Youth Changing the World Through 4-H Community Service

In 2017, Cass County 4-H member Mary DeGraff, 18, received the Diamond Clover Program's "Diamond Award," the highest honor in Nebraska 4-H. This award requires a major service-learning project that benefits the community. DeGraff's project involved raising \$24,000 to purchase a fully functional pet disaster relief trailer for the American Kennel Club (AKC) and Cass County Emergency Management Agency.

- DeGraff raised over \$12,000 from numerous fundraisers and donations. AKC provided a \$12,000 match.
- The trailer will shelter animals during disasters such as tornadoes, fires or floods.
- It is available to emergency management agencies throughout Nebraska.
