4-H/FFA

<u>Placing:</u> All exhibits will be judged and placed according to merit. Purple - superior; Blue - excellent; Red - good; and White - acceptable. The objectives of the project are primarily focused on a high level of individual planning and creativity. Exhibitors must receive a purple or blue placing before being eligible for a trophy or rosette award.

General Rules: Any 4-H'er (8 by January 1st of current year) can exhibit at State Fair except in classes where the presences of the 4-H'er is required (i.e. animal exhibits, judging, presentations, fashion revue). They must be 10 years of age by January 1, 2022 for these classes. 4-H/FFA members may exhibit only in project areas in which they are enrolled during the current year's work. 4-H/FFA members are ineligible to exhibit in 4-H/FFA classes if they have reached their 19th birthday before January 1, 2022.

In events where there are two divisions:

Senior Division - 12 years of age or older by January 1, 2022

Junior Division - Under 12 years of age

In events where there are three divisions:

Senior Division - 14 years of age or older by January 1, 2022

Intermediate Division - 11 to 13 years of age

Junior Division - 8 to 10 years of age

PREMIUM CHECKS

The Extension Office will no longer be mailing premium or sale checks. 4-H'ers are responsible for picking their own checks up from the Extension Office. From the day checks are available, 4-H'ers will have 60 days to pick up and deposit the checks or they will be forfeited. If someone other than the 4-H'er or their parent needs to pick up the check, the Extension Office must be notified by the 4-H'er or parent prior to the check being picked up. Exhibitors not enrolled into 4-H by June 15th will forfeit premium money.

PROTEST OF APPEALS PROCESS

- A.) The respective division superintendent has the authority to make the appropriate decisions based on the County Fair Premium Book.
- B.) A committee shall be appointed to serve as a protest group. They will meet daily, if needed to act upon concerns all protest must be submitted in writing and signed.
- C.) Written protest must be submitted to the County Extension 4-H Educator. The Extension Educator will convene the committee for their deliberation.
- D.) Written protest must include:
 - 1. Number of persons involved
 - 2. Description of the concern
 - 3. Situation and documentation
 - 4. Recommendation for correction
 - 5. Specific action, rule etc. in question
 - 6. Additional persons the committee may contact for clarifications
 - 7. Procedures and/or steps carried out by the person involved prior to submission to the Extension Educator
- E.) The committee will review the written protest. They may discuss the situation with the affected person(s) including the County Fair Superintendent if appropriate prior to making the final decision. The committee will recommend appropriate action to the 4-H Extension Educator in writing. The recommendation of decision will be followed and communicated both verbally and in writing to the group or individual affected.
- F.) When involved in a protest, the exhibitor may be allowed to show but results of showing will be subject to change based on the outcome of the protest process. This facilitates for smooth operation of the show and facilitates appropriate processing.
- G.) The show management reserves the right to withhold premium and/or award. The exhibitor may also be excluded from the show if actions warrant.
- H.) The appeals process in limited to the 4-H/FFA exhibitor, parent, or volunteer leader.
- I.) Protests will not be accepted after the exhibit is released from the County Fair.

LIVESTOCK

General Rules: Youth for the quality care of animals (YQCA); All youth who will be exhibiting beef, swine, sheep, dairy, goats, poultry or rabbits at the County Fair will be required to be certified in YQCA.

Entries: Market animal entries must be weighed by an official at the fairgrounds on entry day. To be eligible for premiums in this division an exhibitor must be a FURNAS COUNTY 4-H/FFA member Members may show no more than four animal entries for the same purpose. (A Pen of Three is considered as one entry). All dairy, market and breeding exhibits must be on the fairgrounds by Noon July 13, 2022. Weigh-in of each species will be held from 10:00 a.m. – 12:00 p.m. Exhibits removed prior to release time on July 16th at 10:00 a.m. will forfeit premium money. Stall assignments will be posted on the ends of the barns.

ALL ANIMALS MUST BE SHOWN BY OWNERS UNLESS EXCUSED BY THE DEPARTMENT SUPERINTENDENTS. Substitute showmen must be a Furnas County 4-H/FFA member.

Stalling: Stall assignments will be posted in each barn on the day of check-in. Wood chips will be provided for bedding in the beef barn, but all other species will be responsible for bringing their own bedding.

Clover Kids: Clover Kids may show one (1) animal, in each of the four market areas: Bucket Calf, Market Swine, Sheep or Goat. They must pre-enter for fair; you can get pre-entry forms from your local Extension Office. Clover kids are welcome to show one of their older siblings' animals. Clover kids that have their own animal are asked to bring their animal the day of show and take home the same day. Exhibit will receive a ribbon and a \$2.00 premium.

SHOWMANSHIP CONTEST

(Dairy, Beef, Sheep, Swine, Goat, Horse, Rabbit, Poultry)
Purple \$5.00 Blue \$4.00 Red \$3.00 White \$2.00
The contest is open to any 4-H/FFA exhibitor who owns, grooms, fits and shows their animal to the best of their ability. Ribbons and premium money will be awarded to all contestants.

LIVESTOCK JUDGING CONTEST

Purple \$5.00 Blue \$4.00 Red \$3.00 White \$2.00

Contest is limited to 4-H/FFA members. Contests will evaluate a class of beef, swine, sheep, and goats. Ribbons and premium money will be awarded to all contestants.

ROUND ROBIN CHAMPIONSHIP

The overall Round Robin Champion Showmanship will be held 2:30 p.m. on Friday, July 15th. Youth who enter showmanship classes will do so with the intent to enter the Round Robin Showmanship if they are selected as class champion. Champion Intermediate and Senior Showmanship winners of the Beef, Sheep, Swine, and Goat Showmanship classes will be eligible to compete in the Round Robin competition. If the Champion is unable to participate, only the Reserve Champion will be invited to participate. Participants of each division will show the same species at the same time and then a rotation will be setup. Four animals will be selected at random and used for both age groups. Selection of Champion will be based upon youth's overall knowledge and ability to show the animal rather than on fitting.

DRESS CODE

4-H/FFA members exhibiting in Beef, Sheep, Swine, Goat, Poultry, Rabbits and Small Animals are required to wear either a 4-H/FFA t-shirt or white shirt with a 4-H Chevron. 4-H Chevrons cost \$3.00 dollars and you may find them at the office on the fairgrounds.

LIVESTOCK SALE

4-H'ers must declare which animals are being sold in the sale at weigh-in or an hour after the livestock shows (only exception is if you receive Grand or Reserve Champion). Base bids will be obtained from buyers for each species. Each 4-H'er will be limited to selling 2 market animals (Market Beef, Market Sheep, Market Swine, Market Goat) through the ring. Other market animals may be sold for the base price. The Livestock Sale Committee will distribute sale checks to each exhibitor. Each 4-H'er must be present on sale day and sell his/her own animal through the ring. If the 4-H'er cannot be present on sale day, the 4-H'er will need to find a private buyer or can sell for base bid. The weight that was recorded on entry weigh-in day will be used for the sale weight. If the champion. reserve champion or any animal is not to be sold, it will not be allowed to go through the sale ring. The 4-H Livestock Sale Committee will be the authority for making any final decision regarding the County Jr. Livestock Sale. The 2022 Sale Order: Swine,

HEALTH

All animals may be inspected for general health by a veterinarian. Unhealthy animals will not be allowed to remain on the fairgrounds. Any animal found to be infected with an infectious, contagious, or otherwise transmissible disease shall be removed from the fairgrounds. (Transmissible diseases will be determined by a veterinarian.)

HERDSMANSHIP

Purple \$5.00 Blue \$4.00 Red \$3.00 White \$2.00 Exhibitors are expected to take pride in their animals and their living space while at home and at the fair. Herdsmanship is very important in the welfare of each animal and should be done in order to keep the animal as comfortable and clean as possible. Herdsmanship is also important at fair to give a nice presentation of the animals to the general public. All livestock exhibitors are automatically entered into the Herdsmanship contest.

Herdsmanship Responsibility: Herdsmanship duties are the responsibility of the exhibitor, not leaders or parents. It is not required for an exhibitor to be present at all times, but maintaining a clean space is important at all times. Stalls/ pens should be clean with proper bedding between 8:00 a.m. and 8:00 p.m. Herdsmanship is judged for the following species and each species is judged as a separate division: Beef/ Dairy, Sheep, Goat, and Swine. Herdsmanship may be judged anytime between 8:00 a.m. & 8:00 p.m. Herdsmanship will not be judged for each species during their respective show time. 4-H'ers chosen to receive the Herdsmanship Award will receive a coupon for a free dessert at the Blue Ribbon and the "Cleanest Exhibit" sign to display on their pen.

Scoring: Herdsmanship will be scored based on the following areas:

- Cleanliness of pens/stalls, bedding, and alleys
- Cleanliness/ neatness of tack/feed area
- General care of animal (groomed, fed, watered)
- Stall Cards in place and legible
- Club/Name signs (not handed out by Extension Office are welcome, but must be displayed neatly)

<u>Dairy Herd</u>: Exhibitors in the Diary Herd Class will enter and show three animals. At least one of the three must be a cow that has freshened and has been fresh long enough to have projected 305-day M.E. At least one animal must be "bred" by exhibitor, and all three must be of the same breed. Only DHIA or DHIR records are acceptable including am/pm programs. Production must be verified by a superintendent. Dairy herds may be either grade or registered. Herds will be scored and awarded herd ribbons on the basis of the current years Dairy Herd scorecard. Each exhibitor is expected to fill out his or her own scorecard and turn it into the office prior to the show.

Supporting Material - All entries must have a statement explaining:

- The purpose of the exhibit
- Exhibitors are encouraged to show evidence of their personal field experiences, study or observations that relate to their exhibit. This helps the judges understand what the 4-H'er did and learned in the process that led to the exhibit.

References - All exhibitors should reference material sources or supporting information used in exhibits (i.e., if questions from a game were taken from an outside source, they must be referenced). **Identification** All entries should be labeled with the exhibitor's name.

Identification - All entries should be labeled with the exhibitor's name, club, and county.

Project Materials - The official reference for the citizenship projects is Citizenship Public Adventures Kit (MI 7329) and Citizen Guide's Handbook (BU 7330). Other helpful citizenship references include Citizenship Washington Focus guides, Character Counts! and Service Learning Information.

A120001 Care Package Display (SF182) This exhibit is a display about the PROCESS of creating and giving a care package, not the actual care package. You may use a poster, PowerPoint or another multi-media program to explain the PROCESS of developing and giving a care package to a service organization. PowerPoint should be saved to a USB/thumb drive. You need to answer the following questions in your exhibit.

- 1. How did you select the organization?
- 2. What items did you include in your care package?
- 3. Why did you select those items?
- 4. How did it feel to present your care pack to the organization?
- 5. What did you learn from this experience?

6. Other information that you feel is important about the care package or organization.

*Some examples of care packages are: Backpack for school supplies, litter pan for animal shelter items, suitcase for abuse shelter or homeless shelter, etc.

A120002 Citizenship Game (SF182) - Which could include but is not limited to symbol flash cards, question and answer board or stimulation with props. Clear instructions on how to play the game and what the game hopes to accomplish must be included.

A120003 Patriotic or Cultural Fine Arts (SF182) - Can be made of any art media but should tie in the relevance of the artwork to citizenship.

A120004 Public Adventure Scrapbook (SF182) - Should describe your Public Adventure or Service Learning Activity. Scrapbooks must measure no more than $16" \times 16"$.

A120005 Public Adventure Poster (SF182) - Should describe your Public Adventure or Service Learning Activity. Display posters must be stiff enough to stand when supported from behind and below. Length and width must be no more than 24" x 28".

A120006 Written or Recorded Stakeholder Interview (SF182) - Should follow the outline found in the Public Adventures Curriculum. It may be written or recorded. Recordings should be saved as a .wav or .mp3 file; a USB/thumb drive will be accepted.

A120007 Written Citizenship Essay (SF182) - Is designed to promote good citizenship and patriotism. This essay is open to all age groups. All essays should be 300 - 400 typewritten words.

A120008 for 9th-12th Graders Only: Oral Citizenship Essay (SF182) - Addressing the theme "Freedom's Obligations" should be 3-5 minutes. No background music, singing or other enhancement allowed. All essays should be saved as a.wav or mp3 file; a USB/thumb drive will be accepted. Voice tone should be normal and conversational. A copy of the written essay should be attached.

A120009 Service Items (SF182) - Can include but aren't limited to lap quilt, Quilt of Valor and homemade toys. Only non-perishable items will be accepted. Attached to the exhibit should be an explanation of who the recipient was and how the service project was made and used. The service item could be part of a larger community service effort.

A120010 4-H Club Exhibit (SF182) - Should depict what a 4-H club has done in the area of community service. This item could include, but is not limited to, a service item, poster, scrapbook, and cultural or creative arts item or care package, Quilt of Valor.

4-H members are allowed to exhibit in only one photography level. **RULES:**

An image may only be used on one exhibit with the exception of portfolios which may include images entered in other classes.

Cameras - Photos may be taken with any type of film or digital camera, including phones, tablets, and drones.

Photos must be shot by the 4-H member during the current project year with the exception of Portfolios which may include images captured and/or exhibited in previous years.

Securely attach photos, mats, backing, and data tags. Exhibits that are poorly attached may be disqualified. Do not use photo corners, borders, or place coverings over the exhibits.

Portfolios - All portfolios must include the following information: 1) 1-page max bio, 2) table of contents, 3) year each photo was taken, 4) device make and model used to capture each image, 5) title for each image, and 5) reflections for each photo. When writing reflections, youth should focus on what new photography techniques or skills they were practicing when they took the photo, what makes the image successful, and what could have been done to improve the image. Portfolios may be presented in either print or digital formats:

- 1. Printed portfolios should be presented in a 8.5x11 three-ring binder or similar book format. Recommended photo size is 8x10. Matting is not necessary.
- 2. Digital portfolios may be presented online and must be exhibited along with a single 8.5x11 flyer. Flyers must include a link, URL,

or QR code that takes users (judges and fairgoers) to their online portfolio.

Display Exhibits – At State Fair, display exhibits are only accepted in Level II. Displays consist of three 4x6 photos mounted on a single horizontal 11x14 black or white poster or mat board. Incorrect sizes will not be accepted. No foam board backing should be used. Each photo in the display must be numbered using a pencil. Numbers should be readable but not distract from the overall display. No titles, captions, or stick-on numbers will be allowed. Photos may be mounted vertically or horizontally. RULES:

- All participants must be 10 years old before January 1 of the current year.
- A team presentation, consisting of two (2) individuals, may be given for any class; there is no separate class for team presentations.
- Each participant is required to wear one of following during their presentation: the 4-H chevron, the 4-H emblem, or a 4-H shirt.
- Enrollment in the project area in which the participant is making a presentation is not required.

ILLUSTRATED PRESENTATIONS, DIVISION 151

An Illustrated Presentation, given by one (1) individual or a team of two (2) individuals, is a live presentation with a formal talk where youth will use visual aids (such as props, posters, computer-based visuals, handouts, video, etc.) to show and tell others how to do something. Presentations are given on a stage/platform. Judge views the entire presentation and engages in a question and answer session following presentation.

Participant Requirements:

- Youth may only participate in one class within Division 151.
- Time limit is 6-8 minutes for a presentation given by an individual, and 8-10 minutes for a presentation given by a team. Participants may be penalized if their presentation exceeds the time limits.

Presentation Topic:

- All 4-H Presentations topics should be related to what the 4-H youth is learning through 4-H educational experience focused on the priorities of career and college readiness, community development, entrepreneurship, food supply confidence, healthy living, leadership development, and STEM (science, technology, engineering, math).
- Enrollment in the project area in which the participant is making a presentation is not required.
- 4-H Presentations should include an introduction (the "why" portion of the topic), a body (the "show and tell" portion of the topic), and a conclusion/summary (the "what" portion of the topic).

All garments and/ or articles made as part of a clothing project, must be entered on July 9th. Clothing members will receive a judging schedule prior to the 9th. A 4-H'er may have unlimited exhibits per class.

RULES:

General: Garments as listed may be made for self (4-H member) or another person. Garments will be displayed by county. 4-H'ers enrolled in clothing projects should continue their skill development. Once you have exhibited in a higher level, you are not eligible to exhibit in a lower level. Ex. Once you exhibit in STEAM Clothing 3, you are not eligible to exhibit in STEAM Clothing 2.

Criteria for Judging: Refer to the Nebraska 4-H website for current state fair scoresheets at www.4h.unl.edu. In addition, all entries must conform to rules and regulations as set forth in the current Nebraska State Fair Book.

Entry Tags: Every clothing exhibit must be described on the appropriate entry tag accompanying it (for example: dark blue wool skirt and jacket, red and white figured blouse). Entry tag placement: as you look at the garment place the entry tag securely using straight pins or safety pins on the right side of the garment and the hook of the hanger to the left. **Identification Labels**: Each item entered as a clothing, knitting or crochet exhibit must have a label attached stating: County, Exhibitor's name and age, project name and class in which garment is entered, and the number of years enrolled in the project exhibited. Wool entries must have the fiber content listed on the identification label. Attach a label on every component of the outfit using safety pins or by basting. Not responsible for unlabeled items.

Preparation of Exhibits: Please bring all wearable exhibits on wire hangers or hangers with a swivel hook ONLY. All exhibits not suitable for hanging should be entered in a self-sealing plastic bag and hung on a hanger. Wool garments and garments with narrow straps hang better on other hangers, i.e., wooden or notched plastic hangers with a swivel hook. As you look at the garment, place the hook of the hanger pointing to the left. Fasten skirts, shorts, and pants to skirt/pant hangers or safety pin on hanger. Each piece should be entered on its own hanger. If more

than one hanger is used for an entry, fasten hangers belonging to one exhibit together with twist ties or rubber bands.

Quilt Quest

**All static exhibits must have received a purple ribbon at the county fair to advance to the State Fair.

In Quilt Quest, 4-Hers learn skills as they progress through the project. The least experienced 4-H exhibitor will select fabric, cut, and sew together only squares or rectangles in making the quilt top. They may have additional guidance in piecing the quilt block and layering together the quilt top, inner batting and the quilt bottom. Another person can do the quilting for them.

In the Premier class, the 4-Her has developed skills to be able to do all of the work by himself/herself. This includes pattern and fabric selection, cutting and sewing individual pieces, layering the quilt top/batting/backing together, and quilting. Quilting may be done by hand, by sewing machine or by a commercial-grade quilting machine. After quilting, the 4-Her must finish the quilt by "squaring it up," put binding on the edge, and placing a label on the quilt which provides details about the quilt making process for historical purposes.

Rules:

- A. All entry cards and support information must be attached using a safety pin. **No straight pins.**
- B. When judging Quilt Quest exhibits, the judges consider **SF209** "Standards for Judging Quilts and Quilted Items."
- C. For all classes, 4-Hers can choose fabrics for the quilt by selecting fabric from fabric bolts. 4-Hers may also use "fabric collections" offered by manufacturers in a particular designer or fabric line. Examples of fabric collection include:
 - o **Jelly Rolls** are made of (up to) 40 different strips of 2 ½" wide fabric laying on top of one another and rolled up to look like a jelly roll. The fabric is created by one designer or fabric line and compliments each other. In many cases, less skilled 4-Hers find it difficult to cut narrow strips with a rotary cutter and ruler, so this fabric selection may make it easier as they learn.
 - Honey Buns are made like the Jelly Rolls with 1 ½" strips of fabrics.
 - Layer Cakes are 10" squares of fabric from a manufactured designer or fabric line with different pieces of fabric "layered" on top of one another to look like a piece of cake.
 - o **Charm Packs** are made of 5" squares of coordinating fabric and may be tied up with a string or scrap of fabric.
 - Candies are 2.5" squares of fabric from a manufactured designer or fabric line.
 - **Turnover** is a collection of coordinating fabrics that are cut into 6" triangles.
 - Fat Quarters are ½ yard cuts of fabric which are cut in half to make a rectangle that is approximately 18" x 21".
 (One half yard of fabric yields 2 fat quarters). The "fat quarter" can be more economical to purchase for a smaller quilt because the purchaser does not have to buy the entire yardage width.

 Fabric Kit is a collection of fabrics cut in large pieces to accommodate the requirements of a particular quilt pattern. The 4-Her must cut out all of the smaller squares, rectangles, etc. to make the quilt top according to the pattern directions.

After fabric selection, youth can use a variety tools for cutting the fabric and completing the quilt. Cutting into pattern pieces may include hand roller die cutting machines that cut particular shapes which can be appliqued to fabric. This is allowed in the construction of the quilt.

- A quilted exhibit is made up of at least 3 layers. Exhibits must be quilted or tied through all layers.
- Fleece blankets are not eligible in this division.
- Quilts must have a permanent label on the back in the bottom right corner with quilter's name and date of completion.

Class C229010 - Exploring Quilts (SF208C)

Illustrate some aspect of quilts or quilt making. Examples include, but are not limited to: language arts, quilts of different cultures, chemistry, design, preservation, history, and construction, math-conversion of quilt patterns, textiles/fabrics, computerization, and entrepreneurship. History may include history of an old quilt or history/research of a particular style of quilt such as Baltimore album quilts or Amish quilts. Exhibit may be a 14 x 22 inch poster, notebook, CD, PowerPoint, Prezi, DVD, YouTube, or other technique. All items in an exhibit must be attached together and labeled. RULES:

- 1.) The official reference for all forestry projects is the Tree Identification Manual (4-H 332) which was recently revised and is available for purchase from UNL Marketplace. Other helpful forestry references include Trees of Nebraska (EC 92-1774-X), Leafing Out (4-H431) and Plant a Tree (EC 17-11-80).
- 2.) Display "boards" must be made from wood or wood composite, e.g. plywood, fiberboard, or Masonite, 1/4" to ½" thick and no larger than 24" x 24". Display boards may be coated, e.g., painted or varnished, on both sides to prevent warping.
- 3.) Display "posters" must be made from a material, e.g. foam board or poster board that will stand upright without buckling, and be no larger than 24" x 24".
- 4.) Display "books" must measure no more than 16" x 16".
- 5.) At least 5 of the 10 samples in Class 2, 3, 4, and 5 must be from the list of 60 species described in 4-H 332. Samples must be from 10 different tree species. For example, Emerald Queen Maple and Crimson King Maple are both varieties of the same species (Norway Maple), and thus have the same genus and species name, i.e. Acer platanoides. All samples must be from trees, NO shrubs. If more than 10 samples are included in the display, only the first 10 samples from the current year will be judged.
- 6.) Due to emerald ash borer infestation, no true ash species (Green Ash, White Ash, Black Ash, or Blue Ash) may be included in any collections. Inclusion of a true ash species will result of the project being disqualified.
- 7.) Remember that other general labeling standards apply. For example, scientific names are always italicized or underlined. Also, the first letter of a Genus name is always capitalized. The first letter of a species name is always lower case. When required, always indicate complete scientific names (Genus and species) and common names, (e.g. Norway Maple) even when "variety names" are included. For example, the scientific name of

- Emerald Queen Maple is Acer platanoides and the common name is Norway maple. "Emerald Queen" may be included as the variety name, but variety names are not required.
- 8.) How well the exhibitor follows written directions is an important factor in judging.

D320001 Design Your Own Exhibit Prepare an educational exhibit about some aspect of trees, forests, or forestry that is of special interest to you. Possible topics include paper recycling, wildfire, forest products, forest wildlife, or forest pests. The only requirement is that the display must be no larger than 24 inches by 24 inches by 24 inches.

Photographs, drawings, samples, charts, posters, etc. can be used, but include enough information to adequately explain the topic. Your display should be substantially different from other display classes. Be as creative as you like.

D320002 Leaf Display the leaf display must include samples of "complete leaves" from at least 10 different tree species. The display must include at least two samples of simple leaves, compound leaves, and conifer leaves. Leaves should be pressed, dried, and mounted.

- Collection: Whenever possible, collect leaves from mature trees. Collect leaves any time after they have reached full size, usually beginning in early summer. Leaf samples should be in good condition and representative of the average leaves on the tree. Keep in mind that shaded leaves are often much larger than normal. Carefully remove leaves from the twig with the entire petiole or rachis intact. After collection, fresh leaf samples can be temporarily stored within the pages of an old magazine, but they should be properly pressed and dried for display. Be sure to record pertinent information during collection. All collection must be done by the exhibitor.
- Mounting: Leaves may be displayed in a notebook or on a display board. Any method may be used to mount leaves, e.g. wire, glue, tape, staples, plastic bags, but be sure all their features can be clearly identified.
- Labeling: The label for each sample must include:
 - 1.Common name 2. Scientific name 3. Leaf type 4. Leaf arrangement (for broadleaf trees) 5. Leaf composition (for broadleaf trees) 6. Collector's name 7. Collection date 8. Collection location (be specific, state and county at a minimum) If a twig is included with a sample, indicate "twig included" on the label. For example, the twig may be included with an eastern red cedar sample because the leaves are very small and difficult to remove from the twig.

**Supplemental information, e.g. general uses, common products, fall color, etc., may be included to enhance educational value.

D320003 Twig Display the twig display must include twig samples from at least 10 different tree species. The display must include at least two samples of opposite and alternate leaf arrangements from broadleaf trees.

- **Collection:** Twig samples should be collected during the dormant season (November April) when the buds are mature. Twig samples must be at least 6 inches long and exhibit buds. Leaves must be removed, and side branches must be trimmed to less than 1 inch in length. All collection must be done by the exhibitor.
- Mounting: Twigs must be mounted on a display board. Any method, e.g. wire, glue, tape, staples, plastic bags, etc., may be used to mount twigs, but be sure all features can be clearly identified. The non-terminal end must be cut at a slant so the pith can be seen.
- Labeling: The label for each sample must include:
 1. Common name 2. Scientific name 3. Leaf arrangement (for broadleaf trees) 4. Collector's name 5. Collection date 6.
 Collection location (be specific, state and county at a minimum)
 **Supplemental information, e.g. general uses, tree characteristics, etc., may be included to enhance educational value.

D320004 Seed Display the seed display must include seed samples from at least 10 different tree species.

- Collection: Tree seeds should be collected at the time of year when they mature, which varies widely depending upon tree species. For example, Silver maple seeds mature in May while red oak acorns do not mature until September. Seed samples should be free of insect or disease symptoms. Remember to display seeds, not fruit. For example, the seed of honey locust is enclosed in a pod. Remove and display the seed, not just the pod. It is acceptable to display the fruit with the seed, but clearly label each. All collection must be done by the exhibitor.
- **Mounting:** Seeds may be displayed in a variety of ways, e.g. mounted on a display board, displayed in jars in a rack, etc., but they must be securely mounted and easily viewed. Be as creative as you like.
- **Labeling:** The label for each sample must include: 1. Common name 2. Scientific name 3. Type of fruit, if known (e.g. samara, pod, nut, legume, etc.) 4. Collector's name 5.

Collection date 6. Collection location (be specific, state and county at a minimum)

**Supplemental information, e.g. maturity date, average number of seed in the fruit, etc., may be included to enhance educational value.

D320005 Wood Display the wood display must include wood samples from at least 10 different tree species.

- **Preparation:** Samples may be of any shape, e.g. sections from a board, wood cylinders turned on a lathe, horizontal or vertical cross sections of a small log with bark attached. Etc., but all samples should be the same shape, e.g. all wood cylinders or all sections of a board. Each sample can be no larger than 4 inches by 4 inches by 4 inches. Cut surfaces should be sanded to show the grain. Treating samples with a clear finish (no stain) is optional. All collection must be done by the exhibitor.
- **Mounting:** Samples may be displayed in a variety of ways, e.g. mounted on a display board, displayed in a box or rack, etc., but they must be securely mounted and easily viewed. Be as creative as you like.
- Labeling: The label for each sample must include
 - Common name 2. Scientific name 3. Wood type (softwood or hardwood) 4. Collector's name 5. Collection date 6. collection location (be specific, state and county at a minimum)

**Supplemental information, e.g. common products, wood density, etc., may be included to enhance education value.

Class D320006 Cross Section a disc cut from a tree species listed in 4H 332. The sample must be collected within 1 year of the state fair judging day. The disc must measure 6 to 12 inches in diameter and 1—3 inches thick. The bark should be firmly attached, which may be difficult if the tree was dead when the disc was cut. Sand at least one side of the disc so the grain can be easily seen. If the disc is treated with a clear finish, both sides must be treated to minimize warping. As the disc dries, some cracking or checking can be expected and is allowed.

labeling: The following parts must be clearly and accurately labeled on the cross section with pins, paper tags, or some other form of identification: 1. pith 2. Heartwood 3. Sapwood 4. One growth ring (beginning and end) 5. Cambium 6. Bark On a separate label attached to the back of the disc must include: 7. common name 8. Scientific name 9. Tree classification (softwood or hardwood) 10. Age (of the cross section) 11. Collector's name 12. Collection date 13. collection location (be specific, state and county at a minimum)

D320007 Parts of a Tree (*this project is only for ages 8-11) Prepare a poster, no larger than 24 inches x 24 inches that clearly identifies the main external parts of any tree: 1. Trunk 2. Crown 3. Roots 4. Leaves 5. Flowers 6. Fruit 7. Buds 8. Bark Identifying other internal parts, e.g. phloem, xylem, cambium, annual ring, pith, etc., is optional. Attach a separate label on the back of the poster that includes the exhibitor's name and age.

D320008 Living Tree Display a living tree seedling grown by the exhibitor from seed in the display container. The seed must be from a species listed in 4H 332. The seedling must be 60 days to 1 year old (on State Fair judging day). The display container must contain at least 8 inches of soil (potting mix or suitable natural soil), have drainage holes (s), and a drain pan to catch drainage water.

- **Labeling:** A waterproof label must be attached and include:
 - 1. Common name 2. Scientific name 3. Seed treatments (if any)
 - 4. Planting date 5. Emergence date 6. Collector's name.

**Supplemental information about the tree, e.g. where the seed was collected, growth measurements, uses for that species, etc., may be included in an attached notebook, poster, etc. to enhance educational value. Supplemental information will be an important factor in judging. D320009 - Forest Product Display - Prepare a visual display and/or collection tracing the origin of one non-lumber product that comes from trees and/or forests. The display must be no larger than 24 inches by 22 inches by 28 inches. Photographs, drawings, samples, charts, posters, etc. can be used. Posters submitted may be no larger than 22" x 28" and may be either vertical or horizontal. The contestant must identify what species of tree the product is derived from and where the product is harvested, grown, or otherwise collected. The product listed must be partially or fully derived from trees; if partial the approximate percentage should be articulated in the display.

- The goal of this exhibit is for students to learn that many products come from trees and forests and to explore one of these products through in-depth study.
- Information about the tree or forest product: e.g. information about harvesting, processing, industry information, and environmental or other benefits may be included to enhance educational value. Supplemental information will be an important factor in judging but should not exceed three printed pages of text. Cite sources of information.
- Personal interviews with industry professionals are encouraged as a source of information.

D320010 - Forest Health Display - Prepare a visual display outlining a specific forest health issue such as a tree disease, insect pest, animal- or human-caused damage, or an abiotic issue such as weather damage. The display must be no larger than 24 inches by 24 inches by 24 inches. Original photographs, drawings, samples, charts, posters, etc. can be used. Actual specimens are strongly encouraged but must be properly preserved, i.e. insects pinned or placed in vials of alcohol, leaves pressed and dried. Posters submitted may be no larger than 24 inches x 24 inches.

- Explain through the display what species of trees the health issue affects, diagnostic features of the issue (symptoms in trees, identifying features of the pest, etc.), and management options.
- Include common and scientific names of trees and pests.
- Supplemental information about the tree or forest health issue:
 e.g. origin, proliferation in Nebraska/United States, and
 physiological effects on the tree may be included to enhance
 educational value. Supplemental information will be an
 important factor in judging but should not exceed three printed
 pages of text. Cite sources of information.
- Attach a separate label on the back of the display that includes the exhibitor's name and age.

D320011 - Wildfire Prevention Poster - Prepare a poster, no larger than 24 inches x 24 inches that promotes wildfire prevention strategies. Strategies articulated in the poster can include personal and/or land management actions. Attach a separate label on the back of the poster that includes the exhibitor's name and age.

 Supplemental information about wildfire prevention should be attached to the poster: e.g. frequency of wildfires in Nebraska/United States, financial costs of wildfires, environmental factors that contribute to wildfires, etc. to enhance educational value. Supplemental information will be an important factor in judging but should not exceed three printed pages of text. Cite sources of information

D320012 - Sustainable Landscape Diorama - Box must be no larger than 24" x 24". The exhibit must show a Nebraska landscape that includes elements such as windbreaks, fields, pastureland, CRP, public lands, community/municipal landscapes. The goal of this exhibit is for

students to articulate conservation and sustainability best-practices that can be implemented on a landscape, while addressing landowner and other stakeholder interests.

- Label point/nonpoint sources of pollution, carbon sequestration, water-wise practices, wildfire prevention strategies, renewable energy sources, and other conservation practices as well as at least 10 species of plants included in the diorama.
- Attach to the exhibit a brief report including supplemental information describing the diorama, defining conservation practices, and outlining opportunities for landscape improvements to enhance educational value. Supplemental information will be an important factor in judging but should not exceed three printed pages of text. Cite sources of information.

D320013 – Tree Planting Project Display – Plant a tree in your community. Prepare a visual display where the student articulates proper tree planting techniques, why the individual tree species was chosen, as well as steps taken to continue care for the tree after initial planting. The display must be no larger than 24 inches by 24 inches by 24 inches. Photographs, drawings, samples, charts, posters, etc. can be used. Posters submitted may be no larger than 24 inches x 24 inches. The tree must have been planted 60 days to 1 year before State Fair judging day. Students must obtain permission from necessary authorities and property owners before planting any trees.

- Labeling: the following information about the tree must be included in the display: 1. common name 2. scientific name 3. planting location 4. planting date 5. tree source 6. planter's name 7. proper tree planting steps 8. tree care (after planting)
- Supplemental information about the tree: e.g. why the species
 was chosen, growth measurements, uses for that species, etc.,
 may be included in an attached notebook, poster, etc. to enhance
 educational value. Supplemental information will be an
 important factor in judging but should not exceed three printed
 pages of text. Cite sources of information.

Guidelines:

Show What You Did and Learned - All exhibitors will show evidence of

their personal field experiences or observations that relate to their exhibit. This helps judges understand what the 4-H'er did and learned in the process that led to the exhibit.

Proper Credit - Show proper credit by listing the sources of plans or other supporting information used in exhibits.

Whose Exhibit? - The exhibitor's name, county, and age must be on the back or bottom of all displays.

Wildlife and Wildlife Laws - "Animal" or "wildlife" in the following classes includes wild fish, amphibians, reptiles, birds, or mammals. Please make sure you are following all appropriate wildlife laws.

Project Materials - Related project booklets include Exploring Your Environment Series, 4-H Shooting Sports, Amphibians, Bird Behavior (EC 59381), Fishing for Adventure Project Manuals, Wildlife Conservation (4-H 125), Geology, and Outdoor Adventure. Other resources include: Outdoor Skills: Learning Science in the Outdoors series (Science Signature Outcome Program)

outdoornebraska.gov/afterschool/ and www.whep.org.

Board and Poster Exhibits - Mount all board exhibits on ¼" plywood, Masonite, or similar panel no larger than 24" high by 24" wide. Poster exhibits should be on regular poster sheets, no larger than standard size (22 by 28 inches) but half size, 22 by 14 inches, is recommended.

WILDLIFE AND HOW THEY LIVE, DIVISION 340

Wildlife and How they Live (Classes 1-4) Examples: life history or other facts about one type of wildlife; how to manage wildlife on a farm or in town; managing habitat for one kind of wildlife; life requirements for one kind of wildlife during one season or through the year; wildlife behavior and habitats.

D340001 Mammal Display (SF154)

D340002 Bird Display (SF154)

D340003 Fish Display (SF155)

D340004 Reptile or Amphibian Display (SF156)

D340005 Wildlife Connections (SF157)

All displays should show two or more interactions (connections) that occur between/among animals or between animals and their habitat. Displays might show how animals interact with other animals, with people, or with their habitat.

Examples:

1. Food chain display. Use pictures, drawings, or other items to illustrate the source of food energy and where it goes - who eats whom or what. Use arrows to show the direction of the energy (food) flow.

- 2. Show the role of predators, scavengers, insect eaters, or others in nature.
- 3. Show how wildlife numbers (populations) change through the year.
- 4. Show predation, competition, or other behavioral interactions of wildlife.
- 5. Choose one kind of wildlife and make observations through a season or year, keep notes of interactions, then make a display of what you saw.

D340006 Wildlife Tracks (SF158) Board or diorama-type box exhibit. Make a display of animal tracks using plaster-of-paris casts. There are 3 options. For all options, include a brief description of your experiences in making the tracks so the judges better understand what you did and learned. Positive casts (impressions as they would be in nature) are preferred, but not required.

Option 1 should show plaster-of-paris tracks of five or more kinds of wildlife along with a picture or illustration of each kind of animal. (OR)

Option 2 should show two or more plaster-of-paris tracks of one specific kind of wildlife and should include a picture or illustration of the animal, what the animal may eat, and what may eat the animal. **Option 3** should show two tracks and include the animal's habitat needs including preferred food, shelter, water, and space in addition to picture or illustration of the animal.

D340007 Wildlife Knowledge Check (SF159) Use electrical circuits, pictures, or other methods of teaching wildlife identification or other wildlife conservation or shooting sports related knowledge. Plan size and shape to fit transportation and display; maximum size 24×24 inches.

D340008 Wildlife Diorama (SF160) Exhibit must be no larger than 24" x 24". The exhibit might show a grassland, prairie, agricultural, woodland, riparian (stream or river corridor), wetland, and/or other area with wildlife habitat. Example: show an area interspersed with several habitats such as windbreaks, farm fields, woods, waste areas, ditches, and pastures for edge-adapted species such as white-tailed deer, Northern bobwhite, mourning doves, cottontail rabbits, fox, squirrels, Northern cardinals, or blue jays. Label the habitats displayed and show at least five kinds of wildlife in their proper habitats.

D340009 Wildlife Essay (SF161) Learn how to share educational information by writing. Choose a conservation or wildlife topic that interests you and write an essay about it. For example, write about a particular species of wildlife that you have observed or about the values

of wildlife. You might write about wildlife on a farm, in town, in a backyard, at a backyard feeder, or at other places. You might write about ethics, proper behavior in the outdoors, hunting, fishing. The essay is between 100 and 1000 words long and typed, double spaced on $8 \frac{1}{2} \times 11$ paper. You might use books, magazines, or personal interviews as resources, but you must give credit to all sources by listing them.

D340010 Wildlife Values Scrapbook (SF162) Make a scrapbook about the various values of wildlife. This would include aesthetic, scientific, commercial, game, genetic, and / or ecological. One resource would be the Wildlife Conservation project booklet (4-H 125).

D340011 Wildlife Arts (SF163) the purpose of this class is to allow artistic exhibits that contain educational information about conservation and wildlife. Examples might include paintings, photographs, and wood carvings, painted duck decoys, or songs or poems written by the exhibitor. Entries must be appropriate for fair display and no larger than 24" x 24". For example, paintings or photographs should be displayed in notebook format or mounted on a sturdy display panel.

*All entries must include a title and brief explanation of the purpose or message (what is the exhibit meant to show).

WILDLIFE HABITAT, DIVISION 342

D342001 Houses (SF165) Make a house for wildlife. Examples: bird house (bluebird, purple martin, wood duck, kestrel, barn owl, etc.) or bat house; no insect houses. Make the house functional so that dimensions, hole size etc. are appropriate to fit the intended species' needs. Include the following information:

- a. The kinds of animal(s) for which the house is intended,
- b. Where and how the house should be located for best use,
- c. Any seasonal maintenance needed, and
- d. Any evidence of your personal observations or experiences.

D342002 Feeders/Waters (SF166) Make a bird bath or feeder. Examples: seed, suet, or nectar feeders. Squirrel feeder is okay; no insect feeders. Include the following information: 1) the kinds of animal(s) for which the water/feeder is intended, 2) where and how the water/feeder should be located for best use, 3) any seasonal maintenance needed, and 4) any evidence of your personal observations or experiences. Tips: check NebGuide on feeding birds.

D342003 Wildlife Habitat Design Board or poster exhibit (SF167) Choose a backyard, acreage, or farm, and design a habitat plan to meet the food, water, shelter, and space needs of at least three kinds of animals you would like to attract. Draw an outline of the area and show

what plants or other habitat will be provided. Indicate how the various parts of your plan provide the desired habitat needs. You might include an aerial photo of the area if you have one.

HARVESTING EQUIPMENT, DIVISION 343

D343001 Fish Harvesting Equipment (SF168) Board exhibit. Display of equipment used in fish harvesting. Examples: fishing knots, hooks (with corks over ends for safety), and lures. Label all items displayed. Include in your exhibit the following information:

- 1. The purpose of each item,
- 2. When or where each item is used in relation to other equipment,
- 3. Any personal experiences you've had with the item(s).

D343002 Build a Fishing Rod (SF169) Rod building blanks and kits with instructions are available for this purpose. A fishing rod educational exhibit may not exceed 96 inches in length. Exhibit must be mounted on a board and labeled with the member's name county and class number. Include with the exhibit the following items as a brief attachment.

- o Explanation of the cost of materials/components
- Where materials/components were purchased
- o How they are made
- Number of hours required for construction.

Identify all parts. Necessary components which must be included are grip, line guides (based on manufacturer's specifications, guide wraps, and hook keeper. Reel seat needs to be aligned with guides, and guides aligned accurately down rod. Guide wraps of size A to D, nylon or silk thread. Exhibit will be judged on: workmanship, labeling of parts (guides, etc.) correct information, and neatness.

D343003 Casting Target (SF170) Make a casting target for exhibit and use. Target must be under 48" x 48". The bullseyes must be 21 feet, outer band must be 1 foot in diameter and can have up to 3 rings. The exhibit must be easy to store, durable, and weather resistant. Include the purpose and rules of using your casting target.

D343004 Wildlife Harvesting Equipment Board exhibit (SF171) Display of equipment used in harvesting wildlife. Examples: expended ammunition casings (no live ammunition permitted), steel traps; hide stretchers, fleshers, etc. For displays of shotguns, rifles, or bows, use drawings or pictures. Label all items displayed. Include in your exhibit the following information:

1. The purpose of each item

- 2. When or where it is used
- 3. Any personal experiences you've had with the item(s). D343005 Inventing Wildlife/Fish Harvesting Equipment, Aid or Accessory (SF168) Use engineering principles to invent or adapt equipment that helps you harvest fish or wildlife. This could include wildlife calls, adapted fishing pole for shallow water, a blind, decoys, etc... Share your drawing (or adapted plans), how the equipment works, how you tested it, and the results of testing your prototype and any adjustments you made.

OUTDOOR ADVENTURES - LEVEL 2

Rules

- · See General Rules.
- \cdot Display posters must be made of material, e.g. foam board or poster board and measure no larger than 22" X 28". Poster material should be sturdy enough to hold display items.
- · Display exhibits other than posters to be no larger than 18" X 24".
- · Journal/Binder exhibits measure no larger than 16" X 16".
- · Consider neatness and creativity.

D341001 Poster - Create a poster display no larger than 22" X 28". Topics may include, but not limited to one or more of the following; how to pitch a tent, knot tying, cooking over a campfire, how to start a campfire, wildlife and plants identified while camping, how to set up emergency shelter, dealing with weather, collection of photos from camping trips, "Leave No Trace" and how that was followed while camping, plan a camping trip, camping essentials, environmental issues/protecting natural resources, park or trail clean up, sanitation/hygiene while outdoors or use of GPS.

D341002 Journal/Binder - Written report of actual, virtual or actual camping/hiking trips with observations OR field journal (notes of actual experiences, sights, sounds, smells, etc.), OR camping or hiking trip diary. Explain growth in project, leading the hikes, planning the camping trip, now being able to identify the wildlife and nature around you and how identified (sight/sound/shape/smell/color). Feathers/leaf/flower

pressings must be securely attached, if included. Photos of drawing of observations encouraged. Exhibits measure no larger than 16" X 16".

D341003 Camping/Hiking Safety - Must include explanation of use of item and why selected/purpose, how it fits hiking/camping needs. May include, but are not limited to, one of the following: travel sized poisonous plants guide, camping first aid kit, weather/water safety or hand hygiene kit. Exhibits measure no larger than 18" X 24".

D341004 Digital Media Use digital media to show video/slideshow/presentation of setting up a tent (include why site is chosen) or protecting natural resources or environmental issues or computer video camping/hiking game. Submit a USB drive or DVD inside a report cover or notebook. If using a slideshow, include printed slides inside report cover or notebook.

D341005 Other Camping Items - Must include what inspired the creation of the item, and its purpose. May include, but are not limited to one of the following; nature art, nature haiku poem, spider web sketches or knot display. Exhibits measure no larger than 18" X 24".

OUTDOOR ADVENTURES - LEVEL 3

Rules

- · See General Rules.
- Display posters must be made of material, e.g. foam board or poster board and measure no larger than 22" X 28". Poster material should be sturdy enough to hold display items.
- · Display exhibits other than posters to be no larger than 18" X 24".
- · Journal/Binder exhibits measure no larger than 16" X 16".
- · Consider neatness and creativity.

D341006 Poster - Create a poster display, no larger than 22" X 28". Topics may include but not limited to one of the following; Topographic map, backpacking trip plan, camp layout, plan an expedition (can be dreamed or lived), collection of photos from your expedition, trails hiked, cost comparison of rental vs purchase or using GPS/compass.

D341007 Journal/Binder - Written report of actual, virtual or imagined expeditions/camping/hiking, OR field journal (notes of actual experiences, sights, sounds, smells, etc.). Explain growth in project, challenges in leading a group, teaching others about wildlife and nature identification and "Leave No Trace." Exhibits measure no larger than 16" X 16".

D341008 Expedition Safety Must include an explanation of use of items, why selected/purpose of item, how it meets hiking/camping/expedition needs. May include, but are not limited to; travel sized edible plants, creepy crawly guide, tent repair kit, travel first aid kit or weather/water safety. Exhibits measure no larger than 18" X 24"

D341009 Digital Media Use digital media to show video/slideshow/presentation of one of the following, but not limited to; building a non-tent shelter (include why needed), packing your backpack/equipment and getting it onto you, teaching others about

building a non-tent shelter (include why needed), packing your backpack/equipment and getting it onto you, teaching others about environmental issues or a computer video backpacking expedition game. Submit a USB drive or DVD inside a report cover or notebook. If using a slideshow, include printed slides inside report cover or notebook.

D341010 Other Expedition Items Must include what inspired the creation of the item, and the purpose of the item. May include, but are not limited to; nature art, nature cinquain poem, backpacking food recipes, hiking/expedition conditioning plan, charcoal etching, dehydrated meal or snack (at least 1 cup displayed in a re-sealable plastic bag with ingredients, instructions, and nutritional facts included). Exhibits measure no larger than 18" X 24"

TAXIDERMY, DIVISION 346

D346001 Tanned Hides or Taxidermy (SF172) any legal fish, bird, or other wild animal properly processed by the member. No requirement as to size or mounting. Include the following information:

- 1. The animal's name.
- 2. Information about the exhibitor's personal field experiences, study, or observations that relate to the exhibit.

OTHER NATURAL RESOURCES, DIVISION 361

D361001 - Design Your Own Exhibit in Natural Resources, Conservation, Geology, or Ecology - (SF164) - This class is for educational exhibits about natural resources, conservation, wildlife, or ecology that do not fit into other categories. Entries must be appropriate for fair display and no larger than 24" x 24". All entries must include a title and should be clear (a brief explanation or other method) about the intended purpose or message – what the exhibit is meant to show. Think about accuracy, creativity, educational value for viewers, and evidence of exhibitor's personal experiences and learning.

4-H SHOOTING SPORTS, DIVISION 347

4-H Shooting Sports requires youth to be under the direct leadership of a certified 4-H Shooting Sports Leader in either shotgun, rifle (bb gun), archery, pistol, black powder/muzzleloader, and/or hunting skills. No firearms can be entered as an exhibit, nor live ammunition; however, information can be shared through pictures. Classes 004-009 can be entered by anyone in the conservation and wildlife area.

D347001 Shooting Aid or Accessory (SF253) – Any item which helps the shooter/hunter better perform their sport, examples: rifle sling, kneeling roll, arm guard, shotgun vest, target boxes, shooting stick, etc... Include your design, or plans you adapted, what the item is and used for. D347002 Storage Case (SF254) – an item with the purpose to safely hold a firearm, bow, ammunition, and/or arrows, examples: soft sided shotgun case, quivers, firearm safe, include your design, or plans you adapted. Explain how the storage case is used.

D347003 Practice Game or Activity (SF255) – invent or adapt an activity to practice or teach a project skill. Include pictures of youth playing the game, testimonials for 4-H members who played the game, what skill is being worked on, and directions for the game. Explain how you came up with the game or adapted it to fit the needs of your group members.

D347004 Science, Engineering, Technology Advancements of Shooting Sports Essay or Display (SF256) – Conservation, or Wildlife Essay or Display - Choose a specific area of shooting sports and share how it has advanced, include a timeline and photos or illustrations. Keep your topic narrow and manageable. Essays are limited to 1000 words and should be on $8 \frac{1}{2} \times 11$ paper.

D347005 Healthy Lifestyles Plan (SF257)– Include a shooter's (hiker's, camper's, angler's) diet and exercise plan, and how the 4-H member will benefit or improve from following the plan. Ideally, the 4-H

member would follow the plan and include some journal entries about adaptions or improvements made while following the plan.

D347006 Citizenship/Leadership Project (SF258) – Share a display on a citizenship project or leadership project the 4-H member took on individually or with a group to improve some aspect related to 4-H Shooting Sports, Conservation or Wildlife. Examples could be range development, conservation planting to attract wildlife, a camp, 4-H recruitment event. Include who benefitted from the project, what the 4-H member's role was, and any results.

D347007 Career Development/College Essay, Interview or Display (SF252) – Research opportunities for careers related to this area or opportunities for college majors or college activities to help discover using project skills beyond a person's 4-H career. Essays are limited to 1000 words and should be on 8 $\frac{1}{2}$ x 11 paper. Interviews need to include a picture of the interviewee in their work setting, questions asked, and a transcript of answers.

D347008 Community Vitality Display (SF251) – Explore how the different shooting sports, conservation, fishing, and hunting keep Nebraska vibrant especially in rural areas. Present facts and research in an interesting way for the public to learn from.

D347009 Ag Literacy-Value Added Agriculture Interview or Research Project (SF250) – Explore how traditional ag producers are adding value to their production agriculture operations through conservation efforts, hunting, raising pheasants, shooting sports related tourism, etc. Present findings in an interesting way for the public to learn from.

H930005 Junior - will shoot at 10 yards (ages 8 - 10 years old)

H930006 Intermediate - will shoot at 15 yards (ages 11 - 13 years old)

H930007 Senior - will shoot at 20 yards (ages 14 years old and Older)

Trap Shooting

H930008 Junior - course of fire; will shoot 2 sets of 25 shells at 16 yards., at least 12 years old with hunter safety certificate)

H930009 Intermediate – course of fire; will shoot 2 sets of 25 shells at 16 yards

H930010 Senior - course of fire; will shoot 25 shells at 16 yards, 25 shells at their handicap.

.22 Rifle

Open to youth ages 12 and older. MUST have a Hunter Safety Card. Course of Fire; 10 shots prone, 10 shots standing, 10 shots kneeling, 10 shots sitting. 4-H'ers will also take a written test.

H930019 Junior (ages 12 to 14 years old)

H930020 Senior (ages 15 years old and Older)

Foods, Nutrition & Food Preservation

RULES:

The judge will select or cut out a sample of the exhibit for display. Entries must have the proper amount of food or they will be disqualified (example: cookies (4) should be entered on a paper plate and exhibited in a plastic bag).

Supporting Information - Each exhibit must include the recipe. Recipe may be handwritten, photocopied or typed. Place food on the appropriately sized plate or container and put in self-sealing bag. Attach entry tag and recipe at the corner of the bag. For NON-FOOD ENTRIES please attach the entry tag to the upper right-hand corner of the entry. Additional information including recipes and supplemental information should be identified with 4-H'ers name and county.

Criteria for Judging - Exhibits will be judged according to score sheets available at your local Extension office or at

http://4h.unl.edu/fairbook. Make sure to follow all entry instructions

required for your exhibit. Incomplete exhibits will be lowered a ribbon placing. Commercially prepared mixes are ONLY allowed in Cooking 201 Creative Mix Class. Prepared baking mixes, biscuit mixes, and other premade mixes entered in other categories will be lowered a ribbon placing. Food Projects - Exhibits should be entered using a disposable pan or plate and covered by a plastic self-sealing bag. The State Fair is not responsible for non-disposable containers, lost bread boards, china, or glassware.

Ingredients - Any ingredient that the 4-H'er uses must be able to be purchased by the 4-H'er. <u>Ingredients such as beer, whiskey, rum, etc.</u> may NOT be used in any recipe file or food exhibit. Exhibits that include alcohol will be disqualified.

Food Safety. Exhibits are on display for several days. Please think FOOD SAFETY! Items that require refrigeration will not be accepted, judged, or displayed as exhibits must be safe to eat when entered, whether they are tasted or not. Glazes, frostings and other sugar-based toppings are considered safe due to their high sugar content. Egg glazes on yeast breads and pie crusts BEFORE baking are acceptable. Eggs incorporated into baked goods and crusts are considered safe. The following food ingredients are considered unsafe for fair exhibits and will be disqualified:

- Egg or cream cheese fillings and cream cheese frostings
- Any meat item including meat jerky, imitation meat bits (bacon bits, pepperoni, etc.)
- Melted cheese on top of food exhibit (cheese mixed into baked goods is considered safe and will be accepted)
- Uncooked fruit toppings (i.e., fresh fruit tart)

E300002 ACTIVITY BAG (SF258) - A duffle bag or backpack that the 4-H'er packs so that they are always prepared to be active and make healthy food choices. May include proper workout attire, a healthy beverage or snack, a notebook or goal sheet, etc. Make sure all items are clean, clearly labeled and an explanation of why it is included in the Activity Bag, instead use a picture of the item or include in the listing of items.

E300003 YIM HEALTHY SNACK RECIPE FILE (SF251) - Collection of 10 recipes from any source. Each recipe must accompany a complete snack menu in which the recipe is used, following the idea that a healthy snack includes foods from at least two different food groups. An additional 10 recipes may be added each year 4-H'er is in project, with year clearly marked on recipes. Consider creativity and neatness. Display in recipe file or box or in a binder. Be sure to include the number of servings or yield of each recipe.

E300004 HEALTHY STYLE INTERVIEW (SF130) – Interview someone in your life that you admire that is physically active or has a healthy lifestyle. Why do they enjoy their exercise program or lifestyle choices? What are their goals? Why do you admire them? Maximum of two pages, one sided write up of an interview with someone who has an active exercise program or has a healthy lifestyle. Consider creativity and neatness. Mount on colored paper or poster board or display in a binder. Include a picture of the person interviewed. (May be laminated to preserve exhibit.) Overall size of mounted exhibit should be no larger than 9x12 inches.

E300005 HEALTHY SNACK (SF125) - See ideas for non-perishable snacks on page 36. Four cookies, bars, muffins, etc., on a paper plate, or at least 1 cup of mix. Examples might include: granola bars, homemade crackers or chips. Supporting information to include recipe and why this snack might be considered a healthy snack.

E350002- Foods and Nutrition Poster Scrapbook, or Photo Display (SF122) Open to any 4-H'er enrolled in a Foods & Nutrition or Food Preservation project. The project should involve a nutrition or food preparation technique or explore a career related to the food industry (caterer, restaurant owner, food scientist, registered dietitian, etc.) This might contain pictures, captions and/or a report to highlight the concept. Exhibit may be a poster or a foam core board (not to exceed 22" by 30"); a computer-based presentation printed off with notes pages (if needed) and displayed in a binder; an exhibit display; or a written report in a portfolio or notebook. Consider neatness and creativity.

E350003 Physical Activity and Health Poster, Scrapbook, or Photo Display (SF122) Open to any 4-H'er enrolled in a Foods & Nutrition or Food Preservation project. The project should involve a physical activity or explore a career-related to physical activity or health (personal trainer, sports coach, physical therapist, etc.) This might contain pictures, captions and/or a report to highlight the concept. Exhibit may be a poster or a foam core board (not to exceed 22" by 30"), a computer-based presentation printed off with notes pages, if needed, and displayed in a binder, an exhibit display, or a written report in a portfolio or notebook. Consider neatness and creativity.

E350004 COOKING BASICS RECIPE FILE (SF251) A collection of 10 recipes from any source. Each recipe must accompany a complete menu in which the recipe is used. An additional 10 recipes may be added each year the 4-H'er is in the project, with year clearly marked on recipes. Display in a recipe file or binder. Be sure to include the number of servings or yield of each recipe. This may be a continued recipe file project from the previously used 4-H curriculum before 2018. Exhibits that include recipes with alcohol (wine, beer, rum, etc.) will be disqualified.

COOKING 201, DIVISION 410

Purple \$3.00 Blue \$2.50 Red \$2.00 White \$1.00 E410001 Loaf Quick Bread (SF123) any recipe, at least ¾ of a standard loaf displayed on a paper plate) Quick bread is any bread that does not require kneading or rising time and does NOT include yeast. A standard quick bread loaf measures approximately 8 ½" x 4 ½" or 9" x 5". If mini-loaf pans are used for exhibit, two loaves must be presented for judging.

E410002 Creative Mixes (SF142) any recipe, at least 3/4 of baked

product or 4 muffins or cookies on a paper plate or in a disposable pan. Baked item made from a mix (commercial or homemade mixes acceptable). Food product must have been modified to make a new or different baked item. Examples include poppy seed quick bread from a cake mix, cake mix cookies, sweet rolls made from readymade bread dough, monkey breads from biscuit dough, streusel coffee cake from a cake mix, etc. Write what you learned about making this product using a mix instead of a homemade recipe or recipe "from scratch". Does it make it better or easier to use a convenience product or mix? Why or why not? **E410003 Biscuits or Scones (SF136)** four biscuits or scones on a small paper plate. This may be any type of biscuit or scone: rolled, or dropped. Any recipe may be used, but it must be a non-yeast product baked from scratch.

E410004 Healthy Baked Product (SF124) any recipe, at least 3/4 of baked product or 4 muffins/cookies on a paper plate or in a disposable pan. Recipe must contain a fruit or vegetable as part of the ingredients (Ex. banana bars, cantaloupe quick bread, zucchini muffins, etc.).

E410005 Coffee Cake (SF129) any recipe or shape, non-yeast product - at least 3/4 of baked product. May be baked in a disposable pan.) Include menu for a complete meal where this recipe is served, following meal planning guidelines suggested in Cooking 201.

E410006 Baking with Whole Grains (SF134) any recipe, at least ¾ of baked product or 4 muffins/cookies on a paper plate or in a disposable pan. Recipe must contain whole grains as part of the ingredients. (Ex. whole wheat applesauce bread, peanut butter oatmeal cookies, etc.) **E410007** Non-Traditional Baked Product (SF133) exhibit must include a food product prepared using a non-traditional method (i.e. bread machine, cake baked in convection oven, baked item made in microwave, etc.) Entry must be at least ¾ baked product, or 4 muffins or cookies on a paper plate or in a disposable pan. Entry must include supporting information that discusses alternative preparation method and how it compares with traditional method.

COOKING 301, DIVISION 411

E411001 White Bread (SF138) any yeast recipe, at least 3/4 of a standard loaf displayed on a paper plate.

E411002 Whole Wheat or Mixed Grain Bread (SF138) any yeast recipe, at least 3/4 of a standard loaf displayed on a paper plate.

E411003 Specialty Rolls (SF138) any yeast recipe, 4 rolls on a paper plate. May be sweet rolls, English muffins, kolaches, bagels, or any other similar recipe that makes individual portions.

E411004 Dinner Roles (SF138) any yeast recipe, 4 rolls on a paper plate. May be cloverleaf, crescent, knot, bun, bread sticks, or any other type of dinner roll.

E411005 Specialty Bread (SF141) any yeast recipe, includes tea rings, braids, or any other full-sized specialty bread products. Must exhibit at least ¾ of a full-sized baked product.

E411006 Shortened Cake (SF137) NOT FROM A CAKE MIX! At least ¾ of the cake. Shortened cakes use fat for flavor and texture and recipes usually begin by beating fat with sugar by creaming, and include leavening agents in the recipe. Cake may be frosted with a nonperishable frosting (no cream cheese or egg white based frostings allowed).

COOKING 401, DIVISION 412

Purple \$3.00 Blue \$2.50 Red \$2.00 White \$1.00 Any bread item prepared or baked using a bread machine should be entered under the Cooking 201. All exhibits made in the Cooking 301 or Cooking 401 projects must have been prepared without the assistance of a bread machine for mixing, raising, or baking of the food item.

E412001 Double Crust Fruit Pie (SF144) made with homemade fruit filling. No egg pastries or cream fillings. No canned fillings or premade pie crusts. May be a double crust, crumb, cut-out or lattice topping. Using an 8- or 9-inch disposable pie pan is recommended.

E412002 Family Food Traditions (SF145) any recipe, at least 3/4 of baked product or 4 muffins or cookies on a paper plate. May be baked in a disposable pan. Any baked item associated with family tradition and heritage. Entry must include (A) recipe, (B) tradition or heritage associated with preparing, serving the food, (C) where or who the traditional recipe came from.

E412003 Ethnic Food (SF146) any recipe, at least 3/4 of baked product or 4 muffins or cookies on a paper plate or in a disposable pan. The name of the country, culture or region should be included as part of the supporting information with the recipe, as well as some background information about the country or culture the food item is representing. **E412004** Candy (SF147) any recipe, 4 pieces of candy on a paper plate or ½ cup. No items containing cream cheese will be accepted (Example: cream cheese mints). Candy may be cooked or no cook; dipped, molded, made in the microwave or other methods of candy preparation. Recipe

must be included.

E412005 Foam Cake (SF148) original recipe (no mixes) of at least ¾ of the cake. Foam cakes are cakes that have a high ratio of eggs to flour and fall into three categories: angel food cakes or meringues; sponge or jelly roll cakes; and chiffon cakes. Cake may be frosted with a nonperishable frosting (no cream cheese or egg white based frostings allowed).

E412006 Specialty Pastry (SF143) any recipe, at least 3/4 of baked product or 4 muffins or cookies on a paper plate or in a disposable pan. Baked items such as pie tarts, puff pastry, phyllo doughs, biscotti, choux, croissants, Danish, strudels. Phyllo dough may be pre-made or from scratch. Pastries made with cream or egg-based fillings will be disqualified.

Food preparation, menu planning, nutritional knowledge, table service, and food handling practices. Any 4-H member enrolled in a foods and nutrition project may participate. Exhibit should be related to a food and nutrition project the member is enrolled in. Individuals under 12 years of age as of January 1 of the current year will participate in the Junior Division. Individuals 12 years of age or older as of January 1 of the current year will participate in the Senior Division. *Ingredients that the 4-H member* cannot legally purchase, such as beer, whiskey, rum, etc. may not be used in any recipe or foods exhibit. Exhibits that include alcohol in the recipe will be disqualified. This includes menu and recipe file exhibits. *Each participant should plan their own exhibit to fit on a standard card table.

The exhibit should include:

- Recipe of the food and a menu for the meal featuring the food item.
- A one place setting for the menu featured. Use table appointments—dishes, silverware, etc.
- A centerpiece appropriate for the planned occasion.
- One serving of the prepared food on/in the appropriate dish.
- Table covering as appropriate for the occasion (tablecloths, placemats, etc.).
- Each 4-H member is responsible for bringing their own card table the day of the revue and setting up their own display.

Interview judging will be used to evaluate each exhibit. Participants may be asked questions about preparation of the recipe, selection and management of the menu, nutritional information in regard to the food and menu exhibited. Champion and Reserve Champion rosettes will be awarded in Junior and Senior Division in the 4-H Food Revue.

4-H'ers under the age of 8 years of age on Jan 1 of the current year may choose to do this class (Clover Kids). The novice needs only to set the table and serve one food item. They do not need a menu card or recipe card and may have someone else make the food. The 4-H'er will need to know the how and why about their table setting, the basic nutrition information about the food chosen, and the cost per serving. They do not need to know the time management or menu planning.

FOOD PRESERVATION, DIVISION 407

- Processing Methods Current USDA processing methods and altitude adjustments must be followed for all food preservation. Jam, preserves and marmalades, fruit, tomatoes and pickled products must be processed in a boiling water bath. (Tomatoes may be processed in a pressure canner.) All non-acid vegetables and meats must be processed in a pressure canner. Improperly canned or potentially hazardous food items will be disqualified. Spoiled or unsealed container disqualifies entry.
- Jars Jars do not need to be the same brand. Half pint jars may be used for jellies and preserves. The jars are not to be decorated by the exhibitor in any way. Canning jars must be used others will be disqualified. No one-fourth pint jars allowed. Leave jar rings on for fair display, it helps protect the seal. No zinc lids.
- **Current Project -** All canning must be the result of this year's 4-H project.
- **Criteria for Judging -** Exhibits will be judged according to score sheets available at your local Extension office or at https://4h.unl.edu/fairbook/general/scoresheets-forms.

 Incomplete exhibits will be lowered a ribbon class. Canned food

items not processed according to altitude in the county will be lowered one class ribbon. Check with your local extension office or https://food.unl.edu/canning#elevation for your county's altitude and how that affects food processing times and pounds of pressure.

Labeling - Jars should be labeled with the name of the food item, name of the 4-H'er, county, and date of processing on the bottom of each jar. Each bag containing dried foods should also be labeled with the name of the food item, the name of the 4-H'er, county and drying date. Multiple dried food exhibits should be secured by a rubber band or "twisty" to keep exhibit containing the 3 self-sealing bags together.

Recipe/Supporting Information - Recipe must be included, and may be handwritten, photocopied or typed. Commercially prepared seasoning mixes are not allowed. Current USDA guidelines for food preservation methods MUST be followed. Suggested sources of recipes include:

- 4-H Food Preservation Manuals (Freezing, Drying, Boiling Water Bath Canning, Pressure Canning)

- 2.) Date preserved
- 3.) Method of preservation (pressure canner or water bath canner)
- 4.) Type of pack (raw pack or hot pack)
- 5.) Altitude (and altitude adjustment, if needed)
- 6.) Processing time
- 7.) Number of pounds of pressure (if pressure canner used)
- 8.) Drying method and drying time (for dried food exhibits).
- 9.) Recipe and source of recipe (if a publication, include name and date).

UNIT 1 FREEZING

E407001 Baked Item Made with Frozen Produce (SF155) any recipe, at least 3/4 of baked product or 4 muffins or cookies on a paper plate or

in a disposable pan. Recipe MUST include a food item preserved by the freezing method done by the 4-H'er. (Ex. Peach pie, blueberry muffins, zucchini bread, etc.). Supporting information must include both the recipe for the produce that was frozen as part of this project AND the baked food item.

UNIT 2 DRYING

E407002 Dried Fruit (SF154) exhibit 3 different examples of 3 different dried fruits. Place each dried fruit food (6-10 pieces of fruit, minimum 1/4 cup) in separate self-sealing bags. Use a rubber band or "twisty" to keep exhibit together.

E407003 Fruit Leather (SF154) exhibit 3 different examples of 3 different fruit leathers. Place a 3-4" sample of each fruit together in separate self-sealing bags. Use a rubber band or "twisty" to keep exhibit together.

E407004 Vegetable Leather (SF154) exhibit 3 different examples of 3 different vegetable or vegetable/fruit leather combo. Place a 3-4" sample of each leather together in separate self-sealing bags. Use a rubber band or "twisty" to keep exhibit together.

E407005 Dried Vegetables (SF149) exhibit 3 different samples of 3 different dried vegetables. Place each food (1/4 cup of each vegetable) in a separate self-sealing bag. Use a rubber band or "twisty" to keep exhibit together.

E407006 Dried Herbs (SF149) exhibit 3 different samples of 3 different dried herbs. Place each food (1/4 cup of each herb) in a separate self-sealing bag. Use a rubber band or "twisty" to keep exhibit together.

E407007 Baked Item Made with Dried Produce/Herbs (SF156) any recipe, at least 3/4 of baked product or 4 muffins or cookies on a paper plate or in a disposable pan. Recipe MUST include a dried produce/herb item made by the 4-H'er. Ex. Granola bar made with dried fruits, dried cranberry cookies, Italian herb bread, lemon thyme cookies. Supporting information must include both the recipe for the dried produce/herb AND the baked food item.

UNIT 3 BOILING WATER CANNING

E407008 - 1 Jar Fruit Exhibit (SF150) exhibit one jar of a canned fruit. Entry must be processed in the boiling water bath according to current USDA recommendations.

E407009 - 3 Jar Fruit Exhibit (SF150) exhibit 3 jars of different canned fruits. May be three different techniques for same type of

product, ex. Applesauce, canned apples, apple pie filling, etc. Entry must be processed in a boiling water bath according to current USDA recommendations.

E407010 - 1 Jar Tomato Exhibit (SF150) exhibit one jar of a canned tomato product. Entry must be processed in a boiling water bath according to current USDA recommendations.

E407011 - 3 Jar Tomato Exhibit (SF150) exhibit 3 jars of different canned tomato products (salsa, sauces without meats, juice, stewed, etc.). Entry must be processed in a boiling water bath according to current USDA recommendations.

E407012 - 1 Jar Picked Exhibit (SF150) one jar of a pickled and/or fermented product. Entry must be processed in a boiling water bath according to current USDA recommendations.

E407013 - 3 Jar Pickled Exhibit (SF150) exhibit 3 jars of different kinds of canned pickled and/or fermented products. Entry must be processed in a boiling water bath according to current USDA recommendations.

E407014 - 1 Jar Jelled Exhibit (SF153) exhibit one jar of a jam, jelly or marmalade. Entry must be processed in a boiling water bath according to current USDA recommendations.

E407015 - 3 Jar Jelled Exhibit (SF153) exhibit 3 different kinds of jelled products. Entry may be made up of either pints or half pints. Entry must be processed in a boiling water bath according to current USDA recommendations.

UNIT 4 PRESSURE CANNING

E407016 - 1 Jar Vegetable or Meat Exhibit (SF150) exhibit one jar of a canned vegetable or meat. Include only vegetables or meats canned in a pressure canner according to current USDA recommendations.

E407017 - 3 Vegetable Exhibit (SF150) exhibit 3 jars of different kinds of canned vegetables. Include only vegetables canned in a pressure canner according to current USDA recommendations.

E407018 - 3 Jar Meat Exhibit (SF150) exhibit 3 jars of different kinds of canned meats. Include only meats canned in a pressure canner according to current USDA recommendations.

E407019 – Quick Dinner (SF151) exhibit a minimum of 3 jars to a maximum of 5 jars plus menu. Meal should include 3 canned foods that can be prepared within an hour. List complete menu on a 3" X 5" file card and attach to one of the jars. Entry must be processed according to current USDA recommendations

E407020 – 1 Jar Tomato Exhibit (SF150) exhibit one jar of a canned tomato product. Entry must be processed in a pressure canner according to current USDA recommendations.

E407021 - 3 Jar Tomato Exhibit (SF150) exhibit 3 jars of different canned tomato products (salsa, sauces without meats, juice, stewed, etc.). Entry must be processed in a pressure canner according to current USDA recommendations.

Safety, Division 440

E440001 First Aid Kit (SF110) A first aid kit is a good way to organize supplies in an emergency. The kit should be assembled in a container appropriate for the kit's intended use. A description of where the kit will be stored and examples of specific emergencies for that situation should be included in the exhibit. The kit should include a written inventory and purpose statement for included items. Items should cover the following areas: airway and breathing, bleeding control, burn treatment, infectious disease protection, fracture care and miscellaneous supplies. Use Citizen Safety manual, 4-H 425, pages 6 & 7 and score sheet SF110 for guidance. Kits containing any of the following will be automatically disqualified:

- 1. Prescription medications. (If the kit's purpose is to provide medication for someone with special needs, explain in the written description and inventory, but remove the medication.)
- 2. Materials with expiration dates on or before the judging date. (This includes sterile items, non-prescription medications, ointments, salves, etc. Articles dated month and year only are considered expired on the last day of that month.)
- 3. Any controlled substance.

E440002 Disaster Kit (Emergency Preparedness) (SF111) Disaster kits must contain the materials to prepare a person or family for emergency conditions caused by a natural or man-made incident. Selection of materials is left to the exhibitor. Family or group kits must have enough material or items for each person. A description of the kit's purpose, the number of people supported, and a list of contents is required. Youth are encouraged to test their kit by challenging their family to try to survive using only the included materials for the designated time. If tested, share that experience in kit documentation. Please include an explanation of drinking water needs for your disaster kit. Do not bring actual water to the fair in the kit.

E440003 Safety Scrapbook (SF292) The scrapbook must contain 15 news articles from print and/or internet sources about various incident types. Mount each clipping on a separate page accompanied by a description of events leading to the incident and any measures that might have prevented it. The Scrapbook should be bound in a standard size hardcover binder or notebook for 8 ½" X 11" size paper. Correct sentence structure, readability and thorough explanations are an important part of judging.

E440004 Safety Experience (SF190) The exhibit should share a learning experience the youth had related to safety. Examples could be participating in a first aid or first responder training, a farm safety day camp, babysitting workshop or similar event; scientific experiment related to safety; or the youth's response to an emergency situation. The exhibit should include a detailed description of the experience, the youth's role, some evidence of the youth's leadership in the situation and a summary of the learning that took place. Exhibits may be presented in a poster with supplemental documentation, a notebook including up to ten pages of narrative and pictures, or a multimedia presentation on a CD lasting up to five minutes.

E440005 Careers in Safety (SF191) The exhibit should identify a specific career area in the safety field and include education and certification requirements for available positions, salary information, demand for the field and a summary of the youth's interest in the field. Examples of careers include firefighters, paramedics, emergency management personnel, some military assignments, law enforcement officers, emergency room medical personnel, fire investigator and more. It is recommended youth interview a professional in the field in their research. Additional research sources might include books, articles, career web sites, job-related government web sites or interviews with career placement or guidance counselors. Exhibits may be presented in a poster with supplemental documentation, a notebook including up to ten pages of narrative and pictures, or a multimedia presentation on a CD lasting up to five minutes.

Fire Safety, Division 450

E450001...Fire Safety Poster (SF269) This is a home floor plan drawn to scale showing primary and secondary escape routes and where fire extinguishers and smoke detectors are located. Draw every room, including all doors and windows. Use black or blue arrows showing primary escape routes from each room. Use red arrows showing secondary routes to use if the primary routes are blocked. Primary and secondary escape routes must lead outside to an assembly location.

Documentation should include evidence the escape plan has been practiced at least four times. Posters must be constructed of commercial poster board at least 11" x 14" but not larger than 22" x 28".

E450002 Fire Safety Scrapbook (SF270) The scrapbook must contain 10 news articles from print and/or internet sources about fires to residential or commercial properties or landscapes. Mount each clipping on a separate page accompanied by a description of events leading to the incident and any measures that might have prevented it. The Scrapbook should be bound in a standard size hardcover binder or notebook for 8 $\frac{1}{2}$ " X 11" size paper. Correct sentence structure, readability and thorough explanations are an important part of judging.

E450003 Fire Prevention Poster (SF268) Posters should promote a fire prevention message and be appropriate to display during National Fire Prevention Week or to promote fire safety at specific times of the year (Halloween, 4th of July, etc.). Originality, clarity and artistic impression will all be judged. Do not include live fireworks, matches or other flammable/explosive/hazardous materials. Any entry containing this material will be disqualified. Posters must be constructed of commercial poster board at

least 11" x 14" but not larger than 22" x 28". Refer to score sheet SF268.

F531003 Marketing Package (mounted on a 14" x 22" poster) must include at least three items (examples) developed by the 4-H'er from the following list: business card, brochure, advertisement, business promotional piece, printout of an internet home page, packaging design, signs, logo design, direct mail piece, etc. The marketing package should be for an original business developed by the 4-H'er and not an existing business.

F531004 Sample of an Original Product with an information sheet (8 $\frac{1}{2}$ " x 11") answering the following questions:

- 1. What did you enjoy the most about making the product?
- 2. What challenges did you have when making the product? Would you do anything differently next time? If so, what?
- 3. What is the suggested retail price of the product? How did you decide on the price?

The purpose of these exhibits is to demonstrate to the public the benefits from the study and application of crop, weed, range and soil sciences to solving problems in management, conservation, sustainability, and environmental protection. For guidelines on specific projects, refer to appropriate project manuals.

GRAIN OR PLANT EXHIBITS (CLASSES 1-5) IMPORTANT:

A. A completed Crop Production Worksheet (available at https://cropwatch.unl.edu/Youth/Documents/Crop%20Production%20Project%20Worksheet%20Final.pdf) must accompany grain and plant exhibits or it will automatically be deducted one ribbon placing. The worksheet must include the exhibitors name and address, county, plant hybrid or variety, plant population,

- whether crop production was irrigated or dryland, and general information including farm cropping history, soil type and weather effects.
- B. The worksheet also must include an economic analysis of the project, listing individual expenses and income, on a per acre basis. Other topics to discuss are the selection of variety or hybrid, impacts of tillage and conservation practices, inputs (fuel, fertilizer, irrigation, labor, pesticides, etc.), any observations made during the growing season, and what you learned from your crops project.
- C. The worksheet counts as 50% of the total when judged. Worksheet must be the original work of the individual exhibitor or it will be deducted one ribbon placing.
- D. Attach the worksheet to the entry in a clear plastic cover such that it can be read without removing it from the cover. In addition to the worksheet, grain and plant exhibits will be judged on condition, appearance (i.e. disease and insect damage, grain fill), uniformity (size, shape, color, maturity), and quality of exhibit. Refer to Scoresheet **SF264**.
- E. Grain exhibits must be one gallon per sample. Grain exhibits harvested in the fall (e.g., corn or soybeans) may be from the previous year's project. Plant exhibits, with the exception of ears of corn, must be the result of the current year's project.
 - Corn 10 ears or 3 stalks (cut at ground level with no roots or soil and bound together)
 - Grain Sorghum 4 stalks (cut at ground level and bound together)
 - Soybeans 6 stalks (cut at ground level and bound together)
 - Small grains (oats, barley, wheat, triticale) sheaf of heads 2 inches in diameter at top tie with stems about 24" long.
 - Other crops (alfalfa, millet, etc.) sheaf of stems 3 inches in diameter at top tied with stems cut at ground level or half size small square bale.

Displays (CLASSES 6-10)

The purpose of the display is to tell an educational story to those that view the display. The display is a visual representation (pictures, charts, graphs) no larger than 28" wide by 28" tall on plywood or poster board. The display should be neatly titled. Make sure to label display with exhibitor's name, address, and county on back side. Explain pictures and graphs clearly and concisely. Consider creativity and neatness. Each display must have a one-page essay (minimum) explaining why the

exhibitor chose the area of display and what they learned from their project. Include any references used. The essay should be in a clear plastic cover with the exhibitor's name outside. If a display does not have an essay, it will automatically be deducted one ribbon placing. Refer to Scoresheet **SF259**

G750005 Any other crop (includes grain sorghum, alfalfa, millets, barley, rye, triticale, and amaranth, dry

beans, sugar beet, mung bean, canola, forage sorghum, safflower, etc.) **G750006 Crop Production Display -** The purpose of this class is to allow original and creative exhibits that contain educational information about crop production aspects, such as crop scouting, alternative crops, pest management, etc.

G750007 Crop Technology Display - Display information about aspects of technology used in crop production, such as genetic engineering, crop breeding, GPS, yield mapping, computers, etc.
G750008 Crop End Use Display - Display information about the final product or end uses for a crop, such as food, feed, fuel, or other products. (i.e. corn can be processed into livestock feed, ethanol, plastics, etc. or soybeans can be processed into biodiesel, pet bedding, crayons, oil, etc.)
G750009 Water or Soil Display - Display information about water or soils, such as how soils are being used for crop production, range, conservation, wildlife, or wetland use, or ways to protect or conserve water and soil resources.

G750010 - Career Interview Display The purpose of this class is to

allow youth to investigate a career in agronomy. Youth should interview 1 person that works with crops about such topics as, what parts of their job do they enjoy or dislike, why did they choose that career, what was their education, etc. Include a picture of the person interviewed.

G750011 - Special Agronomy Project - Educational Exhibit (SF259) - Educational exhibit based on what was learned from the project. Present information on a poster 14" X 22" either vertical or horizontal arrangement or in a clear plastic report cover. Refer to Scoresheet SF259 Each display must have a one-page essay (minimum) explaining why the exhibitor chose the area of display and what they learned from their project. G750012 Special Agronomy Project - Video Presentation - 4-H exhibitor designs a multimedia presentation related to the crop. This could include narration of the growing process, presenting facts about

the crop or any other innovative multimedia practices. The presentation should be at least 2 minutes in length and no more than 5 minutes in length, appropriate graphics, sound and either a video clip, animation or voice over and/or original video clip. Any of the following file formats will be accepted: mp4, .mov, .ppt, or .avi.

G750013 - Special Agronomy Project (Freshly Harvested Crop)Plant exhibits must be the result of the current year's project. Depending on the type of crop selected for the current year: Corn - 10 ears or 3 stalks (cut at ground level with no roots or soil and bound together)

- Grain Sorghum 4 stalks (cut at ground level and bound together)
- Soybeans 6 stalks (cut at ground level and bound together)
- Small grains (oats, barley, wheat, triticale) sheaf of heads 2 inches in diameter at top tie with stems about 24" long.
- Other crops (alfalfa, millet, etc.) sheaf of stems 3 inches in diameter at top tied with stems cut at ground level.

Supporting documentation (½ to 1-page in length) should include the following:

- Economic Analysis and/or research that supports feasibility of this crop in Nebraska or how the crop has evolved over time.
- Other topics to discuss are past/current commercial production of this crop. This includes: the selection of variety or hybrid, impacts of tillage and conservation practices, inputs (fuel, fertilizer, irrigation, labor, pesticides, etc.), any observations made during the growing season about this crop and what you learned from your crops project. This ½ to 1-page summary counts as 50% of the total when judged.
- In addition to the summary, grain and plant exhibits will be judged on condition, appearance (i.e. disease and insect damage, grain fill), uniformity (size, shape, color, maturity), and quality of exhibit.

Agronomy, Division 751 - Weed Science

Any individual in the Conservation, Environment 1, 2 or 3, Range,
Reading the Range 1 or Using Nebraska Range 2, or Crop Production,
Field Crops projects may exhibit a weed book or weed display. At least
15 of specimens must represent this year's work. For assistance
identifying plants, participants can use Nebraska Department of
Agriculture's Weeds of Nebraska and the Great Plains (1994) or Weeds
of the Great Plains (2003).

BOOKS (CLASS 1-2):

- A. Plants must be mounted on sheets that are no larger than 14" wide by 14" high. Proper plant mount should include root as well as stem and leaf tissue. Plants should be glued rather than taped and the mounts should be protected with a clear cover.
- B. Exhibits will be judged based on completeness of plant mount, accuracy of identification, label, neatness, and conformity to exhibit requirements. Refer to Scoresheet **SF261**.
- C. Each completed mount must have the following information (see example below) in the lower right corner of the mounting sheet:
 - 1. Scientific name (in italic or underlined), with authority
 - 2. Common name
 - 3. County of collection
 - 4. Collection date
 - 5. Collector's name
 - 6. Personal collection number, indicating the order that plants were collected in your personal collection
 - 7. Other information depending on class selected, i.e., noxious, life form.

This information should be typed or printed neatly.

DISPLAYS (CLASS 3):

- A. The purpose of the display is to tell an educational story to those that view the display. The display is a visual representation (pictures, charts, graphs) no larger than 28" by 28" on plywood or poster board. The display should be neatly titled.
- B. Make sure to label display with exhibitor's name, address, and county on back side. Explain pictures and graphs clearly and concisely. Refer to Scoresheet **SF259**.
- **C.** Each display must have a one-page essay explaining why the exhibitor chose the area of display and what they learned from their project. Include any references used. The essay should be in a clear plastic cover with the exhibitor's name outside.

G751001 Weed Identification Book A collection of a minimum of 15 plant mounts including at least two of the following prohibited noxious weeds (Canada thistle, musk thistle, plume less thistle, salt cedar, leafy spurge, purple loosestrife, diffuse knapweed, spotted knapweed, Japanese knot weed, bohemian knotweed or phragmites), and at least three weeds that are a problem primarily in lawns.

G751002 Life Span Book A collection of 7 perennial, 1 biennial and 7 annual weeds.

G751003 Weed Display – The purpose of this class is to allow original and creative exhibits that contain educational information about weeds, such as interesting information about a weed species, the effects of weed control, herbicide resistant weeds, what makes a weed a weed or uses for weed.

**All static exhibits must have received a purple ribbon at the county fair to advance to the State Fair.

RULES:

- 1. Each exhibit must be properly identified with **Unit and Class**.
- 2. All plant displays and display covers must be the result of the current year's work.
- 3. Plant identification and lists of appropriate plants in each category (grasses, forbs, shrubs, and grass-like plants) can be found in the Range Judging Handbook and Contest Guide (EC150, Revised July 2016), Common Grasses of Nebraska (EC170), and Common Forbs and Shrubs of Nebraska (EC118).
- 4. The purpose of these exhibits is to demonstrate to the public the benefits from the study and application of crop, weed, and range and soil sciences to solving problems in management, conservation, sustainability and environmental protection. For guidelines on specific projects, refer to appropriate project manuals.

BOOKS (1-6):

For books, plants must be mounted on sheets that are no larger than 14" wide by 14" high. Plants should be glued rather than taped and the mounts should be protected with a clear cover. Proper plant mount should include root as well as stem and leaf tissue. Exhibits will be judged based on completeness of plant mount, accuracy of identification, labeling, neatness and conformation to project requirements. Refer to Scoresheet **SF260**.

Each completed mount must have the following information (see example below) in the lower right corner of the mounting sheet:

1. Scientific name (in italic or underlined), with authority.

- 2. Common name.
- 3. County of collection.
- 4. Collection date.
- 5. Collector's name.
- 6. Collection number, indicating order that plants were collected.
- 7. Other information, depending on class selected, i.e., value and importance, life span, growth season, origin, major types of range plants. This information should be typed or printed neatly.

DISPLAYS (CLASS 7)

The purpose of the display is to tell an educational story to those that view the display. The display is a visual representation (pictures, charts, graphs) no larger than 28" by 28" on plywood or poster board. The display should be neatly titled. Make sure to label display with exhibitor's name, address, and county on back side. Refer to Scoresheet **SF259.**

BOARDS (CLASSES 8-9)

Boards should be should no larger than 30" wide by 36" tall. Boards should be adequately labeled. Refer to Scoresheet **SF260**.Boards should be should no larger than 30" wide by 36" tall or if hinged in the middle a maximum of 60" wide by 36" tall. Boards should be adequately labeled.

D330001 Value and Importance for Livestock Forage and Wildlife Habitat and Food Book A collection of 12 different plant mounts, with 4 classified as high value, 4 as medium value, and 4 as low value for livestock forage, wildlife habitat, or wildlife food. Value and importance classifications can be found in the Range Judging Handbook and Contest Guide, Appendix Table 1 (EC150, Revised July 2016) starting on pages 42. Plants can consist of any combination of grasses, grass-like plants, forbs, or shrubs. Assemble plant mounts in order of high, medium, and low value and importance. Label each plant mount with its value and importance classifications for each of the three areas; Livestock Forage, Wildlife Habitat, Wildlife Food

D330002 Life Span Book A collection of 6 perennial plant mounts and 6 annual plant mounts selected from grasses or forbs.

D330003 Growth Season Book a collection of 6 cool-season grass mounts and 6 warm-season grass mounts.

D330004 Origin Book A collection of plant mounts of 6 native range grasses and 6 introduced grasses. Introduced grasses are not from North America and often used to seed pastures.

D330005 Major Types of Range Plants Book A collection of plant mounts of 3 grasses, 3 forbs, 3 grass-like and 3 shrubs.

D330006 Range Plant Collection Book A collection of 12-range plant mounts with something in common (i.e. poisonous to cattle, or

historically used as food by Native Americans, or dye plants, or favorite antelope forage, etc.) Include a short paragraph in the front of the book, which describes what the plants have in common and why you have chosen to collect them.

D330007 Parts of a Range Plant Poster Mount a range plant on a poster board. Label all the plant parts. Include the plant label in the lower right corner, including the scientific and common name of the plant. Put your name and 4-H county on the back of your poster.

D330008 Special Study Board – A display of the results of a clipping study, a degree of use study, range site study, etc. A short essay must accompany the display to explain the reason for the study, what was learned and study results and should be placed in a sheet cover attached to the board.

D33009 Junior Rancher Board – This exhibit should include a ranch map with a record book or an appropriate educational display on some phase of rangeland or livestock management. A short essay must accompany the display to explain the purpose of the rancher board, what was learned, etc.

**All static exhibits must have received a purple ribbon at the county fair to advance to the State Fair. Entries must be the work of the 4-H member.

Notebooks and posters must have received a purple ribbon at the county fair to advance to the State Fair.

FLORICULTURE (CLASSES 1 – 46)

Youth must be enrolled in the World of Flowers and/or Annual Flowers projects to exhibit in classes 1-46 (cut flowers) and 50-53 (educational exhibits).

- The cultivar or variety name must be included on all entry cards.
 Failure to identify the cultivar or variety will drop the entry one ribbon placing. Proper identification is the responsibility of the exhibitor, not the Extension staff or office personnel. For Floriculture, punch hole in the top center of entry tag, use a rubber band to securely attach entry tag to containers.
- Exhibits entered under an incorrect class number or containing an incorrect number of stems will be dropped one ribbon placing. In classes 23, 45 & 46, do not duplicate entries with the classes listed by using other cultivars or varieties, or entry will be dropped one ribbon placing. For example 4-H'ers with two cultivars or varieties of marigolds can only enter the marigold class and cannot enter the other cultivar or variety in any other class. A perennial is defined as

a plant of which the crown overwinters. **An annual** is a plant that grows from seed each season, whether self-seeded or planted by the gardener. **A biennial** is a plant that germinates, grows and overwinters as a crown, blooms the following year and dies. Foliage will be considered when exhibit is judged.

 All 3 or 5 stems of cut flowers should be the same cultivar and color, do not mix cultivars and colors. Containers will not be judged; however, they should be clear glass containers that won't tip over (No plastic containers at State Fair) and of adequate size to display blooms. Any exhibit not in a clear glass container will be dropped one ribbon placing. Score Sheet SF106.

The notebook must be the result of the current year's work. Pictures from garden catalogs, hand drawn pictures, or photographs may be used. Each species/cultivar must be labeled with the correct common name and scientific name; the height and spread of the plant and the growing conditions (for example: needs full sun and dry sandy soil) the species prefers. In addition to this information, bulbs should also be labeled as spring or summer flowering. Give proper credit by listing the sources of pictures and

information used. The 4-H member's name, age, full address, county, and years in the project(s) must be on the back of the notebook.

G770051 Flower Garden Promotion Poster (SF103) Individual poster promoting flower gardening, size 14" x 22" either vertical or horizontal arrangement. Poster may be in any medium: watercolor, ink, crayon, etc. as long as it is not 3-dimensional. Posters using copyrighted material will not be accepted. Entry card must be stapled to the upper right hand corner. The 4-H member's name, age, full address, county, and years in the project(s) must be on the back of the poster.

G770052 Educational Flower Garden Poster (SF104) Prepare a poster 14" x 22" x 2" (3-dimensional if needed) either vertical or horizontal arrangement illustrating a skill or project you have done or learned about in a 4-H flower or houseplant project. One might show a special technique used or equipment incorporated in the garden. Refer to 4-H horticulture project manuals but use your own creativity. Entry card must be stapled to the upper right-hand corner. The 4-H member's name, age, full address, county, and years in the project(s) must be on the back of the poster.

G770053 Flower Gardening History Interview (SF105) A neatly handwritten or typed account of a gardening history interview whose flower garden has inspired you. Maximum of 4 pages of text and 2 pages of pictures (include 1 picture of the person you interviewed) of their flower garden if the individual is still gardening. Protect with a clear report cover. The 4-H member's name, age, full address, county, and years in the project(s) must be on the back of the report cover.

Houseplants, Division 770

G770060 Flowering potted houseplant(s) that are blooming for exhibition. Non-blooming plants will be disqualified.

G770061 Foliage potted houseplant(s) of all the same variety.

G770063 Dish garden - an open/shallow container featuring a variety of houseplants excluding cacti and succulents.

G770064 Fairy or Miniature garden – A miniature "scene" contained in an open container and featuring miniature or small, slow growing houseplants. The garden needs to have an imaginative theme and miniature accessories, i.e. bench, fence made from tiny twigs, small shell for a bathtub, etc.

G770065 Desert garden - an open/shallow container featuring cacti and/or succulents grown as houseplants.

G770066 Terrarium - a transparent container, partially or completely enclosed; sealed or unsealed.

**All static exhibits must have received a purple ribbon at the county fair to advance to the State Fair. Exhibitors may, and should, correct and update collections for competition at the State Fair.

RULES: Specimens in display collections should be mounted properly and labeled with location, date of collection, name of collector, and order name. Follow mounting and labeling instructions in the Nebraska 4-H Entomology Manual. Boxes are preferred to be 12" high X 18" wide, and landscape orientation, so they fit in display racks. Purchase of commercially made boxes is allowed. All specimens must be from the collector.

H800001 Entomology Display, First-Year Project (SF186).

Collection to consist of 25 or more different kinds (species) of insects representing at least 6 orders. Limit of one box.

H800002 Entomology Display, Second-Year Project (SF186)

Collection to consist of a minimum of 50 kinds (species) of insects representing at least 8 orders. Replace damaged or poorly mounted specimens. At least 25 species must be present from after July 1 of the previous year. Limit 2 boxes.

H800003 Entomology Display, Third-Year or More Project (SF186) Collection to consist of a minimum of 75 kinds (species) of insects representing at least 10 orders. Replace damaged or poorly mounted specimens. At least 25 species must be present from after July 1 of previous year. Limit of 3 boxes.

H800004 Special Interest or Advanced Insect Display (SF187) Educational display developed according to personal interests and/or advanced identification capability. This is also an opportunity to highlight favorite insects in a creative arrangement. Insects should conform to pinning and mounting standards as in Classes 1-3 and be protected in an insect box. Each specialty display should include names of the insects, interesting information about them, and why the display was made. Advanced identification collections should have insects grouped with labels that correspond with identification level (e.g. family, genus, species). A specialty collection may consist of insects by taxonomic group (e.g. butterflies, grasshoppers, dragonflies, scarab beetles) or by host, subject, or habitat (e.g. insect pests of corn, aquatic insects, insect mimicry, insect galls, insects from goldenrod, insect pollinators, etc.).

H800005 - Insect Habitats (SF188) - Habitats consist of any hand-crafted objects, made of natural or artificial materials, placed outdoors, which promote or conserve insects in the environment. Insects may include bee pollinators, butterflies, beneficial insects, etc. A one-page report describing activities must accompany the exhibit.

H800006 – Macrophotography (SF189) - Subjects should be insects, spiders or other arthropods, or any nests, webs or constructions they make. All exhibit prints should be either $8" \times 10"$ or $8\frac{1}{2}" \times 11"$ and mounted on rigid, black $11" \times 14"$ poster or mat board. Either orientation is acceptable. No frames or mat board framing is allowed. A caption of a few sentences should explain the subject and be printed on white paper and glued below the print on the poster board.

H800007 - Insect Poster/Display Exhibits (SF190) - Exhibits can be posters or three-dimensional displays, and artistic creativity is encouraged. Posters should be no larger than 22" x 28". They should be instructional and can be attractive and have pictures, drawings, charts, or graphs. Posters and displays may show any aspect of insect life, habitat, or related conservation or management. Examples include life history and other facts about an insect; insect anatomy; how to manage

insects in a farm, home, lawn, or garden setting; experiences rearing one kind of insect; survey of an important insect; insect behavior (ex. nesting, finding food, mobility, defenses, etc.); habitats (e.g. forests, grasslands, wetlands, rivers, or lakes) and what insects are found there, etc. Three-dimensional displays, such as dioramas, sculptures, models or decorative boxes should have a page of explanatory information accompanying them and fit within a 22" x 28" area.

H800008 - Reports or Journals (SF191) - Reports and journals should be in a 3-ring binder. A report may be informational, that is, an original article about a favorite insect, a history of insect outbreaks, diseases caused by insects, insects as food, etc. Or, it may be a research report about an investigation or experiment done in a scientific manner. It then should have a basic introduction of the insect studied, methods used, observations, and results of the project. Tables, graphs and images are helpful to include. A journal is an observational study over a period of time with personal impressions. It may cover watching changes in kinds of butterflies over the summer, rearing a specific insect from egg to adult, managing a beehive, observations of insects in a specific habitat, accounts of insect behavior in a forest or flower garden, etc.

The purpose of a Veterinary Science exhibit is to inform the public about a common health problem of animals or a veterinary science principle. Do not confuse veterinary science exhibit topics with animal husbandry, history or production topics.

Scoresheet: SF119

Rules:

- A. A Veterinary Science exhibit may consist of a poster, notebook or a display. The exhibit may represent material from any of the Veterinary Science projects including entry level exhibits from Unit I.
- B. If photographs are to be part of the exhibit, remember that they will be viewed by the public. Make sure that the photographs are in good taste and will not be offensive to anyone. Graphic photographs of excessive bleeding, trauma or painful procedures are not

- appropriate. For exhibits related to veterinary surgical procedures, aseptic techniques need to be shown, for example, use of drapes, use of sterile procedures, wearing of gloves, and other appropriate veterinary medical practices.
- C. All static exhibits must have received a purple ribbon at the county fair to advance to the State Fair.
- D. First-Aid Kits: Because of public safety concerns and risk of theft of first-aid kit contents (veterinary drugs/equipment) with perceived potential for drug abuse, animal first aid kits containing any drugs or medications will be immediately disqualified and not displayed. First Aid kits wishing to include medication information should instead utilize written descriptions, photographs, drawings, computer generated printouts, or empty packaging of pharmaceuticals.
- E. **Veterinary Science Posters** This exhibit presents the viewer with a design that is simple and direct, unlike a display that usually presents more information. A poster should not exceed 22" x 28" and may be either vertical or horizontal.
- F. **Veterinary Science Displays** A display may include but is not limited to: a 3-dimensional exhibit, a scale model, the actual product (for example: skeleton; teeth; samples of leather, fur, or dried skin damaged by disease or parasites) or a notebook. A display is not a poster. A display may be mounted on poster board not to exceed 22" x 28" or on 1/4" plywood or equivalent that does not exceed 24" high or 32" wide or in a three-ring binder or another bound notebook format.

Appropriate Veterinary Science Topics:

- Maintaining health
- Specific disease information
- Photographic display of normal and abnormal characteristics of animals
- Animal health or safety
- Public health or safety
- Proper animal management to ensure food safety & quality
- Efficient and safe livestock working facilities
- Or a topic of the exhibitors choosing related to veterinary medicine or veterinary science

*Remember, since these are science displays, all references and information need to be properly cited. Proper sources include but are not limited to: Professional journals and publications, professional AVMA accredited websites, interviews with Veterinarians and excerpts from Veterinary Educational Literature. *Plagiarism will result in a*

disqualification. Please study your topic and present the information to your audience in your own words.

Aerospace, Division 850

Purple \$5.00 Blue \$4.50 Red \$3.00 White \$2.00 **All static exhibits must have received a purple ribbon at the county fair to advance to the State Fair. Entry level rockets, made with PLASTIC FINS and PLASTIC BODY TUBES, are COUNTY ONLY projects.

Rules:

- 1. The name and county of each exhibitor should appear separately on the back of each board, poster or article and on the front cover of the notebooks so owner of the exhibit may be identified if the entry tag is separated from the exhibit.
- 2. Rockets must be supported substantially to protect the rocket from breakage. Rockets are to be mounted on a base that has dimensions equal or less than 12" x 12" and the base should be 3/4" thick. No metal bases. If the rocket fins extend beyond the edges of the required base (12" x 12"), then construct a base that is large enough to protect the fins. The base size is dictated by the size of the rocket fins.
- 3. The rockets must be mounted vertically. Please do not attach sideboards or backdrops to the displays. In addition, a used engine or length of dowel pin is to be glued and/or screwed into the board and extended up into the rockets engine mount to give added stability.
- 4. Rockets must be equipped as prepared for launching, with wadding and parachute or other recovery system. Rockets entered with live engines, wrong base size or sideboards will be disqualified.
- 5. A report, protected in a clear plastic cover, must include:
 - 1) Rocket specification (include original or photo of manufacture packaging stating rocket skill level)
 - 2) A flight record for each launching (weather, distance, flight height)
 - 3) Number of launchings
 - 4) Flight pictures
 - 5) Safety (how did you choose your launch site? Document safe launch, preparations, and precautions)

- 6) Objectives learned
- 7) Conclusions
- 6. The flight record should describe engine used, what the rocket did in flight and recovery success. Points will not be deducted for launching, flight or recovery failures described. This includes any damage that may show on the rocket. Complete factory assembled rockets will not be accepted at the State Fair.
- 7. Judging is based upon display appearance, rocket appearance, workmanship, design or capabilities for flight, number of times launched and report. Three launches are required to earn the maximum launch points given on the score sheets. For scoring for the State Fair, only actual launches count, misfires will not count towards one of the required three launches.
 - For self-designed rockets only, please include digital recorded copy of one flight. In the documentation please include a description of stability testing before the rocket was flown.
 - Skill level of project is not determined by number of years in project. Skill level is determined by the level listed on the manufacturing packaging.
 - 4-H Rocket project levels are not intenended to correspond to National Association of Rocketry model rocket difficulty ratings or levels.
- 8. <u>High power rockets (HPR) is similar to model rocketry with differences that include the propulsion power and weight increase of the model. They use motors in ranges over "G" power and/or weigh more than laws and regulations allow for unrestricted model rockets. These rockets are NOT appropriate for 4-H projects and will be disqualified.</u>
- 9. Posters can be any size up to 28" by 22" when ready for display. Example: tri fold poster boards are not 28" by 22" when fully open for display.

H850010 Factory Assembled Rocket – any kit. (SF92)

H850006-Drone Video-Exhibit must demon straight how the drone interacts with the outside world. H911011 Article made from Unit 1 – Examples: recipe holder, stilts, etc., or other skill level appropriate items.

H911012 Article made from Unit 2 – Examples: birdhouse, footstool, napkin or letter holder etc. or other skill level appropriate items.

NAILING IT TOGETHER - UNIT 3

The ability to build objects as designed by another person is an important life skill. Professional woodworkers often are hired to build objects to exacting specifications as laid out in a written plan.

Requirements:

- All articles exhibited must include a plan (with drawings or sketch or blueprints) stating dimensions and other critical instructions a builder would need to know how to build the project.
- Plans may include narrative instructions in addition to the dimension drawings and include any alternations to the original plan. Part of the score depends on how well the project matches the plans. If the plans are modified, the changes from the original need to be noted on the plans.
- All plans used for making the article must be securely attached and protected by a clear plastic cover.
- 4-H'ers must be in Unit 3 or Unit 4 for the exhibit to be considered for State Fair.
- All projects must have appropriate finish. If the project (i.e. picnic tables, wishing wells, swings, chairs, bridges, doghouses, etc.) is designed to be used outside, it will be displayed outside.

H911001 Woodworking Article (SF91) - Item should be made using either joints, hinges, dowels, or a dado joining made using skills learned in the Nailing It Together manual. Item is required to be appropriately finished. Examples include: bookcase, coffee table or end table.

H911003 Recycled Woodworking Display (SF95) – Article made from recycled, reclaimed or composite wood. Article must be appropriately finished and/or sealed and utilize one or more woodworking techniques from page 2 of the Unit 3 manual. Exhibit must include the woodworking plan and a minimum one-page report of how the engineering design process was used to develop the woodworking plan. Engineering Design Process:

- 1. State the problem (Why did you need this item?)
- 2. Generate possible solutions (How have others solved the problem? What other alternatives or designs were considered?)
- 3. Select a solution (How does your solution compare on the basis of cost, availability, and functionality?)
- 4. Build the item (What was your woodworking plan, and what processes did you use to build your item?)
- 5. Reason for article finish (What type of finish, how did you finish or why you choose this finish?)
- 6. Evaluate (How does your item solve the original need?)
- 7. Present results (How would you do this better next time?)

H911004 - Composite Wood Project (SF96) - 60% of the project must be wood and 40% made from other materials such as metal, rubber,

resin, etc. All plans and plan alternations must be attached to the article. Protect plans with a cover. If project is designed to be outside, it is required to have appropriate outdoor finish because project may be displayed outside.

H911005 - Outdoor Wood Project made with Treated Wood (SF97)

- Treated wood projects DO NOT have to have a finished coating. All plans and plan alternations must be attached to the article. Protect plans with a cover. If project is designed to be outside. Examples include: picnic tables, planters, outdoor furniture, etc.

FINISHING UP - UNIT 4

Requirements:

Exhibit must include the woodworking plan and a minimum one-page report of how the design and engineering process was used to develop the woodworking plan.

Welding, Division 920

Purple \$5.00 Blue \$4.50 Red \$3.00 White \$2.00 **All static exhibits must have received a purple ribbon at the county fair to advance to the State Fair. All metal welding processes accepted.

RULES:

- 1.) The name and county of each exhibitor should appear separately on the back of each board, poster or article and on the front cover of the notebooks so owner of the exhibit may be identified if the entry tag is separated from the exhibit.
- 2.) All welds exhibited in class 1 or 2 must be mounted on a 12" high x 15" long display board of thickness not to exceed 3/8". Attach each weld on a wire loop hinge or equivalent, so the judge can look at the bottom side of the weld when necessary. Each weld should be labeled with information stated 1) type of welding process (stick, MIG, TIG, Oxy-Acetylene, etc.) 2) kind of weld, 3) welder setting, 4) electrode/wire/rod size, and 5) electrode/wire/rod ID numbers. Attach a wire to display board so it can be hung like a picture frame. No picture frame hangers accepted.
- 3.) Fabricated board such as plywood, composition board, or particle-type lumber may be used for demonstration displays.
- 4.) Demonstration boards should be sanded and finished to improve their appearance. The finish on a demonstration board will be judged as a woodworking exhibit.

- 5.) Reports should be written using the scientific method whenever possible (Background, the Question or hypothesis, what you plan to do and what you did, Method used and observations, Results: what you learned. All reports should be computer generated and enclosed in a clear plastic cover. The reports should be attached securely to the display.
- 6.) f no plans are included with welding art, welding article, welding furniture or composite weld project item will be disqualified.
- 7.) All outside projects MUST have entry tag and supporting information placed in a protective bag to prevent damage from weather events such as rain and be ATTACHED to projects with string, zip ties, etc.

ARCS & SPARKS

All welds exhibited in class 1 or 2 must be mounted on a 12" high x 15" long display board of thickness not to exceed 3/8". Attach each weld on a wire loop hinge or equivalent, so the judge can look at the bottom side of the weld when necessary. Each weld should be labeled with information stating:

- 1) type of welding process (stick, MIG, TIG, Oxy-Acetylene, etc.)
- 2) kind of weld,
- 3) welder setting,
- 4) electrode/wire/rod size,
- 5) electrode/wire/rod ID numbers.

Attach a wire to display board so it can be hung like a picture frame. No picture frame hangers accepted. If no plans are included with welding article or welding furniture, item will be disqualified.

4-H Welding Project Tips and Suggestions: Class 1

- 1.) All welds should be made with the same electrode/wire/rod size and number.
- 2.) Welds should be made only on one side of metal so penetration can be judged.
- 3.) Welds should be cleaned with chipping hammer and wire brush. Apply a coat of light oil (penetrating oil) to the metal to prevent rusting. Wipe off excess oil.
- 4.) It is suggested that all welds be on the same size and thickness of metal. These pieces, referred to as coupons, should be 1.5 to 2 inches wide and 3.5 to 4 inches long. A good way to get this size is to buy new cold rolled strap iron and cut to length. The extra width is needed to provide enough metal to absorb the heat from the welding process and prevent the coupons from becoming too hot before the bead is

completed. Narrower coupons will become very hot, making an average welder setting too cold at the bead start, just about right in the middle, and too hot at the end. The correct way to weld narrow strips is to make short beads and allow time to cool, however this project requires a full-length bead.

*Stick welding: Suggested coupon thickness - 1/4" if using 1/8" rod. Suggested rod-AC and DC straight or reverse polarity- first E-7014, second E-6013

*MIG welding: Suggested coupon thickness - 1/4" if using .035 wire and 1/8" if using .023 wire

*Oxy-Acetylene: Suggested coupon thickness - 1/8". Suggested rod-1/8" mild steel rod

4-H Welding Project Tips and Suggestions: Class 2

- 1.) It is suggested that all welds be on same size and thickness of metal. These pieces are referred to as coupons. The welds can be on one coupon that is about 4" x 4" or on individual coupons that are about 2" x 4" inch and ¼" thick. Suggested rods for this class of position welds for AC and DC straight or reverse polarity is, first E-6013, second E-7014 and E-6010 for DC reverse polarity only.
- 2.) Welds should be cleaned with a chipping hammer and wire brush. Apply a coat of light oil (penetrating oil) to the metal to prevent rusting. Wipe off excess oil.

4-H Welding Project Tips and Suggestions: Class 3 & 4

2. All welds should be cleaned and protected from rust with paint or light oil. Plans are to be complete enough that if they were given to a welding shop, the item could be made without further instructions. Bill of materials should include a cost for all items used including steel, electrodes, paint, wheels, etc.

H92001 Welding Joints (SF281) - a display of one butt, one lap and one fillet weld.

H92002 Position Welds (SF281) - a display showing three beads welded in the vertical down, horizontal, and overhead positions. **H92003** - **Welding Art** - **(SF283)** - any art created using tack welds to hold the metal pieces together (examples include horseshoe projects). Type of welder, welder settings, all plans, plan alternations, and a bill for material must be attached to the article. Protect plans with a cover. If project is designed to be outside, it is required to have appropriate outdoor finish.

H92004 Welding Article (SF281) - any shop article where welding is used in the construction. 60% of item must be completed by 4-Her and

notes regarding laser welding or machine welding must be included. Type of welder, welder settings, all plans, plan alternations, and a bill for material must be attached to the article. Protect plans with a cover. If project is designed to be outside, it is required to have appropriate outdoor finish because project may be displayed outside.

H92005 Welding Furniture (SF282) – any furniture with 75% welding is used in the construction. 60% of item must be completed by 4-Her and notes regarding laser welding or machine welding must be included. Type of welder, welder settings, all plans, plan alternations, and a bill for material must be attached to the article.? Protect plans with a cover. If project is designed to be outside, it is required to have appropriate outdoor finish because project may be displayed outside.

H92006. Plasma Cutter/Welder Design (SF279) – Plasma cutters/welders allowed for detailed design(s) to butt cut into metal. 4Hers will create a notebook describing the design process to create the "artwork" to butt cut into the metal. In the notebook include:

- a) A photo (front and back) of the finished project
- b) Instructions on how the design was created (include soft ward used), this allows for replication of the project.
- c) Lessons learned or improvements to the project.
- d) Steps to finish the project.

Class H92007 - Composite Weld Project (SF280) - 60% of the project must be welded and 40% made from other materials such as wood, rubber, etc. Type of welder, welder settings, all plans, plan alternations, and a bill for material must be attached to the article. Protect plans with a cover. If project is designed to be outside, it is required to have appropriate outdoor finish because project may be displayed outside.
