## Learn by Doing

4-H believes in the power of young people. Every child has valuable strengths and real influence to improve the world around us. 4-H provides youth with opportunities to learn by doing, grow from failures, express their ideas, and use their influence to drive positive outcomes.

4-H is the largest youth development organization, empowering nearly six million young people across the U.S. In 2022, over 18,000 youth experienced 4-H in Douglas-Sarpy Counties and obtained leadership, communication, and critical thinking skills to lead for a lifetime. Youth were taught through STEM-based school enrichment, after school, clubs, special interest and Clover Kid programs.

Clubs serve as a cornerstone of the 4-H youth development experience. Clubs are organized groups that meet regularly focusing on a series of educational experiences. The Sarpy County Fair and competitions (presentations, speech, livestock & horse shows, table toppers, small pet, etc.) are opportunities for youth to display and share what they have learned.

## Science, Technology, Engineering & Math

Thriving and flourishing programs in Douglas-Sarpy Counties include Build a Hut, Nature Night Walk, Next Chapter College Readiness Program, 4-H Health Rocks Mentorship, 4-H STEM Challenge Days, Discover Engineering Days, innovative School Enrichment offerings (3D printing and computer science, space science, go figure math, E-textiles, embryology).

The 2022 award winning 4-H Imagine Science, Build-A-Hut program provided hands-on learning and application of construction, solar, and civil engineering. This program provides youth with a foundation that they can use to pursue careers in Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math (STEM). ## Extension Leads the Way

In Douglas and Sarpy County, Extension is the sole agency teaching ServSafe® Manager and ServSafe® Food Handlers certification courses established by the National Restaurant Association. These courses teach the latest science-based information on food safety and keep Nebraskans healthy.

### Food Handlers Education for Teens

A national employee shortage increased the number of teenagers working in food service. Studies show that teens may lack food-safety knowledge. In response, Extension began partnering with local high schools to teach the National Restaurant Association Food Handlers® course to teens. During the pilot phase, 50 youth have successfully completed the course.



## Cottage Food Law Training

The Nebraska Cottage Food Law (passed in 2019) requires producers to complete food safety training specific to the law. To date 800 individuals have completed this training through Douglas and Sarpy County Extension. These trainings are offered in collaboration with local health departments, the Nebraska Department of Ag, UNL Processing Center, and UNL Food Science department. Nebraska Extension coordinates the services these producers need in order to expand their business safely, leading to increased customer satisfaction and business profits.

# **Nutrition Education Program (NEP)**

EFNEP & SNAP-Ed Programs

### Meeting People Where They Work, Play & Live

NEP improves the health of Nebraskans living on limited budgets. NEP is funded through the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program-Education Division (SNAP-Ed) and Expanded Food and Nutrition Education Program (EFNEP). Together with community partners, NEP uses multiple evidence-based education strategies to improve the health of Douglas and Sarpy County residents. Notable programs in 2022 include Eating Smart Moving More classes, Marathon Kids, Go NAPSACC for childcare providers, Siembra Salud programs, UNL Native American Coalition, and Double Up Food Bucks for SNAP recipients at local grocery stores and farmers markets.

# Horticulture, Landscape, & Environmental Systems

Our Horticulture, Landscape, and Environmental Systems professionals work with Nebraskans to sustainably manage community green spaces, protect natural resources, improve landscapes, manage pests, and grow safe, nutritious food.

## Master Gardeners Serve Our Community

The Nebraska Extension Master Gardener (EMG) program extends outreach by providing volunteers with science-based horticulture education, which prepares them to share their knowledge with Nebraskans. This program has been part of UNL Extension since 1976. Master Gardeners are trained by UNL Extension faculty and staff, and they contribute time by working through their local Extension office to provide horticulture-related information in their community. Master Gardeners completing 40 hours of training and 40 hours of service to obtain certification. They retain their certification through annual training and volunteering. Volunteer hours and teaching contacts are completed through various activities including answering residents' questions by phone through the "Horticulture Help Line" and in-person at the "Ask a Master Gardener" table events, planting and maintaining teaching demonstration gardens, collecting data on research projects, speaking to community groups, and teaching youth programs (protecting pollinators and vegetable gardening).

Douglas-Sarpy Educators and Extension Assistants serve on the Backyard Farmer panel of experts and teach about insects, pest management, turf, weeds, rots and spots, landscapes, vegetables, and critters, as well as landscape design and general horticulture topics. Backyard Farmer (BYF) is a co-production between Nebraska Public Media and Nebraska Extension. Backyard Farmer celebrated its 70th season and is the longest running, locally produced television series in the nation.

Additional global and local impacts were made in the area of hydroponics and urban food systems. Extension professionals trained 62 Trinidad Extension professionals in hydroponics, lead 130 producers and food system participants through a Food & Healthy Farms Conference, and contributed to Omaha's Urban Agriculture ordinance language, pending final approval from the City Council.

## Educating Early Childcare Professionals

Nebraska Extension leverages University research and resources to enhance quality learning experiences for children, families, and early childhood professionals. Programs are taught through a variety of online and in-person courses aimed at improving the growth and development of young children. The Douglas-Sarpy Early Childhood Educator is leading local and statewide efforts to create engaging nature-based outdoor learning environments for youth children at childcare programs and public-access areas such as local parks. This work is done through collaboration with local businesses, community members and UNL landscape architecture, early childhood and psychology professors. Young children were also taught through classroom education.
