WHAT IS THE MEANING OF THE 4-H EMBLEM?



The 4-H Name & Emblem is a highly valued mark within our country's history. As such, it was granted a very unique and special status; it is in a category similar to the Presidential Seal and the Olympic Emblem. This federal protection makes it a mark into and of itself with protection that supersedes the limited authorities of both a trademark and a copyright. As a result, responsibility and stewardship for the 4-H Name & Emblem were not given to the U.S. Patent Office but were given to a higher level of the federal government, a member of the Cabinet, the Secretary of Agriculture. The Secretary has responsibility for the 4-H Name and Emblem, at the

direct request of Congress. The "18 USC 707" is the statement in the United States Code that outlines the protection of the 4-H Name & Emblem.

WHAT IS THE 4-H PLEDGE?

I pledge my **HEAD** to clearer thinking, my **HEART** to greater loyalty, my **HANDS** to larger service, and my **HEALTH** to better living, for my club, my community, my country, and my world.

- HEAD stands for decision making, planning, organizing, problem solving, and using knowledge throughout life.
- HEART stands for strong personal values, positive self-concept, concern for others, cooperation and communication.
- HANDS stands for volunteering, community service, preparing the world of work, science, and technology literacy.
- HEALTH stands for healthy lifestyles, character, ethics, stress management, and disease prevention.

WHAT IS THE 4-H MOTTO?

"To Make The Best Better"...The 4-H motto encourages each member to do his best and improve the next time so their "best" becomes "better." Members stretch their abilities and capacities to reach their full potential.

4-H STANDARDS FOR CLUB STRUCTURE FOR 2024

The following are the standards for a Nebraska 4-H Club. Your 4-H club will want to make sure you meet all of these criteria for the 2024 4-H year.

4-H clubs are to be structured as follows:

- Enrolls at least 5 youth members from at least 3 families.
- Is advised by adult staff or volunteers who have been screened and trained in accordance with the Nebraska 4-H Policy and Procedure Handbook.
- Conduct a minimum of 6 regular club meetings (virtual or face-to-face) per year, with many holding 9-12 regular meetings throughout most or all of the year, and often supplemented by project meetings, camps, fairs, and other 4-H learning activities.
- Selects youth officers or youth leaders to provide leadership to the club.
- Meets in any location a home, community center, military installation, library, public housing site, school, afterschool program, and/or many other places.
- Helps youth and parents/guardians adapt in cases of mobility linking them to 4-H programs in other counties and states.
- Meets interests and needs of youth in same-age or cross-age groupings and using single project or multiple project formats.

4-H clubs must conform to this structure for the 2024 4-H year. If you have questions regarding how your 4-H club can conform to this structure, please feel free to contact Colleen at the Extension Office.

NEW VOLUNTEER ORIENTATION!



Nebraska 4-H is implementing a new 4-H Volunteer Orientation, which is part of the volunteer screening process. Direct volunteers are required to complete the 4-H Volunteer Orientation during enrollment as a new volunteer and/or during the re-screening process every five years. Volunteers and staff are invited to complete the orientation at any time.

The volunteer orientation <u>link</u> is located in the direct volunteer screening information in 4honline. Upon completion, the county office the volunteer selected during the orientation will receive a confirmation email.

The volunteer also receives an email confirming their completion. The volunteer orientation can also be found on the public website: <u>https://4h.unl.edu/volunteer-orientation</u>. The volunteer orientation will take approximately 45 minutes to complete. Users are not required to complete the orientation in one session.

GUIDELINES FOR ADULTS WORKING WITH YOUTH

"Winning isn't everything...but striving to win is."

- Permit youth to determine their own involvement in competition.
- Provide a variety of competitive choices.
- Help youth develop an attitude that they are responsible for their actions.
- Take a positive approach praise youth for participation.
- Focus on developing skills and abilities NOT on final scores or placings.
- Make expectations realistic.
- Play with, participate, support, and assist youth.
- Be a positive role model.
- Discuss what is learned.

In 4-H competition, participation for the love of the activity is more important than winning.
