Directions:

<u>West of Norfolk</u> (mainly gravel) -- West on Hwy 275 to Battle Creek spur; turn Right/North 9 miles (mainly gravel) road to dead end with Stop sign; turn Left/West 2 miles, the last mile has 3 curves; turn Right/North 1 1/8 miles; you've arrived - on the Left/West side of the road.

<u>North of Norfolk</u> (mainly pavement) -- On Hwy 81 to Hadar turn off; turn Left/West on Hwy 13 through Hadar and winding through Pierce on Hwy 13; (watch for golf course sign); turn Left/West pass the golf course on pavement to 544 Ave,; turn Left/South 1 7/8 miles on gravel road; you've arrived - on the Right/West side of the road.
