PUBLIC SPEAKING

PREPARED SPEECH:

By participating in the 4-H Prepared Speech, 4-H members will have the opportunity to write and prepare a speech on a topic related to their 4-H experience. The judge will view the speech and evaluate based on the subject, organization, and delivery of the speech. The handout, *A Guide To Making Great 4-H Speeches*, is available on how to develop speeches at <u>https://extension.unl.edu/statewide/knox/knox-county-4-h-public-speaking-contest/</u>.

TROPHIES: Refer to the Knox County Trophy and Award List

Awards: The first-place winner in each division is eligible for a \$50.00 scholarship for a 4-H Camp of their choice, sponsored by the Knox County 4-H Council.

- A speech is an individual event only.
- Ages are as of January 1 of the current year.
- Junior, Intermediate and Senior presenters must have an original speech and include 4-H as the major component of the speech.
- 4-H members may not use an old speech written by a sibling, another 4-H member, or anyone else.
- Acknowledge the source of information used in the speech. For example, an article from a magazine may be used for reference but should not be quoted directly unless you tell the audience your source.
- Note cards are acceptable if used properly at the county level speeches should not be read.
- Use of visual aids and props are not allowed.
- Dress appropriately. Do not wear costumes or special effect clothing.

4-H IMPROMPTU SPEECH:

The Impromptu Speech competition gives youth the opportunity to write and present a speech around a 4-H related topic that they select during the competition where they are given 15 minutes to develop and prepare their presentation. The Judge will evaluate the subject, organization, and delivery of the speech.

- Only individuals may compete in this class: no team entries are allowed.
- On the day of the contest, participants will have a topic randomly selected for them. Youth will have no more than 15 minutes to develop a speech on the selected topic. Participants will then deliver the speech to the judge and audience members.
- Example topic: My Day in 4-H

VIDEO COMMUNICATION:

A video communication contest which allows youth to create a multi-media video around the theme related to 4-H. The judge will be evaluating both the organization of information as well as the audio and video production.

- Length 60-90 seconds
- Only individuals may compete in this class; no team entries are allowed.
- Youth may use a phone, laptop or tablet to create a multi-media piece around the theme: **4-H is a Feeling**
- Sound Effects, public-domain music, and graphics can be used. Copyrighted materials may not be used.
- Videos will be submitted electronically as MP4 files along with the registration form.

PUBLIC SERVICE ANNOUNCEMENT

The Radio Public Service Announce (PSA) contest challenges youth to write and record a 60-second promotional audio recording focused on a yearly theme that could be played on the radio to promote the work of Nebraska 4-H. A Public Service Announcement is an individual event only. Youth are judged on their overall organization and delivery of the PSA. The handout, *How to Prepare a 4-H Radio Public Service Announcement*, and other resources are available at https://extension.unl.edu/statewide/knox/knox-county-4-h-public-speaking-contest/.

PUBLIC SERVICE ANNOUNCEMENT (PSA) CRITERIA:

- All radio PSA's must be created and presented by the 4-Her to promote 4-H and be general enough to be used anywhere in Nebraska at any time of the year.
- <u>All PSA's will use the state theme as the basis for their PSA. The 2024 PSA theme is "4-H is a Feeling"</u>.
- Sound effects and public domain music may be used. Copyrighted material may not be used.
- All 4-H PSA's must include the following tag line within the last ten seconds of the PSA: "Learn more about the Nebraska Extension 4-H Youth Development Program at 4h.unl.edu." The tag line is included in the 60 second time limit.
- Radio PSA's will be submitted electronically prior to the contest or at the contest in a .wav or .mp3 audio formats.
- Length 60 seconds
- All PSA's must be the original work of the presenter. Contestants may not use PSA's written and provided by the state or national staff.
- Four-Her's may participate in both Speech and PSA Divisions in the contest.
- **TROPHIES** will be awarded to the winner in each division.
- No team PSA's are allowed.

FOOD REVUE CONTEST

The 4-H Food Revue Contest is open to all 4-H members ages 8-18 on January 1 of the current year. Participants need not be enrolled in a specific project to exhibit. By participating in the Food Revue, the 4-H'er learns how to:

- Properly set a table
- Plan nutritious meals
- Express originality and creativity in choosing a theme
- Express knowledge of food, nutrition and food safety

WHAT DO I NEED TO PARTICIPATE?

- First, pick out a **Theme** for your display (holiday, birthday, anniversary, season, family dinner, etc.).
- Second, plan a **Menu** to go along with your theme. Put your menu for the meal featuring the food item on an 8 ½ x 11" poster. The menu should be well balanced nutritionally. Try to include a variety in color, shape, texture, temperature and method of preparation in your meal.
- Third, select and prepare a favorite **Food** from your menu to go along with your display theme. Bring the food plus the recipe on an $8 \frac{1}{2}$ x 11" poster.
- Fourth, plan a **Table Setting** for the menu you have selected. Bring along a table setting for 1 person. Include table covering appropriate for the occasion (i.e. tablecloth, placemats), centerpiece (appropriate with the theme), dishes, glassware, silverware, napkins etc.

JUDGING AND INTERVIEW: During the judging, you will present your table and food to the judge. Each participant will be interviewed by the judge. The judge may ask you questions concerning why you chose this particular theme, choice of menu, food preparation, food handling, nutritional information, etc. You should also demonstrate an understanding of table setting techniques. You should be able to describe the ingredients & preparation required for all menu items, as well as food safety. The judge may taste your food.

If your recipe lends itself to be shared, we encourage you to participate in the public sample line following the contest. Contestants share sample sized portions of their food for others to try and answer questions about their exhibit. Please think out how you will serve your samples, small plates and napkins will be provided for those tasting.

Participants are encouraged to display their table at the fair. The table must be set up during entry day (Wednesday, August 7) from 4-8 p.m., and may be taken down on Sunday during release of exhibits.

Food Revue and Cook-Off dishes must be different dishes.

COOK-OFF CONTEST

This contest is open to all 4-H members ages 8-18 as of January 1 of the current year. The contest is divided into three age divisions: Novice, Junior, and Senior. Each entry must include at least one (1) pound of beef, pork, or poultry per four servings. (Example: recipe serving 6 people must have 1 ½ pounds of beef, pork or poultry.)

Contestants will prepare their exhibit at home and bring it ready to serve. Think about the eye appeal of the entire recipe and <u>bring the entire recipe, menu and a plate to serve sample to the judge.</u>

Food Revue and Cook-Off dishes must be different dishes.

Exhibits should come from one of the following areas:

- Main Dish Entree (meat only seasoned with spices or sauces)
- **Casserole Dish Entree** (dish made with meat and vegetables, potatoes, pasta, sauces or any combination of those listed)
- Cold Dish (example: sandwiches, salads, etc.)
- Entree Cooked on Open Grill (gas or charcoal)

Exhibits may be left wrapped to keep in heat or cold until time of judging. The beef, pork and poultry dishes will be judged as follows:

Preparation – 20 points
 Recipe & Menu – 20 points

- Flavor & Aroma 30 points
- Appearance 30 points

PRESENTATION CONTEST

The 4-H Presentation Contest helps youth develop skills for communicating. Through the contest, youth have an opportunity to teach others about the skills they have learned in 4-H by developing and delivering a "show and tell" presentation. Contact the extension office for educational resources to help youth participating in the 4-H Presentations Contest.

4-H ILLUSTRATED PRESENTATIONS - An Illustrated 4-H Presentation is a live presentation with a formal talk where youth will use visual aids (such as props, posters, computer-based visuals, handouts, video, etc.) to show and tell others how to do something. The judge views the entire presentation and engages in a question-and-answer session following the presentation.

Participant Requirements:

- An illustrated Presentation may be given by one individual or a team of two individuals. If team members are not the same age division, they must compete in the age division of the oldest team member.
- All classes require the presence of the contestant(s).
- Participants may be penalized if their presentation exceeds the time limits.
- **Dress:** If possible, participant's attire should correspond with their presentation (be creative). Otherwise, 4-H attire is encouraged.
- The educational resource, *Communication Modules*, for youth participating in the Presentations Contest is available from the Extension Office.
- Presenters using computer-based visuals may bring files on a USB drive that is PC formatted. Participants may also provide their own computer or other equipment as needed; however, participants must be able to connect their computer to a HDMI cord.
- Live animals may be used in the presentation. Presenters are responsible for the care and handling of animals. Animals can only remain in the presentation area while the owner is present.
- All 4-H Presentation topics should be related to what the 4-H youth is learning through 4-H educational experiences.
- Enrollment in the project area in which the participant is making a presentation is not required.
- 4-H Presentations should include an introduction (the "why" portion of the topic), a body (the "show and tell" portion of the topic), and a conclusion/summary (the "what" portion of the topic).

Awards: The first-place winner in each division is eligible for a \$50.00 scholarship for a 4-H Camp of their choice, sponsored by the Knox County 4-H Council.

TALENT CONTEST

PARTICIPANTS: Each group must have 2 or more participants; all must be 4-H members. Limit of **two** entries per group or solo. Limit of one entry per class.

DIVISIONS: Participants will be divided into three divisions, Beginning (ages 8-10), Intermediate (ages 11-13) and Advanced (14 & over). Ages are on December 31 of the previous year.

TIME: The performance of each group or solo is limited to not more than six minutes.

SELECTION: Any number of songs may be sung or performed within the six minute time limit. Groups or solos may sing any selection of their choice. **A copy of the sheet music must be presented to the judge before performing.**

ACCOMPANIMENT:

Dance Classes – Only recorded background music may be used in the dance classes. Dancers must bring their own player. Please only have the music you need on the player.

Vocal Classes - Recorded instrumental background music may be used or singers may be accompanied by piano, guitar or other instruments. If using recorded music, please bring your own player and only the music you need on the player. If using a director, must be a 4-H member.

Instrumental Classes - All performers in the instrumental classes must be 4-H members. You must provide your own music stands. If using a director, must be a 4-H member.

TROPHIES will be awarded to the winner in each division, with the exception of the Other Division. Other Division will be awarded a rosette to the winner in each division.

Write an essay (3-5 pages) that showcases what was learned in this project area.

**B154907 Digital Media (Scoresheet SF94)

Design a form of digital media (advertisement, flyer, short video or presentation, social media or web page, etc.) that showcases what was learned in this project area. Upload the digital media file to an online location (website, Dropbox, Google Drive, YouTube, Flickr, etc.) and using the web address of the digital media file, create a QR code (using any free QR code creator, ex. Qr-code-generator.com). Print the following on an 8.5 inches x 11 inches sheet of cardstock: 1) the QR code; 2) 1-3 sentences about what viewers will see when they access the QR code on their mobile device.

POSTERS

Purpose: The purpose of a poster is to call attention to a subject. Every poster must be crafted to catch the viewer's attention quickly. Each must present only one specific message clearly. The poster should clearly feature some aspect of 4-H. Posters will be judged on the following criteria:

- Idea: simple, clear message, appropriate for a poster.
- Lettering: readable from a distance, appropriate size in proportion to art.
- Art: one dominate, eye-catching element; art relates to written message.
- Arrangement: makes good use of entire poster space without being too crowded; art and lettering

are well balanced.

- Color: use of bold colors that harmonize well; colors used are legible.
- Quality of Construction: neatness; appropriateness of materials used.
- Effectiveness: works well as a poster.

Posters must be 14 inches x 22 inches and must be of a material that can be pinned to a display board. They may be arranged either horizontally or vertically. Those generated by computer must also meet this standard. Computer art generated on an 8 ½ inches x 11 inches sheet of paper and mounted on poster board will be disqualified.

Posters may be in any medium: watercolor, ink, crayon, markers or computer graphics, etc. They may not be three-dimensional. Entries with components thicker than paper (such as milk cartons, pencils, pop cans) will be disqualified. Posters may not use copyrighted materials, such as cartoon characters or commercial product names, logos or slogans. Avoid using clichés or over-used phrases that do not command the viewer's attention.

When using the official 4-H Emblem (clover with the H's on each leaf), it must follow approved guidelines, which can be viewed at <u>http://4h.unl.edu/4hnameemblemguidelines</u>.

Computer "clip art" will not be scored as positively as original computer art designs. Entries which do not conform to size, content, or material guidelines will be lowered one ribbon placing. The 4-H member's name, age, and county must be listed on the back of the poster. Posters may be laminated to protect them. Loose plastic coverings used to protect the exhibit while being transported will be removed by the superintendent for evaluation and display.

But Theatre Arts isn't all you'll be doing. You'll also learn more about yourself, too. You'll learn things you can use all your life, like communicating with others, expressing yourself, making decisions and solving problems.

DIGITAL VIDEO PRO

PHOTOGRAPHY

The purpose of this project area is to establish basic to advanced knowledge of and abilities in using photographic equipment, lighting, and composition to capture images, express feelings, and communication ideas. Participants can work though the three project levels, progressing from basic to advanced photography skills and techniques.

- Youth in 4-H Photography Levels 2 and 3 are eligible to exhibit at the State Fair.
- All static exhibits must have received a purple ribbon at the county fair to advance to the State Fair.
- 4-H members are allowed to exhibit in only <u>one photography level</u>.
- An image may only be used on one exhibit with the exception of the Portfolios, which may include images entered in other classes.
- **Cameras** Photos may be taken with any type of film or digital camera, including phones, tablets, and drones.
- Photos must be shot by the 4-H member during the current project year with the exception of the Portfolios, which may include images captured and/or exhibited in previous years.
- Securely attach photos, mats, backing and data tags. Exhibits that are poorly attached may be disqualified.
- Do not use photo corners, borders or place coverings over the exhibits.
- **Portfolios:** All portfolios must include the following information: 1) 1-page max bio, 2) table of contents, 3) year each photo was taken, 4) title for each image, 5) device make and model used to capture each image, and 6) reflections for each photo. When writing reflections, youth should focus on what new photography techniques or skills they were practicing when they took the photo, what makes the image successful, and what could have been done to improve the image. Portfolios may be presented in either print or digital formats:

1. **Printed portfolios** should be presented in an 8.5 inches x 11 inches three-ring binder or similar book format. Recommended photo size is 8 inches x 10 inches. Matting is not necessary.

2. **Digital portfolios** may be presented online and must be exhibited along with a single 8.5 inches x 11 inches flyer. Flyers must include a link, URL, or QR code that takes users (judges and fairgoers) to their online portfolio.

- **Display Exhibits** Display exhibits are only accepted in Level 1 and Level 2 Classes. Displays consist of three, 4 inches x 6 inches photos mounted on a single horizontal 11 inches x 14 inches black or white poster or mat board. **Incorrect sizes will not be accepted.** No foam board backing should be used. Each photo in the display must be numbered using a pencil. Numbers should be readable but not distract from the overall display. No titles, captions, or stick-on numbers will be allowed. Photos may be mounted vertically or horizontally. Appropriate Data Tags are required (see rule regarding Data Tags).
- Print Exhibits Level 1 Print exhibits may range in size from 4 inches x 6 inches to 8 inches x 10 inches mounted in appropriate size cut matting (no frames) with a sandwich backing. Photos may be horizontal or vertical. Level 2 & 3 Print exhibits must be 8 inches x 10 inches prints mounted in 11 inches x 14 inches (outside size) cut matting with a sandwich mat board backing. Incorrect sizes will not be accepted. No foam board should be used for matting or backing. Mat openings may be rectangular or oval. Photos may be horizontal or vertical. No frames are allowed.
