4-H Online

4-H Online Enrollment

It's time for 4-H members and volunteers to get enrolled in 4-H for the 2024 4-H year! To enroll in 4-H Online, visit: https://v2.4honline.com/. We have to re-enroll every year. For returning families, please do not create a new account; rather use your log-in credentials for 4honline used in previous years. Instructions can be found here: https://4h.unl.edu/enroll/returning-member. Enrollment instructions for new families can be found here: https://4h.unl.edu/enroll/new-member. Please note the enrollment fee for Frontier county is \$5 per 4-Her and \$2.50 per Clover Kid, if paid directly your 4-H Club or the Frontier County Extension Office. Dues paid online at the time of enrollment will be \$5.25 per 4-Her and \$2.75 per Clover Kid.

When enrolling, please make sure that your account has current contact information and if you'd like to receive text messages as an alert that we've sent an email, make sure to check that box giving us permission to do so.

Our primary form of communication is via email so please ensure that you list an email that you will check. If your 4-H'er would also like to receive the emails, please add their email address to their member profile.

4-H Volunteers DHHS Screening



Every 5 years, ALL 4-H volunteers in certain counties must re-screen with DHHS. 2024 is Frontier County's place within the rotation. You will need to select "Program Volunteer-Selected for Required Screening" to prompt the system for re-screening.

Volunteer Orientation

New in 2024 is volunteer orientation. The Nebraska 4-H Volunteer Orientation serves as an introduction to the 4-H Youth Development program in Nebraska. As part of the screening process, the orientation covers a variety of foundational and essential topics. <u>ALL 4-H volunteers are required to complete the training orientation</u>. Volunteer Impact Study (Distributed by the Nebraska State 4-H Office)

What you do makes a difference! We are excited to share that our state will be participating in the 4-H Volunteer Impact Study of volunteers in the North Central Region. This survey is being conducted as a part of 12 state effort to document the impact of volunteering. It will focus on three areas: the personal benefits of your volunteer experience; the impact you have on the organization by volunteering; and how your volunteer efforts contribute to your community in which you live and work. A random sample of volunteers of 1000 volunteers from each state will be surveyed. This study will be conducted through an electronic survey. If you are selected you will receive an email to let you know you have been selected to participate. You may be picked!!! If you are, please respond. Your comments will be used to quantify the personal, organizational and public impacts of volunteers involved with 4-H Youth Development Programs in our twelve-state region. Big Red Camps

Nebraska 4-H facilitates multiple, simultaneously run Big Red Summer Camps at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln. 2024 \$100 4-H Frontier County and State Camp Scholarships—Due March 1, 2024

These scholarships are given by the Frontier County 4–H Council. Youth can apply by writing the 4–H Council a paragraph stating why they want to attend camp and which camp they would like to attend. 4-H Activities/Camps/Events Grant Money Available

The 4-H Council provides some financial support to 4-H groups and individuals for educational and service-learning opportunities such as camps and contests such as PASE and other events. In order to receive any funds, clubs and/or individuals need to submit a one page proposal stating the proposed date/time frame of the event or project, goals, description, estimated number of participants, amount of other funding and a budget. Submit to Extension Office by the first day of March, May, July, September, November or January so the proposal can be put on the 4-H Council's meeting agenda for the next meeting (the 3rd Monday of the above months). This deadline may require some advance planning. The 4-H Council hopes that clubs and individuals will use these grants to take teams to state competitions, perform community service projects or lead 4-H workshops.

Jarvis Memorial Scholarship

This is a \$500 scholarship that is open to females for the fall 2024/spring 2025 semester. Youth must be planning to attend UNL, have been a 4-H or FFA or FCCLA member for at least 2 years, live in or got school in a select list of counties (Dawson, Frontier, Furnas, Hayes, Lincoln and Red Willow Counties are all on the list, plus others) and must reside in Love Memorial Hall. Corn Yield Challenge for 4-H and FFA Members

We are delighted to announce the Corn Yield Challenge, a prestigious contest open to 4-H members (aged 8 and older as of January 1st) and FFA members (in-school members). This competition is designed to guide participants through a comprehensive exploration of all facets of corn production, including aspects related to agricultural careers associated with corn production.

Key Features:

- Team Participation: Teams comprising two or more youth participants will collaboratively embark on the challenge.
- Innovative Practices: Youth will be tasked with implementing a production practice differing from the norm, with the goal of assessing its impact on increasing corn yield.
- Data Collection: The Corn Yield Challenge management summary will systematically gather crucial information, including yields, cropping history, and production details.
- Recognition and Rewards: Outstanding achievements will be duly rewarded with cash prizes and plaques for the top three teams:

First Place: \$1,000Second Place: \$500Third Place: \$250

• Special Awards: In addition to the top rankings, commendable efforts will be acknowledged through the "Extra Mile" and "Ag Literacy" Awards, each carrying a value of \$200.

January 27th and 30th will be used for the Stockville fair's rate-of-gain and the Eustis Fair & Corn Show can use either one or March 2nd for rate-of-gain. ID sheets and more information should have arrived in your US Post Office Box. Please contact the Extension office if you did not receive this letter or have questions. Please pass this information on to any new 4-H families as well.

- County/State 4-H ear tags will be available for purchase at the Extension office and at weigh dates. County only tags are \$1.00. EID tags for Nebraska State Fair and/or AkSarBen are \$4.00.
 All county/state fair sheep and goats MUST use scrapie tag for ID.
- County Livestock ID Sheet & Photo are DUE June 15th in the Extension Office. ID sheets and tags are available at the extension office.
- You can also find the ID sheets online at https://extension.unl.edu/statewide/frontier/4-h-livestock-horse/NOTE: County Market Beef ID sheets are due June 15th.
