A Bug's Life Solitary oak leafminer

Fun facts

- Feed between and pupates between layers of leaf
- Overwinter as larvae in fallen leaf
- Injury largely cosmetic
- Silhouette visible through leaf if held up to light

Identification

<u>Damage</u>: Blotch mines on the upperside of the leaf <u>Egg</u>: One at a time on surface of leaf

<u>Larva</u>: Flat and tapered, look like rattle of rattle snake

Moth: Small, pale, silver moths with orange marks on wings

Host plants

 Larvae feed on various oaks, especially white oak

Management

- Rake, destroy, dispose fallen leaves
- No chemical treatment recommended
