APPLICATION DEADLINE: postmarked by March 15, 2020

Who is Eligible?

1. **Female** born high school graduate (or soon to be) OR a UN-L student who has not resided at Love Memorial Cooperative Residence Hall (LMH) OR an undergraduate transfer student from another college or university pursuing **any major** for an **undergraduate** or **graduate degree**.
2. **Applicant must be or been a member of 4-H or FCCLA or FFA** (minimum of two years) or have taken a *minimum of three semesters in Family & Consumer Sciences classes* and **live in or attend school in the following Nebraska counties:** Antelope, Arthur, Banner, Blaine, Box Butte, Boyd, Brown, Cedar, Chase, Cherry, Cheyenne, Custer, Dakota, Dawes, Dawson, Deuel, Dixon, Dundy, Frontier, Furnas, Garden, Garfield, Gosper, Grant, Harlan, Hayes, Hitchcock, Holt, Hooker, Keith, Keya Paha, Kimball, Knox, Lincoln, Logan, Loup, McPherson, Morrill, Perkins, Phelps, Pierce, Red Willow, Rock, Scotts Bluff, Sheridan, Sioux, Thomas, Thurston, Wayne, Wheeler. **(Map on page 3)**
3. Must have *applied* (minimum) or *been accepted* (preferred) to **University of Nebraska - Lincoln**.
4. **Must have requested residency in Love Memorial Hall**, a cooperative residence hall on East Campus. Residents rotate responsibilities for cleaning a portion of the Hall and planning/preparing meals (around 2-4 hours per week; more time during a week when responsible for food preparation). The cost of living in Love Memorial Hall is less than half of what is charged for all other traditional dorms. Over a four year period this amounts to a savings around \$13,000. What is the Process?

1. Once you have determined your *eligibility*, complete the application form.
2. **Immediately** secure references from two adults, **one** of whom must be or has been your 4-H leader, or FFA advisor or FCS teacher. They are expected to describe their involvement with you, describe your character and why they believe you have a financial need, have the maturity required to apply themselves toward a degree, and successfully live in a cooperative residential situation. Once the individual has agreed to provide a reference, give each the form and **remind them of the postmark deadline date**. Provide each person writing a reference for you with a **stamped envelope addressed as found below**.
3. Submit your application, postmarked **no later than MARCH 15, 2020 to:**

Selection Process and Preference:

A complete application consists of:

- 1) the application submitted by the student
- 1) the **two separate letters of references by the postmark deadline.**

The student needs to help the two reference people. **Provide each of them** the RECOMMENDATION page **in ample time for each person to complete the form AND** type or write their recommendation, mail by the postmark due date—**MARCH 15, 2020**. Unforeseen delays can happen for the student or either of the reference people!

Mrs. Gloria Turnbull will confirm receipt of application and references by phone or email. If you have a preferred method for me to contact you, please indicate that in some way on your application. If you **do not** receive confirmation by 5 days after mailing, call (402) 362-6875 or email turnbull@inebraska.com.

Preference will be given to applicants who:

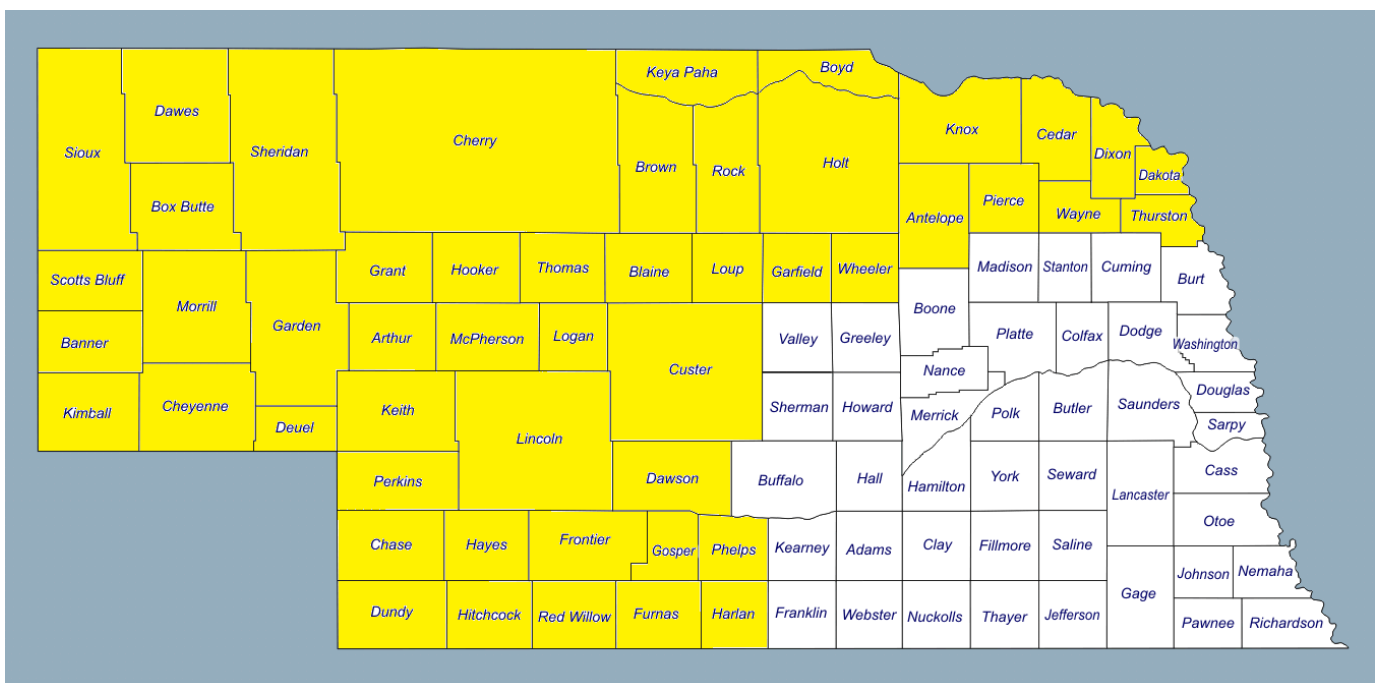
1. Exhibit substantial 4-H work, leadership ability in club work and/or community betterment
2. (FFA or FCCLA or FCS).
2. Demonstrate financial need for college assistance (disclose amount of other cash awards)
3. Have an aptitude for teamwork required in a cooperative residence.

The **recipient** and **school** will be contacted by **APRIL 1**. Presentation will be made through the recipient's chosen school. An alternate will be named in the event the recipient's plans change.

How Funds are awarded and funded:

Upon proof of residency at Love Memorial Cooperative Residence Hall, after the Fall Break, the recipient will be sent the first installment of \$250; the second installment of \$250 will be sent to the recipient following Spring Break if the student continues to meet the eligibility requirements. The total value of this scholarship is \$500. This scholarship cannot be renewed. It is available only to students NEW to residency in LMH.

This scholarship is supported by the Jarvis family and Gloria Turnbull. In addition to the monetary award, there is more than a 50% savings in housing costs and the family-like living environment of LMH.

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4-H, FFA, FCS members - THANK YOU for your interest in this private unrestricted scholarship.

My younger sister, Linda, and I grew up in North Platte, Nebraska through high school. Our 10 years of 4-H membership in the Lively Lassies Club was led by Mrs. Chloe Jarvis who guided us through many projects and leadership opportunities. She was instrumental in the lives of many girls prior to our years and years after. The Jarvis family and I created the Jarvis Scholarship, as a tribute to Chloe's many years of service in 4-H. Because of Chloe's teaching ability, many girls earned ribbons at Lincoln County and State Fairs. Sister, Linda, Love Hall Class 1970, passed away in 2007. I include her in this tribute.

Before marriage, Mrs. Jarvis taught school. Her husband was an over the road truck driver, being gone much of the time. Her family eventually numbered 6 children - 3 boys and 3 girls. All were in 4-H, living on the edge of town. She didn't drive but always found a way to get to a 4-H meeting or event or have the club meet in her home. She also led Boy Scouts groups for her sons and other youth groups.

My introduction to Lincoln was the 2 State Fairs I went on judging teams as a Junior and Senior in high school. I attended the University of Nebraska for 4 years graduating with a Bachelor of Science in Home Economics Education with a minor in Textiles and Clothing in June 1966. My ability to afford college was a result of having good summer jobs while living at home, living in Love Memorial Hall and being accepted for a job under Work Study the last 2 years. No debt for Linda or me. Linda lived at LH for 4 years.

Don Love was a good business man and mayor of Lincoln for 2 terms in the 1930s. He and wife Julia had no children. They were frugal but staunch supporters of education and philanthropic toward the University by donating money for a number of buildings that carried their name. They wanted students to work toward their education. Julia felt the homemaker was a vital part of the family. With those values in mind, Department Chair, Miss Margaret Fedde, encouraged Mr. Love to consider funding a building for Home Economic female students since there was no housing on Ag Campus. Off campus housing was very substandard. This was to be housing that practiced daily homemaking skills while being economical. After Julia's death, Don donated the funds toward the Love Memorial Cooperative Residence Hall which opened in September 1941. The same principles continue today.

I seldom went home for several reasons. Girls rarely had a car for transportation at that time. Interstate 80 began in Omaha and ended at Seward. The remainder of the drive was on Highway 30, with traffic lights in every town, small and large. It took 5 hours of steady uninterrupted driving time. If I rode the bus, it was hard to get to the stations in each town plus there was a cost. The times of leaving Lincoln and arriving in North Platte were at odd hours because the bus stopped for meals, to let passengers on and off and re-fuel.

IF I could find a student driving West, with space for me and my luggage, it was easier. I was picked up on Ag campus and returned back to LH. Packing 5 kids in a car with some luggage was not uncommon. The main time I went home was a week at Christmas time. Some girls lived closer to Lincoln which made their travel easier; even for a parent to come get them on a weekend.

Students seldom called home – long distance was too expensive. Nor did we receive calls from home unless there was an emergency. Most communication was by letter. For local calls we had one phone incoming and another outgoing for 49 girls. In those years, Housing hired older women, often widows to supervise manners, duties, and ate dinner with a Unit. All "house mothers" had to enforce the University hours women were to be in the Hall on week nights and weekends. We also had to sign in and out when leaving for overnight and weekends. And have permission to go home.

My intention for this scholarship is to assist women who live a three or more hour drive from Lincoln but wish to attend the University of Nebraska. I understand the reality of the added expense of money and time. AND make that goal reachable by the financial boost this scholarship gives plus the larger savings brought by residing in Love Memorial Cooperative Residence Hall.

Love Memorial Cooperative Residence Hall is home to female born students from any time enrolled here through graduate years. LMH is self-governed, advised by trained live-in female UNL Housing staff with 24-hour secure entrances. Time management, life skills and cooperation with others are by-products of shared work plus a sense of ownership in a home away from home. The doors of LMH opened in September 1941.

Most residents have double rooms, with single room options. All rooms inside Love are non-smoking with designated smoking areas outside. Each room has controls for heat/air conditioning and computer hook ups. Each of **4 full bathrooms** (2 showers, 2 toilets) have a **tub** in each with **personal towel racks** and **drawer space**.

Common Living Areas:

Front Lounge entry 1st floor – spacious carpeted reception room for all guests and residents with modern upholstered furnishings, full draperies, large custom-made walnut cabinet with TV/DVD and baby grand piano.

Recreation Room - lower level –comfy movable sofas, large screen TV for residents and their guests, wood floor for dancing, trophy case, large window seat. 5 kitchens with adjacent dining rooms, party /make-up dressing room, computer lab, recycling room, two sets of card-operated laundry equipment, bulk food pantry, extra refrigerator and freezer, indoor bicycle storage, multiple storage areas, and storm / tornado shelter.

PJ lounge - 2nd floor - carpeted with comfortable colorful casual furnishings – private for residents and female guests to study or visit giving the roommate privacy in the shared bed room. The large south windows provide a pleasant view of a wide expanse of grass and quiet zone between the building and Holdrege Street traffic.

Elections are held to fill the RESIDENT officer positions. Residents holding leadership positions are exempt from other duties. The rotated duties take up to 2-4 hours per week for everyday upkeep of the dorm and **a free week with no duties**. Cook's duty is one week. Depending on the cook, this may take up to 8 hours per week. Most duties can be done on a flexible schedule to fit around the residents' class schedules and activities. Regular building maintenance is provided by the University. The efforts of residents result in *saving a minimum of more than 50% over other traditional dorm fees*. **Refer to Cost Comparison on page 5.**

Most UNL housing options have a choice of 5- or 7-day meal plan. Because of the cooperative arrangement, LMH offers a **7-day meal allowance**. The five separate kitchens / dining rooms accommodate 6-8 students. Residents may select from dining units that feature *Meat & Potatoes, Vegetarian, or Healthy*. Modern high quality appliances and cooking equipment - smooth top double oven stove, dishwasher, microwave, heavy duty mixer, crock pot - are in each kitchen. The Food Chair officer reviews each incoming cook's menu prior to the week she will cook. Menus are checked to determine that the food is what those women prefer and is nutritionally balanced. The cook can use a Hy-Vee card to shop. The dorm receives some items in bulk that all kitchens share. A family-style atmosphere is created; **NOT** cafeteria style. Guests may be invited to meals with advance notice to the **COOK**.

The intercampus bus stop is near LMH. It is free for UNL students with service only between campuses. A variety of social events are held among the residents and with other houses on campus. Upper classmen assist those new to LMH through a big sister / little sister program.

LMH is the only UNL housing entity to have an **Alumnae Association** who support the residents with finances toward hall enhancement, unrestricted annual scholarships awarded directly to the current students through an application process, a mentoring program and shared events each year.

A tour of Love Memorial Hall can be arranged:

Academic Year: Allow 48 hours minimum notice (longer time preferred) to schedule a LMH officer (resident student) to arrange the tour. Visitors are encouraged to choose days during the **academic year** so they can receive a very detailed tour. Residence halls are closed Thanksgiving, Semester Break and Spring Break.

Summer months: Contact facilities department at (402) 472-1028. They use that time to do annual maintenance work. Reserve at least **a week prior** to the date desired to walk through the building WITH A GUIDE.
