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4-H & FFA GENERAL RULES

- 1. Entries are open to those members of 4-H Clubs or FFA Chapters in Kimball Banner Counties.
- 2. Exhibits must be products of the current year's projects and records must be up to date.
- 3. All 4-H and FFA members will be eligible to participate in County Fair as long as they are within the age limits of 18 or under as of January 1st of the current year, except for FFA members who are pursuing an American Degree making them eligible until their 21st birthday or project completion.
- 4. State Fair: In classes where presence of the 4-H'er is required for judging purposes, such as animal exhibits, judging contests, presentations, and fashion show, a 4-H member must be 9 before January 1, of the current year, or become 10 years of age during the current year. The last year of eligibility is the calendar year the member becomes 19. For classes where presence of the 4-H'er is not required, a 4-H member must be 8 before January 1, of the current year, or become 9 years old during the current year.
- 5. A member **must be enrolled in the project by July 14th of the current year** to exhibit at the Fair by completing a Pre-Entry Sheet.
 - Pre-Entry sheets must list <u>ALL</u> exhibits which a member plans to enter.
 - Department and classes must be shown for each exhibit entered in the Fair.
 - All entries must be put on the entry sheet and will not be accepted at a later date. If the Pre-Entry sheet is not turned in by July 14th, of the current year, the exhibits will not be shown at fair. No exceptions.
 - All livestock entries must have a 4-H/FFA ear tag number on the Fair pre-entry forms.
- 6. All exhibits will remain on display throughout the County Fair except as noted in class rules.
 - In special circumstances, permission for early release can be requested from the respective Superintendent and the Extension Educator/ Assistant.
 - Exhibits removed before release time without permission will automatically result in the forfeiting of premiums, ribbons, and trophies due to that exhibit.
- 7. All Static exhibits will be released starting at 10:00 am Saturday, August 12th.
- 8. All animals will be released following the Livestock sale.
- 9. No Firearms, items with a blade (broad heads, knives, saws, etc.) or related items of any other kind, may be exhibited. The applies to actual items, replicated items and item parts. Shooting sports accessories are permissible as described the Conservation, Wildlife and Shooting Sports section.
- 10. Use of Copywritten Images Copyrighted writing, artwork, videos, and images may be used in 4-H educational exhibits under Fair Use for educational purposes of Copyright Law. In order to qualify for Fair Use, 4-H'ers must: 1) only use a small amount of the copy-written work, 2) add new meaning to the work to make it original, 3) rework it and use it in a totally different way, and 4) use it for nonprofit purposes (not to make money). Giving credit to the original creator is also recommended.
- 11. The maximum offered in premiums for Kimball County will be \$2,000.00. Should premiums exceed this amount, all premiums will be reduced in proportion as is necessary. Banner County premiums are not included in the maximum.
- 12. The respective Superintendent(s) and the 4-H Council President or if personally involved a representative of the 4-H Council of the Executive Committee (Vice Chair, Secretary, or Treasurer) has the authority to make appropriate decisions based on the 4-H Premium Book.

RIBBONS AND AWARDS

- 1. All awards will be made on the grouping system of Purple, Blue, Red, and White, unless otherwise specified.
 - a. Purple ribbons denote an exhibit of superior quality that has met and exceeded all of the standards.
 - b. Blue ribbons denote an above average exhibit that has met almost all of the standards in a way that surpasses the norm.
 - c. Red ribbons indicate average quality and indicate that the exhibit has met the majority of standards in such a way that the benchmark was reached, but not exceeded.
 - d. White ribbons indicate that the exhibit has not met the majority of the standards.
- 2. Judge's decision will be final.
- 3. Exhibits must receive a purple in the class in order to be eligible to receive a Grand Champion in the class (with the exception of Horses).
- 4. Grand Champion Rosettes \$3.00, Reserve Champion Rosettes \$2.00.
- 5. Special Recognition An award is given to recognize youth who have exhibited exceptional creativity, originality, or interview skills in a specific project area. This award is not dependent on ribbon placing and will be given at the judge's discretion; however, the exhibit should stand out from other exhibits.

Information for 4-H exhibitors

- 1. Junior Division is ages 8 11 and Senior Division is ages 12 & Older, unless otherwise stated
- 2. In all classes, an asterisk (*) indicates articles are eligible for State Fair. There are restrictions to the number of articles eligible in some project areas. *Large articles selected to go to State Fair are the responsibility of the exhibitor.*
- 3. The 4-H emblem should be worn at all 4-H events.
- 4. Many exhibits require additional information attached. The directions for this information are listed under each project section.
- 5. <u>Only one entry per class unless otherwise stated</u>. Exceptions include market beef, market sheep, market swine, poultry, meat goat, dairy goat and photography.
- 6. In State Fair classes where an exhibitor has two entries, an exhibitor may only send one exhibit per class if both are chosen for State Fair. Sending a delicate, breakable, or valuable item is highly discouraged. All static exhibits must receive a purple ribbon at the county fair to advance to state fair.
- 7. Grievance Procedure-Regulations and problems arising not covered in this book will be decided by the 4-H Protest Committee. The committee is composed of two 4-H Council representatives, FFA Representative, the Extension Educators (non-voting ex-officio members), one representative of the Kimball County Ag Society, and the Superintendent(s) of the respective department in which the problem arises. Representatives of the 4-H Council will be identified by their organization at least 30 days prior to the start of the Fair. One of the 4-H Council representatives will be selected to chair the committee.
- 8. The 4-H Protest Committee reserves the right to withhold premium and/or award. The 4-H Protest Committee will deal with actions that occur during the County Fair and Fair events only. They will meet when needed to act upon concerns.
 - All protests must be submitted to a Nebraska Extension Educator in writing and signed.
 - The legible written protest must include:
 - 1. Names of persons involved
 - 2. Nature of concerns
 - 3. Situation and documentation
 - 4. Specific action, rule, etc., in question
 - 5. Recommendations for correction
 - 6. Additional persons that the committee may contact for further clarification
 - The 4-H Protest committee will review the written protest. They may discuss the situation with affected persons (i.e. 4-H'ers and parent or guardian) and show officials. Recommendations will be developed, followed, and communicated both verbally and in writing to the group or individual affected.
 - In cases of protest, the exhibitor may be allowed to show, but results of showing will be subject to change based on the outcome of the protest process. This allows for smooth operation of the show and facilitates appropriate processing.
 - Protests will not be accepted after a 24-hour period from the time of occurrence or after the exhibit is released from the 4-H County Fair.
 - Actions of the 4-H Protest Committee will be completed no later than 10 days following the last day of the county fair.
 - The 4-H Protest Committee decision is final.
 - Protests related to judge's integrity, decisions, placing, or other evaluations will not be accepted.

CITIZENSHIP

The purpose of these citizenship exhibits is to foster civic responsibility and action within the diverse areas of citizenship including community service, service learning, government and policy making.

Rules

- 1. Exhibits are entered at 4-H'ers own risk. We will not be responsible for loss or damage to family heirloom items or any items in this division.
- 2. Displays should not be larger than 22" x 28" wide. If the size needs to be a different size because the item is larger than 22"x28" please contact the superintendents for approval. Display collections securely in an attractive container no larger than 22"x28".
- 3. All entries must have a statement explaining:
 - The purpose of the exhibit
 - Exhibitors are encouraged to show evidence of their personal experiences, study or observations that relate to their exhibit. This helps the judges understand what the 4-H'er did and learned in the process that led to the exhibit.
 - References All exhibitors should reference material sources or supporting information used in exhibits (i.e., if questions from a game were taken from an outside source, they must be referenced).
 - Identification All entries should be labeled with the exhibitor's name, club, and county.

CITIZENSHIP

*A120001	Care Package Display - This exhibit is a display about the PROCESS of creating and giving a care package, not the actual care package. You may use a poster, Power Point or another multi-media program to tell about the PROCESS of developing and giving a care package to a service organization. PowerPoint should be saved to a USB/thumb drive. You need to answer the following questions in your exhibit. How did you select the organization? What items did you include in your care package? Why did you select those items? How did it feel to present your care pack to the organization? What did you learn from this experience? Other information that you feel is important about the care package or organization. Some examples of care packages are: Backpack for school supplies, litter pan for animal shelter items, suitcase for abuse shelter or homeless shelter, etc.
*A120002	Citizenship Game which could include, but isn't limited to, symbol flashcards, question-and-answer board, or simulation with props. Clear instructions on how to play the game and what the game hopes to accomplish must be included.
*A120003	Patriotic or Cultural Fine Arts can be made of any art media but should tie in the relevance of the artwork to citizenship.
*A120004	Public Adventure Scrapbook should describe your Public Adventure or Service-Learning Activity. Scrapbooks must measure no more than 16" x 16".
*A120005	Public Adventure Poster should describe your Public Adventure or Service-Learning Activity. Display posters must be stiff enough to stand when supported from behind and below. Length and width must be no more than 24" x 28".
*A120006	Written or Recorded Stakeholder Interview should follow the outline found in the Public Adventures Curriculum. It may be written or recorded.
*A120007	Written Citizenship Essay is designed to promote good citizenship and patriotism. This essay is open to all age groups. All essays should be 300-400 typewritten words.
*A120008	For 9th-12th Graders Only - Oral Citizenship Essay addressing the theme "Freedoms Obligations" should be 3 - 5 minutes. No background music, singing or other enhancement allowed. All essays should be saved as a wav or mp3 file; a USB/thumb drive will be accepted. Voice tone should be normal and conversational. A copy of the written essay should be attached.
*A120009	Service Items can include but aren't limited to lap quilts and homemade toys. Only non-perishable items will be accepted. Attached to the exhibit should be an explanation of who the recipient was and how the service project was made and used. The service item could be part of a larger community service effort.
*A120010	4-H Club Exhibit should depict what a 4-H club has done in the area of community service. This item could include, but is not limited to, a service item, poster, scrapbook, cultural or creative arts item or care package, Quilt of Valor.

Interview should follow the interview guide in the participant manual on page 3 and should reflect on the differences and similarities between you and the person you are interviewing. *A130003 Name Art should be creative art exhibit that symbolizes or explains where your name came from and what it means. Any media can be used. *A130004 Family History depicting your family cultural history or the ethnic make-up of your community noting: Who were the first settlers? Where did they come from? Is there evidence of the background today? (Local celebrations, family celebrations, museum or educational displays, historical markers, etc.) *A130005 **Exhibit depicting a cultural food** that is special to your family. It can be a story or essay. *A130006 "This is Who I Am" poem-a poem written by the 4-H'er that reflect who they are. *A130007 Poster that depicts what you have learned through the i2i Project. *A130008 Biography about a historical figure who has made a positive impact on our society or who has made a difference in the lives of others.
- *A130009 Play Script written about a different culture.

HERITAGE

The purpose of the 4-H Heritage project is to acquire knowledge, develop a connection to the past and share the story of a 4-H member's heritage and history around them. An exhibit may include items, pictures, maps, charts, recordings, drawings, illustrations, writings or displays that depict the heritage of the member's family or community or 4-H history.

Rules

- 1. Exhibits are entered at 4-H'ers own risk. We will not be responsible for loss or damage to family heirloom items or any items in this division.
- Displays should not be larger than 22" x 28" wide. If the size needs to be a different size because the historical item is larger than 22'x28" please contact the superintendents for approval. Display collections securely in an attractive container no larger than 22" x 28".
- Exhibits must include NAME, COUNTY, AGE & PAST EXPERIENCE (years in Explore Your Heritage, projects) on back of exhibit.
- 4. All entries must have documentation included.

If multiple books included in exhibit, only bring book with most current year's work. *A102016 4-H Member Scrapbook - Scrapbook relating to individual 4-H member's 4-H history. If multiple books included in exhibit, only bring book with most current year's work. *A102017 Special Events Scrapbook - A scrapbook relating to a 4-H special event, such as Congress or CWF or a personal or family special event, such as a trip, family reunion, etc.

PHOTOGRAPHY

The purpose of this project area is to establish basic to advanced knowledge of and abilities in using photographic equipment, lighting, and composition to capture images, express feelings, and communicating ideas. Participants can work through the three project levels, progressing from basic to advanced photography skills and techniques.

Rules

- 1. 4-H members are allowed to exhibit in only one photography level.
- 2. 4-H members may enter up to three exhibits but no more than one exhibit per class (see general rules).
- 3. An image may only be used on one exhibit with the exception of Portfolios, which may include images entered in other classes.
- 4. Cameras: Photos may be taken with any type of film or digital camera, including phones, tablets, and drones.
- 5. Photos must be shot by 4-H member during the current project year with the exception of Portfolios, which may include images captured and/or exhibited in previous years.
- 6. Securely attach photos, mats, backing, and data tags. Exhibits that are poorly attached may be disqualified. Do not use photo corners, borders, or place coverings over the exhibits.
- 7. Portfolios: All portfolios must include the following information: 1) 1-page max bio, 2) table of contents, 3) year each photo was taken, 4) title for each image, 5) device make and model used to capture each image, and 6) reflections for each photo. When writing reflections, youth should focus on what new photography techniques or skills they were practicing when they took the photo, what makes the image successful, and what could have been done to improve the image. Portfolios may be presented in either print or digital formats:
 - a. Printed portfolios should be presented in a 8.5"x11" three-ring binder or similar book format. Recommended photo size is 8"x10". Matting is not necessary.
 - b. Digital portfolios may be presented online and must be exhibited along with a single 8.5x11 flyer. Flyers must include a link, URL, or QR code that takes users (judges and fairgoers) to their online portfolio.
- 8. Display Exhibits: At State Fair, display exhibits are only accepted in Level II. Displays consist of three 4"x6" photos mounted on a single horizontal 11"x14" black or white poster or mat board. Incorrect sizes will not be accepted. No foam board backing should be used. Each photo in the display must be numbered using a pencil. Numbers should be readable but not distract from the overall display. No titles, captions, or stick-on numbers will be allowed. Photos may be mounted vertically or horizontally. Appropriate Data Tags are required (see rule regarding Data Tags).
- 9. Print Exhibits: Print exhibits must be 8"x10" printed mounted in 11"x14" (outside size) cut matting with a sandwich mat board backing. Incorrect sizes will not be accepted. No foam board should be used for matting or backing. Mat openings may be rectangular or oval. Photos may be horizontal or vertical. No frames are allowed. Appropriate data tags are required (see rule regarding Data Tags).
- 10. Entry Tags: Entry tags should be securely attached to the upper right-hand corner of the exhibit.
- 11. Data Tags: Data Tags are required on all print and display exhibits. Data tags are not required for portfolios. Each exhibit must have the appropriate number and level of data tags as outline below. Data tags should be securely attached to the back of the exhibit. Current data tags and help sheets are available at: https://go.unl.edu/ne4h-photography
 - a. Level 1 Prints: All Level 1 prints must have a Level 1 Data Tag.
 - b. Level 2 Prints: All Level 2 prints must have a Level 2 Data Tag.
 - c. Level 2 Displays: Each photo of the display must include a separate Level 2 Data Tag. Data Tags should be numbered with the corresponding photo's number.
 - d. Level 3 Prints: All Level 3 prints must have a Level 3 Data Tag.

PRESENTATION CONTEST

The 4-H Presentations Contest includes two types of presentations: Illustrated Presentations and Teaching (Trade Show Exhibit) Presentations.

An Illustrated Presentation, given by one (1) individual or a team of two (2) individuals, is a live presentation with a formal talk where youth will use visual aids (such as props, posters, computer-based visuals, handouts, video, etc.) to show and tell others how to do something. Presentations are given on a stage/platform. Judge views the entire presentation and engages in a question and answer session following presentation.

A Teaching (Trade Show Exhibit) Presentation, given by one (1) individual or a team of two (2) individuals, is a live, interactive, trade show style presentation where youth will continuously engage a constantly changing/moving audience for 30 minutes by showing and telling them how to do something while answering questions. Multiple (up to 6) Teaching Presentations will be scheduled simultaneously, allowing fairgoers/contest attendees to learn from many 4-H youth at one time. Teaching Presentations are given behind a table amongst 4-H exhibits. Judge occasionally stops to view presentation, ask questions, and observe audience engagement.

- 1. To be eligible to compete in the State Fair Presentation Contest, participants must be 10 years old before January 1 of the current year.
- 2. Participants younger than 10 years old before January 1 of the current year are allowed to participate but will not be allowed to compete in State Fair Contest.

- 3. All classes require the presence of the contestant(s).
- 4. A team presentation, consisting of two (2) individuals, may be given for any class; there is no separate class for team presentations.

Participants in the clothing category will demonstrate their knowledge through the creation of garments using STEAM (science, technology, engineering, arts, and mathematics) techniques. Through the creation of garments 4-H'ers will learn more about clothing and application of STEAM abilities. Five divisions in the clothing category offer a varying level of difficulty for 4-H contestants. For more resources and materials in this category refer to the resource section at the bottom of the page.

- 1. **Entry Tags**: Every clothing exhibit must be described on the appropriate entry tag accompanying it (for example: dark blue wool skirt and jacket, red and white figured blouse). Entry tag placement: as you look at the garment place the entry tag securely using straight pins or safety pins on the right side of the garment and the hook of the hanger to the left.
- 2. Identification Labels: Each item entered as a clothing, knitting or crochet exhibit must have a label attached stating: County, Exhibitor's name and age, project name and class in which garment is entered, and the number of years enrolled in the project exhibited. Wool entries must have the fiber content listed n on the identification label. Attach a label on every component of the outfit using safety pins or by basting. Not responsible for unlabeled items.
- 3. **Preparation of Exhibits**: Please bring all wearable exhibits on wire hangers or hangers with a swivel hook ONLY. All exhibits not suitable for hanging should be entered in a self-sealing plastic bag and hung on a hanger. Wool garments and garments with narrow straps hang better on other hangers, i.e., wooden, or notched plastic hangers with a swivel hook. Identification Labels: Each item entered as a knitting or crochet exhibit must have a label attached stating: County, Exhibitor's name and age, project name and class in which exhibit is entered, and the number of years enrolled in the project exhibited. Wool entries must have the fiber content listed on the identification label. Attach a label on every component of the exhibit using safety pins or by basting. Not responsible for unlabeled items.
- 3. Preparation of Exhibits: Knitted and Crocheted exhibits should be entered in the most appropriate manner for the exhibit.
- 4. General: 4-H'ers enrolled in knitted and crocheted projects should continue their skill development. Once you have exhibited in a higher level, you are not eligible to exhibit in a lower level. Ex. Once you exhibit in Knitting Level 3, you are not eligible to exhibit in Knitting Level 2.

QUILT QUEST

In Quilt Quest, 4-Hers learn skills as they progress through the project. The least experienced 4-H exhibitor will select fabric, cut, and sew together only squares or rectangles in making the quilt top. They may have additional guidance in piecing the quilt block and layering together the quilt top, inner batting, and the quilt bottom. Another person can do the quilting for them.

In the Premier class, the 4-Her has developed skills to be able to do all the work by himself/herself. This includes pattern and fabric selection, cutting and sewing individual pieces, layering the quilt top/batting/backing together, and quilting. Quilting may be done by hand, by sewing machine or by a commercial-grade quilting machine. After quilting, the 4-Her must finish the quilt by "squaring it up," put binding on the edge, and placing a label on the quilt which provides details about the quilt making process for historical purposes.

Rules

1. All entry cards and support information must be attached using a safety pin. No straight pins.

- 2. When judging Quilt Quest exhibits, the judges consider "Standards for Judging Quilts and Quilted Items."
- 3. For all classes, 4-Hers can choose fabrics for the quilt by selecting fabric from fabric bolts. 4-Hers may also use "fabric collections" offered by manufacturers in a particular designer or fabric line. Examples of fabric collection include:
 - Jelly Rolls are made of (up to) 40 different strips of 2 ½" wide fabric laying on top of one another and rolled up to look like a jelly roll. The fabric is created by one designer or fabric line and compliments each other. In many cases, less skilled 4-Hers find it difficult to cut narrow strips with a rotary cutter and ruler, so this fabric selection may make it easier as they learn.
 - Honey Buns are made like the Jelly Rolls with 1 ½" strips of fabrics.
 - Layer Cakes are 10" squares of fabric from a manufactured designer or fabric line with different pieces of fabric "layered" on top of one another to look like a piece of cake.
 - Charm Packs are made of 5" squares of coordinating fabric and may be tied up with a string or scrap of fabric.
 - Candies are 2.5" squares of fabric from a manufactured designer or fabric line.
 - Turnover is a collection of coordinating fabrics that are cut into 6" triangles.
 - Fat Quarters are ½ yard cuts of fabric which are cut in half to make a rectangle that is approximately 18" x 21".
 (One half yard of fabric yields 2 fat quarters) The "fat quarter" can be more economical to purchase for a smaller quilt because the purchaser does not have to buy the entire yardage width.
 - Fabric Kit is a collection of fabrics cut in large pieces to accommodate the requirements of a particular quilt
 pattern. The 4-Her must cut out all the smaller squares, rectangles, etc. to make the quilt top according to the
 pattern directions.
- 4. After fabric selection, youth can use a variety of tools for cutting the fabric and completing the quilt. Cutting into pattern pieces may include hand roller die cutting machines that cut particular shapes which can be appliqued to fabric. This is allowed in the construction of the quilt.
 - A quilted exhibit is made up of at least 3 layers. Exhibits must be quilted or tied through all layers.
 - Fleece blankets are not eligible in this division.
 - Quilts must have a permanent label on the back in the bottom right corner with quilter's name and date of completion.

EXPLORING QUILTS

FASHION SHOW

The 4-H Fashion Show is an opportunity for youth to showcase their clothing construction and consumer management skills. Construction garment contestants are judged on fit, construction, poise, and overall look of the garment on the individual. Shopping In Style contestants are judged on garment fit, the overall look of the outfit, and poise, as well as record keeping skills in the written report.

Rules

- 1. Clothing and Fashion Show judging will be held on Clothing Judging Day.
- 2. All garments which are worn in the show must be entered in the clothing exhibits so they can be judged for workmanship.
- 3. Participants will be allowed to model in both the construction fashion show and Shopping in Style fashion show.
- 4. Garments should be age appropriate
- 5. A purchased top can be worn to complete a vest or jacket outfit with a skirt, pants, or shorts outfit with a vest or unlined jacket.
- 6. Exhibitor must sign up for the number of outfits they plan on modeling regardless of project area.
- 7. A completed <u>4-H Fashion Show Script</u> must be turned in to the Extension Office by July 20th.
- 8. A completed Shopping in Style Fashion Show Narration must be turned in to the Extension Office by July 20th.

State Fair Eligibility Rules

- 1. A 4-H'er must be 9 by January 1 of the current or become 10 years of age during the current year to be eligible for the State Fair Fashion Revue.
- 2. In order to be eligible for State Fair, 4-H'ers must model clothing items from the following projects: STEAM 2 Simply Sewing, STEAM 3 A Stitch Further, Beyond the Needle, Knitting or Crochet.
- 3. Garments worn in the 4-H Fashion Show can NOT be entered as Clothing Construction Exhibits.
- 4. Garments should be age appropriate.
- 5. A purchased top can be worn to complete a vest/ jacket with a skirt, pants, or shorts outfit.

HOME ENVIRONMENT

The purpose of Home Environment is to learn design principles and develop graphic design techniques. In addition, activities in this category encourage well-thought-out design plans and diverse artistic techniques. Be sure to take note of the rules section to develop a successful project.

Home Environment Exhibits are evaluated by these criteria:

- 1. Items must be designed to be used for home decorating, home furnishing (no clothing, purses, note cards, scrapbooks/photo albums, etc.)
- 2. Accessories should be of high quality (as compared to quick, simple crafts), suitable for use in the home several months throughout the year. Holiday specific items are discouraged. Exhibits made from kits are also discouraged as kits limit decision making in the design process.
- 3. Items should show creativity and originality, along with the application of design elements and principles. Youth are required to include the design elements and principles they used, along with simple explanation of how they designed their

project with their exhibit. Information on the elements and principles of design may be found in the Design Decisions manual, as well as Portfolio Pathways and Sketchbook Crossroads.

- 4. Entered in correct class. What medium was changed or manipulated? What medium is the majority of your exhibit made from?
- 5. Items should be ready for display in the home: pictures framed, wall hangings and pictures ready to hang etc. No single mat board or artist canvas panels allowed. Wrapped canvas (if staples not visible on edge) is accepted without framing. Make sure hangers are strong enough to support the item. Command strips are not adequate hangers. Items not ready for display will be dropped one ribbon placing.
- 6. Items should not be made for beginning level or other projects (ex: simple (10 minute) table runners or woodworking). Exhibits from the beginning level project, Design My Place, are county only and not state fair eligible.
- 7. Size of Exhibits: Exhibits may be no taller than 7 feet and no wider than 6 feet. All exhibits must be easily lifted by two 4-H staff.
- 8. Entry Tags: An entry tag which includes a clear description of the entry must be securely attached to each Home Environment exhibit. Use color, pattern or picture descriptions to aid in identification. No straight pins.
- 9. Identification: In addition to the entry tag, a label with the exhibitor's name and county should be attached to each separate piece of the exhibit
- 10. Supporting Information: Supporting information is required for all Home Environment exhibits. Information must include elements or principles of design used and steps taken to complete project. Tag templates can be found at http://go.unl.edu/ne4hhomeenvironment. Exhibits without supporting information will be dropped a ribbon placing.

VISUAL ARTS

The purpose of the Visual Arts projects is to learn design principles and develop design techniques. In addition, youth should work to communicate a personal voice, with intention, through their work. Be sure to take note of the rules section to develop a successful project. By completing supporting documentation, youth will examine their choices and demonstrate an understanding of the elements of art and principles of design.

Rules

- 1. Original Work Items must be the original work of the 4-H member and should show creativity and originality. No copyrighted images or master studies.
- 2. Framed and ready for Display All 2-dimensional pieces must be ready to hang using a sawtooth or wire hanger. Stretched canvases do not need frames as long as staples not visible on edges. All other 2-dimensional pieces must be framed.
- 3. Entries per Exhibitors 4-H members may enter one exhibit per class.
- 4. Entry Descriptions Entry tags should include a visual description of the exhibit, including size, dominant color, and subject to aid in identification.
- 5. Supporting Information Support information is required for all Visual Arts exhibits. Information must include responses to all questions and steps taken to complete the project. Supporting Information must be securely attached to the back of the piece. Supporting Information tag templates can be found at hhps://go.unl.edu/ne4hvisualarts. Exhibits without supporting information will be dropped a ribbon placing.

HEIRLOOM TREASURES/FAMILY KEEPSAKES

Rules

- 1. This project area is for items with historic, sentimental, or antique value that are restored, repurposed, or refinished to keep their original look and value.
- 2. It is not for "recycled" items. For example, a bench would be considered an heirloom if the original finish is restored, but if decorated by painting it would be considered recycled.
- 3. Entering highly valuable items (especially small ones) is discouraged, as exhibits are not displayed in closed cases.
- 4. Attach information including:
 - 1. List of steps taken to complete your project. Before and after pictures are encouraged.
 - 2. Keepsakes documentation: how you acquired the item, and the history of the item may be written, pictures, audio, or video tape of interview with family member, etc.
- *C256001 Trunks- including doll-sized trunks or wardrobes.
- *C256002 An article either a repurposed "treasure" (accessory) from an old item or an old "treasure" (accessory) refinished or renovated- May include a display of a collection or collectibles, being careful not to destroy value of the collection.
- *C256003 Furniture either a repurposed treasure" from an old item or an old "treasure" refinished or renovated. May include doll-sized furniture.
- *C256004 Cleaned and Restored Heirloom Accessory or Furniture- A reconditioned and cleaned old piece of furniture or accessory that is functional for use or display. Item might be cleaned and waxed, and simple repairs made. Item would not be refinished or repainted but reconditioned to restore it to its original look or to prevent it from further damage as a valuable heirloom. Consult extension publication Care and Conservation of Heirloom Textiles for information on textiles. This publication can be found in the Digital Commons at: https://go.unl.edu/gcnh (Refinished items go in classes 2 3.) This class is for situations where it may be best to do very little to the item to maintain its antique value. Item or article should be of complexity suited to an advanced project.

FORESTRY

FORESTRY

This category provides 4-H'ers an opportunity to prepare displays that shows their expertise in many aspects of forestry. Involvement in this category will lead to expansion of seed, twig, wood, leaf, and tree knowledge for 4-H'ers. In addition, participants would learn more about common Nebraskan trees. For more information about tree classification visit this website <u>https://4hcurriculum.unl.edu/index.php/main/program_project/65</u>

- The official reference for all forestry projects is the Tree Identification Manual (4-H 332)? https://marketplace.unl.edu/ne4h/4h332.html which was recently revised and is available for purchase from UNL Marketplace. Other helpful forestry references include Trees of Nebraska (EC 92-1774-X), https://marketplace.unl.edu/ne4h/leafing-out.html
- 2. Display "boards" must be made from wood or wood composite, e.g. plywood, fiberboard, or Masonite, 1/4" to ½" thick and no larger than 24" x 24". Display boards may be coated, e.g., painted or varnished, on both sides to prevent warping.
- 3. Display "posters" must be made from a material, e.g. foam board or poster board, that will stand upright without buckling, and be no larger than 24" x 24".
- 4. Display "books" must measure no more than 16" x 16".
- 5. At least 5 of the 10 samples in Class 2, 3, 4, and 5 must be from the list of 60 species described in 4-H 332. Samples must be from 10 different tree species. For example, Emerald Queen Maple and Crimson King Maple are both varieties of the same species (Norway Maple), and thus have the same genus and species name, i.e. Acer platinoids. All samples must be from trees, NO shrubs. If more than 10 samples are included in the display, only the first 10 samples from the current year will be judged.
- 6. Due to emerald ash borer infestation, no true ash species (Green Ash, White Ash, Black Ash, or Blue Ash) may be included in any collections. Inclusion of a true ash species will result of the project being disqualified.
- 7. Remember that other general labeling standards apply. For example, scientific names are always italicized or underlined. Also, the first letter of a Genus name is always capitalized. The first letter of a species name is always lower case. When required, always indicate complete scientific names (Genus and species) and common names, (e.g. Norway Maple) even when "variety names" are included. For example, the scientific name of Emerald Queen Maple is Acer platinoids and the common name is Norway maple. "Emerald Queen" may be included as the variety name, but variety names are not required.
- 8. How well the exhibitor follows written directions is an important factor in judging.

 - Science, Engineering, and Technology Exhibit
- *D320001 Design Your Own Exhibit Prepare an educational exhibit about some aspect of trees, forests, or forestry that is of special interest to you. Possible topics include paper recycling, wildfire, forest wildlife, or forest pests. The only requirement is that the display be no larger than 24" x 24" x 24". Photographs, drawings, samples, charts, posters, etc. can be used but include enough information to adequately explain the topic. Your display should be substantially different from other display classes. Be as creative as you like.
- *D320002 Leaf Display The leaf display must include samples of "complete leaves" from 10 different tree species. The display must include at least two samples each of simple leaves, compound leaves, and conifer leaves. Leaves should be pressed, dried, and mounted.
 - **Collection**: Whenever possible, collect leaves from mature trees. Collect leaves any time after they have reached full size, usually beginning in early summer. Leaf samples should be in good condition and representative of the average leaves on the tree. Keep in mind that shaded leaves are often much larger than normal. Carefully remove leaves from the twig with the entire petiole or rachis intact. After collection, fresh leaf samples can be temporarily stored within the pages of an old magazine, but they should be properly pressed and dried for display. Be sure to record pertinent information during collection. All collection must be done by the exhibitor.
 - **Mounting**: Leaves may be displayed in a notebook or on a display board. Any method may be used to mount leaves, e.g. wire, glue, tape, staples, plastic bags, but be sure all their features can be clearly identified.
 - Labeling: The label for each sample must include: 1. common name 2. scientific name 3. leaf type 4. leaf arrangement (for broadleaf trees) 5. leaf composition (for broadleaf trees) 6. collector's name 7. collection date 8. collection location (be specific, state and county at a minimum) If a twig is included with a sample, indicate "twig included" on the label. For example, the twig may be included with an eastern red cedar sample because the leaves are very small and difficult to remove from the twig.
 - **Supplemental information:** e.g. general uses, common products, fall color, etc., may be included to enhance educational value.

Twig Display - Display must include twig samples from at least 10 different tree species. The display must include at least two samples each of opposite and alternate leaf arrangements from broadleaf trees.

- **Collection**: Twig samples should be collected during the dormant season (November April) when the buds are mature. Twig samples must be at least 6 inches long and exhibit buds. Leaves must be removed, and side branches must be trimmed to less than 1 inch in length. All collection must be done by the exhibitor.
- **Mounting:** Twigs must be mounted on a display board. Any methods, e.g. wire, glue, tape, staples, plastic bags, etc., may be used to mount twigs, but be sure all the features can be clearly identified. The non-terminal end must be cut at a slant so the pith can be seen.
- Labeling: The label for each sample must include: 1. common name 2. scientific name 3. leaf arrangement (for broadleaf trees) 4. collector's name 5. collection date 6. collection location (be specific, state and county at a minimum)
- Supplemental information: e.g. general uses, tree characteristics, etc., may be included to enhance educational value.

***D320004** Seed Display- Collection must include seed samples from at least 10 different tree species.

- **Collection:** Tree seeds should be collected at the time of year when they mature, which varies widely depending upon tree species. For example, silver maple seeds mature in May while red oak acorns do not mature until September. Seed samples should be free of insect or disease symptoms. Remember to display seeds, not fruit. For example, the seed of honey locust is enclosed in a pod. Remove and display the seed, not just the pod. It is acceptable to display the fruit with the seed, but clearly label each. All collection must be done by the exhibitor.
- **Mounting:** Seeds may be displayed in a variety of ways, e.g. mounted on a display board, displayed in jars in a rack, etc., but they must be securely mounted and easily viewed. Be as creative as you like.
- Labeling: The label for each sample must include: 1. common name 2. scientific name 3. type of fruit, if known (e.g. samara, pod, nut, legume, etc.) 4. collector's name 5. collection date 6. collection location (be specific, state and county at a minimum)

- Wood Display Display must include wood samples from at least 10 different tree species.
 - **Preparation**: Samples may be of any shape, e.g. sections from a board, wood cylinders turned on a lathe, horizontal or vertical cross sections of a small log with bark attached, etc., but all samples should be the same shape, e.g. all wood cylinders or all sections of a board. Each sample can be no larger than 4 inches by 4 inches by 4 inches. Cut surfaces should be sanded to show the grain. Treating samples with a clear finish (no stain) is optional. All collection must be done by the exhibitor.
 - **Mounting:** Samples may be displayed in a variety of ways, e.g. mounted on a display board, displayed in a box or rack, etc., but they must be securely mounted and easily viewed. Be as creative as you like.
 - Labeling: The label for each sample must include: 1. common name 2. scientific name 3. wood type (softwood or hardwood) 4. collector's name 5. collection date 6. collection location (be specific, state and county at a minimum)
 - **Supplemental information**: e.g. common products, wood density, etc., may be included to enhance educational value.
- *D320006 Cross Section of a Tree Display- a disc cut from a tree species listed in 4H 332. The sample must be collected, by the exhibitor, within one year of the fair judging day. The disc must measure 6 to 12 inches in diameter and 1 to 3 inches thick. The bark should be firmly attached which may be difficult if the tree was dead when the disc was cut. Sand at least one side of the disc so the grain can be easily seen. If the disc is treated with a clear finish both sides must be treated to minimize warping. As the disc dries, some cracking or checking can be expected and is allowed.
 - Labeling: The following parts must be clearly and accurately labeled on the cross section with pins, paper tags, or some other form of identification: 1. Pith 2. Heartwood 3. Sapwood 4. One growth ring (beginning and end) 5. Cambium 6. Bark o A separate label attached to the back of the disc must include: 7. Common name 8. Scientific name 9. Tree classification (softwood or hardwood) 10. Age (of the cross section) 11. Collector's name 12. Collection date 13. Collection location (be specific, state and county at a minimum)
- *D320007 Parts of a Tree (This project is only for ages 8-11) Prepare a poster, no larger than 24 inches x 24 inches that clearly identifies the main external parts of any tree: 1. Trunk 2. Crown 3. Roots 4. Leaves 5. Flowers 6. Fruit 7. Buds 8. Bark Identifying other internal parts, e.g. phloem, xylem, cambium, annual ring, pith, etc., is optional. Attach a separate label on the back of the poster that includes the exhibitor's name and age.

Living Tree - Display a living tree seedling grown by the exhibitor from seed in the display container. The seed must be from a species listed in 4H 332. The seedling must be 60 days to 1 year old (on State Fair judging day). The display container must contain at least 8 inches of soil (potting mix or suitable natural soil, have drainage holes, and a drain pan to catch drainage water.

- **Labeling:** A waterproof label must be attached and include: 1. common name 2. scientific name 3. seed treatments (if any) 4. planting date 5. emergence date 6. collector's name.
- **Supplemental information** about the tree: e.g. where the seed was collected, growth measurements, uses for that species, etc., may be included in an attached notebook, poster, etc. to enhance educational value. Supplemental information will be an important factor in judging.

*D320009 Forest Product Display - Prepare a visual display and/r collection tracing the origin of one non-lumber product that comes from trees and/or forests. The display must be no larger than 24 inches by 22 inches by 28 inches. Photographs, drawings, samples, charts, posters, etc. can be used. Posters submitted may be no larger than 22" x 28" and may be either vertical or horizontal. The contestant must identify what species of tree the product is derived from and where the product is harvested, grown, or otherwise collected. The product listed must be partially or fully derived from trees, if partial the approximate percentage should be articulated in the display.

- The goal of this exhibit is for students to learn that many products come from trees and forests and to explore one of these products through in-depth study.
- Information about the tree or forest product: e.g. information about harvesting, processing, industry information, and environmental or other benefits may be included to enhance educational value. Supplemental information will be an important factor in judging but should not exceed three printed pages of text. Cite sources of information.
 - Personal interviews with industry professionals are encouraged as a course of information.

*D320010 Forest Health Display - Prepare a visual display outlining a specific forest health issue such as a tree disease, insect pest, animal- or human-caused damage, or an abiotic issue such as weather damage. The display must be no larger than 24 inches by 24 inches by 24 inches. Original photographs, drawings, samples, charts, posters, etc. can be used. Actual specimens are strongly encouraged but must be properly preserved, i.e. insects pinned or placed in vials of alcohol, leaves pressed and dried. Posters submitted may be no larger than 24 inches x 24 inches.

- Explain through the display what species of trees the health issue affects, diagnostic features of the issue (symptoms in trees, identifying features of the pest, etc.), and management options.
- Include common and specific names of trees and pests.

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*D320011

- Supplemental information about the tree or forest health issue: e.g. origin, proliferation in Nebraska/United States, and physiological effects on the tree may be included to enhance educational value. Supplemental information will be an important factor in judging but should not exceed three printed pages of text. Cite sources of information.
 - Attach a separate label on the back of the display that includes the exhibitor's name and age.

Wildfire Prevention Poster - Prepare a poster, no larger than 24 inches x 24 inches that promotes wildfire prevention strategies. Strategies articulated in the poster can include personal and/or land management actions. Attach a separate label on the back of the poster that includes the exhibitor's name and age.

- Supplemental information about wildfire prevention should be attached to the poster: e.g. frequency of wildfires in Nebraska/United States, financial costs of wildfires, environmental factors that contribute to wildfires, etc. to enhance educational value. Supplemental information will be an important factor in judging but should not exceed three printed pages of text. Cite sources of information.
- *D320012 Sustainable Landscape Diorama Box must be no larger than 24" x 24". The exhibit must show a Nebraska landscape that includes elements such as windbreaks, fields, pastureland, CRP, public lands, community/municipal landscapes. The goal of this exhibit is for students to articulate conservation and sustainability best-practices that can be implemented on a landscape, while addressing landowner and other stakeholder interests.
 - Label Point/nonpoint sources of pollution, carbon sequestration, water-wise practices, wildfire prevention strategies, renewable energy sources, and other conservation practices as well as at least 10 species of plants included in the diorama.
 - Attach to the exhibit a brief report including supplemental information describing the diorama, defining
 conservation practices, and outlining opportunities for landscape improvements to enhance educational
 value. Supplemental information will be an important factor in judging but should not exceed three printed
 pages of text. Cite sources of information.
- *D320013 Tree Planting Project Display Plant a tree in your community. Prepare a visual display where the student articulates proper tree planting techniques, why the individual tree species was chosen, as well as steps taken to continue care for the tree after initial planting. The display must be no larger than 24 inches by 24 inches by 24 inches. Photographs, drawings, samples, charts, posters, etc. can be used. Posters submitted may be no larger than 24 inches x 24 inches. The tree must have been planted 60 days to 1 year before State Fair judging day. Students must obtain permission from necessary authorities and property owners before planting any trees.
 - Labeling: the following information about the tree must be included in the display: 1. common name 2. scientific name 3. planting location 4. planting date 5. tree source 6. planter's name 7. proper tree planting steps 8. tree care (after planting)
 - Supplemental information about the tree: e.g. why the species was chosen, growth measurements, uses for that species, etc., may be included in an attached notebook, poster, etc. to enhance educational value. Supplemental information will be an important factor in judging but should not exceed three printed pages of text. Cite sources of information.

WILDLIFE CONSERVATION

Conservation, wildlife and shooting sports gives 4-H members an opportunity to share their knowledge and field experience about conservation, wildlife, and shooting sports. When creating an exhibit make sure to take close account of the rules while considering the different laws that surround those areas.

- 1. Show What You Did & Learned: All exhibitors must show evidence of their personal field experiences, study or observations that relate to their exhibit. This helps judges understand what the 4-H'er did and learned in the process that led to the exhibit.
- 2. Proper Credit: Show proper credit by listing the sources of plans or other supporting information used in exhibits.

- 3. Whose Exhibit? The exhibitor's name, address, and parent's or guardian's name must be on the back or bottom of all displays.
- 4. Wildlife & Wildlife Laws: "Animal" or "Wildlife" in the following classes includes wild fish, amphibians, reptiles, birds, or mammals. Please make sure you are following all wildlife laws.
- 5. Project Materials: Related project booklets include Exploring Your Environment Series, 4-H Shooting Sports, Amphibians, Bird Behavior (EC 59381), Fishing for Adventure Project Manuals, Wildlife Conservation (4-H 125), Geology, and Outdoor Adventure. Other resources include Outdoor Skills: Learning Science in the Outdoors series (Science Signature Outcome Program) outdoornebraska.gov/afterschool/ and www.whep.org.
- 6. Board and Poster Exhibits: Mount all board exhibits on ¼" plywood, Masonite, or similar panel no larger than 24" x 24" wide. Poster exhibits should be on regular poster sheets, no larger than standard size (22" x 28") but half size, 22" x 14", is recommended.

WILDLIFE AND HOW THEY LIVE

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Rules

Classes 1-4 are board or poster exhibits. Display may show any aspect of wildlife, wildlife habitat, or related conservation. For more ideas, refer to project booklets. Remember to look at General Rules for this area.

- *D340001 Mammal Display- Examples: life history or other facts about one type of wildlife; how to manage wildlife on a farm or in town; managing habitat for one kind of wildlife; life requirements for one kind of wildlife during one season or through the year; wildlife behavior and habitats.
- *D340002 Bird Display- Examples: life history or other facts about one type of wildlife; how to manage wildlife on a farm or in town; managing habitat for one kind of wildlife; life requirements for one kind of wildlife during one season or through the year; wildlife behavior and habitats.
- *D340003 Fish Display- Examples: life history or other facts about one type of wildlife; how to manage wildlife on a farm or in town; managing habitat for one kind of wildlife; life requirements for one kind of wildlife during one season or through the year; wildlife behavior and habitats.
- *D340004 Reptile or Amphibian Display- Examples: life history or other facts about one type of wildlife; how to manage wildlife on a farm or in town; managing habitat for one kind of wildlife; life requirements for one kind of wildlife during one season or through the year; wildlife behavior and habitats.
- *D340005 Wildlife Connections- Board or poster exhibit. The purpose of this display is to show interconnections and related aspects among animals, plants, and other habitat components. All displays should show two or more interactions (connections) that occur between/among animals or between animals and their habitat. Displays might show how

animals interact with other animals, with people, or with their habitat. Examples: Food chain display. Use pictures, drawings, or other items to illustrate the source of food energy and where it goes - who eats whom or what. Use arrows to show the direction of the energy (food) flow; Show the role of predators, scavengers, insect eaters, or others in nature; Show how wildlife numbers (populations) change through the year; Show predation, competition, or other behavioral interactions of wildlife; Choose one kind of wildlife and make observations through a season or year, keep notes of interactions, then make a display of what you saw.

- * D340006 Wildlife Tracks- Board or diorama-type box exhibit. Make a display of animal tracks using plaster-of-paris casts. There are 3 options. For all options, include a brief description of your experiences in making the tracks so the judges better understand what you did and learned. Positive casts (impressions as they would be in nature) are preferred. - Option 1 should show plaster-of-paris tracks of five or more kinds of wildlife along with a picture or illustration of each kind of animal. (OR) - Option 2 should show two or more plaster-of-paris tracks of one specific kind of wildlife and should include a picture or illustration of the animal, what the animal may eat, and what may eat the animal. (OR) - Option 3 should show two tracks and include the animal's habitat needs including preferred food, shelter, water, and space in addition to picture or illustration of the animal.
- *D340007 Wildlife Knowledge- Use electrical circuits, pictures, or other methods of teaching wildlife identification or other wildlife conservation or shooting sports related knowledge. Plan size and shape to fit transportation and display; maximum size 24 x 24 inches.
- *D340008 Wildlife Diorama- Exhibit must be no larger than 24" x 24". The exhibit might show a grassland, prairie, agricultural, woodland, riparian (stream or river corridor), wetland, and/or other area with wildlife habitat. Example: show an area interspersed with several habitats such as windbreaks, farm fields, woods, waste areas, ditches, and pastures for edge-adapted species such as white-tailed deer, Northern bobwhite, mourning doves, cottontail rabbits, fox, squirrels, Northern cardinals, or blue jays. Label the habitats displayed and show at least five kinds of wildlife in their proper habitats.
- *D340009 Wildlife Essay- Learn how to share educational information by writing. Choose a conservation or wildlife topic that interests you and write an essay about it. For example, write about a particular species of wildlife that you have observed or about the values of wildlife. You might write about wildlife on a farm, in town, in a backyard, at a backyard feeder, or at other places. You might write about ethics, proper hunting, fishing, or ethics and proper behavior for hunting or fishing. The essay is between 100 and 1000 words long and typed, double spaced on 8 ½ x 11 paper. You might use books, magazines, or personal interviews as resources, but you must give credit to all sources by listing them.
- *D340010 Wildlife Values Scrapbook- Make a scrapbook about the various values of wildlife. This would include aesthetic, scientific, commercial, game, genetic, and/or ecological. One resource would be in the Wildlife Conservation project booklet (4-H 125).
- *D340011 Wildlife Arts- The purpose of this class is to allow artistic exhibits that contain educational information about conservation and wildlife. Examples might include paintings, photographs, wood carvings, painted duck decoys, or songs or poems written by the exhibitor. Entries must be appropriate for fair display and no larger than 24" x 24". For example, paintings or photographs should be displayed in notebook format or mounted on a sturdy display panel. All entries must include a title and brief explanation of the purpose or message (what is the exhibit meant to show).

WILDLIFE HABITAT

- *D342001 Houses Make a house for wildlife. Examples: bird house (bluebird, purple martin, wood duck, kestrel, barn owl, etc.) or bat house/no insect houses. Make the house functional so that dimensions, hole size etc. are appropriate to fit the intended species' needs. Include the following information: 1) the kinds of animal(s) for which the house is intended, 2) where and how the house should be located for best use, and 3) any seasonal maintenance needed. Tips: Check NebGuide on bird houses and shelves.
- *D342002 Feeders/Waterers Make a bird bath or feeder. Examples: seed, suet, or nectar feeders. Squirrel feeder okay; no insect feeders. Indicate the kinds of animal (s) for which the feeder or waterer is intended. Make the feeder or waterer functional so that it fits wildlife needs. Include the following information: 1) where and how the feeder or waterer should be located for best use and 2) how it should be maintained. Tips: Check NebGuide on feeding birds.
- *D342003 Wildlife Habitat Design Board or Poster Exhibit- Choose a backyard, acreage, or farm, and design a habitat plan to meet the food, water, shelter, and space needs of at least three kinds of animals you would like to attract. Draw an outline of the area and show what plants or other habitat will be provided. Indicate how the various parts of your

plan provide the desired habitat needs. You might include an aerial photo of the area if you have one.

HARVESTING EQUIPMENT/FISHING

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- *D343001 Fish Harvesting Equipment Board exhibit. Display of equipment used in fish harvesting. Examples: fishing knots, hooks (with corks over ends for safety), and lures. Label all items displayed. Include in your exhibit the following information: the purpose of each item, when or where each item is used, and any personal experiences you've had with the item(s).
- *D343002 Build A Fishing Rod Rod building kits with instructions are available for this purpose. A fishing rod educational exhibit may not exceed 96 inches in length. Exhibit must be mounted on a board. Include with the exhibit: explanation of cost of materials/components, where materials/components were purchased, and how many numbers of hours required for construction. Label all parts. Necessary components which must be included are grip, line guides (based on manufacturers specifications), guide wraps, and hook keeper. Reel seat needs to be aligned with guides, and guides aligned accurately down rod. Guide wraps of size A to D, nylon, or silk thread. Exhibit will be judged on: workmanship, labeling of parts, correct information, and neatness.
- *D343003 Casting Target Make a casting target for exhibit and use. Target must be under 48" x 48". The bullseyes must be 2 feet, outer band must be 1 foot in diameter and can have up to 3 rings. The exhibit must be easy to store, durable, and weather resistant. Include the purpose and rules of using your casting target.
- *D343004 Wildlife Harvesting Equipment Board Exhibit- Display of equipment used in harvesting wildlife. Examples: expended ammunition casing (no live ammunition permitted) steel traps, hide stretchers, fleshers, etc. For displays of shotgun, rifles, or bows, use drawings or pictures. Label all items displayed: the purpose of each item, when or where it is used, and any personal experiences you've had with the item(s).
- *D343005 Inventing Wildlife/Fish Harvesting Equipment, Aid or Accessory Use engineering principles to invent or adapt equipment that helps you harvest fish or wildlife. This could include wildlife calls, adapted fishing pole for shallow water, a blind, decoys, etc. Share your drawing (or adapted plans), how the equipment works, how you tested it, and the results of testing your prototype and any adjustments you made.

TAXIDERMY

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- *D346001 Tanned Hides Any legal fish, bird, or other wild animal properly processed by the member. No requirement as to size or mounting Include the following information: 1) The animal's name and 2) Information about the exhibitor's personal field experiences, study or observations that relate to the exhibit.
- *D346002 Taxidermy Any legal fish, bird, or other wild animal properly processed by the member. No requirement as to size or mounting. Include the following information: -the animal's name information about the exhibitor's personal field experiences, study, or observations that relate to the exhibit.

OTHER NATURAL RESOURCES

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*D361001 Design Your Own Exhibit in Natural Resources, Conservation, or Ecology- This class is for educational exhibits about natural resources, conservation, wildlife, or ecology that do not fit into other categories. Entries must be appropriate for fair display and no larger than 24" x 24". All entries must include a title and should be clear (a brief explanation or other method) about the intended purpose or message - what the exhibit is meant to show. Think about accuracy, creativity, educational value for viewers, and evidence of exhibitor's personal experiences and learning.

- *D341002 Journal/Binder Written report of virtual, or actual camping/hiking trips with observation OR field journal (notes of actual experiences, sights, sounds, smells, etc.), OR camping or hiking trip diary. Explain growth in project, leading the hikes, planning the camping trip, now being able to identify the wildlife and nature around you and how identified (sight/sound/shape/smell/color). Feather/leaf/flower pressing must be securely attached, if included. Photos of drawing of observations encouraged. Exhibits measure no larger than 16" X 16".
- *D341003 Camping/Hiking Safety Must include explanation of use of item and why selected/purpose, how it fits hiking/camping needs. May include, but are not limited to, one of the following: travel sized poisonous plants guide, camping first aid kit, weather/water safety or hand hygiene kit. Exhibits measure no larger than 18" X 24".
- *D341004 Digital Media Use digital media to show video/slideshow/presentation of setting up a tent (include why site is chosen) or protecting natural resources or environmental issues or computer video camping/hiking gave. Submit a USB drive or DVD inside a report cover or notebook. If using a slideshow, include printed slides inside report cover or notebook.
- *D341005 Other Camping Items Must include what inspired the creation of the item, and its purpose. May include but are not limited to one of the following: nature art, nature haiku poem, spider web sketches or knot display. Exhibits measure no larger than 18" X 24".

- *D341009 Digital Media Use digital media to show video/slideshow/presentation of one of the following, but not limited to; building a non-tent shelter (include why needed), packing your backpack/equipment, and getting it onto you, teaching others about environmental issues or computer video backpacking expedition game. Submit a USB drive or DVD inside a report cover or notebook. If using a slideshow, include printed slides inside report cover or notebook.
- *D341010 Other Expedition Items Must include what inspired the creation of the item, and the purpose of the item. May include, but are not limited to; nature art, nature cinquain poem, backpacking food recipes, hiking/expedition conditioning plan, charcoal etching, dehydrated meal, or snack (at least 1 cup displayed in a re-sealable plastic bag in ingredients, instructions, and nutritional facts included). Exhibits measure no larger than 18" X 24".

SHOOTING SPORTS

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4-H Shooting Sports requires youth to be under the direct leadership of a certified 4-H Shooting Sports Leader in Kimball-Banner County in either shotgun, rifle (bb gun), archery, pistol, black powder/muzzleloader, and/or hunting skills. No firearms can be entered as an exhibit, nor live ammunition; however, information can be shared through pictures. Classes 004-009 can be entered by anyone in the conservation and wildlife area. Remember to look at General Rules for this area.

- *D347001 Shooting Aid or Accessory- Any item which helps the shooter/hunter better perform their sport, examples: rifle sling, kneeling roll, arm guard, shotgun vest, target boxes, shooting stick, etc... Include your design, or plans you adapted, what the item is and used for.
- *D347002 Storage Case an item with the purpose to safely hold a firearm, bow, ammunition, and/or arrows, examples: soft sided shotgun case, quivers, firearm safe, include your design, or plans you adapted. Explain how the storage case is used.
- *D347003 Practice Game or Activity invent or adapt an activity to practice or teach a project skill. Include pictures of youth playing the game, testimonials for 4-H members who played the game, what skill is being worked on, and directions for the game. Explain how you came up with the game or adapted it to fit the needs of your group members.
- *D347004 Science, Engineering, Technology Advancements of Shooting Sports Conservation, or Wildlife Essay or Display -Choose a specific area of shooting sports and share how it has advanced, include a timeline and photos or illustrations. Keep your topic narrow and manageable. Essays are limited to 1000 words and should be on 8 ½ x 11 paper.
- *D347005 Healthy Lifestyles Plan Include a shooter's diet and exercise plan, and how the 4-H member will benefit or improve from following the plan. Ideally, the 4-H member would follow the plan and include some journal entries about adaptions or improvements made while following the plan.
- *D347006 Citizenship/Leadership Project Share a display on a citizenship project or leadership project the 4-H member took on individually or with a group to improve some aspect related to 4-H Shooting Sports, Conservation, or Wildlife. Examples could be range development, conservation planting to attract wildlife, a camp, 4-H recruitment event. Include who benefitted from the project, what the 4-H member's role was, and any results.
- *D347007 Career Development/College Essay, Interview or Display Research opportunities for careers related to this area or opportunities for college majors or college activities to help discover using project skills beyond a person's 4-H career. Essays are limited to 1000 words and should be on 8 ½ x 11 paper. Interviews need to include a picture of the interviewee in their work setting, questions asked, and a transcript of answers.

SHOOTING SPORTS COMPETITION

All 4- H Shooting Sports participants must be a member of a certified 4-H Shooting Sports Club in Kimball-Banner County, must attend Safety Training and pass the Safety Training Test. Then attend at least 3 practices for the discipline for which they will be competing in at the County Fair.

The County Fair BB Gun and Air Rifle Competition will occur at the end of the season in Spring. The Archery competition will occur just prior to or during the Kimball-Banner County Fair. Shooters age groups will be determined by their age as of January 1st of the current year.

BB Gun – Each participant will shoot from the following positions. Prone, Standing, Sitting and Kneeling. The scores from the four positions will be combined for the respective age groups. The 4-P NRA/4-H rules will be followed.

AGRONOMY

Individuals in the Crop Production, Field Crops project may exhibit grain or plants to prepare an educational display representing their project. The purpose of these exhibits is to demonstrate to the public the benefits from the study and application of crop,

weed, range and soil sciences to solving problems in management, conservation, sustainability, and environmental protection. For guidelines on specific projects, refer to appropriate project manuals.

FIELD CROPS

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Classes 1-5 Rules

- A completed Crop Production Worksheet (available at https://cropwatch.unl.edu/Youth/Documents/Crop%20Production%20Project%20Worksheet%20Final.pdf) must accompany grain and plant exhibits or it will automatically be deducted one ribbon placing. The worksheet must include the exhibitors name and address, county, plant hybrid or variety, plant population, whether crop production was irrigated or dryland, and general information including farm cropping history, soil type and weather effects.
- 2. The worksheet also must include an economic analysis of the project, listing individual expenses and income, on a per acre basis. Other topics to discuss are the selection of variety or hybrid, impacts of tillage and conservation practices, inputs (fuel, fertilizer, irrigation, labor, pesticides, etc.), any observations made during the growing season and what you learned from your crops project. The worksheet counts as 50% of the total when judged.
- 3. Worksheet must be the original work of the individual exhibitor, or it will be deducted one ribbon placing.
- 4. Attach the worksheet to the entry in a clear plastic cover such that it can be read without removing it from the cover. In addition to the worksheet, grain and plant exhibits will be judged on condition, appearance (i.e. disease and insect damage, grain fill), uniformity (size, shape, color, maturity), and quality of exhibit. Grain exhibits must be one gallon per sample. Grain exhibits harvested in the fall (e.g., corn or soybeans) may be from the previous year's project. Display containers will be furnished.
- 5. Plant exhibits, with the exception of ears of corn, must be the result of the current year's project. Corn 10 ears or 3 stalks (cut at ground level with no roots or soil and bound together)
- 6. Grain Sorghum 4 stalks (cut at ground level and bound together)
- 7. Soybeans 6 stalks (cut at ground level and bound together)
- 8. Small grains (oats, barley, wheat, triticale) sheaf of heads 2 inches in diameter at top tie with stems about 24" long.
- 9. Other crops (alfalfa, millet, etc.) sheaf of stems 3 inches in diameter at top tied with stems cut at ground level or half size small square bale.
- ***G750001 Corn** (includes yellow, white, pop, waxy, or any other type)

*G750002 Soybeans

*G750004 Wheat

- *G750007 Crop Technology Display Display information about aspects of technology used in crop production, such as genetic engineering, crop breeding, GPS, yield mapping, computers, etc.
- *G750008 Crop End Use Display Display information about the final product or end uses for a crop such as food, feed, fuel or other products. (i.e. corn can be processed into livestock feed, ethanol, plastics, etc. or soybeans can be

processed into bio-diesel, pet bedding, crayons, oil, etc.)

- *G750009 Water or Soil Display Display information about water or soils, such as how soils are being used for crop production, range, conservation, wildlife, or wetland use, or ways to protect or conserve water and soil resources.
- *G750010 Career Interview Display The purpose of this class is to allow youth to investigate a career in agronomy. Youth should interview one person that works with crops about such topics as what parts of their job do they enjoy or dislike, why did they choose that career, what was their education, etc. Include a picture of the person interviewed.

Special Agronomy Project Rules

- 1. Youth experience a crop that is grown, was grown or has the potential to be grown in Nebraska by growing it, researching traits of that crop and determine viability of that crop in the part of the state they live.
- 2. Each year seeds will be mailed to extension offices or ag ed classrooms across the state, as ordered by that location. Offices will distribute to youth on a first, come first serve basis. A different seed will be selected every year.
- 3. Youth will grow seeds in their garden or pots. Written resources materials will be available for youth, in addition to virtual, live or recorded videos/field trips.
- 4. Youth will be eligible to enter an exhibit at both the county and/or state fair in the agronomy project area

The Crop of the year for 2023 is <u>Tepary Beans.</u>

- *G750011 Special Agronomy Project- Educational Exhibit- Educational exhibit based on what was learned from the project. Present information on a poster 14" X 22" either vertical or horizontal arrangement or in a clear plastic report cover. The 4-H member's name, age, and county must be on the back of the poster or report cover. Each display must have a one-page essay (minimum) explaining why the exhibitor chose the area of display and what they learned from their project. Include any references used.
- *G750012 Special Agronomy Project- Video Presentation- 4-H exhibitor designs a multimedia presentation related to the crop. This could include narration of the growing process, presenting facts about the crop or any other innovative multimedia practices. The presentation should be at least 2 minutes in length and no more than 5 minutes in length, appropriate graphics, sound and either a video clip, animation, or voice over and/or original video clip. Any of the following file formats will be accepted: mp4, .mov, .ppt, or .avi.
- ***G750013** Special Agronomy Project- Freshly Harvested Crop- (Freshly Harvested Crop) Plant exhibits must be the result of the current year's project.
 - Depending on the type of crop selected for the current year:
 - Corn 10 ears or 3 stalks (cut at ground level with no roots or soil and bound together)
 - Grain Sorghum 4 stalks (cut at ground level and bound together)
 - Soybeans 6 stalks (cut at ground level and bound together)
 - Small grains (oats, barley, wheat, triticale) sheaf of heads 2 inches in diameter at top tie with stems about 24" long.
 - Other crops (alfalfa, millet, etc.) sheaf of stems 3 inches in diameter at top tied with stems cut at ground level.
 - Supporting documentation (½ to 1-page in length) should include the following:
 - Economic Analysis and/or research that supports feasibility of this crop in Nebraska or how the crop has evolved over time.
 - Other topics to discuss are past/current commercial production of this crop. This includes: the selection
 of variety or hybrid, impacts of tillage and conservation practices, inputs (fuel, fertilizer, irrigation,
 labor, pesticides, etc.), any observations made during the growing season about this crop and what you
 learned from your crops project. This ½ to 1-page summary counts as 50% of the total when judged.
 - In addition to the summary, grain and plant exhibits will be judged on condition, appearance (i.e. disease and insect damage, grain fill), uniformity (size, shape, color, maturity), and quality of exhibit.

WEED SCIENCE

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Rules

Any individual in the Conservation, Environment 1, 2 or 3, Range, Reading the Range 1 or Using Nebraska Range 2, or Crop Production, Field Crops projects may exhibit a weed book or weed display. At least 15 of the specimens must represent this year's

work. For assistance identifying plants, participants can use the Nebraska Department of Agriculture's Weeds of Nebraska and the Great Plains (1994) or Weeds of the Great Plains (2003).

Book Guidelines: Classes 1-2

- 1. Plants must be mounted on sheets that are no larger than 14" wide by 14" high. Proper plant mount should include root as well as stem and leaf tissue. Plants should be glued rather than taped and the mounts should be protected with a clear clover.
- 2. Exhibits will be judged based on completeness of plant mount, accuracy of identification, label, neatness, and conformity to exhibit requirements.
- 3. Each completed mount must have the following information (see example below) in the lower right corner of the mounting sheet: Scientific name (in italic or underlined), with authority, Common name, County of collection, Collection date, Collector's name, Personal collection number, indicating the order that plants were collected in your personal collection, Other information depending on class selected, i.e., noxious, life form. This information should be typed or printed neatly.
- *G751001 Weed Identification Book A collection of a minimum of 15 plant mounts including at least two of the following prohibited noxious weeds (Canada thistle, musk thistle, plumeless thistle, salt cedar, leafy spurge, purple loosestrife, diffuse knapweed, spotted knapweed, Japanese knotweed, Bohemian knotweed giant knotweed, sericea lespedeza or phragmites), and at least five weeds that are a problem primarily in lawns.

***G751002** Life Span Book- A collection of 7 perennials, 1 biennial and 7 annual weeds.

Display Guidelines: Class 3

- 1. The purpose of the display is to tell an educational story to those that view the display. The display is a visual representation (pictures, charts, graphs) no larger than 28" by 28" on plywood or poster board. The display should be neatly titled.
- 2. Make sure to label display with exhibitor's name, address, and county on back side. Explain pictures and graphs clearly and concisely.
- 3. Each display must have a one-page essay explaining why the exhibitor chose the area of display and what they learned from their project. Include any references used.
- 4. The essay should be in a clear plastic cover with the exhibitor's name outside.
- *G751003 Weed Display- The purpose of this class is to allow original and creative exhibits that contain educational information about weeds, such as interesting information about a weed species, the effects of weed control, herbicide-resistant weeds, what makes a weed a weed or uses for weeds.

RANGE

The purpose of this category is to help 4-H'ers identify and collect range plants. In addition, participants will learn the basics of range management, and Nebraska's range. Through the creation of range boards 4-H'ers will become more proficient in knowledge of Nebraska's range. For more resources and materials in this category refer to the resource section at the bottom of the page.

Rules

- 1. Each exhibit must be properly identified with Unit and Class
- 2. All plant displays and display covers must be the result of the current year's work.
- 3. Plant identification and lists of appropriate plants in each category (grasses, forbs, shrubs, and grass-like plants) can be found in the Range Judging Handbook and Contest Guide (EC150, Revised July 2016), Common Grasses of Nebraska (EC170), and Common Forbs and Shrubs of Nebraska (EC118).
- 4. The purpose of these exhibits is to demonstrate to the public the benefits from the study and application of crop, weed, range and soil sciences to solving problems in management, conservation, sustainability, and environmental protection.
- 5. For guidelines on specific projects, refer to appropriate project manuals. Premier 4-H Science Award is available in this area. Please see General Rules for more details.

RANGE MANAGEMENT

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Book Guidelines: Classes 1-6

- 1. For books, plants must be mounted on sheets that are no larger than 14" wide by 14" high.
- 2. Plants should be glued rather than taped and the mounts should be protected with a clear cover.
- 3. Proper plant mount should include root, as well as stem and leaf tissue.
- 4. Exhibits will be judged based on completeness of plant mount, accuracy of identification, labeling, neatness, and conformation to project requirements.
- 5. Each completed mount must have the following information (see example below) in the lower right corner of the mounting sheet. This information should be typed or printed neatly:
 - Scientific name (in italic or underlined), with authority
 - Common name
 - County of collection
 - Collection date
 - Collector's name
 - Personal collection number, indicating order that plants were collected in your personal collection
 - Other information, depending on class selected, i.e., value and importance, life span, growth season, origin, major types of range plants.
- *D330001 Value & Importance for Livestock Forage & Wildlife Habitat & Food Book- A collection of 12 different plant mounts, with 4 classified as high value, 4 as medium value, & 4 as low value for livestock forage, wildlife habitat, or wildlife food. Value and importance classifications can be found in the Range Judging Handbook and Contest Guide (EC 150, Revised July 2009) on pages 3 through 6. Plants can consist of any combination of grasses, grass-like plants, forbs, or shrubs. Assemble plant mounts in order of high, medium, and low value and importance. Label each plant mount with its value and importance classifications for each of the three areas; Livestock Forage, Wildlife Habitat, Wildlife Food.
- *D330002 Life Span Book A collection of 6 perennial plant mounts and 6 annual plant mounts selected from grasses or forbs.
- ***D330003** Growth Season Book- A collection of 6 cool-season grass mounts and 6 warm-season grass mounts.
- *D330004 Origin Book A collection of plant mounts of 6 native range grasses and 6 introduced grasses. Introduced grasses are not from North America and often used to seed pastures.
- *D330005 Major Types of Range Plants Book A collection of plant mounts of 3 grasses, 3 forbs, 3 grass-like, and 3 shrubs.
- *D330006 Range Plant Collection Book -A collection of 12 range plant mounts with something in common (i.e. poisonous to cattle, or historically used as food by Native Americans, or dye plants, or favorite antelope forage, etc.). Include a short paragraph in the front of the book which describes what the plants have in common and why you have chosen to collect them.

Display Guidelines: Class 7

- 1. The purpose of the display is to tell an educational story to those that view the display.
- 2. The display is a visual representation (pictures, charts, graphs) no larger than 28" by 28" on plywood or poster board.
- 3. The display should be neatly titled.
- 4. Make sure to label display with exhibitor's name, address, and county on back side.
- *D330007 Parts of a Range Plant Poster- Mount a range plant on a poster board. Label all the plant parts. Include the plant label in the lower right corner, including the scientific and common name of the plant. Put your name and 4-H county on the back of the poster.

Board Guidelines: Classes 8-9

- 1. Boards should be should no larger than 30" wide by 36" tall. Boards should be adequately labeled.
- *D330008 Special Study Board A display of the results of a clipping study, a degree of use study, range site study, etc. A short essay must accompany the display to explain the reason for the study, what was learned, and study results. This should be placed in a sheet cover attached to the board.
- *D330009 Junior Rancher Board This exhibit should include a ranch map with a record book or an appropriate educational display on some phase of rangeland or livestock management. A short essay must accompany the display to explain the purpose of the rancher board, what was learned, etc.

FOOD AND NUTRITION

The purpose of Food & Nutrition exhibits is to encourage the knowledge about healthy eating and safe cooking practices. This category has multiple projects that allow 4-H'ers to progress over numerous years. In addition, 4-H'ers will learn different types of cooking methods to improve their knowledge of cuisine. For more resources and materials in this category refer to the resource section at the bottom of the page.

Rules

- 1. **Supporting Information**: Each exhibit must include the recipe. Recipe may be handwritten, photocopied, or typed. Place food on the appropriately sized plate or container and put in self-sealing bag. Attach entry tag and recipe at the corner of the bag. For non-food entries, please attach the entry tag to the upper right-hand corner of the entry. Additional information including recipes and supplemental information should be identified with 4-H'ers name and county.
- 2. Criteria for Judging: Exhibits will be judged according to score sheets available at your local Extension office or at http://4h.unl.edu/fairbook. Make sure to follow all entry instructions required for your exhibit. Incomplete exhibits will be lowered a ribbon placing. Commercially prepared mixes are ONLY allowed in Cooking 201 Creative Mix Class. Prepared baking mixes, biscuit mixes, commercially prepared seasoning mixes for food preservation, and other pre-made mixes entered in other categories will be lowered a ribbon placing.
- 3. **Food Projects**: Exhibits should be entered using a disposable pan or plate and covered by a plastic self-sealing bag. The State Fair is not responsible for non-disposable containers, lost bread boards, China, or glassware.
- 4. **Ingredients**: Any ingredient that the 4-H'er uses must be able to be purchased by the 4-H'er. Ingredients such as beer, whiskey, rum, etc. may NOT be used in any recipe file or food exhibit. Exhibits that include alcohol will be disqualified.
- 5. **Food Safety**: Exhibits are on display for several days. Please think FOOD SAFETY! Items that require refrigeration will not be accepted, judged, or displayed as exhibits must be safe to eat when entered, whether they are tasted or not. Glazes, frostings, and other sugar-based toppings are considered safe due to their high sugar content. Egg glazes on yeast breads and pie crusts BEFORE baking are acceptable. Eggs incorporated into baked goods and crusts are considered safe. The following food ingredients are considered unsafe for fair exhibits and will be disqualified:
 - a. Egg or cream fillings and cream cheese frostings
 - b. Any meat item including meat jerky, imitation meat bits (bacon bits, pepperoni, etc.)
 - c. Melted cheese on top of food exhibit (cheese mixed into baked goods is considered safe and will be accepted)
 - d. Uncooked fruit toppings (i.e., fresh fruit tart).

GENERAL FOODS & NUTRITION

- *E350001 Food Science Explorations- Open to any 4-H'er enrolled in a Foods & Nutrition or Food Preservation project. Show the connection between food and science as it relates to food preparation, food safety, food preservation, or food production. Exhibit may be a poster or foam core board (not to exceed 22" x 30"), computer-based presentation printed off with notes pages, if needed, and displayed in a binder, an exhibit display, a written report in a portfolio or notebook. Consider neatness and creativity.
- *E350002 Foods and Nutrition Poster, Scrapbook or Photo Display- Open to any 4-H'er enrolled in a Foods & Nutrition or Food Preservation project. The project should involve a nutrition or food preparation technique or explore a career related to the food industry (caterer, restaurant owner, food scientist, registered dietitian, etc.). This might contain pictures, captions and/or a report to highlight the concept. Exhibit may be a poster or a foam core board (not to exceed 22" by 30"); a computer-based presentation printed off with notes pages (if needed) and displayed in a binder; an exhibit display; or a written report in a portfolio or notebook. Consider neatness and creativity.
- *E350003 Physical Activity & Health Poster, Scrapbook or Photo Display- Open to any 4-H'er enrolled in a Foods & Nutrition or Food Preservation project. The project should involve a physical activity or explore a career-related to physical activity or health (personal trainer, sports coach, physical therapist, etc.). This might contain pictures, captions and/or a report to highlight the concept. Exhibit may be a poster or a foam core board (not to exceed 22" by 30"), a

computer-based presentation printed off with notes pages, if needed, and displayed in a binder, an exhibit display, or a written report in a portfolio or notebook. Consider neatness and creativity.

*E350004 Cooking Basics Recipe File- A collection of 10 recipes from any source. Each recipe must accompany a complete menu in which the recipe is used. An additional 10 recipes may be added each year the 4-H'er is in the project, with year clearly marked on recipes. Display in a recipe file or binder. Be sure to include the number of servings or yield of each recipe. This may be a continued recipe file project from the previously used 4-H curriculum before 2018. Exhibits that include recipes with alcohol (wine, beer, rum, etc.) will be disqualified.

MAKING FOOD FOR ME – BEGINNER

E403001 Rainbow of Fruits and Veggies Poster – You may draw, write, or use pictures showing different fruits and vegetables of different colors corresponding with the Making Food for Me Youth Manual. This should be on 14" x 22" poster board.

E403002 What is the Grain's Group – Show what foods are included in the grains group, where grains come from and make a grain collage using magazines and clip art. This should be on 14" x 22" poster board.

- E403003 Save a Place for Me Placemat In the middle of the Youth Manual, there is a Save a Place for Me Placemat that is divided up into the MyPlate sections and shows youth how to set the table. Select pictures from magazines or clipart and make a balanced meal and write a short paragraph discussing the importance of eating foods from all food groups and more foods from the fruit and vegetable group. This should be on 14" x 22" poster board.
- **E403004** Healthy Snack Four cookies, bars, muffins, etc., on a paper plate or at least 1 cup of snack mix. (Examples might include: snack mix made from a cereal base, no-bake or simple cookie or granola bar).
- **E403005 Protein Collage –** Neatly cut and pasted pictures of protein sources and foods displayed on collage.

SIX EASY BITES – BEGINNER

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E401001	Cookies (any recipe) – Four on a paper plate.
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- **E401002** Muffins (any recipe) Four on a paper plate.
- **E401003** Simple Snack (any recipe) granola, trail mix, cereal-based snack recipe in self- sealing zip lock bag.
- **E401004** Brownie Cents 4 unfrosted brownies (2 made from scratch and 2 made from a mix). Exhibit with answers to questions on page 23 in manual.

COOKING 201

- *E410001 Loaf Quick Bread any recipe, at least ¾ of a standard loaf displayed on a paper plate. Quick bread is any bread that does not require kneading or rising time and does NOT include yeast. A standard quick bread loaf measures approximately 8 ½" x 4 ½" or 9" x 5". If mini-loaf pans are used for exhibit, two loaves must be presented for judging.
- *E410002 Creative Mixes- any recipe, at least ¾ of baked product or 4 muffins or cookies on a paper plate. May be baked in a disposable pan. Baked item made from a mix (commercial or homemade mixes acceptable). Food product must have been modified to make a new or different baked item. Examples include poppy seed quick bread from a cake mix, cake mix cookies, sweet rolls made from readymade bread dough, monkey bread from biscuit dough, streusel coffee cake from a cake mix, etc. Write what you learned about making this product using a mix instead of a homemade recipe or recipe "from scratch". Does it make it better or easier to use a convenience product or mix? Why or why not?
- *E410003 Biscuits or Scones four biscuits or scones on a small paper plate. This may be any type of biscuit or scone: rolled or dropped. Any recipe may be used, but it must be a non-yeast product baked from scratch.
- *E410004 Healthy Baked Product any recipe, at least ¾ of baked product or 4 muffins/cookies on a paper plate. May be baked in a disposable pan.) Recipe must contain a fruit or vegetable as part of the ingredients (Ex. Banana bars, cantaloupe quick bread, zucchini muffins, etc.).
- *E410005 Coffee Cake any recipe or shape, non-yeast product at least ¾ of baked product. May be baked in a disposable pan.) Include menu for a complete meal where this recipe is served, following meal planning guidelines suggested

in Cooking 201.

- *E410006 Baking with Whole Grains any recipe, at least ¾ of baked product or 4 muffins/cookies on a paper plate. May be baked in a disposable pan. Recipe must contain whole grains as part of the ingredients. (Ex. Whole wheat applesauce bread, peanut butter oatmeal cookies, etc.)
- *E410007 Non-Traditional Baked Product exhibit must include a food product prepared using a non-traditional method (i.e. bread machine, cake baked in an air fryer, baked item made in microwave, etc.) Entry must be at least ¾ baked product, or 4 muffins or cookies on a paper plate. Entry must include supporting information that discusses alternative preparation method and how it compares with traditional method.

COOKING 301

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Rules

- 1. Any bread item prepared or baked using a bread machine should be entered under the Cooking 201, Non-Traditional Baked Product.
- 2. All exhibits made in the Cooking 301 or Cooking 401 projects must have been prepared without the assistance of a bread machine for mixing, raising, or baking of the food item.

*E411001 White Bread- any yeast recipe, at least 3/4 of a standard loaf displayed on a paper plate.

- *E411002 Whole Wheat or Mixed Grain Bread- any yeast recipe, at least 3/4 of a standard loaf displayed on a paper plate.
- *E411003 Specialty Rolls- any yeast recipe, 4 rolls on a paper plate. May be sweet rolls, English muffins, kolaches, bagels, or any other similar recipe that makes individual portions.
- *E411004 Dinner Rolls- any yeast recipe, 4 rolls on a paper plate. May be cloverleaf, crescent, knot, bun, bread sticks, or any other type of dinner roll.
- *E411005 Specialty Bread- any yeast recipe, includes tea rings, braids, or any other full-sized specialty bread products. Must exhibit at least ¾ of a full-sized baked product. May be baked in a disposable pan.
- *E411006 Shortened Cake- Must exhibit at least ¾ of the cake (recipe must not be from a cake mix). Shortened cakes use fat for flavor and texture and recipes usually begin by beating fat with sugar by creaming and include leavening agents in the recipe. Cake may be frosted with a non-perishable frosting (no cream cheese or egg white based frostings allowed).

COOKING 401

- 1. Any bread item prepared or baked using a bread machine should be entered under the Cooking 201.
- 2. All exhibits made in the Cooking 301 or Cooking 401 projects must have been prepared without the assistance of a bread machine for mixing, raising, or baking of the food item.
- *E412001 Double Crust Fruit Pie made with homemade fruit filling. No egg pastries or cream fillings. No canned fillings or premade pie crusts. May be a double crust, crumb, cut-out, or lattice topping. Using an 8- or 9-inch disposable pie pan is recommended.
- *E412002 Family Food Traditions any recipe, at least 3/4 of baked product or 4 muffins or cookies on a paper plate. May be baked in a disposable pan. Any baked item associated with family tradition and heritage. Entry must include (A) recipe, (B) tradition or heritage associated with preparing, serving the food, (C) where or who the traditional recipe came from.
- *E412003 Ethnic Food Exhibit any recipe, at least 3/4 of baked product or 4 muffins or cookies on a paper plate. May be baked in a disposable pan. The name of the country, culture or region should be included as part of the supporting information with the recipe, as well as background information about the country or culture the food item is representing.
- *E412004 Candy any recipe, 4 pieces of candy on a paper plate or ½ cup. No items containing cream cheese will be accepted (Example: cream cheese mints). Candy may be cooked or no cook; dipped, molded, made in the microwave or other methods of candy preparation. Recipe must be included.

- *E412005 Foam Cake original recipe (no mixes) of at least ¾ of the cake. Foam cakes are cakes that have a high ratio of eggs to flour and fall into three categories: angel food cakes or meringues; sponge or jelly roll cakes; and chiffon cakes. Cake may be frosted with a non-perishable frosting (no cream cheese or egg white based frostings allowed).
- *E412006 Specialty Pastry any recipe, at least 3/4 of baked product or 4 muffins or cookies on a paper plate. May be baked in a disposable pan. Baked items such as pie tarts, puff pastry, phyllo doughs, biscotti, choux, croissants, Danish, strudels. Phyllo dough may be pre-made or from scratch. Pastries made with cream or egg-based fillings will be disqualified.

FOOD PRESERVATION

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Rules

- Processing Methods: Current USDA processing methods and altitude adjustments must be followed for all food
 preservation. Jam, preserves and marmalades, fruit, tomatoes and pickled products must be processed in a boiling water
 bath. Tomatoes may be processed in a pressure canner. All non-acid vegetables and meats must be processed in a pressure
 canner. Improperly canned or potentially hazardous food items will be disqualified. Spoiled or unsealed container
 disqualifies entry.
- 2. Jars and Lids: Do not need to be the same brand. Half pint jars may be used for jellies and preserves. The jars are not to be decorated by the exhibitor in any way. Canning jars must be used others will be disqualified. No one-fourth pint jars allowed. Leave jar rings on for fair display, it helps protect the seal. Two-piece lids consisting of a flat metal dish and ring should be used. No zinc lids or one-piece lids.
- 3. Current Project: All canning must be the result of this year's 4-H project.
- 4. Criteria for Judging: Exhibits will be judged according to score sheets available at your local Extension office or the State Fairbook at https://4hfairbook.unl.edu/fairbookview.php/rules. Incomplete exhibits will be lowered a ribbon class. Canned food items not processed according to altitude in the county will be lowered one class ribbon. Check with your local extension office or this site https://food.unl.edu/canning#elevationfor your county's altitude and how that affects food processing times and pounds of pressure.
- 5. Labeling: Jars should be labeled with the name of the food item, name of the 4-H'er, county, and date of processing on the bottom of each jar. Exhibits containing multiple jars such as a "3 jar exhibit" should be placed in a container to keep jars together. Each bag containing dried foods should also be labeled with the name of the food item, the name of the 4-H'er, county and drying date. Multiple dried food exhibits should be secured by a rubber band or "twisty" to keep exhibit containing the 3 self-sealing bags together.
- 6. **Recipe/Supporting Information**: Recipe must be included, and may be handwritten, photocopied, or typed. Commercially prepared seasoning mixes are not allowed. Current USDA guidelines for food preservation methods MUST be followed. Suggested sources of recipes include:
 - a. 4-H Food Preservation Manuals (Freezing, Drying, Boiling Water Bath Canning, Pressure Canning)
 - b. USDA Guide to Home Canning <u>https://nchfp.uga.edu/publications/publications_usda.html</u>
 - c. Nebraska Extension's Food Website <u>http://food.unk.edu/food-preservation</u> or Extension publications from other states
 - d. Ball Blue Book (published after 2009)
- 7. All exhibits must include the 4-H Food Preservation Card attached to the project as the required supporting information or include following information with exhibit:
 - 1. Name of product
 - 2. Date preserved
 - 3. Method of preservation (pressure canner, water bath canner or dried)
 - 4. Type of pack (raw pack or hot pack)
 - 5. Altitude (and altitude adjustment, if needed)
 - 6. Processing time
 - 7. Number of pounds of pressure (if pressure canner used)
 - 8. Drying method and drying time (for dried food exhibits).
 - 9. Recipe and source of recipe (if a publication, include name and date).

<u>Unit 1 Freezing</u>

*E406001 Baked Item Made with Frozen Produce- any recipe, at least 3/4 of baked product or 4 muffins or cookies on a paper plate. May be baked in a disposable pan. Recipe MUST include a food item preserved by the freezing method done by the 4-H'er. Ex. Peach pie, blueberry muffins, zucchini bread, etc. Supporting information must include both the recipe for the produce that was frozen as part of this project AND the baked food item.

Unit 2 Drying *E407001 Dried Fruits- exhibit 3 different examples of 3 different dried fruits. Place each dried fruit food (6-10 pieces of fruit, minimum 1/4 cup) in separate self-sealing bags. Use a rubber band or "twisty" to keep exhibit together. *E407002 Fruit Leather- exhibit 3 different examples of 3 different fruit leathers. Place a 3-4" sample of each fruit together in separate self-sealing bags. Use a rubber band or "twisty" to keep exhibit together. *E407003 Vegetable Leather- 3 different examples of 3 different vegetable or vegetable/fruit leather combo. Place a 3-4" sample of each leather together in separate self-sealing bags. Use a rubber band or "twisty" to keep exhibit together. *E407004 Dried Vegetables- exhibit 3 different samples of 3 different dried vegetables. Place each food (1/4 cup of each vegetable) in a separate self-sealing bag. Use a rubber band or "twisty" to keep exhibit together. *E407005 Dried Herbs- exhibit 3 different samples of 3 different dried herbs. Place each food (1/4 cup of each herb) in a separate self-sealing bag. Use a rubber band or "twisty" to keep exhibit together. *E407006 Baked Item Made With Dried Produce/Herbs- any recipe, at least 3/4 of baked product or 4 muffins or cookies on a paper plate. May be baked in a disposable pan. Recipe MUST include a dried produce/herb item made by the 4-H'er. Ex. Granola bar made with dried fruits, dried cranberry cookies, Italian herb bread, lemon thyme cookies.

Unit 3 Boiling Water Canning

*E408001 **1 Jar Fruit Exhibit-** exhibit one jar of a canned fruit. Entry must be processed in the boiling water bath according to current USDA recommendations.

Supporting information must include both the recipe for the dried produce/herb AND the baked food item.

- *E408002 3 Jar Fruit Exhibit- exhibit 3 jars of different canned fruits. May be three different techniques for same type of product, ex. Applesauce, canned apples, apple pie filling, etc. Entry must be processed in the boiling water bath according to current USDA recommendations.
- *E408003 1 Jar Tomato Exhibit- exhibit one jar of a canned tomato product. Entry must be processed in a boiling water bath according to current USDA recommendations.
- *E408004 3 Jar Tomato Exhibit- exhibit 3 jars of different canned tomato products (salsa, sauces without meats, juice, stewed, etc.). Entry must be processed in a boiling water bath according to current USDA recommendations.
- *E408005 1 Jar Pickled Exhibit- one jar of a pickled and/or fermented product. Entry must be processed in the boiling water bath according to current USDA recommendations.
- *E408006 3 Jar Pickled Exhibit- exhibit 3 jars of different kinds of canned pickled and/or fermented products. Entry must be processed in the boiling water bath according to current USDA recommendations.
- *E408007 1 Jar Jelled Exhibit- exhibit one jar of a jam, jelly, or marmalade. Entry must be processed in the boiling water bath according to current USDA recommendations.
- *E408008 3 Jar Jelled Exhibit- exhibit 3 different kinds of jelled products. Entry may be made up of either pints or half pints (but all jars must be the same size). Entry must be processed in the boiling water bath according to current USDA recommendations.

Unit 4 Pressure Canning

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- ***E414001** Jar Vegetable or Meat Exhibit- exhibit one jar of a canned vegetable or meat. Include only vegetables or meats canned in a pressure canner according to current USDA recommendations.
- *E414002 3 Jar Vegetable Exhibit- exhibit 3 jars of different kinds of canned vegetables. Include only vegetables canned in a pressure canner according to current USDA recommendations.
- *E414003 3 Jar Meat Exhibit- exhibit 3 jars of different kinds of canned meats. Include only meats canned in a pressure canner according to current USDA recommendations.
- *E414004 Quick Dinner- exhibit a minimum of 3 jars to a maximum of 5 jars (all the same size) plus menu. Meal should include 3 canned foods that can be prepared within an hour. List complete menu on a 3" X 5" file card and attach to one of the jars. Entry must be processed according to current USDA recommendations
- *E414005 Jar Tomato Exhibit- exhibit one jar of a canned tomato product. Entry must be processed in a pressure canner according to current USDA recommendations.
- *E414006 3 Jar Tomato Exhibit- exhibit 3 jars of different canned tomato products (salsa, sauces without meats, juice, stewed, etc.). Entry must be processed in a pressure canner according to current USDA recommendations.

CAKE DECORATING

Rules

- 1. The cakes should be displayed on a disposable cake board.
- 2. You may use a baked cake, Styrofoam, or pan base.
- **E451001** One decorated single layer cake (8 or 9 inches square or round pan) using decorator tubes. Cake must be decorated with edible materials.
- **E451002** Cake made with pre-formed pan (Mickey Mouse, Holly Hobbies, etc.) Cake must be decorated with edible materials.
- E451003 Cake made using plastic or other decorations.
- **E451004** A one or two layer cake any shape, showing skills learned this year. Cake must be decorated with edible materials. The cake should be made from an original design.
- **E451005 Two- or three-tiered, stacked cake or combination tiered or stacked.** Each tier or stack must be 2 layers. Plastic separators may be used.
- E451006 Two-or-three-tiered, stacked cake or combination tiered or stacked using fondant frosting. Each tier or stack must be 2 layers.
- E451007 Multi Cupcake Creation
- E451008 Decorated cookies (4) showing skills learned this year.
- E451009 Decorated cupcakes (4)
- **E4510010** Other i.e. display board showing minimum of 3 borders, 3 flowers, and 2 leaves or scrapbook showing your collection of cake pictures and pattern ideas.

SAFETY

In this category 4-H'ers have the opportunity to create exhibits about all-terrain vehicles, fire, and tractor safety. In addition, participants can also create informational exhibits about basic safety strategies. Through involvement in this category, 4-H'ers will be better educated about personal safety and have the knowledge base to educate others about safety. *E44001 First Aid Kit - A first aid kit is a good way to organize supplies in an emergency. The kit should be assembled in a container appropriate for the kit's intended use. A description of where the kit will be stored and examples of specific emergencies for that situation should be included in the exhibit. The kit should include a written inventory and purpose statement for included items. Items should cover the following areas: airway and breathing, bleeding control, burn treatment, infectious disease protection, fracture care and miscellaneous supplies. Use the Citizen Safety manual, 4-H 425, pages 6 & 7.

Kits containing any of the following will be automatically disqualified.

1. Prescription medications. (If the kit's purpose is to provide medication for someone with special needs, explain in the written description and inventory, but remove the medication.)

2. Materials with expiration dates on or before the judging date (This includes sterile items, non-prescription medications, ointments, salves, etc. Articles dated month and year only are considered expired on the last day of that month.)

- 3. Any controlled substance.
- *E440002 Disaster kits must contain the materials to prepare a person, family, or emergency condition caused by a natural or man-made incident. Selection of materials is left to the exhibitor. Family or group kits must have enough material or items for each person. A description of the kit's purpose, the number of people supported, and a list of contents is required. Youth are encouraged to test their kit by challenging their family to try to survive using only the included materials for the designated time. If tested, share that experience in kit documentation. Please include an

explanation of drinking water needs for your disaster kit. Do not bring actual water to the fair in the kit.

- *E440003 Safety Scrapbook must contain 15 news articles from print and/or internet sources about various incident types. Mount each clipping on a separate page accompanied by a description of events leading to the incident and any measures that might have prevented it. The Scrapbook should be bound in a standard size hardcover binder or notebook for 8 ½" x 11" size papers. Correct sentence structure, readability and thorough explanations are an important part of judging.
- *E440004 Safety Experience The exhibit should share a learning experience the youth had related to safety. Examples could be participating in a first aid or first responder training, a farm safety day camp, babysitting workshop, or similar event; scientific experiment related to safety; or the youth's response to an emergency situation. The exhibit should include a detailed description of the experience, the youth's role, some evidence of the youth's leadership in the situation and a summary of the learning that took place. Exhibits may be presented in a poster with supplemental documentation, a notebook including up to ten pages of narrative and pictures, or a multimedia presentation on a CD lasting up to five minutes.
- *E440005 Careers in Safety The exhibit should identify a specific career area in the safety field and include education and certification requirements for available positions, salary information, demand for the field and a summary of the youth's interest in the field. Examples of careers include firefighters, paramedics, emergency management personnel, some military assignments, law enforcement officers, emergency room medical personnel and more. It is recommended youth interview a professional in the field in their research. Additional research sources might include books, articles, career web sites, job-related government websites or interviews with career placement or guidance counselors. Exhibits may be presented in a poster with supplemental documentation, a notebook including up to ten pages of narrative and pictures, or a multimedia presentation on a CD lasting up to five minutes.

- *E450001 Fire Safety Poster This is a home floor plan drawn to scale showing primary and secondary escape routes and where fire extinguishers and smoke detectors are located. Draw every room, including all doors and windows. Use black or blue arrows showing primary escape routes from each room. Use red arrows showing secondary routes to use if the primary routes are blocked. Primary and secondary escape routes must lead outside to an assembly location. Documentation should include evidence the escape plan has been practiced at least four times. Posters must be constructed of commercial poster board at least 11" x 14" but not larger than 22" x 28".
- *E450002 Fire Safety Scrapbook The scrapbook must contain 10 news articles from print and/or internet sources about fires to residential or commercial properties or landscapes. Mount each clipping on a separate page accompanied by a description of events leading to the incident and any measures that might have prevented it. The Scrapbook should be bound in a standard size hardcover binder or notebook for 8 ½" x 11" size paper. Correct sentence structure, readability and thorough explanations are an important part of judging.
- *E450003 Fire Prevention Poster Posters should promote a fire prevention message and be appropriate to display during National Fire Prevention Week or to promote fire safety at specific times of the year (Halloween, 4th of July, etc.). Originality, clarity, and artistic impression will all be judged. Do not include live fireworks, matches or other flammable/explosive/hazardous materials. Any entry containing this material will be disqualified. Posters must be constructed of commercial poster board at least 11" x 14" but not larger than 22" x 28".

ENTREPRENEURSHIP

Entrepreneurship exhibits help participants develop an entrepreneurial mindset. An entrepreneurial mindset is needed to tackle social issues as well as explore new business opportunities.

Rules

Exhibit guidelines: The 4-H member's name, age, town, and county must be listed on the back of the exhibit. Entry cards should be stapled or taped (not paper-clipped) to the upper right-hand corner of posters. If exhibit is a poster, it must be 14" x 22" and may be arranged either horizontally or vertically. Poster may not use copyrighted materials, such as cartoon characters or commercial product names. Exhibits which do not conform to size or content guidelines will be lowered one ribbon placing. Posters may include photographs, charts, or examples as well as a written explanation.

- *G773291 Educational Vegetable or Herb Garden Poster Prepare a poster 14" x 22" x 2" (3-dimensional if needed) either vertical or horizontal arrangement illustrating a skill or project the 4-H'er has done or learned about in a 4-H vegetable gardening project. One might show a special technique used or equipment incorporated in the garden (e.g., drip irrigation system, composting, or special techniques learned). Refer to 4-H horticulture project manuals but use your own creativity. Entry card must be stapled to the upper right-hand corner. The 4-H member's name, age, county, and years in the project(s) must be on the back of the poster.
- *G773292 Vegetable and/or Herb Gardening History Interview Neatly handwritten or typed account of a gardening history interview of someone whose vegetable or herb garden has inspired you. Maximum of 4 pages of text and 2 pages of pictures (include 1 picture of the person you interviewed) of their garden if the individual is still gardening. Protect with a clear report cover. The 4-H member's name, age, county, and years in the project(s) must be on the back of the report cover.
- *G773293 Vegetable Seed Display Each display must include seeds representing the following families: Cucurbit, Brassica (cabbage), Solanaceous (nightshade), and Legume (pea) families, plus representatives from 5 other families. Group the seeds by family and type. Glue seeds or otherwise fasten clear containers of seeds to a board or poster mat board no larger than 22" x 24". Label each group and each individual vegetable type with the common and scientific names. Use only one variety or cultivar of each vegetable, except for beans where several examples of beans may be shown. Attach a card to the back of the display explaining why and how it is important to know which vegetables are related and cite references on where the scientific name information was found. The 4-H member's name, age, county, and years in the project(s) must be on the back of the display. Information on vegetable family members can be obtained from your Extension Office.
- *G773294 World of Vegetables Notebook Choose a favorite foreign cuisine and learn what vegetables and/or herbs are common to it (e.g. Mexican, African, Chinese, Italian, etc.). Include a report telling about a minimum of 5 vegetables and/or herbs from each country chosen. Include the scientific and common names; pictures of the plants from your garden or seed catalogs; tell how they are grown; and how the foods are used. Also list a source for buying the seed or plants. Favorite recipes using some or all of the vegetables described may be included. Give proper credit by listing the source of pictures and information used. Protect in a clear report cover or 3-ring notebook. The 4-H member's name, age, county, and years in the project(s) must be on the back of the report cover or notebook.

SPECIAL GARDEN PROJECT EXHIBITS

- *G775001 Special Garden Project- Educational exhibit based on what was learned from the project. Present information on a poster 14" X 22" either vertical or horizontal arrangement or in a clear plastic report cover. The 4-H member's name, age, and county must be on the back of the poster or report cover.
- *G775002 Special Gardenign Project Fresh Cut Flowers, Herbs or Harvested Vegetables The current years' Special Gardening Project fresh cut flowers, herbs or harvested vegetables should be entered in this class. Refer to classes 1-45 for quantity to exhibit if Special Gardening Project is a fresh cut flower. Refer to classes 201-252 for quantity

to exhibit if Special Gardening Project is a vegetable. Flowers and herbs must be cut no potted.

The 2023 Special Gardening project is focused on Mrs. Burns' Lemon Basil

ENTOMOLOGY

Entomology exhibits give 4-H'ers the opportunity to demonstrate their knowledge about insects and insect displays. This category has multiple projects that allows 4-H'ers to progress over numerous years. For help getting started with this project contact your county 4-H extension office.

Rules

- 1. Specimens in display collections should be mounted properly and labeled with location, date of collection, name of collector, and order name.
- 2. Follow mounting and labeling instructions in the Nebraska 4-H Entomology Manual.
- 3. Boxes are preferred to be 12" high X 18" wide, and landscape orientation, so they fit in display racks.
- 4. Purchase of commercially made boxes is allowed.
- 5. All specimens are to be pinned and labeled by the Exhibitor.
- 6. No purchased specimens are allowed.
- 7. No projects over 50 pounds are allowed.

ENTOMOLOGY

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- *H800001 Entomology Display, First-Year Project Collection to consist of 25 or more different kinds (species) of insects representing at least 6 orders. Limit of one box.
- *H800002 Entomology Display, Second-Year Project Collection to consist of a minimum of 50 kinds (species) of insects representing at least 8 orders. Replace damaged or poorly mounted specimens. At least 25 species must be present from after July 1 of the previous year. Limit 2 boxes.
- *H800003 Entomology Display, Third-Year or More Project Collection to consist of a minimum of 75 kinds (species) of insects representing at least 10 orders. Replace damaged or poorly mounted specimens. At least 25 species must be present from after July 1 of previous year. Limit of 3 boxes.
- *H800004 Special Interest or Advanced Insect Display Educational display developed according to personal interests and/or advanced identification capability. This is also an opportunity to highlight favorite insects in a creative arrangement. Insects should conform to pinning and mounting standards as in Classes 1-3 and be protected in an insect box. Each specialty display should include names of the insects, interesting information about them, and why the display was made. Advanced identification collections should have insects grouped with labels that correspond with identification level (e.g. family, genus, species). A specialty collection may consist of insects by taxonomic group (e.g. butterflies, grasshoppers, dragonflies, scarab beetles) or by host, subject, or habitat (e.g. insect pests of corn, aquatic insects, insect mimicry, insect galls, insects from goldenrod, insect pollinators, etc.).
- *H800005 Insect Habitats Habitats consist of any hand-crafted objects, made of natural or artificial materials, placed outdoors, which promote or conserve insects in the environment. Insects may include bee pollinators, butterflies, beneficial insects, etc. A one-page report describing activities must accompany the exhibit. Report should include placement, target insect, why materials were chosen, functional design, and indicators of success. See the following resources for reports.

*H800006 Macrophotography - Subjects should be insects, spiders or other arthropods, or any nests, webs, or constructions they make. All exhibit prints should be either 8" x 10" or 8½" x 11" and mounted on rigid, black 11" X 14" poster or mat board. Either orientation is acceptable. No frames or mat board framing is allowed. A caption of a few sentences should explain the subject and be printed on white paper and glued below the print on the poster board.

- *H800007 Insect Poster/Display Exhibits Exhibits can be posters or three-dimensional displays, and artistic creativity is encouraged. Posters should be no larger than 22" x 28". They should be instructional and can be attractive and have pictures, drawings, charts, or graphs. Posters and displays may show any aspect of insect life, habitat, or related conservation or management. Examples include life history and other facts about an insect; insect anatomy; how to manage insects in a farm, home, lawn, or garden setting; experiences rearing one kind of insect; survey of an important insect; insect behavior (ex. nesting, finding food, mobility, defenses, etc.); habitats (e.g. forests, grasslands, wetlands, rivers, or lakes) and what insects are found there, etc. Three-dimensional displays, such as dioramas, sculptures, models or decorative boxes should have a page of explanatory information accompanying them and fit within a 22" x 28" area.
- *H800008 Reports or Journals Reports and journals should be in a 3-ring binder. A report may be informational, that is, an original article about a favorite insect, a history of insect outbreaks, diseases caused by insects, insects as food, etc. Or it may be a research report about an investigation or experiment done in a scientific manner. It then should have a basic introduction of the insect studied, methods used, observations, and results of the project. Tables, graphs, and images are helpful to include. A journal is an observational study over a period of time with personal impressions. It may cover watching changes in kinds of butterflies over the summer, rearing a specific insect from egg to adult, managing a beehive, observations of insects in a specific habitat, accounts of insect behavior in a forest or flower garden, etc.

Special Entomology Project

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Rules

The insect of the year for 2023 is the Grasshopper

- *H810001 Special Entomology Project Educational exhibit based on what was learned from the project. Present information on a poster no larger than 22" x 28" either vertical or horizontal arrangement or in a clear plastic report cover. The 4-H member's name, age, full address, and county must be on the back of the poster or report cover. Reports may include life cycle, distribution of the insect, insect behavior (ex. nesting, finding food, mobility, defenses, etc.); habitats (e.g. forests, grasslands, wetlands, rivers, or lakes). May include a certain species or broad overview of the family or group of insects.
- *H810002 Special Entomology project display The current years' Special Entomology Project pinned species along with a one to two report of what was learned from researching the insect type. Reports may include life cycle, distribution of the insect, insect behavior (ex. nesting, finding food, mobility, defenses, etc.); habitats (e.g. forests, grasslands, wetlands, rivers, or lakes). May include a certain species or broad overview of the family or group of insects.

AEROSPACE- ROCKETS/DRONES

This category gives 4-H'ers a chance to display the rockets and drones they have created. Through participation in this category 4-H'ers will show judges what they learned about and how they adapted their exhibit throughout this project. Involvement in SET Aerospace gives participants a first-hand experience in modern technology.

- 1. The name and county of each exhibitor should appear separately on the back of each board, poster, or article and on the front cover of the notebooks so owner of the exhibit may be identified if the entry tag is separated from the exhibit.
- 2. Rockets must be supported substantially to protect the rocket from breakage. Rockets are to be mounted on a base that has dimensions equal or less than 12" x 12" and the base should be 3/4" thick. No metal bases. If the rocket fins extend beyond the edges of the required base (12" x 12"), then construct a base that is large enough to protect the fins. The base size is dictated by the size of the rocket fins.
- 3. The rockets must be mounted vertically. Please do not attach sideboards or backdrops to the displays. In addition, a used engine or length of dowel pin is to be glued and/or screwed into the board and extended up into the rockets engine mount to give added stability.
- 4. Rockets must be equipped as prepared for launching, with wadding and parachute or other recovery system. Rockets entered with live engines, wrong base size or sideboards will be disqualified.
- 5. A report, protected in a clear plastic cover, must include: 1) rocket specification (include original or photo of manufacture

packaging stating rocket skill level), 2) a flight record for each launching (weather, distance, flight height), 3) number of launchings, 4) flight pictures 5) Safety (How did you choose your launch site? Document safe launch, preparations, and precautions)6 objectives learned and 7) conclusions.

- 6. The flight record should describe engine used, what the rocket did in flight and recovery success. Points will not be deducted for launching, flight or recovery failures described. This includes any damage that may show on the rocket. Complete factory assembled rockets will not be accepted at the State Fair.
- 7. Judging is based upon display appearance, rocket appearance, workmanship, design or capabilities for flight, number of times launched and report. Three launches are required to earn the maximum launch points given on the score sheets. For scoring for the State Fair, only actual launches count, misfires will not count towards one of the required three launches.
 - a. For self-designed rockets only, please include digital recorded copy of one flight. In the documentation, please include a description of stability testing before the rocket was flown.
 - b. Skill level of project is not determined by number of years in project. Skill level is determined by the level listed on the manufacturing packaging.
 - c. 4-H Rocket project levels are not intended to correspond to National Association of Rocketry model rocket difficulty ratings or levels.
 - d. High power rockets (HPR) are similar to model rocketry with differences that include the propulsion power and weight increase of the model. They use motors in ranges over "G" power and/or weigh more than laws and regulations allow for unrestricted model rockets. These rockets are NOT appropriate for 4-H projects and will be disqualified.
- 8. Posters can be any size up to 28" X 22" when ready for display. Example: tri fold poster boards are not 29" X 22" when fully open for display.

AEROSPACE/ROCKETS

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Rules

- 1. Youth enrolled in Aerospace 2, 3, or 4 may exhibit in any class within this division.
- ***H850001 Rocket-** Any Skill Level Rocket with wooden fins and cardboard body tubes painted by hand or air brush.
- *H850002 Aerospace Display- Poster or display board that displays or exemplifies one of the principles learned in the Lift Off project. Examples include display of rocket parts and purpose, explains the parts of a NASA rocket or shuttle, interview of someone in the aerospace field, or kite terminology. Include notebook containing terminology (definition), and what was learned. Display can be any size up to 28" by 22".
- *H850003 Rocket- Any Skill Level Rocket with wooden fins and cardboard body tubes painted using commercial application, for example: commercial spray paint.
- *H850004 Self-Designed Rocket- Any self-designed rocket with wooden fins and cardboard body tubes.

DRONES

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- 1. Youth enrolled in Aerospace 2, 3, or 4 may exhibit in any class within this division.
- *H850005 Drone Poster—Exhibit must be designed to educate yourself and others on one or more of the following topics: drone technologies, uses of drones, the different types of drones, types of training needed to operate drones, and the laws and regulations users must follow. Posters can be any size up to 28" by 22".
- *H850006 Drone Video-Exhibit must demonstrate how the drone interacts with the outside world. Examples include field scouting, surveying damage from natural disasters, drones used in commercial applications and settings, and drones used for structural engineering. Video should not exceed 5 minutes. Videos should be submitted to

http://go.unl.edu/2023nesfest by August 15, 2023, or be uploaded to a video streaming application and exhibitors **MUST**

COMPUTER

This category gives 4-H'ers a chance to display their knowledge of computers. Through participation in this category 4-H'ers will develop presentations that show judges their knowledge in the different aspects of computer science. Involvement in SET Computers gives participants a first-hand experience in modern technology.

Rules

- 1. The name and county of each exhibitor should appear separately on the back of each board, poster, or article and on the front cover of the notebooks so owner of the exhibit may be identified if the entry tag is separated from the exhibit.
- 2. Demonstration boards should include an overall title for the display, plus other necessary labeling.
- 3. Reports should be written using the scientific method whenever possible (Background, the Question or hypothesis, what you plan to do and what you did, Method used and observations, Results: what you learned.) All reports should be computer generated and enclosed in a clear plastic cover. The reports should be attached securely to the display.
- 4. Please refer to the General Rules for the policy regarding firearms, items with a blade, and other related items.
- 5. Please refer to the General Rules for the policy regarding use of copywritten images.
- 6. Team Entries: To qualify for entry at the Nebraska State Fair team materials entered in H860007 Maker Space/Digital Fabrication must clearly be the work of a team instead of an individual and must have at least 50% of all team members enrolled in 4-H. Additionally, all enrolled 4-H members on the team should complete and attach an entry tag to the materials. A supplemental page documenting the individual contributions to the project should be included. The entry will be judged as a team, with all team members receiving the same ribbon placing.

COMPUTER MYSTERIES: UNIT 2

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- *H860001 Computer Application Notebook 4-H exhibitor should use computer application to create a graphic notebook utilizing computer technology. 4-H'er may create any of the following: greeting card (5 different cards should as a birthday, wedding, anniversary, sympathy get well or other); a business card (3 cards for 3 different individuals and businesses); menu (minimum of 2 pages including short description of foods and pricing); book layout (I-book); promotional flyer (3 flyers promoting 3 different events); newsletter (minimum 2 pages); or other: examples such as precision farming or family business logo etc. This exhibit consists of a notebook (8.5x11 inches) which should include a (1) a detailed report describing: (a) the task to be completed, (b) the computer application software required to complete the task, (c) specific features of the computer application software necessary for completing the task (2) print out of your project. Project may be in color or black and white.
- *H860002 Produce a Computer Slideshow Presentation Using presentation software a 4-H exhibitor designs a multimedia computer presentation on one topic related to youth. Entries should be submitted to http://go.unl.edu/2023nesfset by August 15th, 2023, or videos can be uploaded to a video streaming application and exhibitors **MUST** provide a hardy copy QR code for viewing. Exhibitors are encouraged to test their codes or links on several devices to check for appropriate permissions. A notebook with a printout of all the slides should be submitted. Slideshow should include a minimum of 10 slides and no more than 25. Incorporate appropriate slide layouts, graphics, animations, and audio (music or voice and transition sounds do not count). Each slide should include notes for a presenter. All slideshows must be uploaded.

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*H860003 Produce an Audio/Video Computer Presentation- Using presentation software a 4-H exhibitor designs a multimedia computer presentation on one topic related to youth. Entries should be submitted to http://go.unl.edu/2023nesfset by August 15th, 2023, or videos can be uploaded to a video streaming application and exhibitors MUST provide a

hardy copy QR code for viewing. Exhibitors are encouraged to test their codes or links on several devices to check for appropriate permissions. The presentation should be at least 2 minutes in length and no more than 5 minutes in length, appropriate graphics, sound and either a video clip, animation, or voice over and/or original video clip.

- *H860005 Virtual Platform Presentation Youth design a fully automated education presentation (video, notebook, poster, etc). Vidoes should be submitted to http://go.unl.edu/2023nesfset by August 15th, 2023, or videos can be uploaded to a video streaming application and exhibitors **MUST** provide a hardy copy QR code for viewing. Exhibitors are encouraged to test their codes or links on several devices to check for appropriate permissions.
- *H860006 Create a Web Site/Blog or App Design a simple Web site/ blog or app for providing information about a topic related to youth using either software programs such as an HTML editor like Microsoft's FrontPage or Macromedia's Dreamweaver, and image editor like Irfan View or GIMP OR online using a WIKI such as Google Sites. If the Web site, Blog, or App isn't live include all files comprising the Web site, Blog or App should be submitted on a flash drive in a plastic case along with the explanation of why the site was created or may be shared through a hard copy share link or QR code for viewing. If developed using a WIKI or other online tool include a link to the website in the explanation of why the site was created. - *H860007 3D PRINTING 3D printing uses plastic or other materials to build a three-dimensional (3D) object for a digital design. Youth may use original designs or someone else's they have re-designed in a unique way. Exhibits will be judged based on the motivation and/or problem identified. For example, 3D objects printed as part of the design process for robot or other engineering project. Must include design notebook that addresses the following questions:
 - 1. What was the motivation for your design or the problem you were solving with your design? Is your item a functional or decorative piece?
 - 2. Please include a picture of original design, citation of designer/website OR if design is completely original (you created it using CAD software), then state that it's original. If item was not completely original, indicate what you did to the original design to modify it to better meet the design problem stated in #1 above. Its design was modified multiple times, please indicate what change was made with each modification, and what prompted the need for the change. I.e. I printed it and the design was too fragile, so I resliced the print to make thicker external walls, or to have a denser infill.
 - 3. Define your process for designing/printing. What software and/or hardware was used (indicate type of 3D printer or if item was created with 3D pen)?
 - 4. What materials were selected for your project? (PLA, PVA, ABS, etc.)
 - 5. If your final design has any moving parts, define how you determined appropriate allowance in your design?
 - 6. Identify any changes that you would make to improve your design.

*H860008 Maker Space/ Digital Fabrication – This project is a computer generated projected created using a laser cutter, vinyl cutter, heat press or CNC router. Vector or 3D based software such as Corel Draw, or Fusion 360 would be an example of an appropriate software used to create your finished project. Project should include a notebook with the following:

- 2. Software and equipment used
- 3. Directions on how to create the project
- 4. Prototype of plans
- 5. Cost of creating project

- 7. Changes you would make if you remade the project

ROBOTICS

This category involves the many different aspects of Robotics. Participants will learn more about how robots are designed and developed as well as the mechanical and electronic elements of robots. Involvements in SET Robotics gives participants a first-hand experience in modern technology.

Rules

- 1. The name and county of each exhibitor should appear separately on the back of each board, poster, or article and on the front cover of the notebooks so the owner of the exhibit may be identified if the entry tag is separated from the exhibit.
- 2. Reports should be written using the scientific method whenever possible (Background, the Question or hypothesis, what you plan to do and what you did, Method used and observations, Results: what you learned. All reports should be computer generated and enclosed in a clear plastic cover. The reports should be attached securely to the display.
- 3. Posters can be any size up to 28" X 22" when ready for display. Example: tri fold poster boards are not 28" X 22" when fully open for display.
- 4. Youth enrolled in Virtual Robotics, Junk Drawer Robotics (Levels 1, 2, or 3), or Robotics Platforms may exhibit in any class within this division.
- 5. Team Entries: To qualify for entry at the Nebraska State Fair team materials entered in robotics classes that are clearly the work of a team instead of an individual must have at least 50% of all team members enrolled in 4-H. Additionally, all enrolled 4-H members on the team should complete and attach an entry tag to the materials. A supplemental page documenting the individual contributions to the project should be included. The entry will be judged as a team, with all team members receiving the same ribbon placing.
- 6. Creating a video of your robot in action would be helpful for the judges but is not mandatory. Present as a CD Rom with your robot entry. Videos should be uploaded to a video streaming application and exhibitors should provide a hard copy QR code for viewing.

ROBOTICS

- *H861001 Robotics Poster Create a poster (28" x 22") communicating a robotics theme such as "Robot or Not", "Pseudo code", "Real World Robots", "Careers in Robots" or "Autonomous Robotics", "Precision Agriculture" or a robotic topic of interest to the 4-H'er.
- *H861002 Robotics Notebook Explore a robotics topic in depth and present your findings in a notebook. Documentation should include any designs, research, notes, pseudo code, data tables or other evidence of the 4-H'ers learning experience. The notebook should contain at least three pages. Topics could include a programming challenge, a programming skill, calibration, sensor exploration, or any of the topics suggested in Class 1.
- *H861004 Robotics /Careers Interview Interview someone who is working in the field of robotics and research the career in robotics. Interviews can either be written or in a multimedia format (CD/DVD). Written interviews should be in a notebook. Written reports should be 3 to 5 pages, double spaced, 12-point font, and 1" margins. Multimedia reports should be between 3 to 5 minutes in length.
- *H861005 Robotics Sensor Notebook Write pseudo code which includes at least three sensor activity. Include the code written and explain the code function.
- *H861007 Kit Labeled Robot (cannot be programmed.) and Notebook This class is intended for explorations of robotic components such as arms or vehicles OR educational kits marketed as robots that do not have the ability to be programmed to "sense, plan and act." The exhibit should include a notebook with the robot the youth has constructed. Included in the notebook should be 1) a description of what the robot does, 2) pictures of programs the robot can perform, 3) why they chose to build this particular form, and 4) how they problem solved any issues they might have had during building and programming. A picture story of assembly is recommended. If robot is more than 15" wide and 20" tall they may not be displayed in locked cases.
- *H861008 3D Printed Robotics Parts This class is intended for youth to create parts through 3D printing, that help create their robot or aid the robot in completing a coded function. Project should include notebook describing the process used to create the project, describe the success of your designed piece (did it work), intended use of the

ROBOTIC SHOWCASE

*H861003 Robotics Video – This class should be displayed in a notebook. The notebook should include a video clip on a CD/DVD that demonstrates the robot performing the programmed function. Include your pseudo code and screenshots of the actual code with a written description of the icon/command functions. All videos for state fair should be emailed to Amy Timmerman atimmerman2@unl.edu before August 15. Files must be saved in a PC compatible format with county name and last name of participant before emailing.

LEATHERWORKING

Participants may exhibit in only one level of leather working, basic, intermediate, or advanced. In addition, exhibitor may enter in the Leather Garments, Class 7. One entry per class. Exhibit must be a complete article made of genuine leather (excluding fasteners, frames, lining, or other inserts) created by the exhibitor. Kits are allowed. - Several classes require a display board which should be a height of 24 inches and not to exceed 1/4-inch thickness. A height of 24 7/8 inches is acceptable to allow for the saw kerf (width) if two 24-inch boards are cut from one end of a 4 foot by 8-foot sheet of plywood. Nothing should be mounted within 3/4 inch of the top or bottom of the board. (Example: Woodworking & Electricity.)
 - a. Fabricated board such as plywood, composition board, or particle-type lumber may be used for demonstration displays.
 - b. Demonstration boards should be sanded and finished to improve their appearance. The finish on a demonstration board will be judged as a woodworking exhibit.
 - c. Demonstration boards should include an overall title for the display, plus other necessary labeling.
 - d. Reports should be written using the scientific method whenever possible (Background, the Question or hypothesis, what you plan to do and what you did, Method used and observations, Results: what you learned. All reports should be computer generated and enclosed in a clear plastic cover. The reports should be attached securely to the display.

Reports should be written using the scientific method whenever possible (Background, the Question or hypothesis, what you plan to do and what you did, Method used and observations, Results: what you learned. All reports should be computer generated and enclosed in a clear plastic cover. The reports should be attached securely to the display.
- 3. Youth enrolled in Geospatial may exhibit in any class within this division.

Rules

- 1. The name and county of each exhibitor should appear separately on the back of each board, poster, or article and on the front cover of the notebooks so owner of the exhibit may be identified if the entry tag is separated from the exhibit.
- 2. **Requirements**: All articles exhibited must include a plan (with drawings or sketch or blueprints) stating dimensions and other critical instructions a builder would need to know how to build the project. Plans may include narrative instructions in addition to the dimension drawings and include any alternations to the original plan. Part of the score depends on how well the project matches the plans. If the plans are modified, the changes from the original need to be noted on the plans. All plans used for making the article must be securely attached and protected by a clear plastic cover.

WELDING

- 1. The name and county of each exhibitor should appear separately on the back of each board, poster, or article and on the front cover of the notebooks so owner of the exhibit may be identified if the entry tag is separated from the exhibit.
- All welds exhibited in class 1 or 2 must be mounted on a 12" high x 15" long display board of thickness not to exceed 3/8". Attach each weld on a wire loop hinge or equivalent, so the judge can look at the bottom side of the weld when necessary.

Each weld should be labeled with information stated 1) type of welding process (stick, MIG, TIG, Oxy-Acetylene, etc.) 2) kind of weld, 3) welder setting, 4) electrode/wire/rod size, and 5) electrode/wire/rod ID numbers. Attach a wire to display board so it can be hung like a picture frame. No picture frame hangers accepted.

- 3. Fabricated board such as plywood, composition board, or particle-type lumber may be used for demonstration displays.
- 4. Demonstration boards should be sanded and finished to improve their appearance. The finish on a demonstration board will be judged as a woodworking exhibit.
- 5. Reports should be written using the scientific method whenever possible (Background, the Question or hypothesis, what you plan to do and what you did, Method used and observations, Results: what you learned. All reports should be computer generated and enclosed in a clear plastic cover. The reports should be attached securely to the display.
- 6. If no plans are included with welding art, welding article, welding furniture or composite weld project, the item will be disqualified.

Welding Joints - a display of one butt, one lap and one fillet weld.

- Tips and Suggestions for Class 1
 - 1. All welds should be made with the same electrode/wire/rod size and number.
 - 2. Welds should be made only on one side of metal so penetration can be judged.
 - 3. Welds should be cleaned with chipping hammer and wire brush. Apply a coat of light oil (penetrating oil) to the metal to prevent rusting. Wipe off excess oil.
 - 4. It is suggested that all welds be of the same size and thickness as metal. These pieces, referred to as coupons, should be 1.5 to 2 inches wide and 3.5 to 4 inches long. A good way to get this size is to buy new cold rolled strap iron and cut to length. The extra width is needed to provide enough metal to absorb the heat from the welding process and prevent the coupons from becoming too hot before the bead is completed. Narrower coupons will become very hot, making an average welder setting too cold at the bead start, just about right in the middle, and too hot at the end. The correct way to weld narrow strips is to make short beads and allow time to cool, however this project requires a full-length bead.
 - 5. tick welding: Suggested coupon thickness 1/4" if using 1/8" rod. Suggested rod-AC and DC straight or reverse polarity- first E-7014, second E-6013
 - 6. MIG welding: Suggested coupon thickness 1/4" if using .035 wire and 1/8" if using .023 wire
 - 7. Oxy-Acetylene: Suggested coupon thickness 1/8". Suggested rod- 1/8" mild steel rod 4-H
- *H920002 Position Welds a display showing three beads welded in the vertical down, horizontal and overhead position.
 - Tips and Suggestions for Class 2
 - 1. It is suggested that all welds be of the same size and thickness as metal. These pieces are referred to as coupons. The welds can be on one coupon that is about 4" x 4" or on individual coupons that are about 2" x 4" inch and ¼" thick. Suggested rods for this class of position welds for AC and DC straight or reverse polarity is, first E-6013, second E-7014 and E-6010 for DC reverse polarity only.
 - 2. Welds should be cleaned with a chipping hammer and wire brush. Apply a coat of light oil (penetrating oil) to the metal to prevent rusting. Wipe off excess oil.
 - 3. 4-H Welding Project Tips and Suggestions: Class 3 & 4 1. All welds should be cleaned and protected from rust with paint or light oil. Plans are to be complete enough that if they were given to a welding shop, the item could be made without further instructions. Bill of materials should include a cost for all items used including steel, electrodes, paint, wheels, etc.
- *H920003 Welding Art any art created using tack welds to hold the metal pieces together (examples include horseshoe projects). Type of welder, welder settings, all plans, plan alternations, and a bill for material must be attached to

the article. Protect plans with a cover. If project is designed to be outside, it is required to have appropriate outdoor finish.

- *H920004 Welding article any shop article where welding is used construction. 60% of item must be completed by 4-Her and notes regarding laser welding or machine welding must be included. Type of welder, welder settings, all plans, plan alternations, and a bill for materials must be attached to the article. Protect plans with a cover. If project is designed to be outside, it is required to have appropriate outdoor finish because project may be displayed outside.
- *H920005 Welding furniture any furniture with 75% welding is used in the construction. 60% of item must be completed by 4-Her and notes regarding laser welding or machine welding must be included. All plans, plan alternations, dimensions and a bill for materials must be attached to the article. Protect plans with a cover. May be displayed outside.
- *H920006 Plasma Cutter/Welder Design Plasma cutters/welders allowed for detailed design(s) to butt cut into metal.
 4Hers will create a notebook describing the design process to create the "artwork" to butt cut into the metal. In the notebook include:
 - A photo (front and back) of the finished project. Also include detailed photographs of the project to allow judges to examine cuts.
 - Instructions on how the design was created, this allows for replication of the project.
 - Lessons learned or improvements to the project.
 - Steps to finish the project.

*H920007 Composite Weld Project - 60% of the project must be welded and 40% made from other materials such as wood, rubber, etc. Type of welder, welder settings, all plans, plan alternations, and bill for materials must be attached to the article. Protect plans with a cover. If project is designed to be outside, it is required to have appropriate outdoor finish because project may be displayed outside.

VETERINARY SCIENCE

The purpose of a Veterinary Science exhibit is to inform the public about a common health problem of animals or a veterinary science principle or public health/zoonotic diseases. Do not confuse veterinary science exhibit topics with animal husbandry or production topics.

Rules

- 1. A Veterinary Science exhibit may consist of a poster, notebook, or a display. The exhibit may represent material from exhibitors enrolled in Animal Disease or Animal Health.
- 2. If photographs are to be part of the exhibit, remember that they will be viewed by the public. Make sure that the photographs are in good taste and will not be offensive to anyone. Graphic photographs of excessive bleeding, trauma or painful procedures are not appropriate. For exhibits related to veterinary surgical procedures, aseptic techniques need to be shown, for example, use of drapes, use of sterile procedures, wearing of gloves and other appropriate veterinary medical practices.
- 3. First-Aid Kits: Because of public safety concerns and risk of theft of first-aid kit contents (veterinary drugs/equipment) with perceived potential for drug abuse, animal first aid kits containing any drugs or medications will be immediately disqualified and not displayed. First Aid kits wishing to include medication information should instead utilize written descriptions, photographs, drawings, computer generated printouts or empty packaging of pharmaceuticals.

LIVESTOCK EXHIBITS

Rules

- 1. All market beef, market sheep and market goat must be tagged and weighed at the designated check in day in order to exhibit at the county fair. Exceptions must be approved by the species superintendent.
- 2. All market swine must be tagged and viewed at the designated check in day in June.

3. Dress Code:

- a. All 4-H livestock exhibitors will wear an official 4-H T-shirt, white shirt or blouse with the 4-H Chevron attached or arm band, and dark blue or black jeans.
- b. Exhibitors must wear sturdy shoes or boots NO tennis shoes.
- c. White pants are optional in Dairy Classes.
- d. All Horse exhibitors will also be required to meet attire requirements listed for Western type attire in the "Nebraska 4-H Horse Show and judging guide" on page 21.
- e. FFA members will be required to wear the FFA Official Dress as outlined in the Official FFA handbook unless voted on and changed prior to the Fair.
- 4. Due to a 4-H/FFA member's illness or in other special cases, a 4-H member's animal may be shown by another member with approval by the Extension Educator(s) and Livestock Superintendent prior to the start of the Fair and or Show.
- 5. All exhibitors enrolled in beef, goats, sheep, swine, poultry, and rabbits must complete YQCA (Youth Quality Care of Animals) training through Nebraska Extension program.
- 6. Exhibitors showing livestock are required to care for or make provisions for the care of their animals. All livestock exhibitors must supply their own feed, hay, and grain.
- 7. All livestock must be in their stall in their respective barns by clubs or chapters at 9:00 am each day.
- 8. Barns, alleys, and stalls are to be kept clean and are the responsibility of the exhibitors. Barn cleaning is to be completed by 9:00 am each day.
- 9. Any livestock exhibit must have been owned by the exhibitor at least 90 days prior to entry. (Excluding rabbits and poultry.)
- 10. No animal or project may be entered in more than one class.
- 11. Exhibitors will be limited to three (3) exhibits per division.
- 12. For exhibitors with both 4-H and FFA market livestock projects, the exhibitor will be limited to a combined total of four (4) for each market species representing both organizations. (Example: 4 Market Swine projects: 2 4-H Market Swine and 2 FFA Market Swine.)
- 13. Classes may be altered at the discretion of the Superintendent, Extension Staff and FFA Advisors.
- 14. The Official Judge will break any ties that develop within a class.
- 15. Absent Showman Policy: A 4-H'er must be present to exhibit and sell their market animal unless prior approval is received from the 4-H Council.
- 16. All 4-H livestock must remain at the fairgrounds during the fair.
- 17. Bucket Calves, weaned Stocker-Feeders, weaned Breeding Heifers and Cow-Calf Pairs must check-in during beef weigh ins. Stocker Feeders and Breeding Heifers not weaned may be brought the day of the show and must check-in with the Superintendent by 8:00 am. Following the completion of their class, those animals not weaned may then be released. Exceptions must have approval by the Livestock Superintendent.
- 18. Stall assignments will be made before the fair.
- 19. All stalls must be cleaned by assigned member during and at the close of fair.
- 20. There will be NO BALLOONS allowed in the livestock barns at any time during the Fair. No commercial signage will be permitted on any livestock stalls, pens, or cages.
- 21. All male market animals must be castrated.
- 22. All market animals must be dehorned, except meat goats with blunted horns.
- 23. Breeding Heifers, Breeding Ewes and Breeding Does cannot be shown in Market Classes.
- 24. Any animal that is deemed to be unsafe to the exhibitor or other exhibitors by the superintendents can be removed from the class and if necessary, the grounds. If removed from the class, the ribbon placing will be at the discretion of the judge.
- 25. Any animal that shows signs of a contagious disease will not be allowed to remain on the fairgrounds. This determination will be at the discretion of the Extension Staff, FFA Advisors and Livestock Superintendent.
- 26. The use of tranquilizers on any livestock will be prohibited except with the approval of the Extension Staff, FFA Advisor and Superintendent and be administered by a licensed veterinarian.
- 27. Unauthorized use of tranquilizers will result in the automatic loss of premiums, ribbons, trophies, and prizes won by the exhibitor.
- 28. Drenching of livestock will be permitted and performed only under the direction of a licensed veterinarian.
- 29. Fitting:
 - Any process that alters the animal's natural physical state or the natural color of the animal will not be allowed.
 - Paints that are the same color will be permitted on the legs of cattle and lambs, tail heads and flanks of cattle, elbow pockets and crotches of lambs.
 - Violators will be dropped one ribbon placing.
 - Trimming or blocking chutes for beef animals and lamb stands will be permitted on the fairgrounds on a limited basis. Each exhibitor is limited to one (1) blocking chute or lamb stand. Families with multiple exhibitors may have one of each per enrolled exhibitor.

- 4-Hers and FFA members are to groom and fit their own animals when competing in the intermediate and senior divisions.
- Junior and Intermediate competitors may request the assistance of their leader or family member, however the competitor is expected to be *actively participating* in the grooming.
- Senior competitors can receive verbal instruction or direction from a leader or family member but <u>must groom their</u> <u>animals themselves</u>. The first time an exhibitor is observed to be in violation of this policy will result in a verbal warning; the second violation will result in the reduction of a ribbon placement; and the third violation will be referred to the 4-H Council for determination of the appropriate action, up to and including disqualification.
- Market Swine hair must not be clipped shorter than 1/4 of an inch on any part of the body. Swine with shorter clipped hair may be disqualified by the Judge, Superintendent, or General Committee
- 30. All animals are to be in their assigned stalls after 9 a.m. during the County Fair (see current policy in the fair book) so guests will have the ability to walk through the barns and see the animals. The exception to this requirement will be show days when the animals are being readied for the show.
- 31. All competitors will be required to read and sign an affidavit that they have read the policies regarding grooming prior to bringing their animals to the Fair.
- 32. Youth exhibiting market animals in beef, sheep, goat, or swine may ultrasound their animals. Each youth who plans to participate, include the species and number of animals to be ultra-sounded with a fee of \$7.00 per animal with your pre-fair enrollment by July 14th.

- 4. Disqualified Dogs Females in season will not be permitted to be shown. Overly aggressive dogs may be disqualified at the discretion of the judge or superintendent. Lame or crippled dogs will not be permitted to be shown if it is determined by the dog committee that it is affecting the health of the dog.
- 5. Age of Dog A dog that is exhibited at the County Fair must be 6 months or older.
- 6. Experienced handlers are those showing for the second year or more at any dog show, including AKC, fun matches, etc.
- Handlers and beginning dogs may show only one year in Division A. If continuing as a team, both must advance to Division
 B. Dog and handler in Division B or higher must advance to the next obedience class upon receiving a purple ribbon or class award, except Open Obedience may repeat the class once.
- 8. There is no limit on the number of years a dog may be shown in the Utility Class. Dogs with AKC degrees will show as follows: "CD" degree must show in graduate novice or higher. "CDX" or "UD" degree must show in utility. The dog will stay in its highest attained class. A 'new' handler will enter such class.
- 9. Exhibitors will follow the dress code listed in the General Livestock Rules except shoes. Shoes with non-slip soles are recommended.
- 10. Baiting the dog with food or a toy is not permitted and is cause for disqualification.
- 11. The judge has the authority to disqualify violators.
- 12. Cleanup shall be the exhibitor's responsibility. This includes all areas while on the Fair Grounds. This rule will be enforced.
- 13. List on Pre-entry card the dog's name and note if this dog has been shown before.

- 2. If, for any reason the Grand Champion exhibitor within a species does not wish to or cannot participate in the contest, the exhibitor placing next will be selected to compete, and accordingly until the position is filled.
- 3. In the event of a multiple Grand Champion exhibitor (ex. One 4-H'er winning Beef and Sheep Showmanship), the exhibitor will be given the option of which species he/she would like to participate in the Round Robin contest. Then another exhibitor in the species not selected will be allowed the opportunity to participate.
- Other guidelines applying to the contest other than specific rules the judge may have are:
- 1. The animals used for this competition will be chosen by the Livestock Superintendents from the beef, sheep, horse, goat and swine.
- 2. Each species will be shown separately and a pen set up for confinement of the swine.

Membership and Enrollment:

Any Child age 5 – 7 years old, by January 1st of the current year may enroll. A child may join an already existing 4-H club or the Clover Kids 4-H Club. All Clover Kid members must be registered on the 4-H Online <u>v2.4honline.</u>com This is due by June 15th of every year. Dues to clubs must be paid so insurance can be paid by those clubs.

County Fair Entry Process:

All Clover Kid entries must pre-enter their fair exhibits on the Pre-Entry Form by July 14th of the current year. There will be a Clover Kid Pre-Entry form that will be sent via mail and available online.

County Fair Exhibits/Entries (Static Exhibits):

All non-livestock exhibits are called Static exhibits. Clover Kids may enter as many exhibits as they would like. They will be able to present 5 items to a judge as a "Show and Tell". A list of items to submit for Static Exhibits is located in the Kimball-Banner County Fair Book. All Clover kids will be held to the same deadlines as the regular 4-H members, these forms will be due on July 14th. Clover Kids will be expected to wear official dress for entering static exhibits. White shirt or blouse with the 4-H Chevron attached on the left side or an arm band, and dark blue or black jeans. Clover Kids may participate in the 4-H Fashion Show, Public Speaking and Presentations contests. The same entry procedures and deadlines apply as they do for the regular 4-H members.

When to bring Exhibits to Fair:

Clothing Exhibits will need to be brought to Clothing Judging Day. Please see Fair Schedule for exact date and time. Other Static Exhibits will need to be brought to Static Judging Day. Please see Fair Schedule for exact date and time.

How Clover Kid Exhibits are Judged:

Clover Kids is strictly non-competitive, and exhibits will receive special Clover Kid ribbons. No premiums are paid for Clover Kid Exhibits. Youth may bring as many exhibits as they like to exhibit at fair but will only get to present five of their exhibits to a judge for an interview. Youth may present their five static exhibits to a judge, and they will interview them in a "Show and Tell" fashion. This judging is held on Clothing and Static Entry Days but is not required.

CLOVER KID ANIMALS

Youth who enroll as Clover Kids will be allowed to show Cats, Dogs, Goats, Rabbits, Poultry, Sheep, Small Animals, Swine and Bucket calves, in a non-competitive event with the goal of allowing the Clover Kids the opportunity to experience a showmanship class just for them.

Rules

1. State 4-H Rules prohibit Clover Kids from showing animals no more than 350 lbs for safety concerns.

- 2. Exhibitors are encouraged to show animals that they can control without endangering themselves or other exhibitors and spectators.
- 3. Clover Kids are limited to 2 animals that they can show.
- 4. They should have good knowledge of the animal and care should be learned while doing these projects.
- 5. It is expected that all Clover Kids have an adult or older 4-H member assisting them in the show ring.
- 6. Clover Kids may show their own animal or one shared with an older 4-H member.
- 7. Clover Kids not exhibiting their own animal at fair are responsible for securing the use of an animal that belongs to a registered 4-H member.
- 8. Clover Kids will need to fill out the ID Sheets for their animals and submit by June 15th. These sheets will be available online and at the Extension Office.
- 9. Clover Kids are to only show the animals they have properly tagged/Identified and listed on the ID sheets. These policies will be enforced. No exceptions.
- 10. Clover Kid animals must check their livestock in on weigh-in day.
- 11. All 4-H livestock must remain at the fairgrounds during the fair. Exceptions must have approval from Extension Staff, Clover Kid/4-H Leader and/or the Superintendent.
- 12. Clover Kids will be expected to wear the 4-H official dress for showmanship. White shirt or blouse with the 4-H Chevron attached on the left side or an arm band, and dark blue or black jeans. Must wear sturdy shoes or boots NO TENNIS SHOES!
- 13. Clover Kids will NOT be able to sell their animals in the livestock sale at fair.
- 14. Clover Kid showmanship will immediately follow each 4-H species show.
- 15. Times are approximate and are subject to change due to the length of the 4-H show.
- 16. Please plan accordingly, we will not wait for all Clover Kids to be present in order to begin the show.
- 17. Clover Kid exhibits will not receive any ribbon premium.
- 18. Clover Kid exhibitors will receive a Clover Kid ribbon.
