one season or through the year; wildlife behavior and habitats. For more ideas, refer to project booklets. SF155
- D-340-004 **Reptile or Amphibian Display:** Board or poster exhibits. Display may show any aspect of wildlife, wildlife habitat, or related conservation. Examples: life history or other facts about one type of wildlife; how to manage wildlife on a farm or in town; managing habitat for one kind of wildlife; life requirements for one kind of wildlife during one season or through the year; wildlife behavior and habitats. For more ideas, refer to project booklets. SF156

Wildlife and How They Live (Classes 1-4) board or poster exhibits. Display may show any aspect of wildlife, wildlife habitat, or related conservation. Examples: life history or other facts about one type of wildlife; how to manage wildlife on a farm or in town; managing habitat for one kind of wildlife; life requirements for one kind of wildlife during one season or through the year; wildlife behavior and habitats. For more ideas, refer to project booklets.

- D-340-005 Wildlife Connections: Board or poster exhibit. The purpose of this display is to show interconnections and related aspects among animals, plants, and other habitat components. All displays should show two or more interactions (connections) that occur between/among animals or between animals and their habitat. Displays might show how animals interact with other animals, with people, or with their habitat. Examples: Food chain display. Use pictures, drawings, or other items to illustrate the source of food energy and where it goes who eats whom or what. Use arrows to show the direction of the energy (food) flow. Show the role of predators, scavengers, insect eaters, or others in nature. Show how wildlife numbers (populations) change through the year. Show predation, competition, or other behavioral interactions of wildlife. Choose one kind of wildlife and make observations through a season or year, keep notes of interactions, then make a display of what you saw. SF157
- D-340-006 Wildlife Tracks: Board or diorama-type box exhibit. Make a display of animal tracks using plaster-of-paris casts. There are 3 options. For all options, include a brief description of your experiences in making the tracks so the judges better understand what you did and learned. Positive casts (impressions as they would be in nature) are preferred. - Option 1 should show plaster-of-paris tracks of five or more kinds of wildlife along with a picture or illustration of each kind of animal. (OR) - Option 2 should show two or more plaster-ofparis tracks of one specific kind of wildlife and should include a picture or illustration of the animal, what the animal may eat, and what may eat the animal. (OR) - Option 3 should show two tracks and include the animal's habitat needs including preferred food, shelter, water, and space in addition to picture or illustration of the animal. SF158
- D-340-007 **Wildlife Knowledge Check** Use electrical circuits, pictures, or other methods of teaching wildlife identification or other wildlife related knowledge. Plan size and shape to fit transportation and display; maximum size 24 x 24 inches. SF159
- D-340–008 Wildlife Diorama Box must be no larger than 24" x 24". The exhibit might show a grassland, prairie, agricultural, woodland, riparian (stream or river corridor), wetland, and/or other area with wildlife habitat. Example: show a large unbroken grassland or prairie for species such as meadowlarks, greater prairie-chicken, lark bunting, grasshopper sparrows, Ferruginous hawk, burrowing owl, horned lark, upland sandpiper, or pronghorn; AND/OR show an area interspersed with several habitats such as windbreaks, farm fields, woods, waste areas, ditches, and pastures for edge-adapted species such as white-tailed deer, Northern bobwhite, mourning doves, cottontail rabbits, fox, squirrels, Northern cardinals, or blue jays. Label the habitats displayed and show at least five kinds of wildlife in their proper habitats. SF160
- D-340-009 Wildlife Essay Learn how to share educational information by writing. Choose a conservation or wildlife topic that interests you and write an essay about it. For example, write about a particular species of wildlife that you have observed or about the values of wildlife. You might write about wildlife on a farm, in town, in a backyard, at a backyard feeder, or at other places. You might write about hunting, fishing, or ethics and proper behavior for hunting or fishing. The essay is between 100 and 1000 words long and typed, double spaced, on (8 ½ x 11) paper is preferred. You might use books,
- magazines, or personal interviews as resources, but you must give credit to all sources by listing them. SF161 D-340-010 Wildlife Values Scrapbook - Make a scrapbook about the various values of wildlife following guidelines in the Wildlife Conservation project booklet (4-H 125). SF162
- D-340-011 Wildlife Arts The purpose of this class is to allow artistic exhibits that contain educational information about conservation and wildlife. Examples might include paintings, photographs, wood-carvings, painted duck decoys, or songs or poems written by the exhibitor. Entries must be appropriate for fair display and no larger than 24" x 24". For example, paintings or photographs should be displayed in notebook format or mounted on a sturdy display panel. All entries must include a title and brief explanation of the purpose or message (what is the exhibit meant to show). SF163

Division 342 - Wildlife Habitat

Pay Category #4

- D-342-001 Houses Make a house for wildlife. Examples: bird house (bluebird, purple martin, wood duck, kestrel, barn owl, etc.) or bat house; no insect houses. Make the house functional so that dimensions, hole-size etc. are appropriate to fit the intended species' needs. Include the following information: 1) the kinds of animal(s) for which the house is intended, 2) where and how the house should be located for best use, and 3) any seasonal maintenance needed. Tips: check NebGuide on bird houses and shelves. SF165
- D-342-002 **Feeders/Waterers** Make a bird bath or feeder. Examples: seed, suet, or nectar feeders. Squirrel feeder okay; no insect feeders. Indicate the kinds of animal(s) for which the feeder or waterer is intended. Make the feeder or waterer functional so that it fits wildlife needs. Include the following information: SF166
 - a. where and how the feeder or waterer should be located for best use and
 - b. how it should be maintained. Tips: check NebGuide on feeding birds.
- D-342-003 Wildlife Habitat Design Board or poster exhibit. Choose a backyard, acreage, or farm, and design a habitat plan to meet the food, water, shelter, and space needs of at least three kinds of animals you would like to attract. Draw an outline of the area and show what plants or other habitat will be provided. Indicate how the various parts of your plan provide the desired habitat needs. You might include an aerial photo of the area if you have one. For ideas, check the Wildlife Habitat Evaluation Handbook, Participant's Manual (NE 4H4300). SF167

Division 343 - Harvesting Equipment

- D-343-001 **Fish Harvesting Equipment** Board exhibit. Display of equipment used in fish harvesting. Examples: fishing knots, hooks (with corks over ends for safety), and lures. Label all items displayed. Include in your exhibit the following information: SF168
 - 1. the purpose of each item,
 - 2. when or where each item is used
 - 3. any personal experiences you've had with the item(s).
- D-343-002 Build a Fishing Rod Rod building kits with instructions are

available for this purpose. A fishing rod educational exhibit may not exceed 96 inches length. Exhibit must be mounted on a board. SF169

Include with the exhibit:

- Explanation of cost of materials/components
- Where materials/components were purchased
- How it was made
- Number of hours required for construction.

Label all parts. Necessary components which must be included are grip, line guides (based on manufacturers specifications), guide wraps, and hook keeper. Reel seat needs to be aligned with guides, and guides aligned accurately down rod. Guide wraps of size A to D, nylon or silk thread.

Exhibit will be judged on: workmanship, labeling of parts information, and neatness.

D-343-003 **Casting Target** - Make a casting target for exhibit and use, following guidelines on the reference sheet. Target must be under 48" x 48". The bullseyes must be a 2 feet diameter and can have up to 3 rings. The exhibit must be easy to store, durable and weather resistant. Include the purpose and rules of using your casting target. SF170

D-343-004 Wildlife Harvesting Equipment - Board exhibit. Display of equipment used in harvesting wildlife. Examples: expended ammunition casings (no live ammunition permitted), steel traps, hide stretchers, fleshers, etc. For displays of shotguns, rifles, or bows, use drawings or pictures. Label all items displayed: SF171

- A. the purpose of each item,
- B. when or where it is used,, and
- C. any personal experiences you've had with the item(s).

D-343-005 Inventing Wildlife/Fish Harvesting Equipment, Aid, or Accessory

Use engineering principles to invent or adapt equipment that helps you harvest fish or wildlife. This could include wildlife calls, adapted fishing poles for shallow water, a blind, decoys, etc. Share your drawing (or adapted plans), how the equipment works, how you tested it, and the results of testing your prototype and any adjustments you made. SF168

Division 346 – Taxidermy

- D-346-001 **Tanned Hides or Taxidermy** Any legal fish, bird, or other wild animal properly processed by the member. No requirement as to size or mounting. Include the following information: SF172
 - 1. the animal's name and
 - 2. information about the exhibitor's personal field experiences, study, or observations that relate to the exhibit.

Division 341 – Outdoor Adventure-Level 2

- D341001 Poster Create a poster display no larger than 22" X 28". Topics may include, but not limited to one or more of the following; how to pitch a tent, knot tying, cooking over a campfire, how to start a campfire, wildlife and plants identified while camping, how to set up emergency shelter, dealing with weather, collection of photos from camping trips, "Leave No Trace" and how that was followed while camping, plan a camping trip, camping essentials, environmental issues/protecting natural resources, park or trail clean up, sanitation/hygiene while outdoors or use of GPS.
- D341002 Journal/Binder Written report of actual, virtual or actual camping/hiking trips with observations OR field journal (notes of actual experiences, sights, sounds, smells, etc.), OR camping or hiking trip diary. Explain growth in project, leading the hikes, planning the camping trip, now being able to identify the wildlife and nature around you and how identified (sight/sound/shape/smell/color). Feathers/leaf/flower pressings must be securely attached, if included. Photos of drawing of observations encouraged. Exhibits measure no larger than 16" X 16".
- D341003 **Camping/Hiking Safety** Must include explanation of use of item and why selected/purpose, how it fits hiking/camping needs. May include, but are not limited to, one of the following: travel sized poisonous plants guide, camping first aid kit, weather/water safety or hand hygiene kit. Exhibits measure no larger than 18" X 24".
- D341004 Digital Media Use digital media to show video/slideshow/presentation of setting up a tent (include why site is chosen) or protecting natural resources or environmental issues or computer video camping/hiking game. Submit a USB drive or DVD inside a report cover or notebook. If using a slideshow, include printed slides inside report cover or notebook.
- D341005 **Other Camping Items** Must include what inspired the creation of the item, and its purpose. May include, but are not limited to one of the following; nature art, nature haiku poem, spider web sketches or knot display. Exhibits measure no larger than 18" X 24".

Rules: Display posters must be made of material, e.g. foam board or poster board and measure no larger than 22" X 28". Poster material should be sturdy enough to hold display items. Display exhibits other than posters to be no larger than 18" X 24". Journal/Binder exhibits measure no larger than 16" X 16". Consider neatness and creativity.

- D341008 Expedition Safety Must include an explanation of use of items, why selected/purpose of item, how it meets hiking/camping/expedition needs. May include, but are not limited to; travel sized edible plants, creepy crawly guide, tent repair kit, travel first aid kit or weather/water safety. Exhibits measure no larger than 18" X 24"
- D341009 Digital Media Use digital media to show video/slideshow/presentation of one of the following, but not limited to; building a nontent shelter (include why needed), packing your backpack/equipment and getting it onto you, teaching others about environmental issues or a computer video backpacking expedition game. Submit a USB drive or DVD inside a report cover or notebook. If using a

slideshow, include printed slides inside report cover or notebook.

D341010 Other Expedition Items -Must include what inspired the creation of the item, and the purpose of the item. May include, but are not limited to; nature art, nature cinquain poem, backpacking food recipes, hiking/expedition conditioning plan, charcoal etching, dehydrated meal or snack (at least 1 cup displayed in a re-sealable plastic bag with ingredients, instructions, and nutritional facts included). Exhibits measure no larger than 18" X 24"

Rules: Display posters must be made of material, e.g. foam board or poster board and measure no larger than 22" X 28". Poster material should be sturdy enough to hold display items. Display exhibits other than posters to be no larger than 18" X 24". Journal/Binder exhibits measure no larger than 16" X 16". Consider neatness and creativity.

Division 347 – Shooting Sports

Pay Category #4

4-H Shooting Sports requires youth to be under the direct leadership of a certified 4-H Shooting Sports Leader in either shotgun, rifle (bb gun), archery, pistol, blackpowder/muzzleloader, and/or hunting skills. No firearms can be entered as an exhibit, nor live ammunition; however information can be shared through pictures.

- D-347-001 Shooting Aid or Accessory Any item which helps the shooter/hunter better perform their sport, examples: rifle sling, kneeling roll, arm guard, shotgun vest, target boxes, shooting stick, etc. Include your design or plans you adapted, what the item is and used for.
 D-347-002 Storage Case An item with the purpose to safely hold a firearm, bow, ammunition, and/or arrows, examples: soft sided shotgun
- case, quivers, firearm safe. Include your design, or plans you adapted. Explain how the storage case is used. SF254
- D-347-003 Practice Game or Activity Invent or adapt an activity to practice or teach a project skill, include pictures of youth playing the game, testimonials for 4-H members who played the game, what skill is being worked on, and directions for the game. Explain how you came up with the game or adapted it to fit the needs of your group members. SF255
- D-347-004 Science, Engineering, Technology Advancements of Shooting Sports Essay or Display Choose a specific are of shooting sports and share how it has advanced, include a timeline and photos or illustrations. Keep your topic narrow and manageable. Essays are limited to 1000 words and should be on 8 ½ x 11 paper. SF256
- D-347-005 Healthy Lifestyles Plan Include a shooter's diet and exercise plan, and how the 4-H member will benefit or improve from following the plan. Ideally, the 4-H member would follow the plan and include some journal entries about adaptations or improvements made while following the plan. SF257
- D-347-006 Citizenship/Leadership Project Share a display on a citizenship project or leadership project the 4-H member took on individually or with a group to improve some aspect related to 4-H Shooting Sports. Examples could be range development, conservation planting to attract wildlife, a camp, 4-H recruitment event. Include who benefitted, what the 4-H member's role was, and any results. SF258
- D-347-007 Career Development/College Essay, Interview or Display Research opportunities for careers related to this area or opportunities for college majors or college activities to help discover using project skills beyond a person's 4-H career. Essays are limited to 1000 words and should be on 8 ½ x 11 paper. Interviews need to include a picture of the interviewee in their work setting, questions asked, and a transcript of answers. SF252
- D-347-008 Community Vitality Display Explore the difference shooting sports and hunting make in keeping Nebraska vibrant especially in rural areas. Present facts and research in an interesting way for the public to learn from. SF251
- D-347-009 Ag Literacy-Value Added Agriculture Interview or Research Project Explore how traditional ag producers are adding value to their production agriculture operations through conservation efforts, hunting, raising pheasants, shooting sports related tourism, etc. Present finding in an interesting way for the public to learn from. SF250

Division 361 - Other Natural Resources

Pay Category #4D-

361-001 **Design Your Own Exhibit** in Natural Resources, Conservation, or Ecology - This class is for educational exhibits about natural resources, conservation, wildlife, or ecology that do not fit into other categories. Entries must be appropriate for fair display and no larger than 24" x 24". All entries must include a title and should be clear (a brief explanation or other method) about the intended purpose or message – what the exhibit is meant to show. Think about accuracy, creativity, educational value for viewers, and evidence of exhibitor's personal experiences and learning. SF164

Department D – Forestry

Environmental Education & Earth Sciences

General Information

The official reference for all forestry projects is the Tree Identification Manual (4-H 332), which was recently revised and is available for purchase from UNL Marketplace (<u>http://marketplace.unl.edu/ne4h/tree-identifcation-manual-691.html</u>. Other helpful forestry references include Trees of Nebraska (EC 92-1774-X), Leafing Out (4-H431) and Plant a Tree (EC 17-11-80).

Display "boards" must be made from wood or wood composite, e.g. plywood, fiberboard, or Masonite, 1/4" to ½" thick and no larger than 24" x 24". Display boards may be coated, e.g., painted or varnished, on both sides to prevent warping.

Display "posters" must be made from a material, e.g. foam board or poster board that will stand upright without buckling, and be no larger than 24" x 24".

Display "books" must measure no more than 16" x 16".

At least 5 of the 10 samples in Class 2, 3, 4, and 5 must be from the list of 60 species described in 4-H 332. Samples must be from 10 different tree species. For example, Emerald Queen Maple and Crimson King Maple are both varieties of the same species (Norway Maple), and thus have the same genus and species name, i.e. <u>Acer platanoides</u>. All samples must be from trees. NO shrubs. If more than 10 samples are included in the display, only the first 10 samples from the current year will be judged.

Remember that other general labeling standards apply. For example, scientific names are <u>always</u> italicized or underlined. Also, the first letter of a Genus name is always capitalized. The first letter of a species name is always lower case. When required, always indicate <u>complete</u> scientific names (Genus and species) and common names, (e.g. Norway maple) even when "variety names" are included. For example, the scientific name of

Emerald Queen Maple is <u>Acer platanoides</u> and the common name is Norway maple. "Emerald Queen" may be included as the variety name, but variety names are not required.

Another important judging factor is how well the exhibitor follows the directions for the exhibit class.

Classes:

Division 320- FORESTRY

- D-320-001 Design-Your-Own Exhibit Prepare an educational exhibit about some aspect of trees, forests or forestry that is of special interest to you. Possible topics include paper recycling, wild fire, forest products, forest wildlife, or forest pests. The only requirement is that the display must be no larger than 24"x24". Photographs, drawing, samples, charts, posters, etc. can be used but include enough information to adequately explain the topic. Your display should be substantially different from other display classes. Be as creative as you like. SF31
- D-320-002 Leaf Display The leaf display must include samples of "complete leaves" from at least 10 different tree species. The display must include at least two samples of simple leaves, compound leaves, and conifer leaves. Leaves should be pressed, dried and mounted. SF32

Collection: Whenever possible, collect leaves from mature trees. Collect leaves any time after they have reached full size, usually beginning in early summer. Leaf samples should be in good condition and representative of the average leaves on the tree. Keep in mind that shaded leaves often are much larger than normal. Carefully remove leaves from the twig with the entire petiole or rachis (if compound) intact. After collection, fresh leaf samples can be temporarily stored within the pages of an old magazine, but they should be properly pressed and dried for display. Be sure to record pertinent information during collection. All collection must be done by the exhibitor.

Mounting: Leaves may be displayed in a notebook or on a display board. Any method may be used to mount leaves, e.g. wire, glue, tape, staples, plastic bags, but be sure all their features can be clearly identified.

Labeling: The label for each sample must include:

- 1. Common Name
- 2. Scientific Name
- 3. Leaf Type
- 4. Leaf Arrangement
- 5. Leaf Composition (for broadleaf trees)

- 6. Collector's Name
- 7. Collection Date
- 8. Collection Location (be specific, state and county at a minimum)

If a twig is included with a sample, indicate "twig included" on the label. For example, the twig may be included with an Easter red cedar sample because the leaves are very small and difficult to remove from the twig. Supplemental information, e.g. general uses, common products, fall color, etc., may be included with the display to enhance its educational value.

D-320-003 Twig Display – The twig display must include twig samples from at least 10 different tree species. The display must include at least two samples of opposite and alternate leaf arrangements from broadleaf trees. SF33

Collection: Twig samples should be collected during the dormant season (November-April) when the buds are mature. Twig samples must be at least 6 inches long and exhibit buds. Leaves must be removed and side branches must be trimmed to less than 1 inch in length. All collection must be done by the exhibitor.

Mounting: Twigs must be mounted on a display board. Any method, e.g. wire, glue, tape, staples, plastic bags, may be used to mount twigs, but be sure all features can be clearly identified. The non-terminal end must be cut at a slant so the pith can be seen.

- Labeling: The label for each sample must include:
 - 1. Common Name
 - Scientific Name
 Leaf arrangement (for broadleaf trees)
 - 4. Collector's Name

Supplemental information, e.g. General uses, tree characteristics, etc., may be included with the display to enhance its educational value.

D-320-004 Seed Display – The seed display must include seed samples from at least 10 different tree species. SF34

Collection: Tree seeds should be collected at the time of year when they mature, which varies widely depending upon tree species. For example, Silver maple seeds mature in May while red oak acorns do not mature until September. Remember to display the seeds, and not the fruit. For example, the seed of honey locust is enclosed in a pod. Remove and display the seed, not just the pod. It is acceptable to display the fruit with the seed, but clearly label each. All collection must be done by the exhibitor.

Mounting: Seeds may be displayed in a variety of ways, e.g. mounted on a display board, displayed in jars in a rack, etc., but they must be securely mounted and easily viewed. Be as creative as you like.

D-320-005 Wood Display – The wood display must include wood samples from at least 10 different tree species. SF36

Preparation: Samples may be of any shape, e.g. sections from a board, wood cylinders turned on a lathe, horizontal or vertical cross sections of a small log with bark attached, etc., but all samples should be the same shape, e.g. all wood cylinders or all sections of a board. Each sample can be no larger than 4"x4". Cut surfaces should be sanded to show the grain. Treating samples with a clear finish (no stain) is optional. All collection must be done by the exhibitor.

- 5. Collection Date
- Collection Location (be specific, state and county at a minimum)

Mounting: Samples may be displayed in a variety of ways but they must be securely mounted and easily viewed. For example, wood samples may be mounted on a display board or displayed in a box or rack. Be as creative as you like.

Labeling: The label for each sample must include:

- 1. Common Name
- 2. Scientific Name
- 3. Wood Type (softwood or hardwood)
- 4. Collector's Name

Supplemental information, e.g. common products, density, etc. may be included with the display to enhance its educational value.

D-320-006 **Cross Section**- Display a disc cut from a tree species listed in 4H332. The sample must be collected, by the exhibitor, within one year of the state fair judging day. The disc must measure 6 to 12 inches in diameter and 1 to 3 inches thick. The bark should be firmly attached, which may be difficult if the tree was dead when the disc was cut. Sand at least one side of the disc so the grain can be easily seen. If the disc is treated with a clear finish, both sides must be treated to minimize warping. Some cracking or checking can be expected and is allowed. SF38

Labeling: The following parts must be clearly and accurately labeled on the cross section with pins, paper tags, or some other form of identification.

D-320-008 Living Tree - Display a living tree seedling grown by the exhibitor from seed in the display container. The seed must be from a species listed in 4H332. The seedling must be 60 days to 1 year old (on State Fair judging day). The display container must contain at least 8 inches of soil (potting mix or suitable natural soil); have drainage hole(s), and a drain pan to catch drainage water. SF40

Labeling: A waterproof label must be attached and include:

1. Common Name	Planting Date
2. Scientific Name	5. Emergence Date
3. Seed Treatments (if any)	6. Exhibitor's Name

Supplemental information about the tree, e.g. where the seed was collected, growth measurements, uses for that species, etc., may be included in an attached notebook, poster, etc. Supplemental information will be an important factor in judging.

- D320009 Forest Product Display - Prepare a visual display and/r collection tracing the origin of one non-lumber product that comes from trees and/or forests. The display must be no larger than 24 inches by 22 inches by 28 inches. Photographs, drawings, samples, charts, posters, etc. can be used. Posters submitted may be no larger than 22" x 28" and may be either vertical or horizontal. The contestant must identify what species of tree the product is derived from and where the product is harvested, grown, or otherwise collected. The product listed must be partially or fully derived from trees; if partial the approximate percentage should be articulated in the display.
 - The goal of this exhibit is for students to learn that many products come from trees and forests and to explore one of these products through in-depth study.
 - Information about the tree or forest product: e.g. information about harvesting, processing, industry information, and environmental or other benefits may be included to enhance educational value. Supplemental information will be an important factor in judging but should not exceed three printed pages of text. Cite sources of information.
 - Personal interviews with industry professionals are encouraged as a source of information.
- D320010 Forest Health Display - Prepare a visual display outlining a specific forest health issue such as a tree disease, insect pest, animal- or human-caused damage, or an abiotic issue such as weather damage. The display must be no larger than 24 inches by 24 inches by 24 inches. Original photographs, drawings, samples, charts, posters, etc. can be used. Actual specimens are strongly encouraged but must be properly preserved, i.e. insects pinned or placed in vials of alcohol, leaves pressed and dried. Posters submitted may be no

larger than 24 inches x 24 inches. Explain through the display what species of trees the health issue affects, diagnostic features of the issue (symptoms in trees, identifying features of the pest, etc.), and management options.

- Include common and scientific names of trees and pests.
- Supplemental information about the tree or forest health issue: e.g. origin, proliferation in Nebraska/United States, and physiological
 effects on the tree may be included to enhance educational value. Supplemental information will be an important factor in judging but
 should not exceed three printed pages of text. Cite sources of information.
- Attach a separate label on the back of the display that includes the exhibitor's name and age.
- D320011 Wildfire Prevention Poster Prepare a poster, no larger than 24 inches x 24 inches that promotes wildfire prevention strategies. Strategies articulated in the poster can include personal and/or land management actions. Attach a separate label on the back of the poster that includes the exhibitor's name and age.
 - Supplemental information about wildfire prevention should be attached to the poster: e.g. frequency of wildfires in Nebraska/United States, financial costs of wildfires, environmental factors that contribute to wildfires, etc. to enhance educational value. Supplemental information will be an important factor in judging but should not exceed three printed pages of text. Cite sources of information

D320012 Sustainable Landscape Diorama - Box must be no larger than 24" x 24". The exhibit must show a Nebraska landscape that includes

elements such as windbreaks, fields, pastureland, CRP, public lands, community/municipal landscapes. The goal of this exhibit is for students to articulate conservation and sustainability best-practices that can be implemented on a landscape, while addressing landowner and other stakeholder interests.

- Label point/nonpoint sources of pollution, carbon sequestration, water-wise practices, wildfire prevention strategies, renewable energy sources, and other conservation practices as well as at least 10 species of plants included in the diorama.
- Attach to the exhibit a brief report including supplemental information describing the diorama, defining conservation practices, and
 outlining opportunities for landscape improvements to enhance educational value. Supplemental information will be an important factor
 in judging but should not exceed three printed pages of text. Cite sources of information.
- D320013 Tree Planting Project Display Plant a tree in your community. Prepare a visual display where the student articulates proper tree planting techniques, why the individual tree species was chosen, as well as steps taken to continue care for the tree after initial planting. The display must be no larger than 24 inches by 24 inches by 24 inches. Photographs, drawings, samples, charts, posters, etc. can be used. Posters submitted may be no larger than 24 inches x 24 inches. The tree must have been planted 60 days to 1 year before State Fair judging day. Students must obtain permission from necessary authorities and property owners before planting any trees.
 - Labeling: the following information about the tree must be included in the display: 1. common name 2. scientific name 3. planting location 4. planting date 5. tree source 6. planter's name 7. proper tree planting steps 8. tree care (after planting)
 - Supplemental information about the tree: e.g. why the species was chosen, growth measurements, uses for that species, etc., may be included in an attached notebook, poster, etc. to enhance educational value. Supplemental information will be an important factor in judging but should not exceed three printed pages of text. Cite sources of information.

DEPARTMENT E – NUTRITION, FOODS & FOOD PRESERVATION

RULES:

- A. GENERAL Members may exhibit only in the project in which enrolled. Products should be baked the day before entry day.
- B. ENTRIES PER INDIVIDUAL One entry per exhibitor per class.
- C. **LABELS** For ALL FOOD PRODUCTS -Each exhibit must include the recipe. Recipe may be handwritten, photocopied or typed. Place the food on the appropriate size plate. Put exhibit in a self-sealing bag. Attach entry tag and recipe at the corner of the bag on the outside. FOR NON-FOOD ENTRIES-Please attach the entry tag to the upper right hand corner of the entry. GENERAL LABELING INFORMATION-All additional information pieces (recipes, special items) must be labeled with exhibitor's name and county.
- D. CRITERIA FOR JUDGING Exhibits will be judged according to score sheets available at the extension office or at <u>https://go.unl.edu/ne4hfood-nutrition</u>. Make sure to follow all entry instructions required for your exhibit. Incomplete exhibits will be lowered a ribbon placing. Commercially prepared mixes are allowed in Cooking 201 Creative Mix Class. Prepared baking mixes, biscuit mixes, commercially prepared seasoning mixes for food preservation and other pre-made mixes entered in other categories will be lowered a ribbon placing.
- E. ENTER FOOD EXHIBITS in disposable materials, i.e., paper plate and plastic self-sealing bag. The Butler County Fair is not responsible for lost bread boards, China or glassware.
- F. Ingredients that the 4-H member cannot legally purchase, such as beer, whiskey, rum, etc. may not be used in any recipe or foods exhibit. Exhibits that include alcohol in the recipe will be disqualified. This includes menu and recipe file exhibits.
- G. EXHIBITS ARE ON DISPLAY FOR SEVERAL DAYS. Please limit exhibits to products which hold up well. Items that require refrigeration will not be accepted, judged or displayed. Food products must be unquestionably safe to eat when they are entered, whether tasted or not. Egg glazes on yeast products before baking are allowed. Glazes, frostings and other sugar based toppings are also considered safe due to the high sugar content. Eggs incorporated into baked goods or crusts and cheeses mixed into bread doughs are considered safe. All fruit fillings must be cooked. Uncooked fruit is not allowed in any exhibit due to spoilage (i.e. fresh fruit tart). Cream cheese fillings and/or frostings are not allowed. Meat, dried meat, meat substitute pieces (bacon bits, pepperoni, etc.), or melted cheese toppings are not allowed in food exhibits. Uncooled fruit toppings (i.e., fresh fruit tart) are considered unsafe for fair exhibits and will be disgualified..

*E-401-901 **Cookies** (any recipe)-Four on a paper plate.

*E-401-902 **Muffins** (any recipe)-Four on a paper plate.

*E-401-903 No Bake Cookie (any recipe) – Four on a paper plate.

- *E-401-904 Cereal Bar Cookie (any cereal based recipe made in pan and cut into bars for squares for serving.)-Four bars on paper plate.
- *E-401-905 **Granola Bar** (any recipe)-Four on a paper plate.
- *E-401-906 **Brownies** (any recipe)-Four on a paper plate.
- *E-401-907 Snack Mix (any recipe)-One cup in self-sealing plastic bag.

Division 350-General

E-350-001 Food Science Explorations

Open to any 4-H'er enrolled in a Foods and Nutrition project. Show the connection between food and science as it relates to food preparation, food safety, food preservation or food production. Exhibit may be a poster or foam core board (not to exceed 22" by 30"), computer based presentation printed off with notes pages, if needed, and displayed in binder, an exhibit display, and a written report in portfolio or notebook. Consider neatness and creativity. SF152.

E-350-002 Food and Nutrition Poster, Scrapbook or Photo Display

Open to any 4-H'er enrolled in a Foods and Nutrition project, involving a nutrition or food preparation or explore a career related to the food industry (caterer, restaurant owner, food scientist, registered dietitian, etc.). This might contain pictures, captions, and/or reports to highlight the concept. Exhibit may be a poster or foam core board (not to exceed 22" by 30"), computer based presentation printed off with notes pages, if needed, and displayed in binder, an exhibit display, and a written report in portfolio or notebook. Consider neatness and creativity. SF122.

E-350-003 Physical Activity and Health Poster, Scrapbook or Photo Display

Open to any 4-H'er enrolled in a Foods and Nutrition project, involving a physical activity or career concept/lesson. This might contain pictures, captions, and/or reports to highlight the concept. Exhibit may be a poster or foam core board (not to exceed 22" by 30"), computer based presentation printed off with notes pages, if needed, and displayed in binder, an exhibit display, and a written report in portfolio or notebook. Consider neatness and creativity. SF122.

E-350-004 Cooking Basics Recipe File

A collection of 10 recipes from any source. Each recipe must accompany a complete menu in which the recipe is used. An additional 10 recipes may be added each year the 4-H'er is in the project, with year clearly marked on recipes. Display in a recipe file or binder. Be sure to include the number of servings or yield of the recipe. This may be a continued recipe file project from the previously used 4-H curriculum before 2018. Exhibits that include recipes with alcohol (wine, beer, rum, etc.) will be disqualified. SF251

Division 410 – Cooking 201

Pay Category #4

- E-410-001 Loaf Quick Bread (any recipe) At least ¾ of a standard loaf displayed on a paper plate. Quick bread is any bread that does not require kneading or rising time and does NOT include yeast. A standard quick bread loaf measures approximately 8 ½" x 4 ½" or 9" x 5". If mini-loaf pans are used for exhibit, two loaves must be presented for judging. Scoresheet SF123
- E-410-002 **Creative Mixes** any recipe, at least 3/4 of baked product or 4 muffins or cookies on a paper plate or in a disposable pan. Baked item made from a mix (commercial or homemade mixes acceptable). Food product must have been modified to make a new or different baked item. Examples include poppyseed quick bread from a cake mix, cake mix cookies, sweet rolls made from readymade bread dough, monkey breads from biscuit dough, streusel coffee cake from a cake mix, etc. Write what you learned about making this product using a mix instead of a homemade recipe or recipe "from scratch." Does it make it better or easier to use a convenience product or mix? Why or why not? SF142
- E-410-003 **Biscuits or Scones** Four biscuits or scones on a small paper plate. This may be any type of biscuit or scone-rolled, dropped, any recipe. Recipe must be a non-yeast product baked from scratch. SF136
- E-410-004 Healthy Baked Product (any recipe, at least ¾ of baked product or 4 muffins or cookies on a paper plate. May be baked in a disposable pan.) Recipe must contain a surprise ingredient and MUST not use a mix (ex. cantaloupe quick bread, pork & bean bread, etc.). Write what you learned about making this unique item with an unusual ingredient. What was the anticipated outcome? Would you make it again? SF124
- E-410-005 **Coffee Cake** (any recipe or shape, non-yeast product) At least ¾ of baked product on a paper plate or in a disposable pan. Include menu for a complete meal where this recipe is served. SF129
- E-410-006 Baking with Whole Grain- any recipe, at least ¾ of baked product or 4 muffins/cookies on a paper plate or in a disposable pan. Recipe must contain whole grains as part of the ingredients. (Ex. whole wheat applesauce bread, peanut butter oatmeal cookies, etc.) SF134
- E-410-007 **Non-Traditional Baked Product** exhibit must include a food product prepared using a non-traditional method (i.e. bread machine, cake baked in convection oven, baked item made in microwave, etc.) Entry must be at least ¾ baked product, or 4 muffins or cookies on a paper plate. Entry must include supporting information that discusses alternative preparation method and how it compares with traditional method. SF133

Division 411 – Cooking 301

Pay Category #4

Any bread item prepared or baked, using a bread machine should be entered under the Cooking 201, Non-Traditional Baked Product. All exhibits made in Cooking 301 or 401 projects must have been prepared without the assistance of a bread machine for mixing, raising, or baking of the food item.

E-411-001 White Bread (any yeast recipe) - At least 3/4 of a standard loaf displayed on a paper plate. Scoresheet SF138

E-411-002 Whole Wheat or Mixed Grain Bread (any yeast recipe) - At least 3/4 of a standard loaf displayed on a paper plate. Scoresheet SF138
 E-411-003 Specialty Rolls – (any yeast recipe) 4 rolls on a paper plate. May be sweet rolls, English muffins, kolaches, bagels, or any other similar recipe that makes individual portions. SF138

- E-411-004 Dinner Rolls (any yeast recipe) 4 rolls on a paper plate. May be clover leaf, crescent, knot, bun, bread sticks, or any other type of dinner roll. SF138
- E-411-005 Specialty Bread (any recipe made with yeast) Tea rings, braids, or any other full sized specialty bread products. Must exhibit at least ¾ of a full-sized baked product. SF141
- E-411-006 Shortened Cake Mist exhibit at least ¾ of the cake (recipe must not be from a cake mix). Shortened cakes use fat for flavor and texture and recipes usually begin by beating fat with sugar by creaming and include leavening agents in the recipe. Cake may be frosted with a non-perishable frosting (no cream cheese or egg white based frosting allowed). SF137

Division 413 – Cooking 401

Pay Category #4

Any bread item prepared or baked, using a bread machine should be entered under the Cooking 201, Non-Traditional Baked Product. All exhibits made in Cooking 301 or 401 projects must have been prepared without the assistance of a bread machine for mixing, raising, or baking of the food item.

- E-412-001 **Double Crust Fruit Pie** Made with homemade fruit filling. <u>No egg pastries or cream fillings</u>. No canned fillings of premade pie crusts. May be a double crust, crumb, cut-out or lattice topping. Using an 8- or 9-inch disposable pie pan is recommended. Scoresheet SF144
- E-412-002 **Family Food Traditions** (any recipe, at least ¾ of baked product or 4 muffins or cookies on a paper plate. May be baked in a disposable pan.) Any baked item associated with family tradition and heritage. Entry must include (A) recipe, (B) tradition or heritage associated with preparing, serving the food, (C) where or who the traditional recipe came from. SF2012-002.
- E-412-003 Ethnic Food Exhibit (any recipe, at least ¾ of baked product or 4 muffins or cookies on a paper plate. May be baked in a disposable pan.) The name of the country, culture or region should be included as part of the supporting information with the recipe, as well as some background information about the country or culture the food item is representing. SF146
- E-412-004 **Candy** any recipe, 4 pieces on a paper plate or ½ cup. No items containing cream cheese will be accepted (Example: cream cheese mints). Candy may be cooked or no cook; dipped, molded, made in the microwave or other methods of candy preparation. Recipe must be included. SF147
- E-412-005 Foam Cake original recipe (no mixes) of at least ¾ of the cake. Foam cakes are cakes that have a high ratio of eggs to flour and fall into three categories: angel food cakes or meringues: sponge or jelly roll cakes; and chiffon cakes. Scoresheet SF134
- E-412-006 **Specialty Pastry** (any recipe, at least 3/4 of baked product or 4 on a paper plate or baked in a disposable pan.) Baked items such as pie tarts, puff pastry, phyllo doughs, scones, biscotti, choux, croissants, Danish, strudels. Phyllo dough may be pre-made or made from scratch. Pastries made with cream or egg-based fillings will be disqualified. SF143

Division 408 - Decorated Items

Pay Category # 3

Exhibit by an individual enrolled in the cake decorating project. Cakes may be flat, cut up or layered. Following are the division designations: *Beginning Division - decorating for first year *Middle Division - decorating for 2-4 yrs. *Advanced Division - decorating for five plus yrs.

Use a 6" x 8" covered cardboard and allow 1 inch space around outside for handling, piping borders on the 4" x 6" center area of cardboard.
- *E-408-009 **Decorated Cupcakes-**must be four to a plate.
- *E-408-010 **Decorated tier cake with one or more borders –** Middle or Advanced Divisions only.
- *E-408-011 Other Decorated Item such as donuts, cookies, or sugar Easter eggs, etc. on a base no larger than 15" x 15".

Division 430 – Candies

4-H members taking the "Confectionaries" project may enter each class. Include the recipe. **Recipes in which the egg/egg white is not** cooked cannot be used.

 *E-430-006 Candy - Other (does not fit in above categories) must be four to a plate

Department E - Food Preservation

Food Preservation Rules

- A. ENTRIES PER INDIVIDUAL One entry per exhibitor per class.
- B. PROCESSING METHODS <u>Current USDA processing methods and altitude adjustments must be followed for all food preservation.</u> Jam, preserves and marmalades, fruit, tomatoes and pickled products must be processed in a boiling water bath. Tomatoes may be processed in a pressure canner. All non-acid vegetables and meats must be processed in a pressure canner. Spoiled or unsealed container disqualifies entry.
- C. Jars-Do not need to be the same brand. Half pint jars may be used for jellies and preserves. The jars are not to be decorated by the exhibitor in any way. Canning jars must be used others will be disqualified. No one-fourth pint jars allowed. Leave jar rings on for fair display, it helps protect the seal. <u>No zinc lids.</u>
- D. CURRENT PROJECT- All canning must be the result of this year's 4-H project.
- E CRITERIA FOR JUDGING-Exhibits will be judged according to score sheets available at your local Extension office or at https://4h.unl.edu/fairbook/general/scoresheets-forms. Incomplete exhibits will be lowered a ribbon class. Canned food items not processed according to altitude in the county will be lowered one class ribbon. Check with your local extension office for your county's altitude and how that affects food processing times and pounds of pressure.
- E. RECIPE/LABELING-Recipe must be included, may be handwritten, photocopied or typed. Commercially prepared mixes are not allowed. Current USDA guidelines for food preservation methods must be followed. Suggested resources include:
 - 4-H Food Preservation Manuals (Freezing, Drying, Boiling water Bath Canning, Pressure Canning)

E-407-001 **Baked Item with Frozen Produce-**any recipe, at least ¾ of baked product of 4 muffins or cookies on a paper plate. May be baked in a disposable pan. Recipe MUST include a food item preserved by the freezing method done by the 4-H'er.Ex, Peach pie, blueberry muffins, zucchini bread, etc.) Supporting information must include both the recipe for the produce that was frozen as part of the project AND the baked food item. SF155

- E-407-002 **Dried Fruit-**Exhibit 3 different examples of dried fruit. Place each dried fruit food (6-10 pieces of fruit, minimum 1/4 cup) in separate self-sealing bags. Use a rubber band or "twisty" to keep exhibit together. SF147
- E-407-003 **Fruit Leather-**Exhibit 3 different examples of 3 different fruit leathers. Place a 3-4" sample of each fruit together in separate self-sealing bags. Use a rubber band or "twisty" to keep exhibit together. SF147
- E-407-004 Vegetable Leather-Exhibit 3 different samples of three different vegetable or vegetable/fruit leather combo. Place a 3-4" sample of each leather together in self-sealing bags. Use a rubber band or "twisty" to keep exhibit together. SF154

- E-407-010 **1 Jar Tomato Exhibit**-One jar of a canned tomato product. Entry must be processed in the boiling water bath according to current USDA recommendationsSF150

- E-407-011 **3 Jar Tomato Exhibit** Exhibit 3 jars of different canned tomato products (salsa, sauces without meats, juice, stewed, etc.) Entry must be processed in the boiling water bath according to current USDA recommendations. SF150
- E-407-012 **1 Jar Pickled Exhibit** One jar of a pickled and/or fermented product. Entry must be processed in the boiling water bath according to current USDA recommendations. SF150
- E-407-013 **3 Jar Pickled Exhibit** Three jars of different kinds of canned pickled and/or fermented products. Entry must be processed in the boiling water bath according to current USDA recommendations. SF150
- E-407-014 **1 Jar Jelled Exhibit** One jar of a jam, jelly or marmalade. Entry must be processed in the boiling water bath according to current USDA recommendations. SF153

E-407-015 **3 Jar Jelled Exhibit** - Three different kinds of jelled products. Entry may be made up of either pints or half pints. Entry must be processed in the boiling water bath according to current USDA recommendations. SF153

- E-407-016 **1 Jar Vegetable or Meat Exhibit** One jar of a canned vegetable or meat. Include only vegetables and meat canned in a pressure canner. Entry must be processed in the boiling water bath according to current USDA recommendations. SF150
- E-407-017 **3 Jar Vegetable Exhibit** Three jars of different kinds of canned vegetables. Include only vegetables canned in a pressure canner according to current USDA recommendations. SF150
- E-407-018 **3 Jar Meat Exhibit** Three jars of different kinds of canned meats. Include only meats canned in a pressure canner according to current USDA recommendations. SF150
- E-407-019 Quick Dinner Exhibit a minimum of 3 jars to a maximum of 5 jars (all the same size) plus menu. Meal should include 3 canned foods that can be prepared within an hour. List complete menu on a 3" X 5" file card and attach to one of the jars. Entry must be processed according to current USDA recommendations. SF151
- E-407-020 **1 Jar Tomato Exhibit**-One jar of a canned tomato product. Entry must be processed in a pressure canner according to current USDA recommendationsSF150
- E-407-021 **3 Jar Tomato Exhibit** Exhibit 3 jars of different canned tomato products (salsa, sauces without meats, juice, stewed, etc.) Entry must be processed in a pressure canner according to current USDA recommendations. SF150

Department E – Safety

Division 440 - General Safety

Classes:

- E-440-001 **First Aid Kit:** A first aid kit is a good way to organize supplies in an emergency. The kit should be assembled in a container appropriate for the kit's intended use. A description of where the kit will be stored and examples of specific emergencies for that situation should be included in the exhibit. The kit should include a written inventory and purpose statement for included items. Items should cover the following areas: airway and breathing, bleeding control, burn treatment, infectious disease protection, fracture care and miscellaneous supplies. Use Citizen Safety manual, 4-H 425, pages 6 & 7 for guidance. Kits containing any of the following will be automatically disqualified:
 - a. Prescription medications. (If the kit's purpose is to provide medication for someone with special needs, explain in the written description and inventory, but remove the medication.)

- Materials with expiration dates on or before the judging date. (This includes sterile items, non-prescription medications, ointments, salves, etc. Articles dated month and year only are considered expired on the last day of that month.)
- c. Any controlled substance.
- E-440-002 **Disaster Kit: (Emergency Preparedness)** Disaster kits must contain the materials to prepare a person or family for emergency conditions caused by a natural or man-made incident. Selection of materials is left to the exhibitor. Family or group kits must have enough material or items for each person. A description of the kit's purpose, the number of people supported, and a list of contents are required. Youth are encouraged to test their kit by challenging their family to try to survive using only the include materials for the designated theme. If tested, share the experience in kit documentation. <u>Please include short explanation of water needs for your disaster kit.</u> Do not bring actual water to the fair in the kit. SF111.
- E-440-003 **Safety Scrapbook** The Scrapbook must contain 15 news articles from print and/or Internet sources about various incident types. Mount each clipping on a separate page, accompanied by a description of events leading to the incident and any measures that might have prevented it. The Scrapbook should be bound in a standard size hardcover binder or notebook for 8 ½" X 11" size paper. Correct sentence structure, readability and thorough explanations are an important part of judging. SF292
- E-440-004 **Safety Experience** The exhibit should share a learning experience the youth had related to safety. Examples could be participating in a first aid or first responder training, a farm safety day camp, babysitting workshop or similar event; scientific experiment related to safety; or the youth's response to an emergency situation. The exhibit should include a detailed description of the experience, the youth's role, some evidence of the youth's leadership in the situation and a summary of the learning that took place. Exhibits may be presented in a poster with supplemental documentation, a notebook including up to ten pages of narrative and pictures, or a multimedia presentation on a CD lasting up to five minutes. SF190
- E-440-005 **Careers In Safety** The exhibit should identify a specific career area in the safety field and include education and certification requirements for available positions, salary information, demand for the field and a summary of the youth's interest in the field. Examples of careers include firefighters, paramedics, emergency management personnel, some military assignments, law enforcement officers, emergency room medical personnel, fire investigator and more. It is recommended youth interview a professional in the field in their research. Additional research sources might include books, articles, career web sites, job-related government web sites or interviews with career placement or guidance counselors. Exhibits may be presented in a poster with supplemental documentation, a notebook including up to ten pages of narrative and pictures, or a multimedia presentation on a CD lasting up to five minutes. SF191

*E-440-006 Safety Poster - The exhibit should share a learning experience relating to safety. Examples could be- first aid, farm safety, babysitting, bicycle safety, water safety or other common safety measures. Posters must be constructed of commercial poster board at least 11" x 14", but not larger than 22" x 28".

Division 450 - Fire Safety Education

Classes:

Pay Category #4

- E-450-001 **Fire Safety Poster** This is a home floor plan drawn <u>to scale</u> showing primary and secondary escape routes and where fire extinguishers and smoke detectors are located. Draw every room, including all doors and windows. Use **black or blue** arrows showing **primary** escape routes from each room. Use **red** arrows showing **secondary** routes to use if the primary routes are blocked. Primary and secondary escape routes must lead outside to an assembly location. Documentation should include evidence the escape plan has been practiced at least four times. Posters must be constructed of commercial poster board at least 11" x 14" but not larger than 22" x 28". SF269
- E-450-002 **Fire Safety Scrapbook** The scrapbook must contain 10 news articles from print and/or internet sources about fires to residential or commercial properties or landscapes. Mount each clipping on a separate page accompanied by a description of events leading to the incident and any measures that might have prevented it. The Scrapbook should be bound in a standard size hardcover binder or notebook for 8 ½" X 11" sized paper. Correct sentence structure, readability and thorough explanations are an important part of judging. SF270)
- E-450-003 **Fire Prevention Poster** Posters should promote a fire prevention message and be appropriate to display during National Fire Prevention Week or to promote fire safety at specific times of the year (Halloween, 4th of July, etc.). Originality, clarity and artistic impression will all be judged. Do not include live fireworks, matches or other flammable/explosive/hazardous materials. Any entry containing this material will be disqualified. Posters must be constructed of commercial poster board at least 11" x 14" but not larger than 22" x 28". SF268

General Information:

All exhibits are directly related to activities in the project manual. Refer to the manual for ideas, suggestions and additional information to enhance project exhibits.

Exhibit Guidelines:

The 4-H member's name, age, town and county must be listed on the back of the exhibit. Entry cards should be stapled (not paper-clipped or taped) to the upper right-hand corner of the posters.

If exhibit is a poster it must be 14" x 22" and may be arranged either horizontally or vertically.

Poster may not use copyrighted materials, such as cartoon characters or commercial product names.

Exhibits which do not conform to size or content guidelines will be lowered one ribbon placing. Posters may include photographs, charts or examples as well as a written explanation.

Posters may be laminated to protect them. Loose plastic coverings used to protect the exhibit while being transported will be removed by the superintendent for evaluation and display.

The purpose of these exhibits is to demonstrate to the public the benefits from the study and application of crop, weed, range and soil sciences to solving problems in management, conservation, sustainability and environmental protection. Department G, Division 750 Field Crops

Grain or Plant Exhibits - Classes 1-5: :

- A completed Crop Production Worksheet (available at https://cropwatch.unl.edu/Youth/Documents/Crop%20Production%20Project%20Worksheet%20Final.pdf) must accompany grain and plant exhibits or it will automatically be deducted one ribbon placing. The worksheet must include the exhibitors name and address, county, plant hybrid or variety, plant population, whether crop production was irrigated or dryland, and general information including farm cropping history, soil type and weather effects.
- The worksheet also must include an economic analysis of the project, listing individual expenses and income, on a per acre basis. Other topics to discuss are the selection of variety or hybrid, impacts of tillage and conservation practices, inputs (fuel, fertilizer, irrigation,

labor, pesticides, etc.), any observations made during the growing season and what you learned from your crops project. The worksheet counts as 50% of the total when judged.

- Worksheet must be the <u>original</u> work of the individual exhibitor or it will be deducted one ribbon placing.
- Attach the worksheet to the entry in a clear plastic cover such that it can be read without removing it from the cover. In addition to the worksheet, grain and plant exhibits will be judged on condition, appearance (i.e. disease and insect damage, grain fill), uniformity (size, shape, color, maturity), and quality of exhibit. Refer to Scoresheet SF264. Grain exhibits must be one gallon per sample. Grain exhibits harvested in the fall (e.g., corn or soybeans) may be from the previous year's project. Display containers will be furnished.

- Grain Sorghum 4 stalks (cut at ground level and bound together)

- Small grains (oats, barley, wheat, triticale) sheaf of heads 2 inches in diameter at top tie with stems about 24" long.
- Other crops (alfalfa, millet, etc.) sheaf of stems 3 inches in diameter at top tied with stems cut at ground level or half size small square bale.

- G-750-009 Water or Soil Display Display information about water or soils, such as how soils are being used for crop production, range, conservation, wildlife, or wetland use, or ways to protect or conserve water and soil resources. SF259

This could include narration of the growing process, presenting facts about the crop or any other innovative multimedia practices. The presentation should be at least 2 minutes in length and no more than 5 minutes in length, appropriate graphics, sound and either a video clip, animation or voice over and/or original video clip. The following file formats will be accepted: mp4, .mov, .ppt, or .avi.
- G750013 Special Agronomy Project (Freshly Harvested Crop) Plant exhibits must be the result of the current year's project. Depending on the type of crop selected for the current year:
 - Corn 10 ears or 3 stalks (cut at ground level with no roots or soil and bound together)
 - Grain Sorghum 4 stalks (cut at ground level and bound together)
 - Soybeans 6 stalks (cut at ground level and bound together)

Small grains (oats, barley, wheat, triticale) - sheaf of heads 2 inches in diameter at top tie with stems about 24" long.

Other crops (alfalfa, millet, etc.) - sheaf of stems 3 inches in diameter at top tied with stems cut at ground level.

Supporting documentation ($\frac{1}{2}$ to 1-page in length) should include the following:

Economic Analysis and/or research that supports feasibility of this crop in Nebraska or how the crop has evolved over time. Other topics to discuss are past/current commercial production of this crop. This includes: the selection of variety or hybrid, impacts of tillage and conservation practices, inputs (fuel, fertilizer, irrigation, labor, pesticides, etc.), any observations made during the growing season about this

crop and what you learned from your crops project. This ½ to 1-page summary counts as 50% of the total when judged.

In addition to the summary, grain and plant exhibits will be judged on condition, appearance (i.e. disease and insect damage, grain fill), uniformity (size, shape, color, maturity), and quality of exhibit.

Department D - Range Management

- A. Each exhibit must be properly identified with Unit and Class.
- B. All plant displays and display covers must be the result of the current year's work.
- C. Plant identification and lists of appropriate plants in each category (grasses, forbs, shrubs, and grass-like plants) can be found in the Range Judging Handbook and Contest Guide (EC150, Revised July 2016), Common Grasses of Nebraska (EC170), and Common Forbs and Shrubs of Nebraska (EC118).

Division 330 – Books

Exhibitors are limited to 6 entries in floriculture classes 1-45.

Youth must be enrolled in the World of Flowers and/or Annual Flowers projects to exhibit.

The cultivar or variety name must be included on all entry cards. Failure to identify the cultivar or variety will drop the entry one ribbon placing. Proper identification is the responsibility of the exhibitor not the Extension staff or office personnel. For Floriculture, punch hole in the top center of entry tag, use a rubber band to securely attach entry tag to containers.

Exhibits containing an incorrect number of stems will be dropped one ribbon placing. A perennial is defined as a plant of which the crown overwinters. An annual is a plant that grows from seed each season, whether self-seeded or planted by the gardener. A biennial is a plant that germinates, grows and overwinters as a crown, blooms the following year and dies. Foliage will be considered when exhibit is judged.

All 3 or 5 stems of cut flowers should be the same cultivar and color, do not mix cultivars and colors. Containers will not be judged; however, they should be glass containers of a neutral color that won't tip over and of adequate size to display blooms. Containers will not be returned at State Fair. Score Sheet SF106.

Follow the guidelines in 4-H "Preparing Cut Flowers for Exhibits" <u>4-H Preparing Cut Flowers for Exhibits 4H227</u> when preparing entries for the fair.

One might show a special technique used or equipment incorporated in the garden. Refer to 4-H horticulture project manuals, but use your own creativity. Entry card must be stapled to the upper right hand corner. The 4-H member's name, age, full address, county, and years in the project(s) must be on the back of the poster. SF104.

G-770-053 **Flower Gardening History Interview** - Neatly handwritten or typed account of a gardening history interview whose flower garden has inspired you. Maximum of 4 pages of text and 2 pages of pictures (include 1 picture of the person you interviewed) of their flower garden if the individual is still gardening. Protect with a clear report cover. The 4-H member's name, age, full address, county, and years in the project(s) must be on the back of the report cover. SF105.

Houseplants

Youth must be enrolled in the Growing Great Houseplants project to exhibit in classes 60-66.

Container Grown Houseplants: The choice of container and soil quality will be considered in judging. Each houseplant must be identified by listing the names on the entry tag or on a card attached to the container. Houseplants should be grown in the display container for a minimum of six weeks. Plants grown as houseplants must be used. NebGuide G2205 "Guide to Growing Houseplants"

(http://extensionpublications.unl.edu/assets/html/g2205/build/g2205.htm) and NebGuide G837 "Guide to Selecting Houseplants" (http://extensionpublications.unl.edu/assets/html/g837/build/g837.htm) includes a listing of common houseplants. Containers of annual flowers or annual plants (*i.e.* petunias, geraniums, impatiens) will be disqualified and will not be judged. Entries in Classes 60-66 must have been designed and planted by the 4-H member. Container grown houseplants must have received a purple ribbon at the county fair to be exhibited at the State Fair. Container grown houseplants shall be in pots no greater than 12" in diameter (inside opening measurement). Dish gardens, fairy or miniature gardens, desert gardens and terrariums may be up to 12" in diameter (inside opening measurement). Any container grown plant in Classes 60-66 that is greater than 12" in diameter will be dropped one ribbon placing. Classes 60-65 exhibitors must have and provide a saucer to catch drainage water. The 4-H members name, age, full address, county, and years in the project(s) must be on the bottom or back of the container and saucer. SF107.

- G-770-060 **Flowering potted houseplant(s)** that are blooming for exhibition. Container may have one or more houseplants in container. Label name of each plant. Non-blooming plants will be disqualified.
- G-770-061 Foliage potted houseplant one variety of tropical or cacti or succulent plant.

G-770-062 Hanging basket of flowering and/or foliage houseplants. Container may have one or more houseplants in container. Label name for each plant.

- G-770-063 Dish garden an open/shallow container featuring a variety of houseplants excluding cacti and succulents.
- G-770-064 **Fairy or Miniature Garden** A miniature "scene" contained in an open container and featuring miniature or small, slow growing houseplants. The garden needs to have an imaginative theme and miniature accessories, i.e. bench, fence made from tiny twigs, small shell for a bath tub, etc.
- G-770-065 **Desert garden** an open/shallow container featuring cacti and/or succulents grown as houseplants.
- G-770-066 **Terrarium** a transparent container, partially or completely enclosed; sealed or unsealed.
- *G-770-067 **Outdoor hanging basket** of flowering and/or foliage outdoor plants.
- *G-770068 **Outdoor potted plant(s)-** A potted container of flowering and/or foliage outdoor plants.

Division 773 - Vegetables, Herbs, Fruits & Educational Exhibits

Exhibitors are limited to 6 exhibits in horticulture classes 201-252.

Youth must be enrolled in the Everyone A Gardener, Gardening Unit 1-Unit 4, and/or Special Garden Project.

The cultivar or variety name must be included on all entry cards. Failure to identify the cultivar or variety will drop the entry one ribbon placing. Proper identification is the responsibility of the exhibitor, not the Extension staff or office personnel. Exhibits entered under an incorrect class number or containing an incorrect number of vegetables will be dropped one ribbon placing. In classes 252, 255, 268, 269, 285 and 286 do not duplicate entries from any of the other classes or entry will be dropped one ribbon placing. For example: 4-H'ers with two cultivars or varieties of red tomatoes can only enter the red tomatoes class and cannot enter the other cultivar or variety in any other vegetable class. SF108. Follow the guidelines in "Selecting and Preparing Vegetables, Herbs and Fruits for Exhibit" 4-H 226 (revised June 2013) (Free Download-http://4h.unl.edu/web/4hcurriculum/PreparingVegetablesHerbsandFruit) when preparing entries for the fair. At State Fair, plates will be provided for the exhibitor.

- G-773-256 **4-H Cultivar Vegetable Collection**. Vegetables entered in the collection are 5 cultivars from a single exhibit; for example, 5 cultivars of all types of peppers or squash or onions or tomatoes, etc. Display in a box not more than 24" in any dimension. Boxes may not be returned from State Fair. Showmanship will be considered in judging; but plastic grass, cotton figurines, etc. should not be used in exhibit boxes. Each vegetable in the collection should be exhibited with the number specified for individual class (201-252).

Herbs

Herbs will be judged using the same general criteria used for vegetables. Those grown mainly for their seed, such as dill and caraway, should be exhibited on a plate. Those grown for their leaves such as basil, parsley, etc. should be exhibited in a glass container of water. Containers may not be returned from State Fair. Potted herb plants will be disqualified and will not be judged. SF108.

The 4-H member's name, age, full address, county, and years in the project(s) must be on the back of the poster. SF103.
- G-773-291 **Educational Vegetable or Herb Garden Poster** Prepare a poster 14" x 22" x 2" (3-dimensional if needed) either vertical or horizontal arrangement illustrating a skill or project the 4-H'er has done or learned about in a 4-H vegetable gardening project. One might show a special technique used or equipment incorporated in the garden (e.g., drip irrigation system, composting, or special techniques learned). Refer to 4-H horticulture project manuals, but use your own creativity. Entry card must be stapled to the upper right hand corner. The 4-H member's name, age, full address county, and years in the project(s) must be on the back of the poster. SF104.
- G-773-292 Vegetable and/or Herb Gardening History Interview Neatly handwritten or typed account of a gardening history interview of someone whose vegetable or herb garden has inspired you. Maximum of 4 pages of text and 2 pages of pictures (include 1 picture of the person you interviewed) of their garden if the individual is still gardening. Protect with a clear report cover. The 4-H member's name, age, full address, county, and years in the project(s) must be on the back of the report cover. SF105.
- G-773-293 Vegetable Seed Display Each display must include seeds representing the following families: Cucurbit, Brassica (cabbage), Solanaceous (nightshade), and Legume (pea) families, plus representatives from 5 other families. Group the seeds by family and type. Glue seeds or otherwise fasten clear containers of seeds to a board or poster mat board no larger than 22" x 24". Label each group and each individual vegetable type with the common and scientific names. Use only one variety or cultivar of each vegetable, except for beans where several examples of beans may be shown. Attach a card to the back of the display explaining why and how it is important to know which vegetables are related, and cite references on where the scientific name information was found. The 4-H member's name, age, full address, county, and years in the project(s) must be on the back of the display. Information on vegetable family members can be obtained from your extension office. SF101.

G-773-294 World of Vegetables Notebook - Choose a favorite foreign cuisine and learn what vegetables and/or herbs are common to it (e.g. Mexican, African, Chinese, Italian, etc.). Include a report telling about a minimum of 5 vegetables and/or herbs from each country chosen. Include the scientific and common names; pictures of the plants from your garden or seed catalogs; tell how they are grown; and how the foods are used. Also list a source for buying the seed or plants. Favorite recipes using some or all of the vegetables described may be included. Give proper credit by listing the source of pictures and information used. Protect in a clear report cover or 3-ring notebook. The 4-H member's name, age, full address, county, and years in the project(s) must be on the back of the report cover or notebook. SF102.

Division 775 - Special Garden Project

Youth must be enrolled in the current year's Special Garden Project to exhibit. Fresh cut flowers or harvested vegetables should be entered in the appropriate class listed above.

G-775-001 **Special Garden Project** - Educational exhibit based on what was learned from the project. Present information on a poster 14"x22" either vertical or horizontal arrangement or in a clear plastic report cover. The 4-H member's name, age, full address, and county must

be on the back of the poster or report cover. SF109

G-775-002 Special Garden Project Fresh Cut Flowers or Harvested Vegetable – The current years' Special Garden Project fresh cut flowers or harvested vegetables should be entered in this class. Refer to classes 001-045 for quantity to exhibit -special garden project vegetable.

DEPARTMENT G - ANIMALS

NATIONAL CODE OF SHOW RING ETHICS - IAFE (International Association of Fairs and Expositions)

Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall at all times deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior all well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show. In addition to the "IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics," fairs and livestock shows may have rules and regulations which they impose on the local, county, state, provincial and national levels.

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more that avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada.

The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

- 1. All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.
- 2. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.
- 3. Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at fairs or livestock shows.
- 4. Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of volatile drug residues. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in an event which culminates with the animal entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state and provincial statues, regulations and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with the federal, state, provincial statues, regulations and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event. If the laboratory report of the analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood, or other substance tested by the laboratory to which it is sent is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise. At any time after an animal arrives on the fair or livestock show premises, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian.
- 5. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, conformation, or appearance, except external applications of substances hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of animal, is prohibited.
- 6. The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.
- 7. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.

- 8. No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.
- 9. The application of the code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by any owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge or the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.
- 10. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to have disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show for violation of this Code of Show Ring Ethics and any other rules of competition of the fair or livestock show without recourse against the fair or livestock show. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent that any proceedings or disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show may be published with the name or the violator or violators in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, including Fairs and Expositions and any special notices to members.
- 11. The act of entering of an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statues, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.

LIVESTOCK RULES

Quality Assurance Training–All 4-H/FFA exhibitors in beef, cattle, goats, sheep, swine, rabbits, and poultry must have completed an approved food animal quality assurance training program. Exhibitors must have received Quality Assurance Certification through a UN-L Extension-based program prior to the fair. Program attendance is required. Completion of training will be certified by the county extension staff.

DRESS CODE:

Exhibitors showing beef, dairy, dogs, cats, pets, goats, sheep, swine, poultry, and rabbits are required to wear the official 4-H (club t-shirts are acceptable) or FFA t-shirt, long, dark blue jeans, and hard-soled shoes. **Canvas shoes will constitute disqualification in the show ring.** If there is no official 4-H t-shirt, exhibitors are required to wear a white shirt (or blouse) with the official 4-H chevron attached. NO hats, caps or other types of headgear are to be worn in the show ring.

STATEMENT FOR GROOMING:

Grooming, clipping, or blocking of animals shall be done by the exhibitor or their family (including brothers, sisters, or parents). Butler County exhibitors may help each other. **Professional groomers are** <u>NOT</u> **allowed**.

We will follow the State Fair Blow and Go rules:

GROOMING OF LIVESTOCK: Preparation and grooming of an animal should be the primary responsibility of the Butler County Fair exhibitor; however, assistance may be provided by immediate family members.

- 1. Animals will be shown free of any adhesive, glue, paint, or powder products.
- Any compounds that have adhesive qualities that when applied cannot be combed or brushed through or alter the color of the animal are forbidden. These products include but are not limited to commonly used adhesives and colorants such as Prime Time, EZ Comb, Tail Adhesive, Ultra White Touch-Up, Black Touch-Up, Black Finisher and black show foam.
- 3. Alcohol, water, oil, foam or any water- or alcohol-based products with no adhesive or glue qualities or artificial colorings are permitted. These products include conditioners and commonly used sprays such as Kleen Sheen, Revive, Final Bloom and white show foam. Paint will be allowed on the hooves and dewclaws only.

NO Butt Fans or Portable Generators will be allowed in or around 4-H livestock buildings. Any of these items may be removed at the discretion of the superintendents or fair personnel.

NOTICE TO LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS

The following dates are given as deadlines for identifying animals to be shown at the Butler County Fair and State Fair. FFA exhibitors must also abide by these deadlines in order to show at the Butler County Fair. All information on the identification papers must be complete and turned in to the Extension Office. Late animal I.D.s at county level will be accepted. **However, entries will be lowered one complete ribbon color placing and will not be eligible for final championship drives.** Failure to meet these deadlines will forfeit any and all chances of exhibiting at shows outside of Butler County. Any transfer of ownership or new purchase of animals needs to be recorded on the appropriate ID forms and filed with the County Extension Office prior to these dates. Any transactions after these dates will be considered a late ID and will be subject to that penalty. Animals can only be identified in one county.

MARKET BEEF - Must be <u>ear tagged</u> and identified prior to April 15. Animals must also be DNA tested if 4-H'er wishes to exhibit at State Fair by the identification deadline.

BREEDING BEEF - Must be identified by <u>ear tattoo</u> prior to June 15. If offspring will be shown as a feeder calf, the cow/calf pair must be enrolled by June 15. Registration papers are required in the registered breeding heifer divisions.

FEEDER CALF - Must be identified with an official 4-H ear tag by June 15. Each member may exhibit two feeder calves. Feeder calf released after show. All calves must be born between January 1 and June 1 of the current year.

BUCKET CALF - Must be identified with a 4-H ear tag and identified by June 15.

FIRST YEAR: Bucket Calves are to be born between January 1 and June 1 of the current year.

RETURNING MARKET BUCKET CALVES: Bucket Calves are calves that were exhibited at the Butler County Fair during the previous year by the same exhibitor and qualify by virtue of the First Year Bucket Calf guidelines.

ENTRY LIMIT: An exhibitor is limited to exhibiting ONE FIRST YEAR and ONE RETURNING bucket calf per year.

NOTE: Final decision as to combining the classes will rest with the superintendent.

You may win Champion Bucket Calf in each division only once. You can compete in the bucket calf division as long as you meet the age requirements.

- **GOATS** Market and Breeding Goats must be <u>ear tagged</u> and identified by June 15. Market only must be DNA tested if 4-H'er wishes to exhibit at State Fair by the identification deadline.
- SHEEP Market and Breeding Sheep must be ear tagged and identified by June 15. Exhibitors in registered breeding classes must present proof of registration to the superintendent at the time of entry. Market only must be DNA tested if 4-H'er wishes to exhibit them at State Fair by the identification deadline.

SWINE - Must be <u>ear-notched</u> by June 15. Must be DNA tested if 4-H'er wishes to exhibit at State Fair by the identification deadline.

POULTRY – Poultry DO NOT need to be identified prior to county fair. The BROILER Class (birds are obtained through the Butler County Extension Office and exhibited as a pen of three (3) market broilers, shown at the Butler County Fair. Birds will be between 6-9 weeks old at the time of the fair. Please see the Poultry section for more information.

HORSE – Must be identified by June 1 on the proper ID sheet provided by the Extension Office for Butler County Fair.

Only 4-H or FFA members may show livestock. A member with more than one entry in a class must get some other exhibitor to show the other animal. Substitute showmen must be members of 4-H or an FFA chapter in Butler County. No parent is to be in the ring with their child unless called for by the superintendent in charge. *Diseased animals will not be accepted*.

CLOVER KID LIVESTOCK (4-H Policy Handbook)

Animals and animal subject matter can contribute to Clover Kids objectives. However, for safety, liability, and competitive reasons often associated with livestock shows, some restrictions are necessary to maintain Clover Kids program objectives. The Clover Kids program will be developmentally appropriate and involve the following components:

Encourage involvement of parent or significant adult.

- Focus on self-esteem and provide positive feedback.
- Foster the development of life skills that are essential for the cognitive, social, emotional and physical maturation of youth by providing a unique educational opportunity.
- Share through cooperative learning.
- Noncompetitive emphasizing fun and success of every child.
- Programs are activity-focused and not project focused.
- Recognize individuals for participation.
- Present recognition and incentives without rank or placing

Specific reasons for being cautious with direct large animal involvement are as follows:

Children eight and under often lack the mental and physical skills for controlling and understanding the strength of large animals (Livestock Conservation Institute, 1994).

Young children may lack the strength, balance, and attention span to adequately manage large animals (American Medical Equestrian Association, 1993).

Because of these reasons, Clover Kids programs involving live animals must adhere to the following:

- Exhibition includes discussions with youth based on their knowledge of the care and raising of the animal.
- Exhibitors show in a non-competitive setting for participation only.
- Age, size, and temperament of animal projects must be appropriate for the exhibitor's age and size.
- Horse projects are not allowed or appropriate. Beef animals weighing more than 350 pounds at time of show are not allowed or appropriate for this age group either.
- Animals that are appropriate for this age group include bucket calf, sheep, swine, goat, dog, poultry, rabbit, cat, and companion animals.
- There will be one adult/teen volunteer present for every Clover Kid member that is handling or exhibiting animals. This applies to all animal projects.
- Allowable animals should be no more than six months of age and no more than 350 pounds at time of show. Exhibitors in this age group are not allowed to sell their animal through a livestock sale or premium auction.

HERDSMANSHIP **Butler County Fair**

Livestock exhibitors at the Butler County Fair are expected to keep their guarters orderly, neat, and as attractive as possible. The total area will be inspected two or three times each day. Each club will be rated on its herdsmanship. Final herdsmanship placings for each club will be based on herdsmanship rating of all beef, sheep, swine, and horses exhibited at the Butler County Fair. Remember that parents should assist in herdsmanship only when absolutely necessary. Herdsmanship will be judged on Thursday, Friday, Saturday, and Sunday (morning only). The Herdsmanship Award will be presented on Sunday during the subsidy auction.

ROUND ROBIN SHOWMANSHIP

The grand champion senior showmen in Beef, Swine, Horse, Sheep, Goats, Rabbits and Poultry are eligible to compete for the round robin showmanship championship. An individual is eligible to show in only one species. If qualified in more than one, he/she must choose which one species to show. The reserve champion showman, if also a purple winner, is the only alternate. Winner will be eligible for future species showmanship contests, but not the round robin.

Exhibitors will bring their own animal to the contest; their entry signifies permission for the other champions to show that animal in this contest. Exhibitors will be judged on their knowledge of each species shown and the specific showmanship skills required as well as their presentation of each species. They will be judged on the appearance or fitting of their own animal only.

There is no premium money for this contest. The grand and reserve champions will receive a special award.

BEEF CATTLE

MARKET STEERS AND HEIFERS may have the two center temporary incisor teeth replaced by permanent incisors. The remaining six temporary incisors must be in place and there may be no evidence of eruption of any permanent incisors other than the centers. State Fair age grouping will be used for breeding animals. Each beef animal may be shown in one class only.

BREEDING HEIFERS - Please note that our Registered Breeding Heifer Show is NOT a Purebred Breeding Show. Any animal that is registered by a particular breed association and identified on the ownership affidavit as such can show in that particular class. Registration papers will be required at check-in. If registration papers are not presented, that animal will be shown in the commercial breeding class. Any breeding heifer that is registered to a breed association other than the classes listed below will be shown in the Other Registered Breeding Heifer class. Animals in the Other Registered Breeding Classes will be shown together.

- **NECK CHAINS** Goats are to be shown with neck chains or smooth collars only.
- SHOW CLASS AND SEX Meat goats may be doe or wether kids. Short scrotum, cryptorchid and buck kids are NOT eligible. All market goats will be weighed and divided into classes based on total numbers and weight range. Market does and market wethers will show together. Breeding Goats will check in at designated time and be grouped to show based on total numbers and ages of entries.
- SHOWMANSHIP Exhibitors will not slap or brace the animal or lift the front legs off the ground while in the show ring.

SWINE

- Swine exhibited at the Butler County Fair shall originate directly from a herd not under quarantine for pseudorabies. Under no circumstances may swine under quarantine be exhibited. No swine showing signs of infectious, contagious, and/or communicable diseases will be allowed to show. All swine must enter the fairgrounds through the west gate. Enter up to four animals.
- MINIMUM WEIGHT 210 lbs. on all hogs.
- This is a terminal OPTIONAL show. Exhibitors will declare their plans for their hogs (selling or taking home) during fair weigh in or by 10 am on Thursday July 15th.
 - If you DO NOT tell us by 10 am on Thursday July 15th, your hog(s) will be sent to market.

Open classes for pre-4-H age will be run prior to the start of the 4-H Horse Show. These classes are listed in the Butler County Fair Open Class Fairbook. Show will begin promptly at 8:00 a.m.

In case of inclement weather, the horse show will be DELAYED or RESCHEDULED. The show will not be moved to a different location.

Exhibitors showing poultry are required to wear the official 4-H T-shirt or blouse with a 4-H chevron with blue jeans. NO HEADGEAR. Entries limited to 8 per exhibitor.

Quality Assurance Training - All 4-H poultry exhibitors are required to receive Quality Assurance training or testing prior to the fair.

PEN of BROILERS-pen of three (3) market broilers with a combined weight of 12-21 lbs. Birds will be between 6-9 weeks old at the time of the fair.

Please Notice - Exhibitors showing small animals or pets are required to wear the official 4-H t-shirt or blouse with a 4-H chevron, and long blue jeans. No flip flops or sandals are allowed. All small animals/pets need to have appropriate health papers showing current vaccinations and health status. Animals without these papers cannot be shown. Any animal showing signs of sickness, disease, or parasite infestation will be eliminated from the show and must be removed from the fairgrounds.

All animals must be weaned prior to show. Minimum age of animals to be shown:

Ferrets: 12 weeks	Guinea pigs: 4 weeks	Hedge hogs: 5 weeks
Chinchillas: 7 weeks	Gerbils, hamsters, mice, rats: 4 weeks	Rabbit: 9 week

Cats: Cats should be free of fleas, ticks, ear mites, ring-worm, any internal and external parasite and infectious disease. If any signs of these external parasites are presented, exhibitors will be asked to leave without being allowed in the show area. It is highly recommended that a veterinary check is performed or preventative measures are taken prior to the show to ensure the animal is free of external parasites. ALL DECISIONS OF SHOW OFFICIALS ARE FINAL. If a cat shows the possibility of being contagious, it will be considered a danger to the other cats in the show and will not be allowed to show. Cats that pose a danger to others will not be allowed to enter.

Cats are required to be current on their vaccinations of Rabies, distemper, panleucopenia, rhino tracheitis, calici virus. Cats must either have a current feline leukemia vaccination or proof of a negative test within 180 days of the show. Proof of vaccinations must be available at entry time. Participants should have their veterinarian fill out and sign the "Nebraska State Fair Cat Vaccination Record Form." Exhibitors will not be allowed to show without a signed Vaccination record form.

4-H'ers vaccinating their own cats must provide proof by including a statement from their vet on the Vaccination Record Form or by including the vaccination labels on the form and having it signed by a parent. A rabies vaccination is federally mandated to be given by a Certified Veterinarian ONLY. This vaccination must be current and include a veterinarian signature on the Vaccination Record Form.

Ferrets: Ferrets must be vaccinated for rabies and have a completed health form signed by a veterinarian submitted at show time.

Dogs: - All dogs must be immunized for distemper, hepatitis, parvo and rabies. The Nebraska State Fair Dog Vaccination Record Form must be filled out and signed by a veterinarian and brought to the fair on day of show.

4-H'ers are invited to create a poster highlighting an educational aspect of their animal project. The poster could focus on a current livestock issue, animal industry career, animal care or health, economic impacts of the livestock industry, within the species of dairy, beef, sheep, swine, goat, poultry, and rabbit. Posters will be displayed in the entrance of the livestock buildings as a way to increase the educational experiences of both the 4-H member and the general public increasing agricultural literacy and promoting good will at the Nebraska State Fair. During the time when the corresponding animal is not stalled on the fairgrounds, the poster will be displayed in the 4-H Exhibit Building. In order to be eligible for the State Fair, posters must have been exhibited at the county fair and received a purple ribbon. Because posters may have been exhibited at the county fair in outside conditions, it is understood that they may be re-done prior to Nebraska State Fair but the content and design should be similar

A. State Fair Eligible Entries are limited to those that reference species that stall on the fairgrounds during the Nebraska State Fair. Species include dairy, beef, sheep, swine, goat, poultry and rabbit. (Horse, small animal and dog posters are judged for County display only..

B .State Fair selected entries will be registered by county office staff and entered during the static entry day at the Nebraska State Fair. C. Posters will be judged on static entry day of the State Fair when other static exhibits are judged.

D .Posters will be displayed in the respective barns based on the focus of the exhibit. Educational display superintendents will display posters and they will be in place throughout the weekend of their respective exhibition at the Nebraska State Fair.

E .Poster display should be sturdy enough to last through the fair and no larger than 22 x 28 inches. Only standard poster board will be accepted. Foam Board or cardboard posters are discouraged. NOTE: Please take into consideration that these exhibits will be displayed inside the barns and may not be returned to the exhibitor in the original condition at the time of entry.

G. All entries must match the specie of livestock they have entered at EITHER the county fair OR in the Nebraska State Fair. For example, if a 4-H'er is exhibiting beef, their entry must be about beef and not another species. Also a 4-H'er is NOT required to exhibit their livestock/animal entry at the State Fair. The entry just needs to match the species that was exhibited at the county level.
H. Posters will be judged. Refer to scoresheet for this exhibit.

G-090-100 Educational Display: Includes beef, sheep, swine, goat, poultry and rabbit. Poster will be on display at the Butler County Event Center, during Butler County Fair. State Fair Eligible.

G-090-101 **Educational Display County Only:** Includes horse, small animal and dog posters. Poster will be on display at the Butler County Event Center, during Butler County Fair.

DEPARTMENT H - SCIENCE ENGINEERING, TECHNOLOGY, ENTOMOLOGY

General Information for All Exhibits in Department H (unless otherwise stated)

1. The name and county of each exhibitor should appear separately on the back of each board, poster or articles, and on the front cover of the notebooks so owner of exhibit may be identified if the entry tag is separated from the exhibit.

2. Rockets must be supported substantially to protect the rocket from breakage. Rockets are to be mounted on a base that has dimensions equal or less than 12" x 12" and the base should be 3/4" thick. No metal bases. If the rocket fins extend beyond the edges of the required base (12" x 12"), then construct a base that is large enough to protect the fins. The base size is dictated by the size of the rocket fins.

3 The rockets must be mounted vertically. Please do not attach sideboards or backdrops to the displays. In addition, a used engine or length of dowel pin is to be glued and/or screwed into the board and extended up into the rockets engine mount to give added stability.

4. Rockets must be equipped as prepared for launching, with wadding and parachute or other recovery system. Rockets entered with live engines, wrong base size or sideboards will be disqualified.

5. A report, protected in a clear plastic cover, must include: 1) rocket specification (include original or photo of manufacture packaging stating rocket skill level), 2) a flight record for each launching (weather, distance, flight height), 3) number of launchings, 4) flight pictures 5) Safety (how did you choose your launch site? Document safe launch, preparations, and precautions) 6 objectives learned and 7) conclusions.

6. The flight record should describe engine used, what the rocket did in flight and recovery success. Points will not be deducted for launching, flight or recovery failures described. This includes any damage that may show on the rocket. Complete factory assembled rockets will not be accepted at the State Fair.

7. Judging is based upon display appearance, rocket appearance, workmanship, design or capabilities for flight, number of times launched and report. Three launches are required to earn the maximum launch points given on the score sheets. For scoring for the State Fair, only actual launches count, misfires will not count towards one of the required three launches.

- For self-designed rockets only, please include digital recorded copy of one flight. In the documentation please include a description of stability testing before the rocket was flown.
- Skill level of project is not determined by number of years in project. Skill level is determined by the level listed on the manufacturing packaging.
- 4-H Rocket project levels are not intended to correspond to National Association of Rocketry model rocket difficulty ratings or levels.

8. High power rockets (HPR) is similar to model rocketry with differences that include the propulsion power and weight increase of the model. They use motors in ranges over "G" power and/or weigh more than laws and regulations allow for unrestricted model rockets. These rockets are NOT appropriate for 4-H projects and will be disgualified.

9. Posters can be any size up to 28" by 22" when ready for display. Example: tri fold poster boards are not 28" by 22" when fully open for display.

Department H, Division 850 -SET Aerospace – Rockets & Drones

Youth enrolled in Aerospace 2, 3, or 4 may exhibit in any class in this division.

- H-850-001 Rocket: Any Skill Level Rocket with wooden fins painted by hand or air brush. SF92.
- H-850-002 Aerospace Display: Poser or display board that displays or exemplifies one of the principles learned in the Lift Off project. Examples include: display of rocket parts and purpose, explains the parts of a NASA rockets or shuttle, interview of someone in the aerospace field, or kite terminology. Include notebook containing terminology (definition), and what was learned. Display can be any size up to 28" by 22".SF93.
- H-850-003 Rocket: Any Skill Level Rocket with wooden fins and cardboard body tubes painted using commercial application example commercial spray paint.SF92.
- H-850-004 Self-Designed Rocket: Self-designed rocket with wooden fins and wooden fins and cardboard body tubes.SF92
- H-850-005 Drone Poster: Exhibit must be designed to educate yourself and others on one or more of the following topics: drone technologies, uses of drones, the different types of drones, types of training needed to operate drones, and the laws and regulations users must follow. Posters can be any size up to 28" by 22".
- H-850-006 Drone Video: Exhibit must demonstrate how the drone interacts with the outside world. Examples include field scouting, surveying damage from natural disasters, drones used in commercial applications and settings, drones used for structural engineering. Video should not exceed 5 minutes. Videos should be submitted on a flashdrive for judging.
- *H-850-900 Diamond Kite include a picture of the kite in flight, and a description of the flight.
- *H-850-901 Educational Display exhibit could be a poster, scrapbook, notebook or three-dimensional display on a topic related to aerospace such as: four forces of flight, types of aircraft, weather and flight, parts of a hot air balloon, or parts of an airplane.

Videos should be designed for web viewing. Any of the following formats will be accepted: .mpeg, .rm, .wmv, .mp4, .ov, .ppt, or .avi. SF276.
- H-860-005 **Create a Web Site/Blog or App** Design a simple Web site for providing information about a topic related to youth using either software programs such as an HTML editor like Microsoft's FrontPage or Macromedia's Dreamweaver, and image editor like IrfanView or GIMP or online using a WIKI such as Google Sites. If the Web site isn't live include all files comprising the Web site on a CD-ROM in a plastic case along with the explanation of why the site was created. If developed using a WIKI or other online tool include a link to the website in the explanation of why the site was created. SF275.
- H-860-006 **3D Printing:** 3D printing uses plastic or other materials to build a three-dimensional (3D) object from a digital design (including 3D Pen Creation). Youth may use original designs or someone else's they have redesigned in a unique way. Exhibits will be judged based on the motivation and/or problem identified. For example, 3D objects printed as part of the design process for robot or other engineering project. Must include design notebook that addresses the following questions:
 - 1. What was the motivation for your design or the problem you were solving with your design? ie. is your item a functional or decorative piece?
 - 2. Please include a picture of original design, citation of designer/website OR if design is completely original (you created it using CAD software), then state that it's original. If item was not completely original, indicate what you did to the original design to modify it to better meet the design problem stated in #1 above. Its design was modified multiple times, please indicate what change was made with each modification, and what prompted the need for the change. I.e. I printed it and the design was too fragile, so I resliced the print to make thicker external walls, or to have a denser infill.
 - 3. Define your process for designing/printing. What software and/or hardware was used (indicate type of 3D printer or if item was created with 3D pen)?
 - 4. What materials were selected for your project?
 - 5. If your final design has any moving parts, define how you determined appropriate allowance in your design.
 - 6. Identify any changes that you would make to improve your design.
- H-860-008 **Digital Fabrication** This project is a computer generated projected created using a laser cutter, vinyl cutter, heat press or CNC router. Vector or 3D based software such as coral draw or Fusion 360 would be an example of an appropriate software used to create your finished project. Project should include a notebook with the following: 1) What motivated you to create this project; 2) Software and equipment used; 3) Directions and how to create the project; 4) Prototype of plans; 5) Cost of creating the project; 6) Iterations or modifications made to original plans; 7) Changes you would make if you remade the project. SF1051

Department H, Division 861 - SET Robotics

Youth enrolled in Robotics Explorer, Robotics Probe or GEAR TECH 21 may exhibit in any class within this division.

- H-861-001 **Robotics Poster**-Create a poster (28" X 22") communicating a robotics theme such as "Robot or Not", "Pseudocode", "Real World Robots", "Careers in Robots" or "Autonomous Robotics", "Precision Agriculture" or a robotic topic of interest to the 4-H'er. (SF236)

The ability to build objects as designed by another person is an important life skill. Professional woodworkers often are hired to build objects to exacting specifications as laid out in a written plan.

1. The name and county of each exhibitor should appear separately on the back of each board, poster or article and on the front cover of the notebooks so owner of the exhibit may be identified if the entry tag is separated from the exhibit.

2. Requirements: All articles exhibited must include a plan (with drawings or sketch or blueprints) stating dimensions and other critical instructions a builder would need to know how to build the project. Plans may include narrative instructions in addition to the dimension drawings and include any alternations to the original plan. Part of the score depends on how well the project matches the plans. If the plans are modified, the changes from the original need to be noted on the plans. All plans used for making the article must be securely attached and protected by a clear plastic cover.

3. 4-H'ers must be in Unit 3 or Unit 4 for the exhibit to be considered for State Fair. All projects must have appropriate finish.
 4. If the project (i.e. picnic tables, wishing wells, swings, chairs, bridges, doghouses, etc.) is designed to be used outside, it will be displayed outside.

5. All outside projects MUST have entry tag and supporting information placed in a protective bag to prevent damage from weather events such as rain and be ATTACHED to projects with string, zip ties, etc. (State Fair)

- H-911-004 **Composite Wood Project**: 60% of the project must be wood and 40% made from other materials such as metal, rubber, resin, etc. All plans and plan alternations must be attached to the article. Protect plans with a cover. If project is designed to be outside it is required to have appropriate outdoor finish because project may be displayed outside. SF96
- H-911-005 **Outdoor Wood Project made with Treated Wood**: Treated wood projects DO NOT have to have a finished coating. All plans and plan alternations must be attached to the article. Protect plans with a cover. If project is designed to be outside. Examples include: picnic tables, planters, outdoor furniture, etc. SF97

- H-911-006 Woodworking Article (SF91) Item made using skills learned in the Finishing It Up Project. Examples include: dovetailing, making a pen using lathe, overlays, using a router, etc. Item is required to be appropriately finished.

Article must be appropriately finished and/or sealed and utilize one or more woodworking techniques from page 2 of the Unit 4 manual. Exhibit must include the woodworking plan and a minimum one-page report of how the design and engineering process was used to develop the woodworking plan. 1. State the problem (Why did you need this item?) 2. Generate possible solutions (How have others solved the problem? What other alternatives or designs were considered?) 3. Select a solution (How does your solution compare on the basis of cost, availability, and functionality?) 4. Reason for article finish (What type of finish, how did you finish or why you choose this finish?) 5. Build the item (What was your woodworking plan, and what processes did you use to build your item?) 6. Evaluate (How does your item solve the original need?) 7. Present results (How would you do this better next time?)

Department H, Division 920 – SET Welding

Pay Category #3

(All metal welding processes accepted) SF281 for all classes

All welds exhibited in class 1 or 2 must be mounted on a 12" high x 15" long display board of thickness not to exceed 3/8". Attach each weld on a wire loop hinge or equivalent, so the judge can look at the bottom side of the weld when necessary. Each weld should be labeled with information stated 1) type of welding process (stick, MIG, TIG, Oxy-Acetylene, etc.) 2) kind of weld, 3) welder setting, 4) electrode/wire/rod size, and 5) electrode/wire/rod ID numbers. Attach a wire to display board so it can be hung like a picture frame. If no plans are included with welding item, it will be disqualified. If project is designed to be outside it is required to have appropriate outdoor finish because project may be displayed outside.

- H-920-001 Welding Joints a display of one butt, one lap and one fillet weld. SF281
- H-920-002 Position Welds a display showing three beads welded in the vertical down, horizontal and overhead positions. SF281
- H-920-003 Welding Article any art created using tack welds to hold the metal pieces together (examples include horseshoe projects). Type of welder, welder settings, all plans, plan alternations, and a bill for material must be attached to the article. Protect plans with a cover. If project is designed to be outside, it is required to have appropriate outdoor finish. SF283
- H920004 Welding Article (SF281) any shop article where welding is used in the construction. 60% of item must be completed by 4-Her and notes regarding laser welding or machine welding must be included. Type of welder, welder settings, all plans, plan alternations, and a bill for material must be attached to the article.
- H-920-005 Welding Furniture any furniture with 75% welding is used in the construction. 60% of item must be completed by 4-Her and notes regarding laser welding or machine welding must be include. Type of welder, welder settings, all plans, plan alternations, and a bill for material must be attached to the article. Protect plans with a cover. SF282
- H-920-006 **Plasma Cutter/Welder Design** Plasma cutters/welders allowed for detailed design(s) t butt cut into metal. 4-H'ers will create a notebook describing the process to crate the "artwork" to butt cut into the metal. Notebook includes: A photo (front and back) of the finished project. Also include detailed photographs of the project to allow judges to determine the cuts. Instructions on how the design was created, allows for replication of the project, lessons learned or improvements to the project.
- H-920-007 **Composite Weld Project** 60% of the project must be welded and 40% made from other materials such as wood, rubber, etc. All plans, plan alternations, and a bill for materials must be attached to the article. Protect plans with a cover. If project is designed to be outside it is required to have appropriate outdoor finish because project may be displayed outside. SF280

4-H Welding Project Tips and Suggestions

Class 1:

- 1. All welds should be made with the same electrode/wire/rod size and number.
- 2. Welds should be made only on one side of metal so penetration can be judged.
- 3. Welds should be cleaned with chipping hammer and wire brush. Apply a coat of light oil (penetrating oil) to the metal to prevent rusting. Wipe off excess oil.

4. It is suggested that all welds be on the same size and thickness of metal. These pieces, referred to as coupons, should be 1.5 to 2 inches wide and 3.5 to 4 inches long. A good way to get this size is to buy new cold rolled strap iron and cut to length. The extra width is needed to provide enough metal to absorb the heat from the welding process and prevent the coupons from becoming too hot before the bead is completed. Narrower coupons will become very hot, making an average welder setting too cold at the bead start, just about right in the middle, and too hot at the end. The correct way to weld narrow strips is to make short beads and allow time to cool, however this project requires a full length bead.

Stick welding - Suggested coupon thickness- ¼" if using 1/8" rod. Suggested rod-AC and DC straight or reverse polarity- first E-7014, second E-6013 MIG welding - Suggested coupon thickness--¼" if using .035 wire and 1/8" if using .023 wire. Oxy-Acetylene - Suggested coupon thickness-- 1/8". Suggested rod - 1/8" mild steel rod.

Class 2:

- It is suggested that all welds be on same size and thickness of metal. These pieces are referred to as coupons. The welds can be on one coupon that is about 4" x 4" or on individual coupons that are about 2" X 4" inch and ¼" thick. Suggested rods for this class of position welds for AC and DC straight or reverse polarity is, first E-6013, second E-7014 and E-6010 for DC reverse polarity only.
- 2. Welds should be cleaned with a chipping hammer and wire brush. Apply a coat of light oil (penetrating oil) to the metal to prevent rusting. Wipe off excess oil.

Class 3 & 4:

 All welds should be cleaned and protected from rust with paint or light oil. Plans are to be complete enough that if they were given to a welding shop, the item could be made without further instructions. Bill of materials should include a cost for all items used including steel, electrodes, paint, wheels, etc.

Department H, Division 800 - Entomology

Pay Category #3

General Information

Specimens be mounted properly and labeled with location and date of collection, name of collector, and order name. Follow mounting and labeling instructions in the old edition of the Nebraska 4-H Entomology Manual online as a PDF file (<u>http://4h.unl.edu/web/4hcurriculum/4h26</u>). Purchased insects and other insects not collected by the participant can be included, but must have accurate labels and will not be counted in meeting minimum requirements for the exhibit. Boxes are preferred to be not more than 12" high x 18" wide, landscape orientation, so they fit in display racks. Purchase of commercially-made boxes is allowed. All specimens must be from the collector.

- H-800-001 Entomology Display, First-Year Project (Class I). Collection to consist of 25 or more different kinds (species) of insects representing at least 6 orders. Limit of one box.
- H-800-002 **Entomology Display, Second-Year Project (Class II)**. Collection to consist of a minimum of 50 kinds (species) of insects representing at least 8 orders. Replace damaged or poorly mounted specimens. At least 25 species must be present from after July 1 of the previous year. Limit 2 boxes.
- H-800-003 Entomology Display, Third-Year or More Project (Class III). Collection to consist of a minimum of 75 kinds (species) of insects representing at least 10 orders. Replace damaged or poorly mounted specimens. At least 25 species must be present from after July 1 of the previous year. Limit of 3 boxes.
- H-800-004 **Special Interest Display or Advanced Insect Display**. Educational display developed according to individual interests and/or advanced identification capability. This also is an opportunity to highlight favorite insects in a creative arrangement. Insects should conform to pinning and mounting standards as in Classes 1-4 and be protected in an insect box. Each specialty display should include names of the insects, interesting information about them, and why the display was made. Advanced identification collections should have insects grouped with labels that correspond with the identification level (e.g. family, genus, species). A specialty collection ma consist of insects by taxonomic group (e.g. butterflies, grasshoppers, dragonflies, scarab beetles) or by host, subject or habitat (e.g.. insect pests of corn, aquatic insects, insect mimicry, insect galls, insects from goldenrod, insect pollinators, etc.).
- H-800-005 Insect Habitats. A one-page report must accompany the exhibit. (SF188)
- H-800-006 **Macrophotography**. Subjects should be insects, spiders or other arthropods, or any nests, webs or constructions they make. All exhibit prints should be either 8" x 10" or 8 ½" x 11" and mounted on rigid, black 11" x14" poster or black matt board. Either orientation is acceptable. No frames or mat board framing is allowed. A short caption explaining the subject, printed on white paper and glued below the print on the poster or matt board. (SF 189)
- H-800-007 **Insect Poster/Display.** Exhibits can be posters or three-dimensional displays, and artistic creativity is encouraged. Posters should be no larger than 22" x 28". They should be instructional and can be attractive and have pictures, drawings, charts, or graphs. Posters and displays may show any aspect of insect life, habitat, or related conservation or management. Examples include life history and other facts about an insect; insect anatomy; how to manage insects in a farm, home, lawn, or garden setting; experiences rearing one kind of insect; survey of an important insect; insect behavior (ex. Nesting, finding food, mobility, defenses, etc.). habitats (e.g. forests, grasslands, wetlands, rivers, or lakes) and what insects are found there, etc. Three-dimensional displays, such as dioramas, sculptures, models or decorative boxes should have a page of explanatory information accompanying them and fit within a 22" x 28" area.
- H-800-008 **Reports or Journals.** Reports and journals should be in a 3-ring binder. A report may be informational, that is, an original article about a favorite insect, a history of insect outbreaks, diseases caused by insects, insects as food, etc. Or, it may be a research report about an investigation or experiment done in a scientific manner. It then should have a basic introduction of the insect studied, methods used, observations, and results of the project. Tables, graphs and images are helpful to include. A journal is an observational study over a period of time with personal impressions. It may cover watching changes of kinds of butterflies over the summer, rearing a specific insect from egg to adult, managing a beehive, observations of insects in a specific habitat, accounts of insect behavior in a forest or flower garden, etc.
- H-810-001 **Special Entomology Project**. Educational exhibit based on what was learned from the project. Present information on a poster no larger than 22" x 28" either vertical or horizontal arrangement or in a clear plastic report cover. The 4-H member's name, age, full

address, and county must be on the back of the poster or report cover. Reports may include life cycle, distribution of the insect, insect behavior (ex. nesting, finding food, mobility, defenses, etc.); habitats (e.g. forests, grasslands, wetlands, rivers, or lakes). May include a certain species or broad overview of the family or group of insects.

H810002 **Special Entomology Project Display.** The current years' Special Entomology Project pinned species along with a one to two report of what was learned from researching the insect type. Reports may include life cycle, distribution of the insect, insect behavior (ex. nesting, finding food, mobility, defenses, etc.); habitats (e.g. forests, grasslands, wetlands, rivers, or lakes). May include a certain species or broad overview of the family or group of insects.

Rules: The insect of the year for 2022 is the tiger beetle

Department H – Veterinary Science

Pay Category #4

Pay Category #4

The purpose of a Veterinary Science exhibit is to inform the public about a common health problem of animals or a veterinary science principle. Do not confuse veterinary science exhibit topics with animal husbandry or production topics.

A Veterinary Science exhibit may consist of a poster, notebook or a display. The exhibit may represent material from any of the Veterinary Science exhibitors enrolled in Animal Disease or Animal Health.

If photographs are to be part of the exhibit, remember that they will be viewed by the public. Make sure that the photographs are in good taste and will not be offensive to anyone. Graphic photographs of excessive bleeding, trauma or painful procedures are not appropriate. For exhibits related to veterinary surgical procedures, aseptic techniques need to be shown, for example, use of drapes, use of sterile procedures, wearing of gloves, and other appropriate veterinary medical practices.

First-Aid Kits: Because of public safety concerns and risk of theft of first-aid kit contents (veterinary drugs/equipment) with perceived potential for drug abuse, animal first aid kits containing any drugs or mediations will be immediately disqualified and not displayed. First Aid kits wishing to include medication information should instead utilize written descriptions, photographs, drawings, computer generated print-outs, or empty packaging of pharmaceuticals.

Veterinary Science Posters

This exhibit presents the viewer with a design that is simple and direct, unlike a display that usually presents more information. A poster should not exceed 22" x 28" and may be either vertical or horizontal.

Veterinary Science Displays

A display may include but is not limited to: a 3-dimensional exhibit, a scale model, the actual product (for example: skeleton; teeth; samples of leather, fur, or dried skin damaged by disease or parasites) or a notebook.

A display is not a poster.

A display may be mounted on poster board not to exceed 22" x 28" or on 1/4" plywood or equivalent that does not exceed 24" high or 32" wide or in a three-ring binder or another bound notebook format.

Appropriate Veterinary Science Topics:

- Maintaining health
- Specific disease information
- Photographic display of normal and abnormal characteristics of animals
- Animal health or safety
- Public health or safety
- Proper animal management to ensure food safety & quality
- Efficient and safe livestock working facilities
- Or a topic of the exhibitor's choosing related to veterinary medicine or veterinary science

**REMEMBER: Since these are science displays, all references and information needs to be properly cited.

Proper sources include but are not limited to: Professional journals and publication, professional journals and publications, professional AVMA accredited websites, interviews with Veterinarians and excerpts from Veterinary Educational Literature.
