A Bug's Life Three-lined potato beetle

Fun facts

- Injury to tomatillos can be severe, usually minor on potato and tomato
- Larvae cover themselves with excrement for protection
- Overwinter as adults in leaf litter

Host plants

 Tomatillo, potato, tomato and others in nightshade/Solanaceae family



Identification

<u>Damage</u>: Defoliation to leaves <u>Eggs</u>: Yellow eggs, laid in groups on underside of leaves

<u>Larva</u>: Slug-like, brownish-gray, visible legs, black head, covered in frass

<u>Beetle</u>: 1/4" long, orange-yellow, 3 lengthwise black stripes, orange thorax with black spots



Management

- Usually found on weeds in garden
- Handpick beetles, remove eggs and larvae from leaves into soapy water
- Install floating row covers*
- Garden sanitation and fall clean up
- When needed, organic options include pyrethins, neem oil and spinosad; synthetic options include carbaryl and permethrin



*Row covers should be removed or pulled back when plants flower to allow for pollination



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
