PROGRAM GUDIELINES:

HOW TO FNROLL IN 4-H

Membership into 4-H can be made anytime through the year. 4-H members are required to have projects enrolled by June 15 to be eligible to exhibit at the fair. To enroll in 4-H, members will use an online system to registration. Once completed they will be accepted as members. The site to enroll is **v2.4honline.com**

WHO IS ELIGIBLE TO ENTER?

Youth ages 8 years old and under 19 of age on January 1 that are enrolled as a 4-H member are eligible to enter exhibits. Exhibits must be the result of the 4-H club member's project since last County Fair. Records must be up to date and approved by the local leader before entry will be accepted. 4-H members are required to be enrolled in the project prior to June 15 of the current year to be eligible to exhibit at Clay County Fair. FFA members will follow the same regulations/deadlines as 4-H.

CLOVER KID 4H MEMBERS are 5, 6, 7 years old on January 1. They may enroll in 4-H and enter at the fair from a select list of projects. Ribbons will be awarded for exhibits. Clover Kids will show animals in a Showmanship class only. No premiums are paid to Clover Kids. *Check the section in this book that shows entries allowed for Clover Kids.*

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS FOR EXHIBITORS AT STATE FAIR

An exhibitor must be a 4-H member enrolled in the project they are exhibiting in the county which he/she represents. In classes where presence of the 4-H'er is required for judging purposes, such as animal exhibits, judging contests, presentations, music contest and fashion revue, a 4-H member must be 8 by January 1 or become 9 years of age during current year. The last year of eligibility is the calendar year the member becomes 19.

WHAT ENTRIES MAY BE MADE?

Only entries mentioned in the premium list will be given a place in the exhibit.

WORKSHOP ENTRIES

4-H members and non-4-H members that have participated in a County-wide or 4-H club sponsored workshop, will be allowed to exhibit in a "Workshop Class". These exhibits will not be eligible for State Fair and topics may change yearly. Workshop entries will be made in Department K - Division 900 Class 901. Each item made at a workshop may be entered.

FAIR THEME - can be used in any way fitting. All static exhibits that incorporate the theme will receive a recognition certificate. The theme for **2024 is:**

"Ridin',Ropin',Rockin',& Rollin' at the Clay County Fair"



HOW MANY ENTRIES ARE ALLOWED?

***4-H'ers <u>are</u> allowed to enter more than one entry per class number in static areas.

Animal areas are allowed to exhibit:

- -Beef: four breeding beef within the following combinations: two breeding heifers, two cow-calf pair, one cow (not same animal as shown in other class), two feeder calves, two market steers and two market heifers,
- -one first year Bucket Calf,
- -one second year Bucket Calf
- -two dairy goats per class,
- -two gilts and three individual market hogs,
- -two breeding sheep per class and four market or feeder lambs,
- -two breeding market goats per class and 4 markets,
- -two dogs,
- -ten poultry which could be 2 per class max
- -ten rabbits which could be 2 per class max
- -four small animals which could be 2 per class max

No individual animal may be shown in both breeding and market livestock classes.

Exhibitors are responsible for showing their own animal. If two animals are in the same class, another 4-H'er may help show. Swine exhibitors have the option to move one up a weight class and this must be determined at weigh-in.

OPEN CLASS: One registered **4-H** animal per species may be shown in Open Class. Obtain an Open Class Premium List for complete guidelines for livestock and static exhibits.

WHEN WILL EXHIBITS BE RELEASED? Release time for all livestock exhibits will be following the completion of the 4-H Livestock Auction.

Static Exhibits will be release from 7:00 – 9 p.m. from the Activities Building. The building will be open again Sunday from 9-11 a.m.

Policy set by the Clay County 4-H Council and Clay County Agricultural Society (Fairboard): All livestock stalls, tie-out areas, and pens (poultry, rabbits, sheep, swine, cattle, horses, or any other animal) must be cleaned prior to removal of animals from the fairgrounds. Premium money for all members in the club will be held until after pens and/or stalls are cleaned. Premium money will be withheld for any 4-H member that removes livestock or exhibits from display before the release time. (check horse rules for specifics on stalling horses)

Early animal release - Pre-approval for early livestock dismissal possibly could be granted at the discretion of the Livestock Superintendent and Extension Staff. Circumstances would need to be evaluated. Submission for pre-approval should be made by entry deadline of June 14.

OFFICIAL 4-H DRESS CODE

Participants in livestock, dairy, small animal, cat and dog shows, are required to wear a white shirt (or blouse) with the official 4-H chevron attached or a white

4-H T-shirt. As a second option, 4-H'ers may wear the official 4-H green shirt. Dark blue denim jeans are to be worn. 4-H'ers are allowed to wear the T-Shirt donated by Poet. Dairy exhibitors only may wear white pants.

Participants in contests such as music, presentation, shooting sports, judging, and all other contests are also asked to wear a chevron patch or prominent 4-H identification.

Participants in horse will wear a white, long sleeve preferred shirt with a 4-H arm band worn above the elbow on the left arm. 4-H members of FFA Chapters, may wear an official FFA T-shirt in place of the 4-H shirt. State Fair or Ak-Sar-Ben shirts will not be allowed for shows. Violators will not be allowed to show. Cell phones must be turned off when in the show ring.

PREMIUM AWARDS

The information printed in this fair book is intended to be correct, however any necessary corrections and updates to these policies and guidelines will appear in 4-H newsletters.

In 4-H, all exhibits will be divided into groups according to merit. Purple will denote Superior exhibits; blue will denote an Excellent exhibit, red will denote a Good exhibit; white a Fair exhibit. Equal prizes will be given the same color under the entry number.

PREMIUM PAYMENTS will be paid as listed, within budget limitations. Premiums will be paid one time on individual livestock. (Example: no additional premium for medal winners, pen of three, carcass, rate of gain, champion, reserve champion trophy winners).

Each entry number will show its own scale of awards. *All trophy and award winners must be purple exhibits.*

Grand Champions in Livestock or Static Contest areas will have the choice of receiving a Banner or sweatshirt. There will be a google doc form to complete and return to the office marking your choice. The chosen award will be ordered and available post fair. Reserve Champions will receive either medals or rosettes as indicated. Livestock Exhibitors will also have a choice of a gift card for livestock supplies.

HOW TO MAKE AN ENTRY: The fair book is divided into three main areas – Contests | Livestock | Static display exhibits.

The numbers listed with each entry option are detailed with a letter and series of numbers. These denote the:

DEPARTMENT/Curriculum area (alphabet letter)
DIVISION/Project or Activity (first three digits)
CLASS/ Entry age division or level (last three digits)
(An example would be E440 001. Curriculum area E- Healthy Lifestyles;
Project 440 –Citizen Safety – Class 001 - First Aid Kit).

*County only entries can be identified by the <u>class</u> numbers beginning with **900**. Example: E400 **901**) an * will also precede the department letter.

Recorded on the entry tag will be exhibitors name, club, **department**, **division**, **class number**. **ALL FAIR ENTRIES ARE TO BE PRE-ENTERED

and entry cards will be generated by the Extension Office. **Pre-enter all entries** - contests, animals and static exhibits by **June 14 of current year.**

Clover Kid exhibits will begin with a **CK** for the Department letter. There is a designated place in this book for those exhibit choices.

STATE FAIR CONTESTS offered are: Culinary Challenge Contest, Life Challenge, Clover Challenge, Grass, Weed, and Tree Identification, Horticulture Judging, Livestock Judging, Poultry Judging, Dog Skillathon, Meats Contest, and Tractor Operator Contest. Contact the Extension office for details or visit the State Fair website for complete details.

NOTE: *All static exhibits must have received a purple ribbon at the county fair to advance to the State Fair. The selected exhibits will be marked with a purple State Fair sticker.

Live animal entries – please read regarding animal ownership. Clover kids that have enrolled in a livestock project may show either their own animal or borrow from a sibling or another member that is exhibiting at the fair. An animal id affidavit sheet does need to be turned in to the office by june 14th telling who the exhibitor is and the ownership of the animal they will be showing at the fair.

Clover kids have the opportunity to "show" an animal and visit with the judge as a showmanship class. The animal will not be judged as it is strictly a "showmanship" class for youth to experience. *** note: clover kid livestock will need to check in 1 hour prior to their respective show. It will be optional for clover kid livestock exhibits to be stalled at the fairgrounds.

Equine entries are **not** eligible for clover kids, rainbow classic, or open class horse show. Equine exhibitors must be 8 years old, 4-H age.

Herdmanship and animal care is the responsibility of each 4-H member and clover kid that are exhibiting at the county fair. Please be responsible for proper care of your animal by watering, feeding, keeping animal cool (fans or misting) and keeping environment correct for your animal and for public viewers.

Division 410 - fashion show - modeling

The 4-h fashion show is an opportunity for youth to showcase their clothing construction and consumer management skills. Construction garment contestants are judged for fit, construction, poise, and overall look of the garment on the individual.

Fashion revue entry form/written narrative sheets, are due in the extension office on pre-entry day. The narrative sheet is a brief paragraph telling the good points, description, and itemized cost of the outfit plus a sample of the fabric. This is the script that will be read aloud for the public fashion revue. All garments entered in fashion show will also be judged separately for clothing construction and displayed at the fair. Garments should be age appropriate.

Shopping in style contestants are judged on garment fit, the overall look of the outfit, and poise, as well as record keeping skills in the written report.

County award: jack arp memorial award (\$25) given for the top presentation.

An illustrated presentation, given by one (1) individual or a team of two (2) individuals, is a live presentation with a formal talk where youth will use visual aids (such as props, posters, computer-based visuals, handouts, video, etc.) To show and tell others how to do something. Judge views the entire presentation and engages in a question-and-answer session following presentation. Educational resources for youth can be found in the 4-h project resource central found at http://4h.unl.edu/resources.

Junior- 8-10 vrs old Intermediate- 11-13 vrs old senior-14-18 vrs old

Participants must be 10 years old on january 1 to be eligible for state fair competition. At county level, an lcd projector can be available for use. If competing at the nebraska state fair participants may provide their own computer or other equipment as needed; and must be able to connect their computer to a hdmi plug on the television.

Rules: all 4-H presentations topics should be related to what the 4-h youth is learning through 4-h educational experiences focused on the priorities of career and college readiness, community development, entrepreneurship, food supply confidence, living leadership development, and stem (science, technology, engineering, and math.

4-H presentations should include an introduction (the "why" portion of the topic), a body (the "show and tell" portion of the topic), and a conclusion/summary (the "what" portion of the topic).

Time limit: 6-8 minutes individual, 8-10 minutes for a team.

Contest information: presenters using computer-based visuals may bring files on a usb drive that is pc formatted. Participants may also provide their own computer or other equipment as needed; however, participants must be able to connect their computer to a hdmi plug on the television. Live animals may be used in the presentation. All state fair livestock health requirements must be followed. Presenters are responsible for all stalling arrangements, care and handling of animals. Animals can only remain in the presentation area while the owner is present.

Division 151 - 4-H Illustrated presentations contest

B151113 illustrated presentation (sf65)

B151112 premier presenter contest – (state fair only class). Participant qualification: each nebraska county may advance one individual or one two-person team (top purple or grand champion presentation) from the illustrated presentation class in the county 4-h presentations contest to the premier presenter contest.

Division 152: teaching trade show presentations contest

A teaching (trade show exhibit) presentation, given by one (1) individual or a team of two (2) individuals, is a live, interactive, trade show style presentation where youth will continuously engage a constantly-changing/moving audience for 30 minutes by showing and telling them how to do something while answering questions. Communication modules for youth participating in the teaching presentations contest can be found in the 4-h project resource central found at http://4h.unl.edu/resources.

Rules: any teaching (trade show exhibit) presentation that has been previously shared at the county 4-h presentation contest or other event that has a live audience (4-h club meeting, community event, etc.) Is eligible for this division. The class requires the presence of the contestant(s). Participants will present for 30 minutes. Each participant is required to wear the 4-h chevron, 4-h emblem, or 4-h shirt during their presentation.

Presentation topic:

The purpose of a poster is to call attention to a subject. Posters must be crafted to catch the viewer's attention quickly and present only one specific message clearly. The poster should clearly feature some aspect of 4-H. Judging criteria:

Idea: simple clear message, appropriate for a poster.

Lettering: readable from a distance, appropriate size in proportion to art.

Art: one dominant, eye-catching element: art relates to written message.

Arrangement: makes good use of entire poster space without being too crowded: art and lettering are well balanced.

Color: use of bold colors that harmonize well: colors used are legible.

Quality of Construction: neatness: appropriateness of materials used.

Effectiveness: works well as a poster.

Posters must be 14" x 22" and must be of a material that can be pinned to a display board. They may be arranged either horizontally or vertically. Those generated by computer must also meet this standard. Computer art generated on an 8 2 x 11" sheet of paper and pasted on poster board will be disqualified.

Posters may be in any medium ... watercolor, ink, crayon, markers or computer graphics. They may not be 3-dimensional. Entries with components thicker than paper (such as milk cartons. Pencils, pop cans) will be disqualified.

Posters may not use copyrighted materials, such as cartoon characters or commercial product names, logos, or slogans. Avoid using clichés or over-use phrases that do not command the viewer=s attention. When using the official 4-H Emblem, it must follow approved guidelines, which can be viewed at http://www.national4hheadquarters.gov/emblem/4h name.htm. Computer clip art will not be scored as positively as original computer art designs. Posters may be laminated to protect them.

GENERAL ANIMAL WELFARE PLAN

- 1. Animal Care This is the highest priority need and should be maintained all year long, not just at and before county fair time. Proper care including fresh water, a well-balanced diet, protection from the environment and a good health program will ensure that an animal will be ready at fair.
- Fair Time Good herdsmanship and animal care is the key here. Well groomed and cared for animals are healthier and show better thus resulting in higher placing for the 4-Her.

CONFRONTATION WITH AN ANIMAL RIGHTS GROUP

- Remain calm and collected. NEVER get into a shouting match or argument with any activist. Always state facts.
- 2. 4-H-er's should contact their leaders or livestock superintendent immediately upon being confronted. The 4-Her should not try to deal with these people.
- 3. The primary responsibility of leaders and superintendents is to maintain the safety and well-being of the 4-Her's. Animal rights activist can only use verbal and/or signs to demonstrate with. They may not use physical contact. Any attempt to free or handle an animal is against the law. If this is done, make sure that this act or acts are witnessed.
- 4. If a confrontation has occurred, and a leader or superintendent has maintained control of the area, the leader and or superintendent should contact the designated contact person (in Clay County this will be the Ag Extension Educator) and they will take the appropriate action.
- 5. Remember, keep calm at all times. These people fuel themselves on shouting matches. Ignoring them is the best solution.

LIVESTOCK AUCTION

General Rules:

- 1. Exhibitors now have a choice to sell their animal for premium only or sell it and have it go on the truck!
 - a. Examples:
 - i. Billy decides to sell his animal for premium only. During the auction, that animal will be "sold", and youth will only receive the premium bid amount. He will still retain ownership of that animal, and take that animal home.
 - ii. Billy decides to sell his animal and wants it to go on the truck. That animal will be sold in the auction and Billy will receive the premium bid amount as well as the packer bid for his animal. That animal will then go on the truck, and he will no longer have ownership of that animal.
 - All animals will be sold as designated by the youth. Buyers will NOT have the option to purchase and keep an animal during the live auction.
- 2. Only market animals **shown** at the Clay County Fair will be allowed to sell in the auction.
- 3. Choice to sell any animal, including Champion/Res Champion, is decision of 4-H'er.
- A consignment fee of \$10/head of the "bonus portion" of the sale of each animal will be accessed. This money will be put into a separate account for use by the 4-H Council.

- Each exhibitor will be allowed to sell a maximum of 2 units. Units shall consist of: Beef - 1 market beef animal
 - Swine A champion, reserve champion or pen (3,2 or 1 swine)
 - Sheep A champion, reserve champion or pen (4,3,2 or 1 sheep)
 - Goats A champion, reserve champion or pen (4,3,2 or 1 goat)

Sheep, Goat and Swine exhibitors will be able to sell one unit per species, unless they have a Grand Champion or Reserve Champion market animal, then they will be allowed to sell two units in that species. Other animals exhibited but not sold in the auction may be sold for base bid, with approval of the packer.

- 6. The order of sale: the specie selling first will be sold last the next year, on an annual rotational basis. 2024 sale order will be: beef, sheep, meat goats, and swine. All animals will be sold in a random order including the Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion.
- Official weights for the sale will be the weigh-in weight taken at check-in. No livestock will be weighed "WET". No exceptions!
- Hogs will go directly to the base bidder (packer) or a limited number of hogs can be purchased for custom slaughter. Transportation is provided to the base bid packer plant.
- 9. Definitions for the purpose of this sale the following definitions apply:
 - **Base Bid** this is the bid offered by the packer buyer for that specie. The base bidder takes all "turn back" animals.

Premium - amount bid during auction.

- 10. Market beef must weigh 1,000 pounds or more to sell in the auction. For the auction, market beef shall consist of: Market Steers/Heifers, or Second Year Bucket Calves. Market Sheep must weigh 95 pounds or more to sell in the auction. Market Goats must weigh 55 pounds. Market swine must weigh 220 or more to sell in the auction.
- 11. The Clay County 4-H Auction committee has final decision on all matters.

4-H'ers/Consignors

When an exhibitor chooses to sell his/her market animal in the Clay County Livestock Auction they agree to accept certain responsibilities including:

- 1. Solicit buyers to promote the auction by contacting potential buyers prior to the sale.
- Decision of market animal or animals to be sold. Notification of selection must be made to the livestock office, ONE HOUR after completion of the last livestock show. (knowing your decision at check-in would be very helpful!!) NO EXCEPTIONS.
- 3. REQUEST For purposes of working with livestock buyers to obtain top bids, you will be asked at weigh-in for your best intent of selling thru the auction or sending market livestock on the truck to the buyer. The earlier these livestock numbers are known, a better projection of numbers can be given to the buyer so the bid can be offered accordingly.
- 4. The sale order will be by species, in random order, determined by random drawing. The sale program will be the official order of sale.
- 5. Official 4-H dress code will be enforced during the livestock auction.
- 6. Feed & water your animal until the animal is released to the bidder. Have your animal cleaned-up and at the sale ring 10 minutes prior to the animal sale order. After they are sold, all animals will be sent to receiving/holding pens until released by the auction staff.
- 7. Follow all State and Federal laws regarding the use of drugs on their animals, and to follow all withdrawal regulations. It is against the law to use certain drugs in food animals. Any violation of these laws will be aggressively pursued by the Clay County Auction committee.

- All 4-Hers and their families at the sale will be expected to conduct themselves in a professional, courteous manner. Your actions reflect on the entire Clay County 4-H program.
- 9. 4-H'ers are required to show their own animal thru the auction.

GENERAL RULES FOR EXHIBITION

Only animals exhibited by their owners receive ribbons or prizes unless the owner is excused by the Superintendent.

- All possible diligence and care will be used to prevent loss or injury to articles or animals on exhibit; but it is hereby expressly stipulated that the management of the fair will in no way be responsible should loss or injury occur.
- All animals must be properly identified by June 14th with the Extension Office. The forms are available on the website or at the Extension Office. Please use the most current form.

County exhibitors must submit a paper copy of the ID sheet to the local Ext. office. Paper copies are available at the office or online at 4h.unl.edu

Market beef animals are required to have an official EID, 4-H or FFA ear tag.

Registered Breeding beef must have a Tattoo and provide a copy of registration papers with the ID sheets.

Commercial Breeding beef can have an EID ear tag or a Tattoo.

Swine must have an ear tag obtained from the Extension office. Ear notches no longer required for county or state.

Sheep and Meat Goats need a Scrappies tag

Rabbits are to have a permanent ID number or name in their ear.

Ear Tags are available at the Extension Office and must be in place by **June 14th** for all livestock. Clay County also requires a paper ID sheet.

Exhibitors not meeting these requirements will be dropped one ribbon placing in the live show and the animal(s) will not be eligible for Champion or Reserve Champion.

HOW MANY FNTRIES?

Only one entry per person per class number may be made (unless specified differently) in areas *except* in livestock, dairy, poultry, and rabbits. A member is eligible to exhibit:

four breeding beef within the following combinations: two breeding heifers, two cow-calf pair, one cow (not same animal as shown in other class), two feeder calves, two market steers and two market heifers.

one first year bucket calf

one second year bucket calf

two dairy goats per class.

two gilts and three individual market hogs,

two breeding sheep per class and four market or feeder lambs,

two breeding meat goats per class and 4 market meat goats,

ten poultry – 2 per class ten rabbits - 2 per class four small animals - 2 per class two dogs

No individual animal may be shown in both breeding and market classes. Exhibitors are responsible for showing their own animal. If an exhibitor has two animals are in the same class, another 4-H'er can help show.

OFFICIAL 4-H DRESS CODE: Participants in livestock, dairy, small animal, cat and dog shows are required to wear a white shirt (or blouse) with the official 4-H chevron attached or a white or green 4-H T-shirt, or the annually donated POET shirts. Dark blue denim jeans are to be worn. Dairy exhibitors only may wear white pants. Participants in music and presentation contest are also asked to wear a chevron patch or prominent 4-H identification. Participants in horse will wear a white, (long sleeve preferred) shirt with a 4-H arm band worn above the elbow on the left arm. 4-H members or FFA Chapters, may wear an official FFA T-shirt in place of the white 4-H shirt. State Fair or Ak-Sar-Ben shirts will not be allowed for shows. Violators will not be allowed to show. Cell phones must be turned off when in show ring.

YQCA – Youth for the Quality Care of Animals training— (formally called Quality Assurance) is required for all meat animal species exhibitors. This includes: (beef, sheep, swine, goat, dairy goat, poultry and rabbit). Training must be completed by June 14 for showing at county, state or Ak-Sar-Ben shows. YQCA training is now available as an online course at: yqcaprogram.org. Registration fee is \$12. In person trainings are available and require an online registration and \$3 fee. Print and submit Certificates to the office upon completion. Options to test out online are available for Intermediate and Senior ages. Ages: Jr 8-11; Int. 12-14, Sr 15 & over.

HOME BRED AND FED CLASSES have been added in the market areas for beef, swine, sheep and meat goat. Home Bred and Fed is defined as a market animal that was raised on the home farm from time of conception through finishing phase. The parent/exhibitor must own the mother of the animal at time of conception and the offspring must be raised by the 4-H member at their facility. An exhibitor is allowed one animal per species for this class. The animal must be designated for the Bred and Fed class at the time of weigh-in. The animal will show in the Bred and Fed class only. The Champion and Reserve Champion Bred and Fed class will be eligible for the Grand Champion Market animal award.

LIVESTOCK HEALTH REQUIREMENTS

**See each animal area for specific animal health regulations.

All animals exhibited will be healthy and free of any known disease. Any animal found to be infected with any infectious, contagious, or otherwise transmissible disease, or is suspected of being so affected shall be removed from the fairgrounds immediately. Ring worm and pink eye shall be considered to be infectious, contagious and otherwise transmissible if in the opinion of the veterinarian, Extension personnel, Superintendent and/or fairboard such infection, contagion or disease is an active disease entity.

Exhibitors of market animals will be required to fill out and turn in a disclosure affidavit. All meat and dairy species exhibitors are required to attend a YQCA

training annually or receive certification by passing a test to be eligible to show at the county, state or Ak-Sar-Ben shows.

All rams and female sheep and female goats exhibited must have an official USDA identification eartag registered with the State Veterinarians for the Scrapie Eradication Program. This applies to both market and breeding sheep.

- Cats are required to be current on their vaccinations of Rabies, distemper shots, panleucopenia, rhino tracheitis, calici virus. Cats must be current with feline leukemia vaccination or show proof of negative test within 180 days of show.
- **Dogs** must be immunized with Distemper, Hepatitis, parvo and rabies and accompanied by a health certificate.

ROUND ROBIN SHOWMANSHIP CONTEST

- A Round Robin Showmanship Contest will be held for the top Champion and Reserve Champion in the Senior Division from Beef, Sheep, Meat Goat, Swine, and Horse Showmanship classes.
- The third ranked showman (if a purple ribbon winner) will serve as an alternate **if** either the 1st or 2nd ranked showman has already won Round Robin, if the 4H'er has won showmanship in two areas, or 4-H'er is unable to compete.
- Those who have won Round Robin are not eligible to compete in Round Robin contest but **are** eligible to compete in showmanship.
- The contest will consist of a **written test** in addition to the live contest. The written test will include questions from all 5 species. The live portion will consist of each contestant showing each of the 5 species. If possible, they will show as each animal as a group. The test will be administered to all, Saturday morning at 8:30 a.m. in the meeting room in the Activities Building.
- Each candidate will be awarded a medal for participation in the contest. The winner will be the participant that has the highest score. The winner may select an item of his/her choice, have it personalized (engraved or embroidered) and submit the bill for reimbursement. The reimbursement will be up to \$100.

BEEF FITTING CONTEST

BEEF FITTING CONTEST RULES:

- Names will be drawn composing teams and they will be posted in a timely fashion.
- The Beef Fitting Contest will be Saturday at 10:30a.m. during the Clay County Fair. It is encouraged that teams meet ½ prior to the contest to get supplies ready.
- Teams will be made up of up to 4 Clay County 4-H members. Youth must be enrolled in the beef project.
- No age divisions.
- All animals start wet and must be finished in 30 minute time frame.
- The animal must be provided by the team, being an eligible entry at the Clay Co. Fair.
- All grooming tools must be provided by the team. This includes grooming chutes, combs, brushes, one single blowers, extension cord, grooming foams, mousse and sprays and fly spray. (NO CLIPPERS, ADHESIVES OR PAINTS ALLOWED!)

- Contestants may not receive help or advice from anyone during the contest. They
 cannot have any communication with anyone except the judges or their team
 members during the contest.
- Judging may be done by volunteer judges selected by the 4-H Council.
- Judges may question contestants regarding their knowledge, abilities, procedures, etc.
- Teams will be scored on safety (20 points), use of time (20 points), team work and participation by each team member (40 points) and technique (20 points).
- Individuals have until June 14th to get registered. Names will drawn and team
 assignments will be posted. Prizes will be awarded to the top two teams. There
 will not be ribbons or premium money given for this contest.

SHOWMANSHIP CONTESTS:

Only Clay County 4-H exhibitors, parents, siblings and 4-H leaders will be permitted to assist in any phase of grooming of livestock at the Clay County Fair. 4-H exhibitors may help each other in grooming including clipping, trimming and/or blocking. Assistance by anyone else automatically disqualifies the exhibitor from all classes in that species. Please notify the superintendent, 4-H Educator or a member of the 4-H council livestock committee, of violations to this rule.

All livestock Showmanship entries must be made on the <u>pre-entry sheet</u> prior to fair. Entry numbers for showmanship classes are included in each specie DIVISION. Each competitor must show his own animal in Showmanship.

- * Breed class must have two or more entries to show as a single breed. Breeds with less than 2 in a class will show in an AOB class (All Other Breeds). This will be determined at fair, when class numbers are known.
- * Heifers showing in breed class must have registration papers and readable tattoo. Registration papers are not required for Commercial heifers. Commercial heifers may be ID with either a tattoo or EID ear tag.
- * Submit a copy of the breed papers and completed ID sheets (due by June 14).

 * 4-H'er with two entries of same breed can *option* to put one in a breed class and one in AOB class. This must be done at pre-entry time (June 14) and not at fair check-in. No Exceptions on this rule!
- * At the end of the breed class, a breed champion will be picked and an award plaque will be presented if sponsorship allows.
- * The final class will be to pick overall grand champion and reserve grand champion heifer (top heifers from each breed). A trophy will be awarded for the champion and reserve champion.

Awards: BREED SPONSORED PLAQUES - Additional sponsors have been obtained to support the breeding beef program. These sponsors have agreed to provide a plaque to the Champion breeding beef female in each breed division. The Breed Beef plaques will be awarded after all classes in each division are complete.

Breeding pigs farrowed on or after January 1 of this year are eligible in breeding entries. Market Swine, either fat gilt or barrow, must be farrowed on or after January 1.

All pigs exhibited at fair must be identified (form 4H F107) and ear TAGS by **June 14**. (Clay County no longer requires ear notches). EID tags required for State Fair. Ear tags are available at the Extension office.

A club member is limited to exhibiting two breeding gilts and three individual market hogs. No individual hog may be shown in both breeding and market classes. Market Hogs should weigh at least **220 pounds** with no upper weight limit. Pigs can only be shown in the class they register for on entry day.

An exhibitor has the option to advance a hog to the next higher weight class to eliminate showing two in the same weight class. This would need to be determined at weigh-in. Market gilts and barrows will be shown in separate classes. A medal will be awarded to the Champion gilt and Champion barrow and they will be eligible for grand champion market swine. An award will be given at Achievement Program to the owner of the Grand Champion Market Swine.

***Because ractopamine has been banned in international markets, swine exhibited at the 2024 Clay County fair are required to be ractopamine-free.To ensure that exhibitors follow this protocol, the Clay County 4-H Council will secure a signed

affidavit from a parent/legal guardian and exhibitor at the time of weigh-in which states that the pigs shown by the exhibitor have never been offered ractopamine (sold under the trade names Paylean® or Engain® for swine).

No parents of exhibitors shall be in show ring while their child is showing. Once your child is in the show ring, it is the parents' responsibility to find another person to step in and fill their role.

<u>Grooming Rules</u> - Pigs must be shown without hairdressing compounds. This includes oil, powder or any other coat dressing compounds considered objectable by the packer. Only **unadulterated** water is permitted. Pigs found in violation will be disqualified from the show.

LIGHT HORSE

- For the safety of all persons attending the fair, horses may be ridden only in the arena. Horses can be led north of the barns only. They are not allowed south of the barns in the parking area or east of the barns, or south of the grandstand. Saddle horses outside, not in barn alley.
- NOTE: Only exhibitors are allowed to ride horses the day of the show. This includes warming them up or settling them down. Adults should not be on the horses at all.
- Horse Divisions will only be Junior and Senior. There will be no Intermediate classes. Junior Division will be youth ages 8-12 and Seniors will be ages 13 & over.
- Exhibitors will wear the 4-H arm band on the left arm while showing. Participants must wear white shirt or white blouse (long sleeves preferred) and dark blue denim jeans. Only western hats are allowed. **Helmets are encouraged for speed events.**
- An exhibitor may enter five classes plus showmanship. An exhibit in this class must be a bona fide project animal and an ID sheet completed by June 14. No animal may be entered or exhibited in any one event more than once.
- All members must meet project, ownership and identification requirements as identified on the required *Horse Identification Certificate*. NOTE: Complete the form by drawing markings, photos will not be accepted. The show will run according to the current 4-H show rules and regulations for the year. *NE 4-H Horse Show and Judging Guide* is available at the Extension Office for a fee. Only pre-entries made to the Extension office by the designated date will be allowed to compete in the 4-H Horse show at the county fair. No stallions may be shown. Only those horses listed on a 4-H Light Horse Identification Form and filed in the County Extension Office by June 14, of current year, are eligible for show.

Stalling horses during the county fair will be optional. Due to the condition of the barn, exhibitors will have the option to take their horse home following the horse show. Horse exhibitors will still receive premium money. Stalling horses is still welcome if exhibitors choose to do so. (This rule ONLY applies to horses.) The horse must be a bona fide, identified horse. Herdsmanship rules will apply following the show.

All 4-H horses must be **checked in by 10:00 a.m. the day of the show**. For Horses that will be in stalls. Exercise times will be; from 10 am - 4:30 pm, allowed to exercise in the arena from 4:30-6:00 pm. If exhibitors choose to keep their

horses at the fairgrounds. Horses must return to the barn for display between 6-9 pm. and can be removed again after 9 pm. When exercising in arena, a bridle and saddle must be used and appropriate shoes worn by rider. Practice safety at all

Youth under 4-H age of 8 will not be allowed to ride or show equine at the fair. This policy includes Clover Kids and Rainbow Classic Pet show participants.

SMALL ANIMAL GUIDELINES

YQCA – Youth for the Quality Care of Animals training is required for all meat animal species exhibitors. This includes: (beef, sheep, swine, goat, dairy goat, dairy cattle, poultry and rabbit). Training must be completed by June 14 for showing at county, state or AkSarBen shows. YQCA training is now available as an online course at: https://yqcaprogram.org. In person trainings may be available and can be utilized. Check with the office for class schedules. Online registration and fee payment are required and a completion certificate must be turned into the office.

OFFICIAL 4-H DRESS CODE

- Participants in livestock, dairy, small animal, cat and dog shows are required to wear a white shirt (or blouse) with the official 4-H chevron attached or a white 4-H T-shirt. Dark blue denim jeans are to be worn. Dairy exhibitors only, may wear white pants. Participants in music and presentation contest are also asked to wear a chevron patch or prominent 4-H identification. Participants in horse will wear a white, (long sleeve preferred) shirt with a 4-H arm band worn above the elbow on the left arm. 4-H members FFA Chapters may wear an official FFA T-shirt in place of the white 4-H shirt. State Fair or Ak-Sar-Ben shirts will not be allowed for shows. Violators will not be allowed to show. Cell phone must be turned off in the show arena.
- **SMALL ANIMALS** *Exhibitors may enter up to 2 animals per class and 4 small animals total.* If you want your cages locked please bring padlocks. Exhibitors must supply own food and water equipment, which cannot turn over. All exhibitors in this area are responsible to keep the area clean at all times except during shows.
- **POULTRY INFORMATION** A 4-H member may exhibit a total of **10** poultry which may allow max **2 per class**. Poultry must be grown in club members' poultry project.
- **MINIMUM WEIGHTS** -The minimum weights for exhibition birds will be as stated in the American Standard of Perfection and the Bantam Standard. The minimum weights for production birds will be 3 lbs. for females and 4 lbs. for males of light breeds and 4 lbs. for females and 5 lbs. for males of heavy breeds.
- **TRIO** A trio of exhibition birds shall consist of one male and two females of the same breed. Birds entered singly are not eligible to be judged as part of a trio. Birds entered in a trio are NOT eligible to be judged in individual competition.
- **PENS** A pen of broilers shall consist of three male or three female birds 6-9 weeks of age. Birds entered in a pen class are NOT eligible to be judged in individual competition.
- A PEN OF HYBRIDS, crossbred or purebred egg production birds shall consist of 3 sexually mature females. Pens of broilers or egg production females will be judged for production qualities only and need not necessarily conform to breed standards.

- RULES FOR BANTAM & OTHER POULTRY -The rules for standard size chickens apply equally to bantams, waterfowl and turkey where applicable.
- **HEALTH REQUIREMENTS POULTRY Health certificates are not required for** poultry. No additional testing requirements for Nebraska origin poultry.

4-H MEMBERS MUST BE PRESENT AT THE TIME IF ENTRIES ARE JUDGED IN PENS.

RABBITS

YQCA certification training is required for all exhibitors in Poultry and Rabbit

A 4-H member may make max two entries under each class number and can show a maximum of 10 rabbits. Rabbits must be grown in member's rabbit project. Rabbits, other than fryers, entering County and State Fair, must have permanent ID numbers or names in the ear. Rabbits used for showmanship must also be ID. Exhibitors - furnish own feed and water equipment which rabbit cannot turn over.

Cats must be current with feline leukemia vaccination or show proof of negative test within 180 days of show. In some instances, a current vaccine may be a 1 to 3 year time interval, please check with your vet to be sure. ** Send a copy of the shot record with the pre-entry OR be prepared to show proof of vaccinations (such as a signed vet certificate, vaccinations printout or receipt). For health reason, all cats must be vaccinated two weeks prior to the fair or be current with shots. Cats will be released to the exhibitor immediately after pet show.

*** Clay County, Fillmore County, and Nuckolls County will join together to hold a dog show. The show will be conducted as one event with awards being made to the top exhibitor regardless of county origin. The 2024 show location will be in Nelson on July 5th at 10:00 a.m.

NUMBER OF ENTRIES: An exhibitor may enter one showmanship class, 2 agility classes (using different dogs and in different level of classes), and 2 obedience classes (using different dogs and in different level of classes)

VACCINATIONS: **Dogs must be immunized with distemper, hepatitis, parvo and rabies.** To pre-enter, submit the Nebraska State Fair Dog Show Vaccination Record Form (SF 263) filled out and signed by a veterinarian documenting that rabies vaccinations are within 1 year or 3 years depending on the vaccine given and all other vaccinations within 12 months. All vaccinations must be in effect at the time for the show. Explanation: Some rabies vaccinations are viable for one year and some rabies vaccinations are viable for three year but are specifically designed and administered according to their label. It is not acceptable nor allowed to vaccinate a dog with a 1 year rabies vaccine and plan to have it in effect for 3 years.

DISQUALIFIED DOGS - Females in season will not be permitted at show. Overly aggressive dogs may be disqualified at discretion of the judge or superintendent. Lame or crippled dogs will not be permitted to show if it is determined by a show superintendent that it is affecting the health of the dog.

ADVANCE IN OBEDIENCE AND AGILITY CLASSES: Follow rules in Nebraska 4-H Dog Shows Guidelines 4-H20. A youth will move up to a "transition year", after they receive 2 purples in a specific class at county or state level completion. Youth will finish their 4-H year at the same level if the second purple ribbon occurs in the middle of their 4-H year. Youth do not have to move up in the middle of a 4-H year. Youth will then have the option to stay in their current class for one additional year (after receiving 2 purple ribbons) called "transition year". During the transition year, youth will practice the more advanced class (gained skills such as off leash work) but may compete in their same level. Youth may advance up to the next level more quickly with advice/assistance from a leader and parent to help evaluate skill and readiness of youth and dog. This may especially occur if the youth has had previous dog handling experiences.

Clubs may be scored on Herdsmanship several times a day anytime between 10:00 am and 6:00 pm. After 6:00 pm, no demerit points will be taken off for feeding and watering animals in stalls or lack of club attendant, but exhibit should be reasonably neat at all times. Herdsmanship will begin at 12:00 noon, on Entry Day. The final scoring will be following cleanup at the conclusion of the fair. This also includes the tie-out areas you were responsible for.

Each 4-H livestock exhibitor is expected to excel in Herdsmanship. Herdsmanship is a club activity, cooperation, and hard work is expected by all exhibitors.

Herdsmanship involves: 4-H exhibitor cards being on the stalls and/or pens identifying animal, class, exhibitor, and club. Ribbons stickers may be placed on cards after each respective show. Use of white paint only on stalls, green paint may be used as trim. Show box and supplies areas should be kept neat and orderly. Keep alleys and tie out area clean. Properly store feed and trappings and dispose of manure in appropriated area. After judging hours, stalls and pens should be cleaned and prepared for the next day, keeping the alleys open and clean. No litter should be dumped in driveways.

All areas will be judged on show days. The animals that are being "shown" in respective areas will be exempt from judging two hours before and two hours after the show. Alleyways must be kept clear at all times.

Tie out areas may be utilized for large animals, from 9:00 p.m. to 10:00 a.m. and will be assigned and judged as part of Herdsmanship accordingly. Neck ties on cattle, in addition to halters, are highly recommended. Tie-out areas must be cleaned by the 4-H'ers utilizing the space, at the conclusion of the fair.

Horses will be allowed to leave stalls between 4:30-6 p.m. and may be exercised in **the arena and only the arena**. Bridles and saddles must be used and appropriate shoes worn when riding. Animals will return to stalls for display.

Small animal's barns must be kept clean. Each exhibitor is responsible to take turns sweeping and maintain the barn. The barns need to be presentable at all times.

The following score card will be the basis of judging Herdsmanship in dairy, beef, swine, sheep, and horses. Comment sheets **may** be available to view at the fair office after judging.

Questions or complaints about the scoring on Herdsmanship must be discussed with the superintendent, by a 4-H member. Complaints received by other than a 4-H'er, may cause points to be deducted from the club score.

HERDSMANSHIP AND ANIMAL CARE is the responsibility of each 4-H member and Clover Kid that are exhibiting at the county fair. Please be responsible for proper care of your animal by watering, feeding, keeping animal cool (fans or misting) and keeping environment correct for your animal and for public viewers. Hogs may need to be watered down periodically.

Summer Heat and watering of animals: due to high temperatures, it will be necessary to provide water to your animals during the time they are stalled in the barn. This can be handled by bringing water to your animal or temporarily securing a pan of water in a stall so it is not loose or able to be spilled. Remove bucket when finished.

<u>DIVISION 120</u> -Public Adventures, And My World (SF182)

The purpose of these citizenship exhibits is to foster civic responsibility and action within the diverse areas of citizenship including community service, service learning, government and policy making.

Please note exhibits are entered at 4-H'ersown risk. We are not responsible for loss or damage to family heirloom items. Displays should not be larger than $22" \times 28"$ wide.

Resources: Solve real problems in your community; Discover the possibilities of democratic citizenship; Plan and conduct a project that will create, change, or improve something valuable to people.

Supporting Material: All entries must have a statement explaining the purpose of the exhibit. All exhibitors are encouraged to show evidence of their personal experiences, study or observations that relate to their exhibit. This helps the judges understand what the 4-H'er did and learned in the process that led to the exhibit.

References: All exhibitors should reference material sources or supporting information used in exhibits (i.e., if questions from a game were taken from an outside source, they must be referenced.)

Identification: All entries should be labeled with the exhibitor's name, club and county. Scoring: Score sheets can be found on the web or are available from the county extension office.

Classes

A120001 - Care Package Display This exhibit is a display about the PROCESS of creating and giving a care package, not the actual care package. You may use a poster, Power Point or another multi-media program to tell about the PROCESS of developing and giving a care package to a service organization. PowerPoint should be saved to a USB/thumb drive. You need to answer the following questions in your exhibit.

How did you select the organization?

What items did you include in your care package?

Why did you select those items?

How did it feel to present your care pack to the organization?

What did you learn from this experience?

Other information that you feel is important about the care package or organization. Some examples of care packages are: Backpack for school supplies, litter pan for animal shelter items, suitcase for abuse shelter or homeless shelter, etc.

A120002 - Citizenship Game which could include but is not limited to symbol flash cards, question and answer board or stimulation with props. Clear instructions on how to play the game and what the game hopes to accomplish must be included.

A120003 - Patriotic or Cultural Fine Arts can be made of any art media but should tie in the relevance of the artwork to citizenship.

A120004 - Public Adventure Scrapbook should describe your Public Adventure or Service Learning Activity. Scrapbooks must measure no more than 16" x 16".

A120005 - Public Adventure Poster should describe your Public Adventure or Service Learning Activity. Display posters must be stiff enough to stand when supported from behind and below. Length and width must be no more than 24"x 28".

A120006 - Written or Recorded Stakeholder Interview should follow the outline found in the Public Adventures Curriculum. It may be written or recorded. Recordings should be saved as a.wav or .mp3 file: a USB/thumb drive will be accepted.

A120007 - Written Citizenship Essay is designed to promote good citizenship and patriotism. This essay is open to all age groups. All essays should be 300 - 400 typewritten words.

A120008 - For 9th-12th Graders Only: Oral Citizenship Essay addressing the theme "Freedom's Obligations" should be 3-5 minutes. No background music, singing or other enhancement allowed. All essays should be saved as a.wav. or mp3 file; a USB/thumb drive will be accepted. Voice tone should be normal and conversational. A copy of the written essay should be attached.

A120009 - Service Items can include but aren't limited to lap quilt and homemade toys. Only non-perishable items will be accepted. Attached to the exhibit should be an explanation of who the recipient was and how the service project was made and used. The service item could be part of a larger community service effort.

A120010 - 4-H Club Exhibit should depict what a 4-H club has done in the area of community service. This item could include, but is not limited to, a service item, poster, scrapbook, cultural or creative arts item or care package.

Division 130 - I2I Project Classes (SF183)

Discover your own family genealogy; Expand your cultural knowledge; Explore different cultures and ways of thinking.

Class A130001 – Cultural Fine Arts can be made of any art media but should symbolize what makes them unique.

Class A130002 – How are We Different? Interview should follow the interview guide in the participant manual on page 3 and should reflect on the differences and similarities between you and the person you are interviewing.

Class A130003 –Name Art should be a creative art exhibit that symbolizes or explains where your name came from and what it means. Can use any media.

Class A130004—Family History depicting your family cultural history or the ethnic make-up of your community noting who were the first settlers, where did they come from, is there evidence of the background today(local celebrations, family celebrations, museum or educational displays, historical markers, etc.)

Class A130005 – Exhibit depicting a Cultural Food that is special to your family. Can be a story or essay.

Class A130006 – "This is Who I Am" poem. A poem written by the 4-H'er that reflects who they are.

Class A130007 –Poster that depicts what you have learned through the i2i Project.

Class A130008 -- Biography about an historical figure that has made a positive impact on our society or who have made a difference in the lives of others

Class A130009 - Play Script written about a different culture.

- *B154933 **Communications Game.** Create a quiz game for your family or 4-H club members by selecting topic categories, writing and answering questions within these categories, and assigning point values to each question. Place this information on 3" x 5" index cards and display quiz game on a poster board. Explain how this game could be used and its purpose.
- *B154934 **Caring Correspondence**. Create a formal or an informal letter, e-mail, or note that shows how much you care, such as a letter of appreciation, a thank you note, or a friendship card.

GENERAL GUIDELINE RULES TO ASSIST IN PREPARING YOUR EXHIBIT. READ THROUGH ALL DIRECTIONS SO YOUR EXHIBIT MEETS QUALIFICATIONS.

- 4-Hers are allowed exhibits in only <u>one Level</u> of competition. 4-H Photography Level I is <u>county only</u>.
- 2. 4-H members may enter one exhibit per class
- 3. An image may only be used on one exhibit with the exception of the Portfolios, which may include images entered in other classes.
- Cameras: Photos may be taken with any type of film or digital camera, including pones, tablets, and drones.
- Photos must be shot by member during the current project year with the exception of Portfolios, which may include images captured and /or exhibited in previous years.

- Securely attach photos, mats, backing, and data tags. Exhibits that are poorly attached may be disqualified. Do not use photo corners, borders, or place coverings over the exhibits.
- 7. Portfolios: All portfolios must include the following information: 1) 1-page max bio, 2) table of contents, 3) years each photo was taken, 4) title for each image, 5) device make and model used to capture each image, and 6) reflections for each photo. When writing reflections, youth should focus on what new photography techniques or skills they were practicing when they took the photo, what makes the image successful, and what could have been done to improve the image Portfolios may be presented in either print or digital formats.
 - Printed portfolios should be presented in a 8.5" x 11" three-ring binder or similar book format. Recommended photo size is 8" x 10". Matting is not necessary.
 - Digital portfolios may be presented online and must be exhibited along with a single 8.5" x 11" flyer. Flyers must include a link, URL, or QR code that takes users (judges and fairgoers) to their online portfolio.
- 8. Display exhibits are accepted in Units 1 and II divisions. State Fair only accepts Level II. Displays consist of three 4" x 6" photo mounted on a single horizontal 11" x 14" black or white poster or mat board. Incorrect sizes will not be accepted. No foam board backing should be used. Each photo in the display must be numbered using a pencil. Numbers should be readable but not distract from the overall display. No titles, captions, or stick-on numbers will be allowed in class 20-60. Photos may be mounted vertically or horizontally. Appropriate Data Tags are required. (see rule regarding Data Tags)
- Print Exhibits: Print exhibits must be 8" x 10" printed mounted on 11" x 14" (outside size) cut matting with a sandwich mat board backing. Incorrect size will not be accepted. No foam board should be used for matting or backing. Mat openings may be rectangular or oval. Photos may be horizontal or vertical. No frames are allowed. Appropriate data tags are required. (see rule regarding Data Tags).
- Entry Tags should be securely attached to the upper right-hand corner of the exhibit.
- Data Tags are required on all print and display exhibits in classes 20-7-.
 Data tags should be securely attached to the back of the exhibit. Current data tags and help sheets are available.
 - Level 2 Prints: All Level 2 prints must have a Level 2 Data Tag.
 - Level 2 Displays: Each photo of the display must include a separate
 Level 2 Data Tag. Data Tags should be numbered with the corresponding photo's number.
 - Level 3 Prints: All Level 3 prints must have a Level 3 Data Tag.
- 12. On-Campus Exhibition Selection Level 2 and 3 Prints exhibited at State Fair may be selected for special on-campus exhibitions. Selected prints will be collected at the end of State Fair and will be returned to county offices after completion of exhibition.

- *B180901 Fun with Shadows Display or Print Photos should capture interesting or creative use of shadows (Activity 4)
- *B180002 Get in Close Display or Print Photo should capture a close-up view of the subject or object (Activity 8)
- *B180003 Bird's or Bug's Eye View Display or Print Photo should capture an interesting viewpoint of a subject, either from above (bird's eye view) or below (bug's eye view (activity 10)
- *B180004 Tricks and Magic Display or Print Photos should capture visual trickery or magic. Trick photography require creative compositions of objects in space and are intended to trick the person viewing the photo. For example, if someone is standing in front of a flower pot, the pot might not be visible in the image, making it look as if the flowers are growing out of the person's head (activity 11)
- *B180005 People, Places, or Pets with Personality Display or Print Photos should have a strong focal point, which could be people, places, or pets. Photos should capture the subject's personality or character. Photos may be posed or unposed. (activity 13)
- *B180006 Black and White Display or Print Photos should create interest without the use of color. Photos should show strong contrast and /or textures. Photos may be captured in black and white or captured in color and edited to black and white (act. 15)
- *B180007 Challenging Photo Exhibit: Telling a Story Display Exhibit will include three photos which tell a story without words. Photos may show something being created, destroyed, consumed, moving, or growing. Photos should capture the beginning, middle, and end of a single story, project, or event. Portfolios must include: 1) 1-page max bio, 2) table of contents, 3) year each photo was taken, 4) title for each image, 5) device make and model used to capture each image, and 6) reflections for each image. B182020 Advanced Techniques & Lighting Print —Photos should show an experimentation or exploration of advanced lighting, such as low-light or silhouette photography or another advanced photography technique, such as astrophotography, underwater photography, or infrared photography (Activity 3,4,5, or 12)

B182030 Advanced Composition Print – Photos should show advanced composition, such as using diagonal, horizontal, or vertical lines or repeating shapes to frame a subject or lead the viewer's eye through a scene; breaking the rule of thirds to compose a discordant image; or another advanced composition technique covered in Book 3, Activity 6,7)

B182040 Portrait Print – A great portrait captures not only a person's physical image, but also something of the person's character or personality. Phots may be either formal or informal, but must be of one or more human subjects (Activity 9)

B182050 Still Life Print – Photos should capture non-moving objects that have been arranged in an interesting way. Photos should demonstrate advanced control over lighting and compositon (Activity 8)

B182060 Freeze/Blur the Moment Print – Photos should capture a subject in motion. Photographers should adjust shutter speed to either freeze or blur the movement (Activity 11)

Rules

1 Level 3 photographers should be exploring and experimenting with advanced techniques. This may include but does not necessarily require using an SLR camera, manual adjustments, or other advanced equipment. <u>Information sheets for Classes 1 - 6 & Class 8:</u> (Final ribbon placing of the exhibit will include the completeness and accuracy of this information sheet.)

Information sheets for Classes 1-6 should include:

- 1) Where did I get the idea for this exhibit?
- 2) What decisions did I make to be sure exhibit is safe for child to use?
- 3) What age is this toy, game or activity appropriate for and why? (Infant, Birth-18 mos.; Toddlers, 18 mos-3 yrs.; Preschoolers, 3-5 yrs. or Middle Childhood, 6-9 yrs.) 4-H'ers must give at least 2 examples that help in understanding the appropriateness of this exhibit for the age of the child (see project manuals).
- 4. How is the toy, game or activity intended to be used by the child?

Information sheet for Class 8 (Babysitting Kit) should include:

- Participants in the clothing category will demonstrate their knowledge through the creation of garments using STEAM (science, technology, engineering, arts and mathematics) techniques. - NOTE: No entry will be accepted which is not listed in the premium book. This area is for clothing construction. To model in the Fashion Show, check the <u>Contest</u> section of this book.
- IDENTIFICATION LABEL Each item entered as a clothing exhibit must have a label attached stating: county, exhibitor's name, age, project name and class in which garment is entered and the number of years in the project exhibited. Wool entries must have the fiber content listed on the identification label. Attach a label on every component of the outfit using safety pins or basting. Not responsible for unlabeled items. You may provide your own paper labels.
- PREPARATION OF EXHIBITS Please bring all wearable exhibits on wire hangers only. All exhibits not suitable for hanging should be entered in a self-sealing plastic bag. As you look at the garment place the hook of the hanger pointing to the left. Fasten skirts, shorts and pants to skirt/pant hangers or safety pin to hanger. Each piece should be entered on its own hanger. If more than one hanger is used for an entry, fasten hangers belonging to one exhibit together with twist ties or rubber bands.
- **GENERAL** Garments as listed may be made for self (4-H member) or another person. 4-H'ers enrolled in clothing projects should continue their skill development. HOME DESIGN & RESTORATION

The purpose of Home Design & Restoration is to learn design principles and develop graphic design techniques. In addition, activities in this category encourage a well-thought-out design plans and diverse artistic technique. Be sure to take note of the rules section to develop a successful project.

Rules:

- Items must be designed to be used for home decorating, home furnishings or home management (No clothing, purses, note cards, scrapbooks/photo albums, etc).
- 2). Accessories should be of high quality (as compared to quick, simple crafts) that are suitable for use in the home several months throughout the year. Holiday specific items are discouraged. Exhibits made from kits are also discouraged as kits limit decision making in the design process.
- 3). Items should show creativity and originality, along with the application of design elements and principles. Youth are **required** to include the design elements and principles they used along with simple explanation of how they designed their project with their exhibit. Information on the elements and principles of design may be found in the Design Decisions manual, as well as Portfolio Pathways and Sketchbook Crossroads.
- 4) Entered in correct Class: What medium was changed or manipulated? What medium is the majority of your exhibit made from?
- 5) Items should be ready for display in the home (pictures framed, wall hangings and pictures ready to hang, etc.). No single matboard or artist canvas panels allowed. Wrapped canvas (if staples not visible on edge), is accepted without framing. Make sure hangers are strong enough to support the item. Command strips are not adequate hangers. Items not ready for display will be dropped one ribbon placing.
- Items should not be made for beginning level or another project (ex. Simple table runner or woodworking).

SUPPORTING INFORMATION is required for all Home Design and Restoration exhibits. Information must include the elements and principles of design used and steps taken to complete project. Tag templates can be found at the end of this

EXHIBIT GUIDELINES

In Quilt Quest, 4-Hers learn skills as they progress through the project. The least experienced 4-H exhibitor will select fabric, cut, and sew together only squares or rectangles in making the quilt top. They may have additional guidance in piecing the quilt block and layering together the quilt top, inner batting and the quilt bottom. Another person can do the quilting for them.

In the Premier Class, the 4-H'er has developed skills to be able to do all of the work by himself/herself. This includes pattern and fabric selection, cutting and sewing individual pieces, layering the quilt top/batting/backing together, and quilting. Quilting may be done by hand, by sewing machine or by a commercial-grade quilting machine. After quilting, the 4-Her must finish the quilt by "squaring it up," put binding on the edge, and placing a label on the quilt which provides details about the quilt making process for historical purposes. All entry cards and support information must be attached using a safety pin. Not Straight pins. When judging Quilt Quest exhibits, the judges consider SF209 "Standards for Judging Quilts and Quilted Items."

NOTE: All exhibits require completion of the Home Design & Restoration information sheet. Exhibits without supporting information will be dropped a ribbon placing.

For all Classes, 4-Hers can choose fabrics for the quilt by selecting fabric from fabric bolts. 4-Hers may also use "fabric collections" offered by manufacturers in a particular designer or fabric line. Examples of fabric collections include:

- **Jelly Rolls** are made of (up to) 40 different strips of 2 ½" wide fabric laying on top of one another and rolled up to look like a jelly roll. The fabric is created by one designer or fabric line and compliments each other. In many cases, less skilled 4-Hers find it difficult to cut narrow strips with a rotary cutter and ruler, so this fabric selection may make it easier as they learn.
- Honey Buns are made like the Jelly Rolls with 1 ½" strips of fabrics.
- Layer Cakes are 10" squares of fabric from a manufactured designer or fabric line with different pieces of fabric "layered" on top of one another to look like a piece of cake.
- Charm Packs are made of 5" squares of coordinating fabric and may be tied
 up with a string or scrap of fabric.
- Candies are 2 ½ " squares of coordinating fabric and may be tied up with a string or scrap of fabric.
- **Turnover** is a collection of coordinating fabrics that are cut into 6" triangles.
- Fat Quarters are ½ yard cuts of fabric which are cut in half to make a rectangle that is approximately 18" x 21". (One half yard of fabric yields 2 fat quarters). The "fat quarter" can be more economical to purchase for a smaller quilt because the purchaser does not have to buy the entire yardage width.
- Fabric Kit is a collection of fabrics cut in large pieces to accommodate the requirements of a particular quilt pattern. The 4-Her must cut out all of the

smaller squares, rectangles, etc. to make the quilt top according to the pattern directions.

After fabric selection, youth can use a variety tools for cutting the fabric and completing the quilt. Cutting into pattern pieces may include hand roller die cutting machines that cut particular shapes which can be appliqued to fabric. This is allowed in the construction of the quilt.

- A quilted exhibit is made up of at least 3 layers. Quilts or quilted items must be quilted or tied through all layers.
- Fleece blankets are not eligible for his division.
- Quilts must have a permanent label on the back in the bottom right corner with quilter's name and date of completion.

BARN QUILTS - A Barn Quilt is a large piece of wood that is painted to look like a quilt block. Supporting information is required for this exhibit. Information must also include elements or principles of design used and steps taken to complete project. Please note this is the Home Environment information sheet. Exhibits without supporting information will be dropped a ribbon placing.

EXPLORING QUILTS

A \$25 cash award for the best pie from Cooking 401 Class E413001 or County Only Pie class E941937. (This award is provided by the Dennis Valentine Family as a memorial to Alene Valentine and her love for baking pies).

Supportive Information: ALL FOOD EXHIBIT PRODUCTS MUST INCLUDE A RECIPE. Recipe may be handwritten, photocopied, or typed. Place the food on the appropriate size plate. Put exhibit in a self-sealing bag. Attach entry tag and recipe at the corner of the bag on the outside.

Criteria for Judging: Exhibits will be judged according to score sheets available. Make sure to follow all entry instructions required for your exhibit. Incomplete exhibits will be lowered a ribbon placing. Commercially prepared mixes are allowed in the Cooking 201 Creative Mixes (C 2) exhibit ONLY. Prepared baking mixes, biscuit mixes, or other pre-made mixes entered in other categories will be lowered a ribbon placing.

Food Projects: Exhibits should be exhibited using disposable materials, disposable pan, paper plate and plastic self-sealing bag. ***PLEASE NOTE- after baked goods are judged, they will go to the food stand to be sold. If you do NOT want your exhibit to be sold at the food stand, please indicate that at the time of check-in.

Ingredients: any ingredient that the 4-H member cannot legally purchase, such as beer, whiskey, rum, etc. may not be used in any recipe of Foods exhibit. Exhibits that include alcohol in the recipe will be disqualified.

Food Safety - exhibits are on display for several days. Please think FOOD SAFETY! Items that require refrigeration will not be accepted, judged or displayed. Food products must be unquestionably safe to eat when they are entered, whether tasted or not. Glazes, frostings and other sugar based toppings are also considered safe due to the high sugar content. Egg glazes on yeast products and pie crusts before baking are acceptable. Eggs incorporated into baked goods or crusts are considered safe.

The following food ingredients are considered unsafe for fair exhibits and will be disqualified:

Egg or cream cheese fillings and cream cheese frosting Any meat item including meat jerky, limitation meat bits (bacon bits, pepperoni, etc. Melted cheese on top of food exhibit (cheese mixed into baked goods is considered safe and will be accepted)
Uncooked fruit (fresh fruit tart).

Consider neatness and creativity.

E350002 Foods, And Nutrition Poster, Scrapbook, or Photo Display (SF 122) This project should involve a nutrition or food preparation technique or explore a career related to the food industry (caterer, restaurant owner, food scientist, registered dietitian, etc.). This might contain pictures, captions, and/or reports to highlight the concept. Exhibit may be a poster or foam core board (not to exceed 22" by 30"), computer based presentation printed off with notes pages, if needed, and displayed in binder, an exhibit display, a written report in portfolio or notebook. Consider neatness and creativity.

E350003 Physical Activity and Health Poster, Scrapbook, or Photo Display (SF 122) Open to any 4-H'er enrolled in a Foods and Nutrition project, involving a physical activity or career. The project should inolve a physical activity or explore a career-related to physical activity or health (personal trainer spors coach physical therapist, etc.) This might contain pictures, captions, and/or reports to highlight the concept. Exhibit may be a poster or foam core board (not to exceed 22" by 30"), computer based presentation printed off with notes pages, if needed, and displayed in binder, an exhibit display, a written report in portfolio or notebook. Consider neatness and creativity.

E 350004 Cooking Basics Recipe File (SF151) Collection of 10 recipes from any source. Each recipe may accompany a completed menu in which the recipe is used. An additional 10 recipes may be added each year 4H'er is in project, with year clearly marked on recipes. Display in recipe file or in a binder. Be sure to include the number of servings or yield of each recipe. This may be a continued recipe file project from the previously used 4-H curriculum before 2018. Exhibits that include recipes with alcohol (wine, beer, rum, ets.) will be disqualified.

DIVISION 410 - COOKING 201

- E401001 **Loaf Quick Bread** SF128 (any recipe) At least ¾ of a standard loaf displayed on a paper plate. Quick bread is any bread that does not require kneading or rising time and does NOT include yeast. Standard quick bread loaf measures approximately 8 ½" x 4 ½" or 9" x 5". If mini-loaf pans are used for exhibit, two loaves must be presented for judging.
- E410002 Creative Mixes SF142 (any recipe, at least 3/4 of baked product or 4 muffins or cookies on a paper plate. May be baked in a disposable pan.)

 Baked item made from a mix (commercial or homemade mixes acceptable).

 Food product must have been modified to make a new or different baked item. Examples include poppyseed quick bread from a cake mix, cake mix cookies, sweet rolls made from readymade bread dough, monkey breads from biscuit dough, streusel coffee cake from a cake mix, etc. Write what you learned about making this product using a mix instead of a homemade recipe or recipe "from scratch". Does it make it better or easier to use a convenience product or mix? Why or why not?
- E410003 **Biscuits or Scones** (SF136) Four biscuits or scones on a small paper plate. This may be any type of biscuit or scone: rolled, dropped. Any recipe may be used, but it must be a non-yeast product baked from scratch.
- E410004 **Healthy Baked Product** (SF124) (any recipe, at least 3/4 of baked product or 4 muffins or cookies on a paper plate. May be baked in a disposable pan.) Recipe must contain a fruit or vegetable as part of the ingredients (Ex. Banana bars, cantaloupe quick bread, zucchini muffins, etc.)
- E410005 **Coffee Cake** (SF 129) any recipe or shape, non-yeast product at least ¾ of baked product. May be baked in a disposable pan). Include menu for a complete meal where this recipe is served, following meal planning guidelines suggested in Cooking 201.
- E 410006 **Baking with Whole Grains** (SF 134) any recipe, at least ¾ of baked product or 4 muffins/cookies on a paper plate. May be baked in a disposable pan. Recipe must contain whole grains as part of the ingredients. (Ex. Whole wheat applesauce bread, peanut butter, oatmeal cookies, etc.)
- E410007 **Non-Traditional Baked Product** (SF 133) exhibit must include a food product prepared using a non-traditional method (i.e. bread machine, cake baked in an aif fryer, baked item made in microwave, etc.) Entry must be at least ¾ baked product or r muffins or cookies on a paper plate. Entry must include supporting information that discusses alternative preparation method and how it compares with traditional method.

DIVISION 411 COOKING 301

Any bread item prepared or baked using a bread machine should be entered under the Cooking 101, Non-Traditional Baked Product. All exhibits made in the Cooking 301 or Cooking 401 projects must have been prepared without assistance of a bread machine for mixing, rising, or baking of the food item.

E411001 White Bread (SF138) any yeast recipe - At least 3/4 of a standard loaf displayed on a paper plate.

- E411002 Whole Wheat or Mixed Grain Bread (SF138) (any yeast recipe) At least 3/4 of a standard loaf displayed on a paper plate.
- E411003 **Specialty Rolls** (SF13) (any yeast recipe) 4 rolls on a paper plate. May be sweet rolls, English muffins, kolaches, bagels, or any other similar recipe that makes individual portions.
- E411004 **Dinner Rolls** (SF138) (any yeast recipe) 4 rolls on a paper plate. May be cloverleaf, crescent, knot, bun, bread sticks, or any other type of dinner roll.
- E411005 **Specialty Bread** (SF141) any yeast recipe, includes tea rings, braids, or any other full-sized specialty bread products. Must exhibit at least ¾ of a full sized baked product. May be baked in a disposable pan.
- E411006 **Shortened Cake** (SF 137) NOT FROM A CAKE MIX! At least ¾ of the cake. Shortened cakes se fat for flavor and texture and recipes usually begin by beating fat with sugar for creaming, and include leavening agents in the recipe. Cakes may be frosted with a non-perishable frosting (no cream cheese or egg white based frostings allowed).

DIVISION 412 COOKING 401

Any bread item prepared or baked using a bread machine should be entered under the Cooking 201. All exhibits made in the Cooking 301 and 401 projects must have been prepared without the assistance of a bread machine for mixing, raising, or baking of the food item.

- E412001 **Double Crust Fruit Pie** SF144 Made with homemade fruit filling. No egg pastries or cream fillings. No canned fillings or premade pie crusts. May be a double crust, crumb, cut-out, or lattice topping. Using an 8- or 9-inch disposable pie pan is recommended.
- E412002 **Family Food Traditions** SF2012-002 (any recipe, at least 3/4 of baked product or 4 muffins or cookies on a paper plate. May be baked in a disposable pan.) Any baked item associated with family tradition and heritage. Entry must include (A) recipe, (B) tradition or heritage associated with preparing, serving the food, (C) where or who the traditional recipe came from.
- E412003 Ethnic Food Exhibit SF146 (any recipe, at least 3/4 of baked product or 4 muffins or cookies on a paper plate. May be baked in a disposable pan.) The name of the country, culture or region should be included as part of the supporting information with the recipe, as well as background information about the country or culture the food item is representing.
- E412004 **Candy** Scoresheet SF 147) any recipe, 4 pieces of candy on a paper plate or ½ cup. No items contain cream cheese will be accepted (Ex: cream cheese mints). Candy may be cooked or no cook; dipped, molded, made in the microwave or other methods of candy preparation. Recipe must be included.
- E410005 **Foam Cake** SF134 original recipe (no mixes) of at least ¾ of the cake. Foam cakes are cakes that have a high ratio of eggs to flour and fall into three categories: angel food cakes or meringues; sponge or jelly roll cakes; and chiffon cakes. Cakes may be frosted with a non-perishable frosting (no cream cheese or egg white based frostings allowed).

E413006 **Specialty Pastry** SF143 - (any recipe, at least 3/4 of baked product or 4 muffins or cookies on a paper plate. May be baked in a disposable pan.)

Baked items such as pie tarts, puff pastry, phyllo doughs, scones, biscotti, choux, croissants, Danish, strudels. Phyllo dough may be pre-made or from scratch. Pastries made with cream or egg based fillings will be disqualified.

Cakes, Pies, Cake Decorating, Bread Machine Fun areas are open to all exhibitors enrolled in a food project.

FOOD PRESERVATION

ALL FOOD ITEMS MUST INCLUDE A RECIPE. ONE ENTRY PER CLASS

Processing Methods - Current USDA processing methods and altitude adjustments must be followed for all food preservation. Jams, preserves and marmalades, fruit, tomatoes and pickled vegetables must be processed in a boiling water bath. (Tomatoes may be processed in a pressure canner). All non-acid vegetables and meats must be processed in a pressure canner. Improperly canned or potentially hazardous food items will be disqualified. Spoiled or unsealed container disqualifies entry.

Jars and Lids Do not need to be the same brand. Half pint jars may be used for jellies and preserves. The jars are not to be decorated in any way. Canning jars must be used, others will be disqualified. No one fourth pint jars allowed. Leave jar rings on for fair display, it helps protect the seal. Two-piece lids consisting of a flat metal disk and a ring should be used. No zinc lids or one-piece lids.

Current Project – Exhibits must have been preserved since the member's previous year's county fair, and not been exhibited at the previous State Fair.

Criteria For Judging – exhibits will be judged according to score sheets available at local Extension office or the State Fairbook at http://fairbook.unl.edu/fairbookview.php/rules. Incomplete exhibits will be lowered a ribbon. Canned food items not processed according to altitude in the county will be lowered one ribbon. Check with your local extension office or this site http://food.u;nl.edu/canning#elevation for your county's attitude and how that affects food processing times and pounds of pressure.

Labeling: Jars should be labeled with the name of the food item, name of the 4-H'er, county and date of processing on the bottom of each jar. Exhibits containing multiple jaars such as a "3 jar exhibit" should be placed in a container to keep jars together. Each bag containing dried foods should also be labeled with the name of the food item, the name of the 4-H'ers, county and drying date. Multiple dried food exhibits should be secured by a rubber band or "twisty" to keep exhibit containing the 3 self-sealed bags together.

Recipe/ Support Information— Recipe must be included, may be handwritten, photocopied or typed. Commercially prepared seasoning mixes are not allowed. Current USDA guidelines for food preservation methods MUST be followed.

See http://food.unl.edu/web/preservation/home for current USDA guidelines, how to find your Nebraska altitude, and proper procedures for food preservation. Jars should be labeled with name of 4-H'er, county, and name of product and date of processing. Write plainly on a label and paste or tape securely on jar bottom. In addition:

All canned foods must include the following support information:

- 1. Name of product
- 2. Date preserved
- 3. Method of preservation (pressure canner or water bath canner)
- 4. Type of pack (raw pack or hot pack)
- 5. Altitude (and altitude adjustment if needed)
- 6. Processing time
- 7. Number of pounds of pressure (if pressure canner used)
- 8. Drying method and drying time (for dried food exhibits).
- 9. Recipe and source of recipe (if a publication, include name and date).

Recipes can come from any source but current USDA guidelines for food preservation methods MUST be followed. Check website for current guidelines.

Supporting information must include both the recipe for the produce that was frozen as part of this project AND the baked food item.

DIVISON 407 UNIT 2 DRYING PROJECT

- E407001 **Dried Fruit** Exhibit 3 different examples of dried fruit. Place each dried fruit food (6-10 pieces of fruit, minimum 1/4 cup) in separate self-sealing bags. Use a rubber band or "twisty" to keep exhibit together.
- E407002 **Fruit Leather -** Exhibit 3 different examples of 3 different fruit leathers. Place a 3-4" sample of each fruit together in separate self-sealing bags. Use a rubber band or "twisty" to keep exhibit together.
- E407003 **Vegetable Leather** exhibit 3 different examples of 3 different vegetable or vegetable/fruit leather combo. Place a 3-4" sample of each leather together in separate self-sealing bags. Use a rubber band or "twisty" to keep exhibit together.

E407006 **Baked Item Made With Dried Produce/Herbs** – any recipe, at least ¾ of baked product or 4 muffins or cookies on a paper plate or in a disposable pan. Recipe MUST include a dried produce/herb item made by the 4-H"er. Granola bar made with dried fruits, dried cranberry cookies, Italian herb bread, lemon thyme cookies. Supporting information must include both the recipe for the dried produce/herb AND the baked food item.

DIVISION 408 UNIT 3 BOILING WATER CANNING

- E408001 **1 Jar Fruit Exhibit -** One jar of a canned fruit. Entry must be processed in the boiling water bath according to current USDA recommendations.
- E408002 **3 Jar Exhibit** Exhibit 3 jars of different canned fruits. May be three different techniques for same type of product, ex. Applesauce, canned apples, apple pie filling, etc. Entry must be processed in the boiling water bath according to current USDA recommendations.
- E408003 **1 Jar Tomato Exhibit -** One jar of a canned tomato product. Entry must be processed in a boiling water bath according to current USDA recommendations.
- E408004 **3 Jar Tomato Exhibit** Exhibit 3 jars of different canned tomato products (salsa, sauces without meats, juice, stewed, etc.). Entry must be processed in a boiling water bath according to current USDA recommendations.
- E408005 1 Jar Pickled Exhibit One jar of a pickled and/or fermented product. Entry must be processed in a boiling water bath according to current USDA recommendations.
- E408006 **3 Jar Exhibit** Three jars of different kinds of canned pickled and/or fermented products. Entry must be processed in a boiling water bath according to current USDA recommendations.
- E408007 1 Jar Jelled Exhibit One jar of a jam, jelly or marmalade. Entry must be processed in a boiling water bath according to current USDA recommendations.
- E4080408 **3 Jar Jelled Exhibit** Three different kinds of jelled products. Entry may be made up of either pints or half pints. Entry must be processed in a boiling water bath according to current USDA recommendations.

- E4140001 1 Jar Vegetable OR Meat Exhibit One jar of a canned vegetable or meat. Include only vegetables and meat canned in a pressure canner according to current USDA recommendations.

- E414004 **Quick Dinner** Exhibit a minimum of 3 jars to a maximum of 5 jars plus menu. Meal should include 3 canned foods that can be prepared within an hour. List complete menu on a 3" X 5" file card and attach to one of the jars. Entry must be processed according to current USDA recommendations.
- E414005 **Jar Tomato Exhibit -** One jar of a canned tomato product. Entry must be processed in a pressure canner according to current USDA recommendations.
- E414006 **3 Jar Tomato Exhibit** Exhibit 3 jars of different canned tomato products (salsa, sauces without meats, juice, stewed, etc.). Entry must be processed in a pressure canner according to current USDA recommendations.

<u>Division 300</u> YOUTH In Motion (county only)

- *E300901 Youth in Motion Poster, Scrapbook or Photo Display Exhibit about the 4-H'er or the 4-H'ers family involved in a physical activity or concept/lesson involving this project. This might contain pictures, captions, and/or reports about the physical activity the individual or family did as a result of taking this project.

DO NOT put valuable items (i.e. electronics) in Activity Bag, instead use a picture of the item or include in the listing of items.
- *E300903 YOUTH in Motion Healthy Snack Recipe File collection of 10 recipes from any source. Each recipe must accompany a complete snack menu in which the recipe is used following the idea that a healthy snack includes foods from at least two different food groups. An additional 10 recipes may be added each year 4H'er is in project, with year clearly marked on recipes. Consider creativity and neatness. Display in recipe file or box, or a binder. Be sure to include the number of servings or yield of each recipe.
- *E300904 Healthy Lifestyle Interview Interview someone in your life that you have admired that is physically active or has a healthy lifestyle. Why do they enjoy their exercise program? What are their goals? Why do you admire them? Maximum of two pages, one sided write up of an interview with someone who has an active exercise program or has a healthy lifestyle. Consider creativity and neatness. Mount on colored paper or poster board or display in binder. Include a picture of the person interviewed. (May be laminated to preserve exhibit). Overall size of mounted exhibit should be no larger than 9 x 12 inches.
- *E300905 **Healthy Snack** See ideas for non-perishable snacks on page 36. Four cookies, bars, muffins, etc., on a paper plate or at least 1 cup of mix, (examples might include: granola bars, homemade crackers or chips). Supporting information to include recipe and why this snack menu might be considered a healthy snack.

DIVISION 440 - CITIZEN SAFETY

Purple \$4.00 Blue - \$3.00 Red - \$2.00 White - \$1.50

In this category 4-H'ers have the opportunity to create exhibits from fire and basic safety strategies. Through involvement in this category, 4-H'ers will be better

educated about personal safety and knowledge base to educate others about safety.

FIRST AID KIT:

E440001 - A **first aid kit** is a good way to organize supplies in an emergency. The kit should be assembled in a container appropriate for the kit's intended use. A description of where the kit will be stored and examples of specific emergencies for that situation should be included in the exhibit. The kit should include a written inventory and purpose statement for included items. Items should cover the following areas: airway and breathing, bleeding control, burn treatment, infectious disease protection, fracture care and miscellaneous supplies. Use Citizen Safety manual, 4-H 425, pages 6 & 7 for guidance.

Kits containing any of the following will be automatically disqualified:

- Prescription medications. (If the kit's purpose is to provide medication for someone with special needs, explain in the written description and inventory, but remove the medication.)
- Materials with expiration dates on or before the judging date. (This includes sterile items, non-prescription medications, ointments, salves, etc. Articles dated month and year only are considered expired on the last day of that month.)
- 3. Any controlled substance.
- E440002 **Disaster Kits (Emergency Preparedness)** (SF111) must contain the materials to prepare a person or family for emergency conditions caused by a natural or man-made incident. Selection of materials is left to the exhibitor. Family or group kits must have enough material or items for each person. A description of the kit's purpose, the number of people supported and a list of contents is required. Youth are encouraged to test their kit by challenging their family to try to survive using only the included materials for the designated time. If tested, share that experience in kit documentation. Please include an explanation of drinking water needs for your disaster kit. Do not bring actual water to the fair in the kit.
- E440003 **Safety Scrapboo**k (SF190) must contain 15 news articles from print and/or internet sources about various incident types. Mount each clipping on a separate page accompanied by a description of events leading to the incident and any measures that might have prevented it. The Scrapbook should be bound in a standard size hardcover binder or notebook for 8 ½" X 11" size paper. Correct sentence structure, readability and thorough explanations are an important part of judging.
- E440004 Safety Experience (SF190) The exhibit should share a learning experience the youth had related to safety. Examples could be participating in a first aid or first responder training, a farm safety day camp, babysitting workshop or similar event; scientific experiment related to safety; or the youth's response to an emergency situation. The exhibit should include a detailed description of the experience, the youth's role, some evidence of the youth's leadership in the situation and a summary of the learning that took place. Exhibits may be presented in a poster with supplemental documentation, a notebook including up to ten pages of narrative and pictures, or a multimedia presentation on a CD lasting up to five minutes.
- E440005 Careers in Safety (SF191) The exhibit should identify a specific career area in the safety field and include education and certification requirements for available positions, salary information, demand for the field and a summary of the youth's interest in the field. Examples of careers include firefighters,

paramedics, emergency management personnel, some military assignments, law enforcement officers, emergency room medical personnel, fire investigator and more. It is recommended youth interview a professional in the field in their research. Additional research sources might include books, articles, career web sites, job-related government web sites or interviews with career placement or guidance counselors. Exhibits may be presented in a poster with supplemental documentation, a notebook including up to ten pages of narrative and pictures, or a multimedia presentation on a CD lasting up to five minutes.

E450001- This is a home floor plan drawn **to scale** showing primary and secondary escape routes and where fire extinguishers and smoke detectors are located. Use **red** arrows showing **secondary** routes to use if the primary routes are blocked. Primary and secondary escape routes must lead outside to an assembly location. Documentation should include evidence the escape plan has been practiced at least four times. Posters must be constructed of poster board at least 11" x 14" but not larger than 22" x 28".

FIRE SAFETY SCRAPBOOK

E450002 - The scrapbook must contain 10 news articles from print and/or internet sources about fires to residential or commercial properties or landscapes. Mount each clipping on a separate page accompanied by a description of events leading to the incident and any measures that might have prevented it. The Scrapbook should be bound in a standard size hardcover binder or notebook for 8 ½" X 11" size paper. Correct sentence structure, readability and thorough explanations are an important part of judging.

FIRE PREVENTION POSTER

E450003 - Posters should promote a fire prevention message and be appropriate to display during National Fire Prevention Week or to promote fire safety at specific times of the year (Halloween, 4th of July, etc.). Originality, clarity and artistic impression will all be judged. Do not include live fireworks, matches or other flammable/ explosive/ hazardous materials. Any entry containing this material will be disqualified. Posters must be constructed of commercial poster board at least 11" x 14" but not larger than 22" x 28".

DIVISION 531 - ENTREPRENEURSHIP

- Show What You Did and Learned All exhibitors will show evidence of their personal field experiences, research observations that relate to their exhibit. This helps judges understand what was done and what was learned in the process that led to the exhibit.
- Proper Credit Show proper credit by listing the sources of plans or other supporting information used in exhibits.
- 3. Whose Exhibit? Label the name, county age on back or bottom of all displays
- 4. **Wildlife & Wildlife Laws** "Animal or Wildlife" in the following classes includes wild fish, amphibians, reptiles, birds or mammals. Please make sure you are following all appropriate wildlife laws. Domestic animal (i.e. domestic livestock or house pets) and insect exhibits are not appropriate for this area.

- 5. Project Materials: Related project booklets include Exploring Your Environment, 4-H Shooting Sports, Amphibians, Bird Behavior, Fishing, Wildlife Conservation. Geology, and Outdoor Adventure. Other resources include: Outdoor Skills,: Learning Science in the Outdoors series (Signature Outcome Program) ourdoornebraska.gov/afterschool/ and www.whep.org.
- Board and Poster Exhibits these are displays that show educational information about a topic of interest. Board exhibits can hold objects such as fishing equipment or casts of animal tracks. Mount all board exhibits on 1/4" plywood, Masonite or similar panel 24" high by 24" wide. Poster exhibits should be on regular poster sheets, no larger than standard size (22 by 28") but half size, 22 by 14" is recommended.
- 7. Exhibits Size: Exhibits other than poster/display board should not exceed 48 inches x 48 inches and able to be moved by two people.

DIVISION 340 - Wildlife/Conservation

D340001 Mammal Display D340002 Bird Display D340003 Fish Display

D340004 Reptile or Amphibian Display

- Classes 1-4 are board or poster exhibits. Display may show any aspect of wildlife, wildlife habitat or related conservation. Examples: Life history or other facts about one type of wildlife; how to manage wildlife on a farm or in town; managing habitat for one kind of wildlife; life requirements for one kind of wildlife during one season or through the year; wildlife. For more ideas, refer to project booklets.
- D340005 Wildlife Connections -- board or poster exhibit. The purpose of this among animals, plants, and other habitat components. All displays should show two or more interactions (connections) that occur between/among animals or between animals and their habitat. Displays might show how animals interact with other animals, with people, or with their habitat. Examples: Food chain display. Use pictures, drawings, or other items to illustrate the source of food energy and where it goes -- who eats whom or what. Use arrows to show the direction of the energy (food) flow. Show the role of predators, scavengers, insect eaters, or others in nature. Show how wildlife numbers (populations) change through the year. Show predation, competition, or other behavioral interactions of wildlife. Choose one kind of wildlife and make observations through a season or year, keep notes of interactions, then make a display of what you saw.
- D340006 Wildlife Tracks --board or diorama-type exhibit. Make a display of animal tracks using plaster-of-paris casts. There are three options. For all option, include a brief description of your experiences in making the tracks so the judge better understands what you did and learned. Positive casts (impressions as they would be in nature) are preferred but not required.

Option 1, should show plaster-of-paris tracks of five, or more kinds of wildlife along with an illustration of each kind of animal.

Option 2 should show two or more plaster-of-paris tracks of one specific kind of wildlife and should include a picture or illustration of the animal, what the animal may eat, and what may eat the animal OR

Option 3 should show two tracks and include the animal's habitat needs including preferred food, shelter, water, and space in addition to picture or illustration of the animal

- D340007 **Wildlife Knowledge Check** -- Use electrical circuits, pictures, or other methods of teaching wildlife identification or other wildlife related knowledge. Plan size and shape to facilitate transportation and display; maximum size 24 x 24
- D340008 Wildlife Habitat Diorama -- box must be no larger than 24" by 24". The exhibit might show a grassland, prairie, agricultural, woodland, riparian (stream or river corridor) wetland, and/or other area with wildlife habitat. Example: show a large unbroken grassland or prairie for area-sensitive species such as meadowlarks, greater prairie-chicken, lark bunting, grasshopper sparrows, Ferruginous hawk, burrowing owl, horned lark, upland sandpiper, or pronghorn; AND/OR show an area interspersed with several habitats such as windbreaks, farm fields, woods, waste areas, ditches, and pastures for edge-adapted species such as white-tailed deer, Northern bobwhite, ring-necked pheasants, mourning doves, cottontail rabbits, fox squirrels, Northern cardinals, or blue jays. Label the habitats displayed and show at least five kinds of wild animals in their proper habitats.
- D340009 **Wildlife Essay** -- learn how to share educational information by writing. Choose a conservation or wildlife topic that interests you and write an essay about it. For example, write about a particular species of wildlife that you have observed or about the values of wildlife on a farm, at a backyard feeder, or at other places. You might write about hunting, fishing, or ethics and proper behavior for hunting or fishing. The essay is between 100 and 1,000 words long and typed, double spaced, on paper. You might use books, magazines, or personal interviews as resources, but you must give credit to all sources by listing them.
- D340010 **Wildlife Values Scrapbook** -- make a scrapbook about the various values of wildlife (commercial value, game value, genetic value, aesthetic value, ecological value, scientific value) following guidelines in the Wildlife Conservation project booklet (4-H 125).
- D340011 **Wildlife Arts** -- the purpose of this is to allow artistic exhibits that contain educational information about conservation and wildlife. Examples might include paintings, photographs, wood carvings, or painted duck decoys. Entries must be appropriate for fair display and no larger than 24" by 24". For example, paintings or photographs should be displayed in notebook format or mounted on a sturdy display panel. All entries must include a title and brief explanation of the purpose or message (what is the exhibit meant to show).

DIVISION 342 - WILDLIFE HABITAT

- D342001 **Houses** -- make a house for wildlife. Examples: bird house (bluebird) purple martin, wood duck, kestrel, barn owl, etc.) or bat house/no insect houses. Make the house functional so that dimensions, hole size, etc. are appropriate to fit the intended species' needs. Include the following information: 1) the kinds of animal(s) for which the house is intended, 2) where and how the house should be located for best use and 3) any seasonal maintenance needed. Tips: check Neb Guide on bird houses and shelves
- D342002 **Feeders/Waterers** Make a bird bath or bird feeder. Examples: Seed, suet or nectar feeders. Squirrel feeder okay; no insect feeders. Indicate the kinds of animal(s) for which the feeder or waterer is intended. Make the feeder or waterer functional so that it fits wildlife needs. Include the following information: 1) where and how the feeder or waterer should be located for best use, 2) how it should be maintained. Tips: check NebGuide on feeding birds.

D342003 Wildlife Habitat Design Board or Poster Exhibit. Choose a backyard, acreage, or farm and design a habitat plan to meet the food, water, shelter, and space needs of at least three kinds of animals you would like to attract. Draw an outline of the area and show what plants or other habitat will be provided. Indicate how the various parts of your plan provide the desired habitat needs. You might include an aerial photo of the area if you have one.

DIVISION 343 - HARVESTING EQUIPMENT

- D343001 **Fish Harvesting Equipment** *board exhibit*. Display of equipment used in fish harvesting. Examples: fishing know, hooks (with corks over ends for safety), lures. Label all items displayed. Include in your exhibit the following information: the purpose of each item, when or where it is used in relation to other equipment and indicate personal experiences you've had with the item.
- D343002 **Build a Fishing Rod** -- build your own fishing rod for exhibit and for fishing use. Rod building blanks and kits with instructions are available for this purpose. A fishing rod educational exhibit may not exceed 96 inches length. Exhibit must be mounted on a board and labeled with the member's name, county and class number. Include with the exhibit the following items as a brief attachment: Explanation of cost of materials/components, where materials/ components were purchased, how many number of hours required for construction.
- -Identify all parts. Necessary components which must be included are grip, line guides, (based on manufacturers specifications), guide wraps, and hook keeper. Reel seat needs to be aligned with guides, and guides aligned accurately down rod. Guide wraps of size A to D, nylon or silk thread.
- -Exhibit will be judged on: workmanship, labeling of parts (guides, etc.) correct information, and neatness.
- D343003 Casting Target -- make a casting target for exhibit and use the following guidelines. Target must be under 36" x 36". The bullseyes/rings must be 1 foot in diameter and can have up to 3 rings. They must be easy to store, durable, and weather resistant.
- D343004 Wildlife Harvesting Equipment -- Board Exhibit. Display of equipment used in harvesting wildlife. Examples: expended ammunition casing (no live ammunition permitted), steel traps, hide stretchers, fleshers, etc. For displays of shotguns, rifles, or bows, use drawings or pictures. Label all items displayed. Include in your exhibit the following information: the purpose of each item, when or where it is used in relation to other equipment, and any personal experiences you've had with the item(s).
- D343005 Inventing Wildlife/Fish Harvesting Equipment, Air or Accessory Use engineering principles to invent or adapt equipment that helps you harvest fish or wildlife. This could include wildlife calls, adapted fishing pole for shallow water, a blind, decoys, etc... Share your drawing (or adapted plans), how the equipment works, how you tested it, and the results of testing your prototype and any adjustments you made.

DIVISION 341 - Outdoor Adventures Level 2

D341001 **Poster** – Topic may include, but not limited to one or more of the following; how to pitch a tent, knot tying, cooking over a campfire, how to start a campfire, wildlife and plants identified while camping, how to set up emergency shelter, dealing with weather, collection of photos from camping trips, "Leave No Trace" and how that was followed while camping, plan a camping trip, camping essentials,

- environmental issues/protecting natural resources, park or trail clean up, sanitation/hygiene while outdoors or use of GPS
- D341002 **Journal/Binder** written report of virtual or actual camping/hiking trips with observations OR field journal (notes of actual experiences, sights, sound, smells, etc.), OR camping or hiking trip diary. Explain growth in project, leading the hikes, planning the camping trip, now being able to identify the wildlife and nature around you and how identified (sight/sound/shape/smell/color). Feathers/leaf/flower pressings must be securely attached, in included. Photos of drawing of observations encouraged. Exhibits measure no larger than 16 inches x 16 inches.
- D341003 Camping/Hiking Safety Must include explanation of use of item and why selected/purpose, how it fits hiking/camping needs. May include, but are not limited to, one of the following: travel sized poisonous plants guide, camping first aid kit, weather/water safety or hand hygiene kit.
- D341004 Digital Media -- Use digital media to show video/slideshow/presentation of setting up a tent (include why site is chosen) it protecting natural resources or environmental issues or computer video camping/hiking game. Submit a USB drive or DVD inside a report cover or notebook. If using a slideshow, include printed slides inside report cover or notebook.
- D341005 Other Camping Items Must include what inspired to creation of the item, and its purpose. May include, but not limited to one of the following; nature art, nature haiku poem, spider web sketches or knot display.

Outdoor Adventures Level 3

- D341006 **Poster** Topic may include, but not limited to one of the following; Topographic map, backpacking trip plan, camp layout, plan an expedition (can be dreamed or lived), collection of photos from you expedition, trails hiked, cost comparison of rental vs purchase or using GPS/compass.
- D341007 **Journal/Binder** written report of virtual or actual camping/hiking trips with observations OR field journal (notes of actual experiences, sights, sound, smells, etc.), OR camping or hiking trip diary. Explain growth in project, challenges in leading a group, teaching others about wildlife and nature identification and "Leave No Trace" Exhibits measure no larger than 16 inches x 16 inches.
- D341008 **Expedition Safety** Must include an explanation of use of items, why selected/purpose of item, how it meets hiking/camping/expedition needs. May include but are not limited to; travel sized edible plants, creepy crawly guide, tent repair kit, travel first aid kit or weather/water safety.
- D341009 Digital Media -- Use digital media to show video/slideshow/presentation of building a non-tent shelter (include why needed), packing your backpact/equipment and getting it onto you, teaching others about environmental issues or a computer video backpacking expedition game. Submit a USB drive or DVD inside a report cover or notebook. If using a slideshow, include printed slides inside report cover or notebook.
- D341010 Other Expedition Items Must include what inspired to creation of the item, and its purpose. May include, but not limited to one of the following; nature art, nature cinquain poem, backpacking food recipes, hiking/expedition conditioning plan, charcoal etching, dehydrated meal or snack (at least 1 cup displayed in a resealable plastic bag with ingredients, instructions, and nutritional facts included). Exhibits measure no larger than 18 inches x 24 inches..

DIVISION 346 - Taxidermy

- D346001 **Tanned Hides** any legal fish bird, or other wild animal properly processed by the member. No requirements as to size or mounting. Include the following information: 1) the animal's name and 2) information about exhibitor's personal field experience, study or observations that relate to exhibit.
- D346002 **Taxidermy-** (SF172) Any legal fish, bird, or other wild animal properly processed by the member. No requirement as to size or mounting/ Include the following information: The animals name, information about the exhibitor's personal field experiences, study, or observations that relate to the exhibit.

DIVISION 347 - 4-H SHOOTING SPORTS

4-H Shooting Sports requires youth to be under the direct leadership of a certified 4-H Shooting Sports Leader in either shotgun, rifle (bb gun), archery, pistol, blackpowder/muzzleloader, and/or hunting skills. No firearms can be entered as an exhibit, nor live ammunition; however information can be shared through pictures.

Classes 004-009 can be entered by anyone in the conservation and wildlife area.

D347001 Shooting Aid or Accessory – Any item which helps the shooter/hunter better perform their sport. Examples: rifle sling, kneeling roll, arm guard, shotgun vest, target boxes, shooting stick, etc. Include your design, or plans you adapted, what the item is and used for.

D347002, Storage Case – an item with the purpose to safely hold a firearm, bow, ammunition, and/or arrows. Examples: soft sided shotgun case, quivers, firearm safe. Include your design, or plans you adapted. Explain how the storage case is used.

D347003, **Practice Game or Activity** – invent or adapt an activity to practice or teach a project skill. Include pictures of youth playing the game, testimonials of 4-H members who played the game, what skill is being worked on, and directions for the game. Explain how you came up with the game or adapted it to fit the needs of your group members.

D347004, Science, Engineering, Technology Advancements of Shooting Sports, Conservation, or Wildlife Essay or Display – Choose a specific area of shooting sports and share how it has advanced, include a timeline and photos or illustrations. Keep your topic narrow and manageable. Essays are limited to 1000 words and should be on 8 ½ x 11 paper.

D347005, **Healthy Lifestyles Plan** – Include a shooter's (hiker's, camper's, angler's) diet and exercise plan, and how the 4-H member will benefit or improve from following the plan. Ideally, the 4-H member would follow the plan and include some journal entries about adaptions or improvements made while following the plan.

D347006, Citizenship/Leadership Project – Share a display on a citizenship project or leadership project the 4-H member took on individually or with a group to improve some aspect related to 4-H Shooting Sports, Conservation, or Wildlife. Examples could be range development, conservation planting to attract wildlife, a camp, or 4-H recruitment event. Include who benefitted from the project, what the 4-H member's role was, and any results.

D347007, Career Development/College Essay, Interview or Display –Research opportunities for careers related to this area or opportunities for college majors or college activities to help discover using project skills beyond a person's 4-H career. Essays are limited to 1000 words and should be on 8 ½ x 11 paper. Interviews need to include a picture of the interviewee in their work setting, questions asked, and a transcript of answers.

D347008, Community Vitality Display – Explore the difference shooting sports, conservation, fishing, and hunting make in keeping Nebraska vibrant especially in rural areas. Present facts and research in an interesting way for the public to learn from

D347009, Ag Literacy-Value Added Agriculture Interview or Research Project – Explore how traditional ag producers are adding value to their production agriculture operations through conservation efforts, hunting, raising pheasants, shooting sports related tourism, etc...Present findings in an interesting way for the public to learn from.

*D347920, Project of your choice County Only. Could be a display or Educational Poster showing knowledge learned by participating in Shooting Sports.

DIVISION 361 - Other Natural Resources - Geology -

D361001 Design your own exhibit in Natural Resources, Conservation or Ecology - this class is for educational exhibits about natural resources, conservation, wildlife, or ecology that do not fit into other categories. Entries must be appropriate for fair display and no larger than 24" x 24". All entries must include a title and should be clear (a brief explanation or other method) about the intended purpose or message - what the exhibit is meant to show. Think about accuracy, creativity, educational value for viewers, and evidence of exhibitor's personal experiences and learning.

Geology displays - County only

Display in a box of your choice, no larger than 24" x 24" x 3". If the box has a sliding cover, use plexiglass (not glass). Arrange and secure rock collection with label located below specimen. Label should include the specimen, date collected, specimen name or description and locality (county where collected).

*D361901 Field Trip tools – put together a kit of items helpful for collecting rocks. Make a list naming each and telling why you choose what you did for your kit.

*D361902 Display and label at least 15 different rocks.

*D361903 Display at least 30 different rocks, minerals, and fossils. Display by proper groups.

*D361904 Create an art display/project utilizing small rocks you have found.

DIVISION 320 - FORESTRY

Purple - \$3.00 Blue - \$2.50 Red - \$2.00 White - \$1.50

This category provides 4-H'ers an opportunity to prepare displays that shows their expertise in many aspects of forestry. Involvement in this category will lead to expansion of seed, twig, wood, leaf and tree knowledge for 4-H'ers. In addition, participants would learn more about common Nebraskan trees. For more information about tree classification visit this website 4hcurriculum.unl.edu/index.php/main/program_project/65.

- The official reference for all forestry projects is The Tree Identification Manual (4H332). Other helpful forestry references include Trees of NE (EC 9201774-X), Leafing Out (4H431) and Plant a Tree (EC 17-11-80).
- 2. Display Board must be made from wood or wood composite, e.g. plywood, fiberboard or Masonite 1/4" to ½" thick and no larger than 24 x 24". Display boards may be coated, e.g., painted, varnished on both sides to prevent warping.
 - 3. Display posters must be made from a material, e.g. foam board or poster board that will stand upright without buckling, and will be no larger than 24" x 24".
- 4. Display books must measure no more than 16 x 16".
- 5. At least 5 of the 10 samples in C 2,3,4,and 5 must be from the list of 60 species described in 4-H 332. Samples must be from 10 different tree species. For example, Emerald Queen Maple and Crimson King Maple are both varieties of the same species (Norway Maple), and thus have the same genus and species name, i.e., Acer platanoids. All samples must be from trees, NO shrubs. If more than 10 samples are included in the display, only the first 10 samples from the current year will be judged.
 - 6. Due to emerald ash borer infestation, no true ash species (Green Ash, White Ash, Black Ash or Blue Ash) may be included in any collections. Inclusive of a true ash species will result in the project being disqualified.
- 7. Remember that other general labeling standards apply. For example, scientific names are <u>always</u> italicized or underlines. Also, the first letter of a Genus name is always capitalized. The first letter of a species name is always lower case. When required, always indicate <u>complete</u> scientific names (Genus and species) and common names, (e.g. Norway Maple) even when variety names are included. For example, the scientific name of Emerald Queen Maple is <u>Acer platanoides</u> and the common name is Norway maple. "Emerald Queen" may be included as the variety name, but variety names are not required.
- 8. How well the exhibitor follows written directions is an important factor in judging.

D320001 DESIGN-YOUR-OWN EXHIBIT

Prepare and educational exhibit-about some aspect of trees, forests, or forestry that is of special interest to you. Possible topics include paper recycling, wild fire, forest products, forest wildlife, or forest pests. The only requirement is that the display must be no larger than 24" x 24" x 24". Photographs, drawings, samples, charts, posters, etc. can be used but include enough information to adequately explain the topic. Your display should be substantially different from other display Classes. Be as creative as you like.

D320002 LEAF DISPLAY

The leaf display must include samples of "complete leaves" from at least10 different tree species. The display must include at least two samples of simple leaves, compound leaves, and conifer leaves. Leaves should be pressed, dried, and mounted.

Collection: Whenever possible, collect leaves from mature trees. Collect leaves any time after they have reached full size, usually beginning in early summer. Leaf samples should be in good condition and representative of the average leaves on the tree. Keep in mind that shaded leaves are often much larger than normal. Carefully remove leaves from the twig with the entire petiole or rachis. After collection, fresh leaf samples can be temporarily stored within the pages of an old magazine, but they should be properly pressed and dried for display. Be sure to record pertinent information during collection. All collection must be done by the exhibitor.

Mounting: Leaves may be displayed in a notebook or on a display board. Any method may be used to mount leaves, but be sure all their features can be identified.

Labeling: The label for each sample must include:

- 1) common name
- 2) scientific name
- 3) leaf type
- 4) Leaf arrangement (for broadleaf trees)
- 5) leaf composition (for broadleaf trees)
- 6) collector's name
- 5) collection date
- 8) collection location (be specific, state and county at a minimum).

If a twig is included with a sample, indicate "twig included" on the label. For example, the twig may be included with an eastern red cedar sample because the leaves are very small and difficult to remove from the twig.

Supporting information, e.g. general uses, common products, fall color, etc., may be included with the display to enhance its educational value.

D320003 TWIG DISPLAY

The twig display must include twig samples from at least10 different tree species. The display must include at least two samples each of opposite and alternate leaf arrangements from broadleaf trees.

Collection twigs: Twig samples should be collected during the dormant season (November – April) when the buds are mature. Twig samples must be at least 6 inches and exhibit buds. Leaves must be removed and side branches must be trimmed to less than 1 inch in length. All collection must be done by the exhibitor.

Mounting: Twigs must be mounted on a display board. Any method, e.g. wire, glue, tape, staples, plastic bags, may be used to mount twigs, but be sure all their features can be clearly identified. The non-terminal end must be cut at a slant so the pith can be seen.

Labeling: The label for each sample must include;

- 1) common name
- 2) scientific name
- 3) leaf arrangement (for broadleaf trees)
- 4) collector's name
- 5) collection date
- 6) collection location (be specific, state and county at a minimum).

Supplemental information, e.g. general uses, tree characteristics, etc., may be included with the display to enhance its educational value.

D320004 SEED DISPLAY

The seed display must include seed samples from at least 10 different tree species.

Collection: Tree seeds should be collected at the time of year when they are mature, which varies widely depending upon tree species. For example, Silver maple seeds mature in May while red oak acorns do not mature until September. Seed samples should be free of insect or disease symptoms. Remember to display seeds not fruit. For example, the seed of honey locust is enclosed in a pod. Remove and display the seed, not just the pod. It is acceptable to display the fruit with the seed, but clearly label each. All collection must be done by the exhibitor.

Mounting: Seeds may be displayed in a variety of ways, i.e. mounted on a display board, displayed in jars in a rack, etc., but they must be securely mounted and easily viewed. Be as creative as you like.

Labeling: The labels for each sample must include:

- 1) common name
- 2) scientific name
- 3) type of fruit, if known (e.g. samara, pod, nut, legume, etc.)
- 4) collector's name
- 5) collection date
- 6) collection location (be specific state and county at a minimum).

Supplemental information, e.g. maturity date, average number of seed in the fruit, etc., may be included to enhance its educational value.

D320005 WOOD DISPLAY

The wood display must include wood samples from at least 10 different tree species.

Preparation: Samples may be of any shape, e.g. sections from a board, wood cylinders turned on a lathe, horizontal or vertical cross sections of a small log with bark attached, etc., but all samples should be the same shape, e.g. all wood cylinders or all sections of a board. Each sample can be no larger than 4 inches by 4 inches by 4 inches. Cut surface should be sanded to show the grain. Treating samples with a clear finish (no stain) is optional. All collection must be done by the exhibitor.

Mounting: Samples may be displayed in a variety of ways, e.g. mounted on a display board, displayed in a box or rack, etc., but they must be securely mounted and easily viewed. Be as creative as you like.

Labeling: Label each sample must include:

- 1) common name
- 2) scientific name
- 3) wood type (softwood or hardwood)
- 4) collector's name
- 5) collection date
- 6) collection location (be specific state and county at a minimum).

Supplemental information, e.g. common products, wood density, etc., may be included to enhance educational value.

D320006 CROSS SECTION DISPLAY

Display a disc cut from a tree species listed in 4H 332. The sample must be collected, by the exhibitor, within one year of the state fair judging day. The disc must measure 6 to 12 inches in diameter and 1 to 3 inches thick. The bark should be firmly attached, which may be difficult if the tree was dead when the disc was cut. Sand at least one side of the disc so the grain can be easily seen. If the disc is treated with a clear finish, both sides must be treated to minimize warping. As the disc dries, some cracking or checking can be expected and is allowed.

Labeling: The following parts must be clearly and accurately labeled on the cross section with pins, paper tags, or some other form of identification:

- 1) pith
- 2) heartwood
- 3) sapwood
- 4) one growth ring (beginning and end)
- 5) cambium
- 6) bark

A separate label attached to the back of the disc must include:

- 7) common name
- 8) scientific name
- 9) tree Classification (softwood or hardwood)
- 10) age (of the cross section)
- 11) collector's name
- 12) collection date
- 13) collection location (be specific, state and county at a minimum).

D320007 PARTS OF A TREE (This project is only for ages 8 – 11)

Prepare a poster, no larger than 24 inches x 24 inches that clearly identifies the main external parts of any tree:

- a) Trunk
- b) Crown
- c) Roots
- d) Leaves
- e) Flowers
- f) Fruit
- g) Buds
- h) Bark

Identifying other internal parts, e.g. phloem, xylem, cambium, annual ring, pith, etc., is optional. Attach a separate label on the back of the poster that includes the exhibitor's name and age.

D320008 LIVING TREE DISPLAY

Display a living tree seedling grown by the exhibitor from seed in the display container. The seed must be from a species listed in 4H 332. The seedling must be 60 days to 1 year old (on State Fair judging day). The display container must contain at least 8 inches of soil (potting mix or suitable natural soil), have drainage hole(s), and a drain pan to catch drainage water.

Labeling: A waterproof label must be attached and include:

- 1) common name
- 2) scientific name
- 3) seed treatments (if any)
- 4) planting date
- 5) emergence date
- 6) exhibitor's name

Supplemental information about the tree, e.g. where the seed was collected, growth measurements, uses for that species, etc., may be included in an attached notebook, poster, etc. to enhance educational value. Supporting information will be an important factor in judging.

AGRONOMY

(Projects related to Field Crops - Weed Science - Range)

DIVISION 750 - FIELD CROPS

Purple - \$3.00 Blue - \$2.50 Red - \$2.00 White - \$1.50

Individuals in the Crop Production, Field Crops projects may exhibit grain or plants or prepare an educational display representing their product. The purpose of these exhibits is to demonstrate to the public the benefits from the study and application of crop, weed, range, and soil sciences to solving problems in management, conservation, sustainability and environmental protection. For guidelines refer to appropriate project manuals.

NOTE: Clay County will allow 2 exhibits per crop species to allow both a plant and grain to be exhibited. If selected for State Fair, only **one** will be eligible.

Grain or Plant Exhibits - Classes 1-5:

- A completed Crop Production Worksheet (available at https://go.unl.edu/cropproductionprojectworksheet must accompany grain and plant exhibits or will automatically be deducted one ribbon placing. The worksheet must include exhibitors name and address county, proper variety or hybrid, plant population, whether production was irrigated dryland and general information including farm cropping history, soil type and weather effects.
- The worksheet also must include an economic analysis of the project, listing individual expense and income, on a per acre basis.
 Other topics to discuss are the selection of variety or hybrid, impacts of decisions on tillage and conservation practices, inputs (fuel, fertilizer, irrigation, labor, pesticides, etc) any observations made during the growing season, and what you learned from your crops project. The worksheet counts as 50% of the total when judged.
- Worksheet must be the original work of the individual exhibitor.
- Attach the worksheet to the entry in a clear plastic cover such that it can
 be read without removing it from the cover. In addition to the worksheet,
 grain and plant exhibits will be judged on condition, appearance (i.e.
 disease and insect damage, grain fill), uniformity (size, shape, color,
 maturity), and quality of exhibit.

*Grain exhibits must be one gallon per sample. Grain exhibits harvested in the fall (e.g. corn or soybeans) may be from the previous year's project and brought in an appropriate sized box/container for display. **NEW:** Place in a clear container so it can be viewed and displayed.

^{*}Plant exhibits with the exception of ears of corn, must be the result of the current years project.

⁻Corn - 10 ears or 3 stalks (cut at ground level with no roots or soil and bound together):

⁻Grain Sorghum - 4 stalks (cut at ground level and bound together);

⁻Soybeans - 6 stalks cut at ground level and bound together);

⁻Small grains (oats, barley, wheat, triticale) - sheaf of heads 2 inches in diameter at

top tie with stems about 24" long.

-Other crops (alfalfa, millet, etc.) - sheaf of stems 3 inches in diameter at top tied with stems cut at ground level or half size small square bale.

DISPLAYS

- A. The purpose of the display is to tell an educational story to those that view the display. The display is a visual representation (pictures, charts, graphs) no larger than 28 inches wide by 28 inches tall on plywood or poster board. The display should be neatly titled. Make sure to label display with exhibitor's name, address, and county on back side. Explain pictures and graphs clearly and concisely. Consider creativity and neatness.
- B. Each display must have a one page essay (minimum) explaining why the exhibitor chose the area of display and what they learned from their project. Include any references used. The essay should be in a clear plastic cover with the exhibitor's name outside. If a display does not have an essay, it will automatically be deducted one ribbon placing.
- C. NEW Agronomy Project Youth experience a crop that is grown, was grown or has the potential to be grown in Nebraska by growing it, researching traits of that crop and determine viability of that crop in the part of the state they live. Each year seeds will be ordered and distributed from the Extensionoffice on a first, come-first serve basis. A different seed will be selected each year. Youth will grown seeds in their garden or plots. Written resource materials will be available for youth in addition to virtual, live or recorded video/field trips. Youth will be eligible to enter an exhibit at both county and state fair agronomy area.

Classes:

- G750006 **CROP PRODUCTION DISPLAY** The purpose of this class is to allow original and creative exhibits that contain educational information about crop production aspects, such as crop scouting, alternative crops, pest management, etc.
- G750007 **CROP TECHNOLOGY DISPLAY** Display information about aspects of technology used in crop production, such as genetic engineering, crop breeding, GPS, yield mapping, computers, etc.
- G750008 CROP END USE DISPLAY Display information about the final product or

end uses for a crop such as food, feed, fuel, or other products. (i.e. corn can be processed into livestock fee, ethanol, plastics, etc. or soybeans can be processed into bio-diesel, pet bedding crayons, oil, etc.) This should not be about the process of crop production, but focus on an end product(s).

- G750009 WATER OR SOIL DISPLAY Display information about water or soils, such as how soils are being used for crop production, range, conservation, wildlife, or wetland use, or ways to protect or conserve water and soil resources.
- G750010 **CAREER INTERVIEW DISPLAY** –the purpose of this class is to allow youth to investigate a career in agronomy. Youth should interview 1 person that works with crops about such topics as what part of their job do they enjoy or dislike, why did they choose that career, what was their education, etc. Include a picture of the person interviewed, educational information about soils, such as how soils are being used for crop production, range, conservation, wildlife, or wetland use.

- G750011 **SPECIAL AGRONOMY PROJECT** Educational Exhibit Educational exhibit based on what was learned from the project. Present information on a poster
 - 14 inches x 22inches either vertical or horizontal arrangement or in a clear plastic report cover. The 4-H member's name, age, and county must be on the back of the poster or report cover. Refer to Spread sheet SF259. Each display must have a one-page essay (minimum) explaining why the exhibitor chose the area of display and what they learned from their project. Include any references used.
- G750012 SPECIAL AGRONOMY PROJECT VIDEO PRESENTATION 4-H exhibitor designs a multimedia presentation related to the crop. This could include narration of the growing process, presenting facts about the crop or any other innovative multimedia practices the presentation should be at least 2 minutes in length and no more than 5 minute in length, appropriate graphics, sound and either a video clip, animation or voice over and /or original video clip. Any of the following file formats will be accepted: mp4,.mov,.pt, or .avi. Email a link to the video to the superintendents to anygren2@unl.edu or brandy.vandewalle@unl.edu by August 10th.
- G7500013 **SPECIAL AGRONOMY PROJECT** (freshly, harvested crop) Plant exhibits must be the result of the current year's project. Depending on the type of crop selected for the current year:
 - -Corn 10 ears or 3 stalks (cut at ground level with no roots or soil and bound together);
 - -Grain Sorghum 4 stalks (cut at ground level and bound together);
 - -Soybeans 6 stalks cut at ground level and bound together);
 - -Small grains (oats, barley, wheat, triticale) sheaf of heads 2 inches in diameter at top tie with stems about 24" long.
 - -Other crops (alfalfa, millet, etc.) sheaf of stems 3 inches in diameter at top tied with stems cut at ground level or half size small square bale.

Supporting documentation (1/2 to 1-page in length) should include the following: Economic Analysis and /or research that supports feasibility of this crop in Nebraska or ow the crop has evolved over time. Other topics to discuss are past/current commercial production of this crop. This includes: the selection of variety of hybrid, impacts of tillage and conservation practices, inputs (fuel, fertilizer, irrigation, labor, pesticides, etc.), any observations made during the growing season about this crop and what you learned from your crops project. This ½ to 1 page summary counts as 50% of the total when judged. In addition to the summary, grain and plant exhibits will be judged on condition,

appearance (i.e. disease and insect damage, grain fill), uniformity (size, shape, color, maturity) and quality of exhibit.

DIVISION 751 - WEED SCIENCE

Purple - \$3.00 Blue - \$2.50 Red - \$2.00 White - \$1.50

- A. At least 15 of the specimens must represent this year's work. For assistance identifying plants, refer to the *NE Department of Agriculture's Weed of Nebraska and the Great Plains* (1994) or *Weeds of the Great Plains* (2003)
- B. Exhibits will be judged based on completeness of plant mount, accuracy of identification, label, neatness and conformity to exhibit requirements. Refer to Scoresheet SF261.

Books - Plants must be mounted on sheets that are no larger than 14 inches wide by 14 inches high. Proper plant mount should include root as well as stem and leaf tissue. Plants should be glued rather than taped and the mounts should be protected with a clear cover. Each completed mount must have the following information (see example below) in the lower right corner of the mounting sheet: - Scientific name (in italic or underlined), with authority, - Common name, - County of collection, - Collection date, - Collector's name, - Personal collection number, indicating the order that plants were collected in your personal collection, - Other information depending on class selected, i.e., noxious, life form. This information should be typed or printed neatly.

- Displays: The purpose of the display is to tell an educational story to those that view the display. The display is a visual representation (pictures, charts, graphs) on no larger than 28" x 28" plywood or poster board. The display should be neatly titled. Make sure to label display with exhibitor's name, address, and county on back side. Explain pictures and graphs clearly and concisely. Each display must have a one page essay explaining why the exhibitor chose the area of display and what they learned from their project. Include any references used. The essay should be in clear plastic cover with the exhibitor's name outside.
- G751001 **WEED IDENTIFICATION BOOK** A collection of a minimum of 15 plant mounts at least two of the following prohibited noxious weeds. (Canada thistle, musk thistle, plumeless thistle, salt cedar, leafy spurge, purple loosestrife, diffuse knapweed, spotted knapweed, Japanese knotweed, bohemian knotweed or phragmites), and at least five weeds that are a problem primarily in lawns.
- G751002 LIFE SPAN BOOK a collection of 7 perennials, 1 biennial, and 7 annual weeds.
- G751003 **WEED DISPLAY** The purpose of this Class is to allow original and creative exhibits that contain educational information about weeds, such as the interesting information about a weed species, effects of weed control, herbicide resistant weeds, what makes a weed a weed, or uses for weeds.

DIVISION 330 - Range Management

Purple - \$3.00 Blue - \$2.50 Red - \$2.00 White - \$1.50

The purpose of this category is to help 4H-ers identify and collect range plants. In addition, participants will learn the basics of range management, and Nebraska's range. Through the creation of range boards 4-H'ers will become more proficient in knowledge of Nebraska's range.

- 1. Each exhibit must be properly identified with Unit and Class
- 2. All plant displays and displays must be the result of the current year's work.
- 3. Plant identification and lists of appropriate plants in each category (grasses, forbs, shrubs, and grass-like plants) can be found in the Range Judging handbook Contest Guide (EC150 revised July 2016), Common Grasses of Nebraska (EC170), and Common Forbs and Shrubs of Nebraska (EC118).
- 4. The purpose of these exhibits is to demonstrate to the public the benefits from the study and application of crop, weed, range, and soil sciences to solving problems in management, conservation, sustainability and environmental protection.
- D330001 VALUE AND IMPORTANCE FOR LIVESTOCK FORAGE AND WILDLIFE HABITAT AND FOOD BOOK A collection of 12 different plant mounts, with 4 Classified as high value, 4 as medium value, and 4 as low value for livestock forage, wildlife habitat, or wildlife food. Value and importance Classification can be found in the Range Judging Handbook and Contest Guide Appendix Table 1 (EC150, Revised July 2016) on pages 42. Plants can consist of any combination of grasses, grass-like plants, forbs, or shrubs. Assemble plant mounts in order of high, medium, and low value and importance. Label each plant mount with its value and importance Classifications for each of the three areas: Livestock Forage, Wildlife Habitat. Wildlife Food.
- D330002 **LIFE SPAN BOOK-** A collection of 6 perennial plant mounts and 6 annual plant mounts selected from grasses or forbs.
- D330003 **GROWTH SEASON BOOK** -A collection including 6 cool-season grass mounts and 6 warm-season grass mounts.
- D330004 ORIGIN BOOK -A collection of plant mounts of 6 native range grasses and 6 introduced grasses Introduced grasses are not from North America and are often used to seed pasture.
- D330005 MAJOR TYPES OF RANGE PLANTS BOOK A collection of plant mounts of 3 grasses, 3 forbs, 3 grass-like, and 3 shrubs.
- D330006 RANGE PLANT COLLECTION BOOK A collection of 12 range plant mounts with something in common (i.e. poisonous to cattle, or historically used as food by Native Americans, or dye plants, or favorite antelope forage, etc.) Include a short paragraph in the front of the book which describes what the plants have in common and why you have chosen to collect them.
- D330007 PARTS OF A RANGE PLANT POSTER Mounted a range plant on a poster board. Label all the plant parts. Include the plant label in the lower right corner including the scientific and common name of the plant. Include your name and county on the back of poster.
- D330008 SPECIAL STUDY BOARD A display of the results of a clipping study, a degree of use study, range site study, etc. A short essay must accompany the display to explain the reason for the study, what was learned, and study results. This should be placed in a sheet cover attached to the board.
- D330009 JR. RANCHER BOARD –This exhibit should include a ranch map with record book or an appropriate educational display on some phase of rangeland or livestock management. A short essay must accompany the display to explain the purpose of the rancher board, what was learned, etc.
- **BOOKS:** Plants must be mounted on sheets that are no larger than 14" wide x 14" high. Plants should be glued rather than taped and the mounts should be

protected with a clear cover. Proper plant mount should include root as well as stem and leaf tissue. Exhibit will be judged based on completeness of plant mount, accuracy of identification, labeling, neatness and conformation to project requirements. Each completed mount must have the following information: 1) Scientific name (in italic or underlined). 2) Common name. 3) County of collection. 4) Collection date. 5) Collector's name 6) Personal collection number, indicating order that plants were collected in your personal collection. 7) Other information, depending on class selected, i.e., value and importance, life span, growth season, origin, major types of range plants. This information should be typed or printed neatly.

DISPLAYS: The purpose of the display is to tell an educational story to those that view the display. The display is a visual representation (pictures, charts, graphs) no larger than 28" x 28" on plywood or poster board. The display should be neatly titled. Make sure to label display with exhibitor's name, address, and county on back side. Refer to Scoresheet SF259.

BOARDS: Boards should be no larger than 30" wide by 36" tall. Boards should be adequately labeled.

*DIVISION 760 INSECTIGATOR (county only)

Create an "insect" using common materials available to you (some ideas might be: clay, egg cartons, paper, clothes pins, paper clips, glue, paints...) DIVISION 770 - FLORICULTURE

The purpose of Horticulture is to encourage participants to start and maintain vegetable gardens. In addition, 4-H'ers can participate in planting, growing, and caring for flowers. This is also a special gardening project in this category that 4-H'ers can participate in.

For the Clay County Fair, an exhibitor may enter a maximum of 5 from Classes 1- 45 and an additional 2 entries of notebooks, poster, history interview, houseplant Classes. One entry per person per Class number. Exhibitors at the State Fair may exhibit a maximum of 4 entries per person in Classes 1- 45. Youth must be enrolled in the World of Flowers, Annual Flowers, Houseplants and/or Special Garden Project.

The cultivar or variety name must be included with entry, labeled on an **index card**. Failure to do so will drop 1 ribbon placing. *A pre-entry form was made available in the spring time to utilize in planning exhibits and recording cultivar names*.

A perennial is defined as a plant of which the crown overwinters. An annual is a plant that grows from seed each season, whether self-seeded or planted by the gardener. A biennial is a plant that germinates, grows & overwinters as a crown,

blooms the following year and dies. Foliage will be considered when exhibit is judged.

CUT FLOWERS: All 3 or 5 stems of cut flowers should be the same cultivar and color, do not mix cultivars and colors. Containers will not be judged, however, they should be clear glass containers and adequate size to display blooms. Containers may not be returned from State Fair exhibits.

Follow the guidelines in "Preparing Cut Flowers for Exhibits" 4-H227 or (free download-http://4h.unl.box.com) when preparing entries for the fair

Give proper credit by listing the sources of pictures and information used. The 4-H member's name, age, county and years in flower projects must be on the back of the notebook.
- G77051 Flower Garden Promotion Poster- (SF 103) Individual poster promoting flower gardening, size 14 x 22" either vertical or horizontal arrangement. Poster may be in any medium: watercolor, ink, crayons, etc. as long as it is not 3-dimensional. Posters using copy righted material will not be accepted. Entry card must be stapled to the upper right hand corner. 4-H member's name, age, county and years in the project must be on the back of the poster.
- G77052 **Educational Flower Garden Poster** –(SF104) prepare a poster 14 x 22 x 2" (3-dimensional if needed) either vertical or horizontal arrangement illustrating a skill or project you have done or learned about in a 4-H flowers or houseplant project. One might show a special technique used or equipment incorporated in the garden. Refer to 4-H horticulture project manuals but use your own creativity. Entry card must be stapled to the upper right hand corner. 4-H member's name, age, address, county and years in project must be on the back of poster.
- G77053 Flower Gardening History Interview (105) neatly handwritten or typed account of a gardening history interview whose flower garden has inspired you. Maximum of 4 pages of text and 2 pages of pictures (include 1 picture of the person you interviewed) of their flower garden in the individual is still gardening. Protect with a clear report cover. 4-H member's name, county and years in the project(s) must be on the back of the report cover.

Youth must be enrolled in the **Growing Great Houseplants** project to exhibit in Classes 60-66.

Container Grown Houseplants: The choice of container and soil quality will be considered in judging. Each houseplant must be identified by listing the names on the entry tag or on a card attached to the container. Plants should be grown in the display container for a minimum of six weeks. Plants grown as houseplants must be used. NebGuide G2205 "Guide to Growing Houseplants" and NebGuide G837 "Guide to Selecting Houseplants" includes a listing of common houseplants. Containers of annual flowers or annual plants (i.e. petunias, geraniums) will be disqualified and not be judged. Entries in Classes 60-66 must have been designed and planted by the 4-H member.

Contain grown houseplants shall be in pots no greater than 12" in diameter (inside opening measurement). Dish gardens, fairy or miniature gardens, and desert gardens may and terrariums may be up to 12" in diameter (inside opening measurement). Any container grown plant in Classes 60-66 that is greater than 12" diameter (inside opening measurement) will be dropped one ribbon placing. Classes 60-66 should provide a saucer to catch drainage water. 4-H members name, age, address, county and years in project must be on the bottom or back of container and saucer. (Score Sheet SF 107).

Aerospace, Computer, Electricity, Small Engines, Robotics, Woodworking, Entomology, Vet Science, GeoSpacial, Alternative Energies & Welding

Purple - \$4.00 Blue - \$3.00 Red - \$2.00 White - \$1.50

Rules:

- 1. The name and county of exhibitor should appear on the back or each board, poster or articles and on the front cover of the notebooks. All static exhibits must have received a purple ribbon at the county fair to advance to the State Fair.
- 2. Several Classes require a display board which should be a height of 24 inches and not to exceed ¼" thickness. A height of 23 7/8" is acceptable to allow for the saw kerf (width) if two 24 inch boards are cut from one end of a 4' x 8' sheet of plywood, nothing should be mounted within ¾" of the top or bottom of the board. Examples: woodworking, & Electricity.
- 3. Fabricated board such as plywood, composition board, or particle-type lumber may be used for demonstration displays.
- 4. Demonstration boards should be sanded and finished to improve their appearance. The finish on a demonstration board will be judged as a woodworking exhibit.
- 5. Demonstration boards should include an overall title for the display, plus other necessary labeling.
- 6. Reports should be written using the scientific method whenever possible. (Background, the Question or hypothesis, what you plan to do and what you did, Method used and observations. Results: what you learned. All reports should be computer generated and enclosed in a clear, plastic cover. The reports should be attached securely to the display.

Premier 4-H Science Award is available in this area. See General Rules for details.

DIVISION 850 - AEROSPACE

Rockets must be supported <u>substantially</u> to protect the rocket from breakage. Rockets are to be mounted on a base with dimensions equal or less than 12" x 12" and the base should be 3/4" thick. No metal bases. If the rocket fins extend beyond the edges of the required base (12x12") then construct a base that is large enough to protect the fins. The base size is dictated by the size of the rocket fins.

The rockets must be mounted vertically. Please do not attach side boards or backdrops to the displays. In addition a used engine or length of dowel pin is to be glued and /or screwed into the board and extended up into the rockets engine mount to give added stability. Rockets must be equipped as prepared for launching, with wadding and parachute or other recovery system.

Rockets entered with live engines, wrong base size or sideboards will be disqualified.

A report, protected in clear plastic cover, must include: 1) rocket specification, (include original or photo of manufacture packaging stating rocket skill level), include original or photo of manufacture packaging stating rocket skill level) 2) a flight record for each launching (weather, distance, flight height) 3) number of launchings, 4) flight pictures 5) safety (how did you choose your launch site? Document safe launch, preparations, and precautions, 6) objectives learned and 7) conclusions.

The flight record may describe engine used, what rocket did in flight or recovery success. Points will not be deducted for launching, flight or recovery failures described. This includes any damage that may show on the rocket. Complete factory assembled rockets will not be accepted.

- Judging is based upon display appearance, rocket appearance, workmanship, design or capabilities for flight, number of times launched and report. Three launches are required to earn the t9 maximum launch points given on the score sheets. (For scoring for the State Fair, only actual launches count, misfires will not count towards one of the required three launches)
- -For self-designed rockets only, please include a digital recording copy of one flight. In the documentation please include a description of stability testing before the rocket was flown.
- -Skill level of project is not determined by number of years in project. Skill level is determined by the level listed on the manufacturing packaging.
- -4-H Rocket project levels are not intended to correspond to National Association of Rocketry model rocket difficulty ratings or levels.
- -High power rockets (HPR) is similar to model rocketry with differences that include the propulsion power and weight increase of the model. They use motors in ranges over "G" power and/or weigh more than laws and regulations allow for unrestricted model rockets. These rockets are NOT appropriate for 4-H projects and will be disqualified.

AEROSPACE/ROCKETS

H850001 **Rocket:** Any skill Level Rocket with wooden fins and cardboard body tubes painted by hand or air brush. (SF92)

H850002 **Aerospace Display**: Poster or display board that displays or exemplifies one of the principles learned in the Lift Off project. Examples include: display of rocket parts and purpose, explains the parts of a NASA rocket or shuttle, interview of someone in the aerospace field, or kite terminology. Include notebook containing terminology (definition), and what was learned. Display can be any size up to 28" by 22". (SF93)

H850003 **Rocket:** any Skill Level Rocket with wooden fins and cardboard body tubes painted using commercial application, for example commercial spray paint.(SF92)

SELF-DESIGNED ROCKET

H850004 **Rocket** – any self-designed rocket with wooden fins and cardboard body tubes. (SF92)

DRONES

H850005 **Drone Poster** – Exhibit must be designed to educate yourself and others on one or more of the following topics: drone technologies, use of drones, the different types of drones, types of training needed to operate drones, and the laws and regulations users must follow. Posters can be any size up to 28" x 22".

H85006 **Drone Video** - Exhibit must demonstrate how the drone interacts with the outside world. Examples include: field scouting, surveying, damage from natural disasters, drones, used in commercial applications and settings, and drones used for structural engineering. Video should not exceed 5 minutes. Videos should be submitted Online, or be uploaded to a video streaming application and exhibitors **MUST** provide a hard copy QR code for viewing. Exhibitors are encouraged to text their codes or links on several devices to check for appropriate permissions.

DIVISION 860 - SET COMPUTERS

This category gives 4-H'ers a chance to display their knowledge of computers. Through participation in this category 4-H'ers will develop presentations that show judges their knowledge in the different aspects of computer science Involvement in SE Computers gives participants a first-hand experience in modern technology.

Rules:

- Name and county should appear on back of each board, poser or article or front cover of notebook
- Demonstration boards should include an overall title for the display, plus other necessary labeling
- Reports should be written using scientific method whenever possible (Background, the Question or hypothesis, what you plan to do and what you did, Method used and observations. Results: what you learned). All reports should be computer generated and enclosed in a clear plastic cover attached to display.
- 4. Team Entries: to qualify for entry at NE State Fair, team materials entered in H860008 Digital Fabrication must clearly be the work of a team instead of an individual and must have at least 50% of all team members enrolled in 4-H. additionally, all enrolled 4-H members of the team should complete and attach an entry tag to the materials. A supplemental page documenting the individual contributions to the project should be included. The entry will be judged as a team, with team members receiving the same ribbon placing.

BOOTING UP – Unit 1 (level one is county only)

*H860931 **Create a poster** on a lesson learned in Unit 1. Examples might include: hardware, software programs, or how to take care of a computer and operating system.

*H860932 Internet Exploration - Exhibit will be a notebook consisting of the following four areas: 1) three e-mails sent requesting a reply, 2) the reply to each of the e-mails, 3) print-out of three websites and 4) what you liked and did not like about each website.

*H860933 Computer Designed Greeting Card - exhibit will consist of six greeting cards. Cards should be created on 8 2" x 11" paper using a commercially available graphics program and either single color or color printer/plotter. The cards should vary in folds and design. Tell which software program was used. Prefabricated cards from commercially available card programs will NOT be accepted. No theme required. Put cards in some type of protective cover.

COMPUTER MYSTERIES - UNIT 2

H860001 Computer Application (SF277) – 4-H exhibitor should use computer application to create a graphic notebook utilizing computer technology. 4-H'er may create any of the following: greeting card (5 different cards such as a birthday, wedding, anniversary, sympathy get well or other); a business card (3 cards for 3 different individuals and businesses); menu (minimum of 2 pages including short description of foods and pricing); book layout (I-book); promotional flyer (3 flyers promoting 3 different events); newsletter (minimum 2 pages); or other: examples such as precision farming or family business logo etc.. This exhibit consists of a notebook (8.5x11 inches) which should include a (1) a detailed report describing: (a) the task to be completed, (b) the computer application software required to complete the task, (c) specific features of the computer application software necessary for completing the task (2) print out of your project. Project may be in color or black and white.

H860002 **Produce a Computer Slideshow Presentation (SF277)** – Using presentation software a 4-H Exhibitor designs a multimedia computer presentation on one topic related to youth. A notebook with a printout of all the slides should be submitted. Slideshow should include a minimum of 10 slides and not more than 25. Incorporate appropriate slide layouts, graphics, animations, and audio (music or voice and transition sounds do not count). Each slide should include notes for a presentation. DIVISION 870 – ELECTRICITY

- *Demonstration boards should be sanded and finished to improve appearance. Finish will be judged as a woodworking exhibit.

H911005 Outdoor Wood Project made with Treated Wood - Treated wood projects DO NOT have to have a finished coating. All plans and plan alternations must be attached to the article Protect plans with a cover. If project is designed to be outside it may be displayed there Examples: picnic table, planter, outdoor furniture, etc.

H911006 Wood Projects created on a Turning Lathe Article is the object created from spinning wood on a turning lathe. Article must be appropriately finished and/or sealed. Exhibit must include plans detailing design and process of completion, any changes made to the design, details of finishing techniques, and other relevant information about the article. Must include a description of tools used

FINISHING UP - UNIT 4

H9110006 Woodworking Article- Item made using skills learned in the Finishing it up Project. Examples include: dovetailing, making a pen using lathe, overlays, using a router, etc. Item is required to be appropriately finished.

- H920003 WELDING ARTICLE any shop article or piece of furniture where welding is used in the construction. 60% of item must be completed by 4-Her and notes regarding laser welding or machine welding must be included. All plans and plan alternations, a bill for materials must be attached to the article. Protect plans with a cover. If project is designed to be outside it is required to have appropriate outdoor finish.
- H920004 WELDED FURNITURE any furniture with 75% welding is used in the construction, 60% of item must be completed by 4-Her and nots regarding laser welding or machine welding must be included. All plans and plan alternations, a bill for materials must be attached to the article. Protect plans with a cover. If project is designed to be outside it is required to have appropriate outdoor finish. May be displayed outside.

H920005 PLASMA CUTTER/WELDING DESIGN - Plasma cutters/welders allowed for detailed design(s) to butt cut into metal. 4-H members will create a notebook describing the design process to create the "artwork" to butt cut into metal. This exhibit is not eligible for entry at the State Fair. In the notebook include:

- A photo (front and back) of the finished project. Also include detailed photographs of the project to allow judges to examine cuts.
- Instructions on how the design was created, this allows for replication of the project.
- Lessons learned or improvements to the project

H920006 COMPOSITE WELD PROJECT – 60% of the project must be welded and 40% made from other materials such as wood, rubber, etc. All plans, plan alternations, and a bill for materials must be attached to the article. Protect plans with a cover. If project is designed to b outside it is required to have appropriate outdoor finish because project may be displayed outside.

Rules: All welds exhibited in C 1 or 2 must be mounted on a 12" high x 15" long display board of thickness not to exceed 3/8." Attach each weld on a wire loop hinge or equivalent, so the judge can look at the bottom side of the weld when necessary. Each weld should be labeled with information stating a) type of welding process, (stick, MIG, TIG, Oty-Acetylene, etc.) b) kind of weld, c) welder setting, d) electrode/wire/rod size and e) electrode/wire/rod ID numbers. Attach wire to display board so it can be hung like a picture frame. No picture frame hangers accepted. If no plans are included with the welding article or welding furniture, item will be disqualified.

Welding Project Tips and Suggestions: Classes 1: Class 1 GUIDELINES

- 1. All welds should be made with the same electrode/wire/rod size and number.
- 2. Welds should be made only on one side of metal so penetration can be judged.
- 3. Welds should be cleaned with chipping hammer and wire brush. Apply a coat of light oil (penetrating oil) to the metal to prevent rusting. Wipe off excess oil.
- 4. It is suggested that all welds be on the same size and thickness of metal. These pieces, referred to as coupons, should be 1.5 to 2 inches wide and 3.5 to 4 inches long. A good way to get this size is to buy new cold rolled strap iron and cut to length. The extra width is needed to provide enough metal to absorb the heat from the welding process and prevent the coupons from becoming too hot before the bead is completed. Narrower coupons will become very hot, making an average welder setting too cold at the bead start, just about right in the middle, and too hot at the end. The correct way to weld narrow strips is to make short beads and allow time to cool, however this project requires a full length bead.

Stick welding:

- Suggested coupon thickness- " if using 1/8" rod
- Suggested rod-AC and DC straight or reverse polarity- first E-7014, second E-6013
- MIG welding:
- Suggested coupon thickness--" if using .035 wire and 1/8" if using .023 wire
- Oty-Acetylene :
- Suggested coupon thickness- 1/8".
- Suggested rod- 1/8" mild steel rod

Welding Project Tips and Suggestions: Classes 2

- 1. It is suggested that all welds be on same size and thickness of metal. These pieces are referred to as coupons. The welds can be on one coupon that is about 4"x4" or on individual coupons that are about 2" x 4" inch and 3" thick. Suggested rods for this C of position welds for AC and DC straight or reverse polarity is, first E-6013, second E-7014 and E-6010 for DC reverse polarity only.
- Welds should be cleaned with a chipping hammer and wire brush. Apply a coat of light oil (penetrating oil) to the metal to prevent rusting. Wipe off excess oil.

Welding Project Tips and Suggestions Class 3 & 41. All welds should be cleaned and protected from rust with paint or light oil. Plans are to be complete enough that if they were given to a welding shop, the item could be made without

further instructions. Bill of materials should include a cost for all items used including steel, electrodes, paint, wheels, etc.

DIVISION 861 - ROBOTICS

This category involves the many different aspects of Robotics. Participants will learn more about how robots are designed and developed as well as the mechanical and electronic elements of robots. Involvements in SET Robotics gives participants a first-hand experience in modern technology.

Team Entries: to qualify for entry at NE State Fair, team materials entered in robotics must clearly be the work of a team instead of an individual and must have at least 50% of all team members enrolled in 4-H. Additionally, all enrolled 4-H members of the team should complete and attach an entry tag to the materials. A supplemental page documenting the individual contributions to the project should be included. The entry will be judged as a team, with team members receiving the same ribbon placing.

Creating a video of your robot in action would be helpful for the judges but is not mandatory. Present as a CD Rom with your robot entry.

- **H861001** Robotics Poster: Create a poster (14" X 22") communicating a robotics theme such as "Robot of Not", "Pseudocode", "Real World Robots", "Careers in Robots", or "Autonomous Robotics", "Precision Agriculture", or a robotic topic of interest to the 4-H'er.
- H861002 Robotics Notebook Explore a robotics topic in-Department and present your findings in a notebook. Documentation should include any designs, research, notes, pseudocode, data tables or other evidence of the 4-H'ers learning experience. The notebook should contain at least three pages. Topics could include a programming challenge, a programming skill, calibration, sensor exploration, or any of the topics suggested in Class 1.
- **H861003 Robotics Video** This Class should be displayed in a notebook. The notebook should include a video clip on a CD/DVD that demonstrates the robot performing the programmed function. Include your pseudocode and

screenshots of the actual code with a written description of the icon/command functions. All videos should be saved in a PC compatible format. State Fair entries will be mailed to Amy Timmerman atimmerman2@unl.edu by Aug. 15.

- H861004 Robotics/Career Interview- Interview someone who is working in the field of robotics and research the career in robotics. Interviews can either be written or in a multimedia format such as a short video uploaded to a cloud sharing service. Include a QR code with your project to allow for judging access. SF qualified videos should be submitted online by August 10th, 2024. Exhibitors MUST provide a hard copy QR code for viewing. Written interviews should be in a notebook. Written reports should be 3 to 5 pages, double spaced, 12 point font, and 1" margins. Multimedia reports should be between 3 to 5 minutes in length.
- H861005 Robotics Sensor Notebook Write pseudo code which includes at least one sensor activity. Include the code written and explain the code function. Codes can be submitted as a multimedia format uploaded to a cloud sharing service. Include a QR code with your project to allow judging access. Multimedia presentation should be 3 to 5 minutes in length. SF qualified videos should be submitted online by August 10th. SF Exhibitors MUST provide a hard copy QR code for viewing.
- **H861007 Kit Labeled Robot (cannot be free programmed).** This Class is intended for explorations of robotic components such as arms or vehicles OR educational kits marketed as robots that do not have the ability to be programmed to "sense, plan and act." The exhibit should include a project the youth has constructed, a description of what it does and an explanation of how it is similar to and different from a robot. (If robot is more than 15" wide x 20" tall it may be hard to display so would recommend submitting the project under class H861003).
- H861008 Kit Labeled Robot (cannot be programmed) This class is intended for youth to create pars through 3D printing, that help create their robot or aid the robot in completing a coded function. Project should include notebook describing the process used to create the project, describe the success of your designed piece (did it work), intended use of the product and the modifications made to the item.

H880002 4-H Favorite Places, or Historical Site Poster – The 4-H exhibitor identifies a favorite place or historical site (including grave sites) in Nebraska. Exhibit should include latitude and longitude, digital picture, and local area map. Poster size should not exceed 14 x 22".

H880003 GPS Notebook – Keep a log of at least 5 places visited using a GPS enabled device. At least one site should be from a community other than where you live. For each site, record the latitude, longitude and evaluation. Also include a description of the site, a paragraph explaining what was interesting about the site or finding it. Photos of each site and/or cache are optional but encouraged.

H880004 Geocache – Assemble a themed geocache (physical geocache is REQUIRED with exhibit). Each geocache should be a water-tight container. It should include a log book and pencil for finders to log their visits and may include small trinket, geocoins, etc. for the finders to trade. Documentation should include a title, teaser description and the geographic coordinates of intended placement. Register this site at geocaching.com, include a print-out of its registry. H880005 Agriculture Precision GIS Mapping – 4-Hers will assemble a notebook that will include a minimum of 2 digital copies of various data layers that can be used in precision agriculture to identify spatial patterns and/or correlations (printed copies of websites were applications can be purchased is acceptable. A report of how the analysis of the various data will be used to make a management decision.

H880006 4-H History Map – Preserve 4-H History: Nominate a Point of Interest for the 4-H History Map Project include copy of submitted form in folder or notebook. (a minimum of one paragraph).

Class H880007 - GIS Thematic Map — Using any GIS software, create a thematic. Thematic maps can utilize any subject of interest to the 4-H'er. Example map would be Amelia Earhart's or Sir Francis Drake's voyage population density maps, water usage "x 11" maps or 4-H project in Nebraska. Create GIS Map using data from books, and or internet. Use reliable data, (U.S. Center or U.S. Census Bureau etc.) Map any size from 8.5" x 11"up to 36" x 24", should include Title, Base Map, Neat Line, North Arrow, and Legend. Identify the source of your information on the back of the map.

DIVISION 900 - SET Physics/Power of Wind/4-Wheelin' Physics Fun

This category provides 4-H'ers a way to present their ideas about energy. Through participation in this category 4-H'ers will learn more about physics, friction, energy, and

elasticity. In addition, participants will make a display to go along with their findings.

Purple - \$4.00 Blue - \$3.00 Red - \$2.00 White - \$1.50

Several classes require a display board which should be a height of 24 inches and not to exceed 1/4-inch thickness. A height of 24 7/8 inches is acceptable to allow for the saw kerf (width) if two 24 inch boards are cut from one end of a 4 foot by 8-foot sheet of plywood. Nothing should be mounted within 3/4 inch of the top or bottom of the board. (Example: Woodworking & Electricity.)

- Fabricated board such as plywood, composition board, or particle-type lumber may be used for demonstration displays.
- Demonstration boards should be sanded and finished to improve their appearance. The finish on a demonstration board will be judged as a woodworking exhibit.
- Demonstration boards should include an overall title for the display, plus other necessary labeling.
- 4. Reports should be written using the scientific method whenever possible (Background, the Question or hypothesis, what you plan to do and what you did, Method used and observations, Results: what you learned. All reports should be computer generated and enclosed in a clear plastic cover. The reports should be attached securely to the display.
- Premier 4-H Science Award is available in this area. Please see General Rules for more details.

Class H900001. Create and Compare Energy Resources Poster – Poster should explore 2 alternative/renewable energy resources. Compare and contrast the 2 resources including two of the following information: amount of energy created, costs of production, usability of the energy, pros/cons of environmental impacts, etc. Posters can be any size up to 28" by 22."

Class H900002. Experiment Notebook – Notebook will explore the scientific method involving alternative/renewable energy sources. Information required. 1.) Hypothesis 2.) Research 3.) Experiment 4.) Measure 5.) Report or Redefine Hypothesis.

Class H900003. Solar as Energy Display/poster - Item should be the original design of the 4-Her. Include the item, or a picture if item is in excess of 6' tall or 2' X 2'. Include a notebook of why the item was designed and how it harnesses the power of the sun. Examples include solar ovens, solar panels, etc.

Class H900004. Water as Energy Display/poster - Item should be the original design of the 4-Her. Include the item, or a picture if item is in excess of 6' tall or 2' X 2'. Include a notebook of why the item was designed and how it harnesses the power of water.

Class H900005. Wind as Energy Display/poster – Item should be the original design of the 4-Her. Include the item, or a picture if item is in excess of 6' tall or 2' X 2'. Include a notebook of why the item was designed and how it harnesses the power of wind.

Class H90006. Other Nebraska Alternative Energy –Notebook should explore Nebraska an alternative energy source besides wind, water, and solar power.

Include information on type of power chosen, infrastructure for distribution, what resources are needed to create this alternative resource, cost of production, and potential uses of bio-products.

DIVISION 800 - ENTOMOLOGY

Entomology exhibits five 4-H'ers the opportunity to demonstrate their knowledge about insects and insect displays. This category has multiple projects that allows 4-H'ers to progress over numerous years.

Purple - \$4.00 Blue - \$3.00 Red - \$2.00 White - \$1.50

Rules:

1). Specimens in display collections should be mounted properly and labeled with location, date of collection, name of collector, and order name. Follow mounting and labeling instructions in the Nebraska 4-H Entomology Manual. Boxes are preferred to be 12" high X 18" wide, and landscape orientation, so they fit in display racks. Purchase of commercially-made boxes is allowed. All specimens must be from the collector.

H800001 - Entomology Display, First-Year Project

Collection to consist of 25 or more different kinds (species) of insects representing at least 6 orders. Limit of one box.

H800002 - Entomology Display, Second-Year Project Collection to consist of a minimum of 50 kinds (species) of insects representing at least 8 orders. Replace damaged or poorly mounted specimens. At least 25 species must be present from after July 1 of the previous year. Limit 2 boxes.

H800003 - **Entomology Display, Third-Year** or More Project Collection to consist of a minimum of 75 kinds (species) of insects representing at least 10 orders. Replace damaged or poorly mounted specimens. At least 25 species must be present from after July 1 of previous year. Limit of 3 boxes.

H800004 - Special Interest or Advanced Insect Display

Educational display developed according to personal interests and/or advanced identification capability. This also is an opportunity to highlight favorite insects in a creative arrangement. Insects should conform to pinning and mounting standards as in Classes 1-3 and be protected in an insect box. Each specialty display should include names of the insects, interesting information about them, and why the display was made. Advanced identification collections should have insects grouped with labels that correspond with identification level (e.g. family, genus, and species). A specialty collection may consist of insects by taxonomic group (e.g. butterflies, grasshoppers, dragonflies, scarab beetles) or by host, subject or habitat (e.g. insect pests of corn, aquatic insects, insect mimicry, insect galls, insects from goldenrod, insect pollinators, etc.).

H800005 - Insect Habitats

Habitats consist of any hand-crafted objects, made of natural or artificial materials, placed outdoors, which promote or conserve insects in the environment. Insects

may include bee pollinators, butterflies, beneficial insects, etc. A one-page report describing activities must accompany the exhibit. Report should include placement, target insect, why materials were chosen, functional design, and indicators of success.

H800006 - Macrophotography

Subjects should be insects, spiders or other arthropods, or any nests, webs or constructions they make. All exhibit prints should be either 8" x 10" or 8½" x 11" and mounted on rigid, black 11" X 14" poster or matt board. Either orientation is acceptable. No frames or mat board framing is allowed. A caption of a few sentences should explain the subject and be printed on white paper and glued below the print on the poster board.

H800007 - Insect Poster/Display Exhibits - Exhibits can be posters or three-dimensional displays, and artistic creativity is encouraged. Posters should be no larger than 22" x 28". They should be instructional and can be attractive and have pictures, drawings, charts, or graphs. Posters and displays may show any aspect of insect life, habitat, or related conservation or management. Examples include life history and other facts about an insect; insect anatomy; how to manage insects in a farm, home, lawn, or garden setting; experiences rearing one kind of insect; survey of an important insect; insect behavior (ex. nesting, finding food, mobility, defenses, etc.); habitats (e.g. forests, grasslands, wetlands, rivers, or lakes) and what insects are found there, etc. Three-dimensional displays, such as dioramas, sculptures, models or decorative boxes should have a page of explanatory information accompanying them and fit within a 22" x 28" area.

H800008 - Reports or Journals

Reports and journals should be in a 3-ring binder. A report may be informational, that is, an original article about a favorite insect, a history of insect outbreaks, diseases caused by insects, insects as food, etc. Or, it may be a research report about an investigation or experiment done in a scientific manner. It then should have a basic introduction of the insect studied, methods used, observations, and results of the project. Tables, graphs and images are helpful to include. A journal is an observational study over a period of time with personal impressions. It may cover watching changes of kinds in butterflies over the summer, rearing a specific insect from egg to adult, managing a bee hive, observations of insects in a specific habitat, accounts of insect behavior in a forest or flower garden, etc.

DIVISION 840 - VETERINARY SCIENCE

The purpose of a Veterinary Science exhibit is to inform the public about a common health problem of animals or a veterinary science principle. Do not confuse veterinary science exhibit topics with animal husbandry, history or production topics.

Purple - \$4.00 Blue - \$3.00 Red - \$2.00 White - \$1.50

A Veterinary Science exhibit may consist of a poster, notebook, or a display. The exhibit may represent material from exhibitors enrolled in Animal Disease or

Animal Health. (County Only exhibits may be from Level 1) If photographs are to be part of the exhibit, remember that they will be viewed by the public. Make sure that the photographs are in good taste and will not be offensive to anyone. Graphic photographs of excessive bleeding, trauma or painful procedures are not appropriate. For exhibits related to veterinary surgical procedures, aseptic techniques need to be shown, for example, use of drapes, use of sterile procedures, wearing of gloves, and other appropriate veterinary medical practices.

First-Aid Kits - Because of public safety concerns and risk of theft of first-aid kit

contents (vet drugs/equipment) with perceived potential for drug abuse, animal first aid kits containing any drugs or medications will be immediately disqualified and not displayed. First Aid kit wishing to include medication information should instead utilize written descriptions, photographs, drawings, computer generated print-outs or empty packaging of pharmaceuticals.

Veterinary Science Posters - This exhibit presents the viewer with a design that is a simple and direct, unlike a display that usually presents more information. A poster should not exceed 22" x 28" and may be either vertical or horizontal.

Veterinary Science Displays -a display may include but is not limited to a 3-dimensional exhibit, a scale model, the actual product (for example: skeleton; teeth; samples of leather, fur, or dried skin damaged by disease or parasites) or a notebook. A display is not a poster. A display may be mounted on poster board not to exceed 22" x 28" or on 1/4" plywood or equivalent that does not exceed 24" high or 32" wide or a three ring binder or another bound notebook format.
